Package Description

This package is for PCCEP Facilitation and Community Engagement Carryover. PCCEP has been meeting regularly during FY 21-22 and is looking to evolve their work to include more support for their planning and community engagement. In order to support this, the onetime funding will include professional facilitation for FY 22-23, interpretation, upgraded live-streaming, and supplementing their community engagement by contracting with community based organizations. In addition, the PCCEP office lease expires in June, 2022 and the increase in rental rates has PCCEP looking for alternative office space. There will be one-time costs with an office space move. The goal is to complete this work in FY22-23. There is a small risk that a small portion falls into FY 2023-24.

Service Impacts

The growth and reach of this program would be limited if this carryover is not approved. PCCEP efforts with community engagement has been well received but the carryover funding would support the growth of these efforts.

COVID 19 restricted meeting in person this fiscal year. Next year we know there will be increases due to the new law that requires in person and online meetings for all public meetings.

Equity Impacts

PCCEP is a required part of the Settlement Agreement which focuses on police use of force in situations involving people having a behavioral health crisis. Mental health disorders are disabilities. We also know that Black, Indigenous and People of Color communities are overrepresented in the Mental Health disorder populations. If the carryover is not approved, it will affect community engagement activities and facilitation.

In previous supplemental budgets, funds for alternative outdoor shelters (\$3.0 million General Fund one-time) and COVID-19 Homeless Response (\$5.1 million ARP) were placed at the Portland Housing Bureau (PHB). Shortly after approval of the fall BMP, the City and County agreed to put these funds into a second IGA with the Joint Office of Homeless Services (JOHS) administered by the Office of Management and Finance (OMF). The package reflects the funds being put into Special Appropriations (PHB has a sibling package removing the funds from their budget). The IGA is nearing completion, and both of these amounts will be spent by the end of the current fiscal year.
