



North Portland Aquatic Center: Phase 2 / Cycle 2 Online Survey Summary – August 2025

For the second cycle of engagement for the North Portland Aquatic Center (NPAC) design process, the design team at Scott Edwards Architecture provided three updated design options that responded to input received in the prior engagement cycle in March 2025, provided more detailed layouts, and showed exterior building design options.

Community members were invited to give input via an online survey in English and Spanish. The survey was promoted through email to the overall 5,500 email subscribers for the project, posts on social media, attendees at the community gathering on August 21, and direct outreach to local schools and community partners. The online survey was open for two weeks from August 21 – September 4, 2025.

Three responses were received in Spanish and were incorporated into the overall summary. A total of 500 responses were received. It should be noted that this report reflects the opinions of those who chose to participate in this survey and is not necessarily representative of the broader community.

This online survey was part of a larger engagement effort in August 2025 that also included:

- 8/18/25: NPAC Project Advisory Committee (PAC) meeting
- 8/19/25: Focus Groups with Priority Communities
- 8/21/25: Community Gathering at Roosevelt High School
- 8/23/25: Display at Kidz Outside Festival at George Park
- Portland Public School staff meeting
- Technical Advisory Committee review (a group of PP&R staff who will maintain and program the future NPAC and park amenities).

All input received in this cycle of engagement will be used to further the final design for the North Portland Aquatic Center, and the next round of engagement for the preferred design concept will occur in early 2026. In a few words or sentences, tell us why you ranked your #1 option. Below is a summary of the comments for each design option. A full list of all comments can be found as an appendix at the end of this report.

Heart of the Park: 42% of responses ranked this option #1. Here are some major themes why:

- **Layout/site plan/overall flow** – Many felt this has the best overall layout with a good flow that is logical, appealing, and balanced and will integrate into the neighborhood and park.
- **Open recreation space** – maintains a lot of open recreation space and maintains what people enjoy about the park.
- **Parking/entry** - This and Beacon in the Park were preferred by the majority of responders because of the entry from Fessenden into the parking lot. The entrance has good visibility and access from the parking lot and bus stop/sidewalk, and there is a second entrance for competition entry and drop-off.
- **Trees** – This option was highly favored because it preserves more trees than in Beacon in the Park. Several liked the design of Beacon but were concerned about tree impacts, so rated this higher.
- **Outdoor Amenities** – Many liked the location of the splash pad and pavilion in this design for integration into the park and creating safe spaces. Some were concerned that the pavilion in Beacon was too close to the building and entries, and that the pavilion in Geneva was too far in the NE corner making it a place for negative behavior at night and hard to unload equipment for events. The curvy design of the plaza in Heart of the Park was also favored.
- **Interior Design** – the 2nd story spectator area, pool layout, and windows were mentioned.

Beacon in the Park: 38% of responses ranked this option #1. Here are some major themes why:

- **Layout** – It was noted this appears to have shortest distance from parking lot to pool which is important for people with disabilities, and overall, many liked the layout and design.
- **Open recreation space** – This rated highly because it maintains the largest open field for soccer and other sports.

- **Parking/entry** – Like Heart of the Park, a majority preferred these two options that have access to the parking lot from Fessenden and a clear entrance from the parking lot. Beacon consolidates all the parking into one main parking lot, and some appreciated that meant more parking opportunities for the aquatic center.
- **Tennis courts** – This was the only design that preserves the existing tennis courts, instead of converting them into parking, and many ranked that high. While the courts may not be in good condition, they are still used, and a small parking lot was not seen as a desirable replacement.
- **Trees** – A few noted that most of the impacted trees in this option are nuisance trees, so not as high a priority for preservation and non-nuisance species could be planted instead.
- **Building exterior design** – The distinctive exterior corner of this building and the views Fessenden were mentioned frequently, and people appreciated the windows giving views into the pool.

Meet Me at Geneva: 17% of responses ranked this option #1. Here are some major themes why:

- **Parking/entry** – This option overall was not ranked highly, but for those who did, largely it was because they favored the parking entrance on Geneva. They were concerned that Fessenden may be too busy of a street and create congestion or safety issues with people coming in/out of the aquatic center.

10. Raised spectator seating & splash pad.
11. Spectator seating on the second floor.
12. Nice curves on rec pool.
13. Heart of the park design makes the best use of building space
14. I like the pool layout, direction of light and prioritizing of windows
15. This design prioritizes the swim facility above other tradeoffs, and the swimming facility is more important to me than any other consideration. for example the second story observation deck maximizes space and visibility.
16. Interior flows and circulation from lockers to both pools looks confusing.
17. I will be honest, the renderings were hard to decipher what the inside of the building would look like and how the layout would be for staff so I can't speak to that.

4. Low profile of building

5. Skylights
6. Strip windows break up mass along Fessenden.
7. Best transition from human-made to nature.
8. Terraced roof (ideally acting as a skylight) and exterior window design allowing to maximize natural light.

11. It was a close call between Heart of the Park and Meet Me at Geneva. I like the building design better for Heart of the Park.
12. Beacon definitely has the most striking view from Fessenden, with the slide right there for all to see, but in general, Heart of the Park is the best overall design.
13. The look of Beacon in the Park is better.
14. It feels more landscape-forward, as though it will feel green no matter what part of the interior or exterior you are located. The exterior feels most classic and timeless, as well as most likely to fit within the neighborhood (without dominating the neighborhood).
15. I feel that more effort was put into the design, and the other options fall flat.
16. You had me with the waterslide that projects outside.
17. The design seems the most organic/aesthetic
18. Architecture
19. The overall design aesthetic
20. I do not like the building in this option, however.
21. However from the outside I love how Beacon in the Park has that giant front window. I feel like Heart of the Park should take inspiration from that as currently it kind of looks like a church rather than a place for community fun.
22. All three need more thought on the exterior design. Look like generic industrial sheds.
23. Visually, it is very noticeable from Fessenden.
24. The only thing I like better about my second choice is the entrance view into the pool.
25. The other two options create more unfortunate pedestrian circulation that overlaps with vehicular movement than the first- these two types of travel need to be separated for safety.
 - a. It also appears to be the most structurally feasible. As details are developed, many of the architectural gestures of the other two will prove to not be possible.
 - b. This is the only place to leave open comments, so here are some concerns i have about the project goals. Using a CM/GC model is not a goal, that is a process. It can be a valuable tool to get immediate pricing and constructability feedback during design, but it can also be used to "value engineer" down to conventional, unsustainable building methods. And while a GMP is provided, it is poorly enforced, so the accountability promise of the model is undermined.
 - c. I also take some exception to the idea that "high performance sustainability" needs to be balanced with "long-term operational success". Sustainability implies and requires long term success; to set them up as conflicting goals is absolutely the wrong way to think

about sustainability and suggests it is an "extra" thing. There is no good design that is not sustainable design, full stop. This is a particularly important consideration for a aquatics center that will have an extremely high demand for water and energy.

- d. Please encourage SEA to lose the impossible, wafer-thin roof profiles and ribbons of glazing and opaque materials that ignore the realities of proper envelope detailing, structural systems and energy code. It does no one any good - residents, PP&R or anyone else - to sell a vision that cannot be executed. We all know better, even in schematic design, and regardless of prescriptive or performance path OEEESC compliance.
- e. Daylighting analysis would be a valuable next step for these designs. The options include big gestures of clerestory and monumental curtain wall glazing - these can be very problematic for glare when the sun is shining directly in your eyes while swimming, or make it impossible to see the flags for backstroke. It doesn't appear to be well-distributed light in many of the options.

19. parking lot is easily accessible to the center
