Google Form

<u>Closed-ended responses (N = 324)</u>

- SE (28%), NE (25%), SW (12%), N (12%), E (8%), NW (8%), outside (3%)
- Female (54%); 31% male; 9% nondisclosers; 4% gender non-conforming; 0.6% Trans
- Hetero (44%); 23% missing; 14%
 ~disclosers; 8% bi; 6% queer; 4% lesbian, 3% gay
- White (75%); 10% ~disclose; 7% Asian; 4% Latino; 2% Black; 2% Middle Eastern/North African; 1% Indigenous
- 14% have a disability
- 7% have experienced homelessness
- Average income: \$80-100K (*M*=5.22)

• <u>Open-ended responses (N = 127)</u>

- SE (28%), NE (25%), SW (14%), N (12%), E (10%), NW (6%), outside (<1%)
- Female (50%); 27% male; <u>13%</u> nondisclosers; <u>7%</u> gender non-conforming; <1% Trans
- Hetero (39%); 19% missing; 18%
 ~disclosers; 9% bi; 9% queer; 4%
 lesbian, 2% gay
- White (73%); 14% ~disclose; <u>2%</u> Asian; 5% Latino; 2% Black; <1% Middle Eastern/North African; <1% Indigenous
- <u>19%</u> have a disability
- <u>10%</u> have experienced homelessness
- Average income: \$80-100K (*M*=5.18)


Google Form

- Procedure and Analysis
 - Closed-ended responses
 - Descriptive statistics: Averaged and ranked
 - Open-ended responses
 - Content analysis: Quantifying qualitative data (Krippendorf, 2004)
 - Qualitative data review comment by comment
 - Codes created to represent individual "meaning units"
 - Codes essentially counted whenever present (1's and 0's)
 - Codes combined into themes according to shared/similar content
 - Descriptive statistics run on emergent codes and themes




Average rating

City to increase access to addiction and behavioral health resources. More rapid citywide expansion of the Portland Street Response program. City to increase access to unsheltered and houseless community resources. City to invest in an improved police records system to allow for greater transparency and less harmful... BOEC to increase its transparency regarding the public safety calls it receives, its protocols to limit the... City to ensure the Behavioral Health Unit remains fully funded and maintained. City to partner with community organizations to form a restorative justice program that moves away from... Pilot program to be expanded to handle a larger volume of dispatched calls. City to invest further in ensuring effective wellness programs are available for police and other first... City to create an alternative body of people who would handle traffic safety. Additionally, we would... Police to increase the number of officers who receive enhanced crisis intervention training. City to significantly increase funding to the Office of Violence Prevention on a permanent basis. Private security patrols to be removed from public spaces, replaced by PS3s or a similar city run program.



- Fifty-five codes were derived from the survey's qualitative responses (*i* = 55)
 - Comments often include multiple topics and complex content (*c* = 321 from the 127 open-ended responses)
 - Overall, five categories (themes) surfaced in the data:
 - 1. Support for services alternative to policing (36%)
 - 2. Police reforms neutral/negative (25%)
 - 3. Funding (16%)
 - Not prioritizing, non-increases, reductions, or defunding (73%)
 - Maintaining, adequately supplying, or increasing (27%)
 - 4. Police reforms positive (13%)
 - 5. Miscellaneous (11%)





- Task at hand
 - Whether or not this data influences your recommendations in terms of content, strength, or direction
 - Additions, subtractions, or caveats to the recommendations or just confirmation
- Future steps on the data side
 - Composite scores (across items) helps for summaries and more complicated analyses
 - Crosstabulations to see group differences
 - Relationships between items
