City Officials	<ul> <li>Statement from Portland City Mayor Ted Wheeler         <ul> <li>Thanks PCCEP for their service, recognizes the work is not easy however it is appreciated. Echo's the mission of the PCCEP is to work closely with the Mayor's office, Portland Police Bureau (PPB) and the community to achieve desired outcomes of equitable policing above constitutional requirements. And to engage in meaningful community dialogue and build trust in PPB.</li> <li>Shares the Department of Justice notified the City that it is in substantial compliance with all terms of the Settlement Agreement.</li> <li>Acknowledges the work is not done- We collectively provide more services and support to people experiencing mental illness and continue to explore ways to reduce uses of force including deadly fore and work to do with racial disparities in the criminal justice system.</li> <li>An expectation that PCCEP continues after the Settlement Agreement goes away- its vitally important to maintain PCCEP. Working on implementing surveys for the youth at MacLaren. Mission statement finalized "Our mission is to lift the voices of people of color to shape how Portland Police Bureau (PPB) engages with our communities equitably." 	• Within each paragraph a statement will be made on rather or not PCCEP believes the City is in substantial compliance with each of those pieces of the Settlement Agreement regarding PCCEP.
	• Public Comment- Hopes that PCCEP will continue, that there will be a community- based group where the community can come to share their concerns. And hopes to see change the outcomes of reducing use of force that have real outcomes and not just checking boxes in the Settlement Agreement.

Procedural Justice Recommendation	<ul> <li><u>Procedural Justice Statement Policy Recommendation</u></li> <li>PCCEP discussion - The Recommendation is a policy proposal. This is a framework for the Procedural Justice policy. This is a policy concept and framework not the actual policy.</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>Public Comment – Collect data on the "reasons" for conducting a traffic stop vs. collecting traffic stops data which is already happening.</li> <li>Pass by a vote of 6-0</li> </ul>
