Um, so I'll tell you a little bit about the DLO program. It's, uh, dialogue Liaison.

We go out and talk with, and it's not only...

Some people think it's just protests, it's community events, it's protests, it's demonstrations.

It's anybody who wants to talk with us, and part of what we do is try to...

Uh, help support people's right to free speech, so that...

Uh, everybody has the right to have their opinion heard, and to have that opinion.

[DiMatteo] 18:42:18

Uh, other people may not agree with it, uh, it may not be what the city agrees with,

[DiMatteo] 18:42:24

But that's all irrelevant.

[DiMatteo] 18:42:26

Because you have the right to have that, and my team...

[DiMatteo] 18:42:29

We're going to defend your right to have your opinion,

[DiMatteo] 18:42:32

Regardless of...

[DiMatteo] 18:42:34

Um, what it is. Just because that's the freedom of... that's the First Amendment.

[DiMatteo] 18:42:39

Um, everybody has that.

[DiMatteo] 18:42:41

Part of what we do also is we do crowd stewardship.

[DiMatteo] 18:42:45

So, at a lot of events or protests,

[DiMatteo] 18:42:48

We try to stay out of them.

[DiMatteo] 18:42:51

Unless there is a need for police intervention. Uh, the crowd, um...

[DiMatteo] 18:42:55

is able to manage itself in most of these. The demonstrators

They're going to know what they want more than we do, so...

[DiMatteo] 18:43:02

We try to go out, we talk to them, we find out...

[DiMatteo] 18:43:05

If they have any plans, if they have any concerns, any wants or needs,

[DiMatteo] 18:43:09

And then we try to step back, or we'll find out from them

[DiMatteo] 18:43:12

at what point would they like some intervention?

[DiMatteo] 18:43:15

Um, are they able... do they have de-escalators there who are able to help

[DiMatteo] 18:43:19

de-escalate maybe counter-protesters who come.

[DiMatteo] 18:43:22

Or is that something they're not prepared for, or don't understand how to deal with?

[DiMatteo] 18:43:26

Um, but again, it's... we usually defer to them to find out what

[DiMatteo] 18:43:32

Uh, what level of involvement they want from the police.

[DiMatteo] 18:43:36

Um, let's see...

[DiMatteo] 18:43:40

Uh, and for a crowd management type stuff, a lot of times we will work with the rapid response team.

[DiMatteo] 18:43:45

Um, and we function as a kind of go-between between the protesters and command.

[DiMatteo] 18:43:52

Where, if somebody says, like, hey... so let's say... I'll use the, uh...

[DiMatteo] 18:43:58

the marches they have downtown.

[DiMatteo] 18:44:00

Sometimes the marches will say,

[DiMatteo] 18:44:03

We would like to go down this street.

[DiMatteo] 18:44:06

And from that, I've suggested, well, here's the permitting process. If you want, you can go through that direction to...

[DiMatteo] 18:44:11

have streets closed down, kind of like Roast Festival, when they do that.

[DiMatteo] 18:44:15

Or, if they're not comfortable going through that process, you could ask

[DiMatteo] 18:44:18

And then I can pass it up to command, and say,

on this date, is that something that we can accommodate?

[DiMatteo] 18:44:25

Uh, and find out, is there a way the police and the community can work together

to make a... an event successful, or...

that it'll have on just regular city business.

So, those are primarily what we do. Currently, we have a team who's over at the ICE facility.

on a nightly basis.

And again, that is to...

help people, you know, get out what their opinions are, to have their protests. Sometimes you will have disagreements,

And we'll go over, and we'll just...

We'll politely let people know, like, you know what, everybody has the right to their opinions, you're not... you may not agree with the other person.

But, talk about it, because it...

Sometimes people just kind of lose that perspective that...

everybody should be able to have a voice.

[DiMatteo] 18:45:15

And that's what makes having a voice important, is

You may not agree with the other person,

[DiMatteo] 18:45:21

But, at the same time, they may not agree with you, but if nobody listens, that's when people start fighting.

[DiMatteo] 18:45:27

And that's when, kind of usually an enforcement has to take care... happen. And we don't want that. I... I would always rather see the...

the groups in the community be able to

[DiMatteo] 18:45:38

you know, politely disagree, or even... they may even find a common ground, you never know.

[DiMatteo] 18:45:43

Uh, so that kind of, in a nutshell is... is what the...

Um, what the Dialogue Liaison Program has?

[DiMatteo] 18:45:52

Um, so I don't know if, uh, if there's any...

[DiMatteo] 18:45:56

questions that people have, uh, or...

[DiMatteo] 18:45:59

if I'm supposed to turn it over to the next person?

[DiMatteo] 18:46:02

Um, and again...

Yeah, let's... yeah.

So I was gonna say, if people typed it, uh...

Being on the phone, it's gonna be really hard for me to try to find the...

kind of the chat section, if somebody had typed in a question.

So, I am more than happy if somebody who's, like, on a full computer,

We trained in de-escalation, but is there another group that's like the RRT that you...

um, get to help with de-escalation, or...?

[Tia Palafox] 18:47:18

Are you all doing that as well?

[DiMatteo] 18:47:20

So, we help to de-escalate.

[DiMatteo] 18:47:23

Uh, the Rev Response Team can help de-escalate.

[DiMatteo] 18:47:26

However, their primary function is more of...

[DiMatteo] 18:47:30

Um, when there's an incident that needs...

[DiMatteo] 18:47:33

some enforcement. A lot of times, though, they're out there, too, like...

[DiMatteo] 18:47:37

They're over at the ice building, just engaging and communicating with people.

[DiMatteo] 18:47:41

Um, but a lot of times, they are sent in for focused arrests as well.

[DiMatteo] 18:47:45

Where if somebody has been identified as having committed a crime,

[DiMatteo] 18:47:49

and needs to be kind of removed from the group, that's what they will go in.

[DiMatteo] 18:47:54

And work towards. A lot of times, we'll go first to try to de-escalate people and let people know

[DiMatteo] 18:47:59

you know, peaceful protest versus, you know, if...

[DiMatteo] 18:48:03

graffiti, uh, fighting, uh, breaking, like...

[DiMatteo] 18:48:06

what the difference is between peaceful and not peaceful protests are.

Yeah.

[Dori Grabinski, PCCEP Program Manager] 18:48:17

Thank you, Tia and Kayla?

[Kala Franklin (she/her)] 18:48:22

I had a question. I read an article from the Oregon Live,

[Kala Franklin (she/her)] 18:48:27

And it says that there are people who are streaming, uh, nightly and regularly, but they do it, uh, for...

[Kala Franklin (she/her)] 18:48:34

some sort of attention economy, and I would assume, like, pro-lown exposure to conflict would cause some sort of...

[Kala Franklin (she/her)] 18:48:43

um, reactive, like, psychologically state, uh,

[Kala Franklin (she/her)] 18:48:46

the dress of the situation.

[Kala Franklin (she/her)] 18:48:47

Um, there is a particular streamer and other streamers that are causing buyer crimes.

[Kala Franklin (she/her)] 18:48:53

Uh, I want to know if the dialogue officers, uh, refer to the Behavioral Health Unit and other

[Kala Franklin (she/her)] 18:49:01

units to, uh, have some sort of intervention or preventions.

[Kala Franklin (she/her)] 18:49:05

Uh, to decrease that kind of behavior

[DiMatteo] 18:49:09

So, we don't normally refer people to the Behavioral Health Unit unless there is a mental health component to this.

[DiMatteo] 18:49:16

Um, and then, kind of, you brought up a second part to where it was...

[DiMatteo] 18:49:22

to kind of maybe dissuade or prevent this, uh...

[DiMatteo] 18:49:25

So that isn't something that we're going to do at all.

[DiMatteo] 18:49:28

Just because...

[DiMatteo] 18:49:30

it's... they're streaming, and they are going to have a counter view to other people who are down there, however,

[DiMatteo] 18:49:36

If the city were to go in and say,

You can't stream because you have a view different than the majority of the other people.

we would then be chilling free speech, and that's...

[DiMatteo] 18:49:45

Part of the first event, we can't do that. We can't tell somebody that...

one person's opinion is more valid, or...

[DiMatteo] 18:49:52

able to be shared versus another person's.

[DiMatteo] 18:49:54

Um, but yeah, for the behavioral health part, unless... if there was some indication this person had any mental health,

Uh, episode, or was experiencing some of that, then it could be referred to the...

behavioral health, but the streaming itself, um, doesn't rise to that level.

Thank you, Leslie.

[Leslie Martinez] 18:50:21

Yeah, thanks, um, yeah, thank you so much for being here and, uh, being on mobile. I know that that's difficult being out there, just, um, so...

[Leslie Martinez] 18:50:29

I... I had a question about reporting and, like, incident reporting, what that looks like for your group.

[Leslie Martinez] 18:50:34

Um, just because I know that, like,

[Leslie Martinez] 18:50:36

part of it is trying to avoid conflict and things like that, but do you... so, I'm... typically, reports don't really get written unless, like, something actually happens or transpires, so I was wondering,

[Leslie Martinez] 18:50:48

How does that work within your unit, and, like, how... what reporting is... is done?

[Leslie Martinez] 18:50:55

when things happened.

[DiMatteo] 18:50:58

So, I guess it kind of depends on...

[DiMatteo] 18:51:00

the reporting, so normally, like, if we're thinking about a...

[DiMatteo] 18:51:05

If a person came up to me and said, I am the victim of this kind of crime,

[DiMatteo] 18:51:09

Um, what we're going to do is we are likely going to call in the rapid response team to go, because they have more people,

[DiMatteo] 18:51:16

to come and take that report. And part of the reason we do that is... if I were to just start taking the report right now,

[DiMatteo] 18:51:24

I am now not able to dialogue with somebody. If they're, let's say,

[DiMatteo] 18:51:29

Um, an arrest comes out of it.

[DiMatteo] 18:51:31

The RAD response team comes in,

[DiMatteo] 18:51:33

and arrest a person,

[DiMatteo] 18:51:36

And now the dialogues are all... the dialogue officers are also involved in that, because we are part of the investigative

[DiMatteo] 18:51:42

portion of it. Now the... the protesters, the group,

[DiMatteo] 18:51:46

they start wondering, well, why did this person get arrested?

[DiMatteo] 18:51:49

And part of what we, as dialogue officers, do is, when arrests are made, we will tell the group, like, well, here's why this happened.

[DiMatteo] 18:51:55

and help to, um...

[DiMatteo] 18:51:58

Help people to understand what was going on, or what caused this action.

[DiMatteo] 18:52:01

If we are taken out of that, the group will protest, they are left to kind of come up with their own ideas as to why this happened.

[DiMatteo] 18:52:09

And we've seen it before, where people say,

[DiMatteo] 18:52:11

10 minutes ago, that guy wasn't doing anything.

[DiMatteo] 18:52:14

the police just came and arrested him,

[DiMatteo] 18:52:16

And then the protest or the group may think, well, the police are legitimate because

[DiMatteo] 18:52:21

He wasn't doing anything when I saw him.

[DiMatteo] 18:52:23

So, they are now just a resting peaceful protesters, where we can then say,

[DiMatteo] 18:52:27

Well, no, it was actually part of... he committed a crime against another person,

[DiMatteo] 18:52:31

And this is kind of the result of that. So...

[DiMatteo] 18:52:35

For reporting like that, we usually try to stay out of it.

[DiMatteo] 18:52:38

However, there's instances, like the other day,

[DiMatteo] 18:52:41

Um, a person came up and said, hey, I lost, um...

[DiMatteo] 18:52:44

I lost a component to my phone as I was...

[DiMatteo] 18:52:47

running over here, and I had actually seen somebody pick it up,

[DiMatteo] 18:52:50

We went over, talked to him, and tried to get it back. At first, there was a disagreement because of their political opinions.

[DiMatteo] 18:52:56

But, so we got involved in the... in that part of it, because since I had actually watched it,

[DiMatteo] 18:53:01

to try to pass something off like that would be a little bit more cumbersome. Now, I'm trying to explain to another officer about it, so for those, I will write a report.

[DiMatteo] 18:53:09

But for the most part, we try to stay...

[DiMatteo] 18:53:12

Um, able to just engage with the community.

[Dori Grabinski, PCCEP Program Manager] 18:53:22

Thank you. Um, Pia, is that a legacy hand?

[Tia Palafox] 18:53:26

I did have one more question that, um...

[Tia Palafox] 18:53:29

he almost answered was, I was wondering if, um, you all do FDL

[Tia Palafox] 18:53:34

Officers also arrest people, or is that not something that you have, then?

[Tia Palafox] 18:53:40

paratidial.

[DiMatteo] 18:53:42

So, we're actual police officers. Uh, we are the same as any other police officer.

[DiMatteo] 18:53:47

This is... yeah, this is an auxiliary duty for us.

[Tia Palafox] 18:53:48

More than often.

[DiMatteo] 18:53:51

Um, we've all... everybody who's a DLO,

[DiMatteo] 18:53:55

is a DLO because they want to, because they want to be with the community, they want to try to help.

[DiMatteo] 18:53:59

and improve things, and work towards it, and we believe in the First Amendment and people's rights.

[DiMatteo] 18:54:03

Um, we try to reserve our arrests for...

[DiMatteo] 18:54:08

If there's nothing else that can be done right now.

[DiMatteo] 18:54:10

So, if I was watching an assault happen,

[DiMatteo] 18:54:13

yes, I'm going to intervene now, because it's a life safety thing.

[DiMatteo] 18:54:17

If somebody came up and said, hey, I...

[DiMatteo] 18:54:20

this person just stole from me.

[DiMatteo] 18:54:23

I would probably then call the, uh, response team to come over,

[DiMatteo] 18:54:27

And do that again, because...

[DiMatteo] 18:54:29

It is... it's property, and that can be taken care of.

[DiMatteo] 18:54:32

It may take a couple extra minutes for the rapid response team to get there.

[DiMatteo] 18:54:36

But it also keeps me then free from doing that. But yes, uh, we try to reserve it for life safety incidents.

to still be part of the, uh, the event.

Um, do you mind... I'm just curious how the conversations are going out there. I mean, I know that's, uh, kind of a...

Personal question, in a way, but I'm curious how your conversations are going, and sort of what de-escalation strategies you're using, and sort of what's successful and what's not working. I just kind of want insight on how it's going

Sure. So, the conversations range from

[DiMatteo] 18:55:30

people being appreciative for us being out there.

[DiMatteo] 18:55:33

people not understanding why we're out there, or not understanding what

[DiMatteo] 18:55:39

kind of just going on in general over there.

[DiMatteo] 18:55:41

Uh, two people telling us to F off.

[DiMatteo] 18:55:44

So, we have... it's... you have...

[DiMatteo] 18:55:46

pleasant and unpleasant conversations.

[DiMatteo] 18:55:49

But regardless, it's... and for me,

[DiMatteo] 18:55:51

they're all conversation, because if we weren't having these,

[DiMatteo] 18:55:54

People will then just make up their own

[DiMatteo] 18:55:57

Um, kind of narrative as to what's happening right now.

[DiMatteo] 18:56:01

without any input, or they're kind of in a vacuum, or may not know why the police are there, what they're doing.

[DiMatteo] 18:56:06

We've explained, we've had people ask, well, why aren't the police doing

[DiMatteo] 18:56:11

Um, X action. Why did they do Y action?

[DiMatteo] 18:56:14

So, a lot of it is just talking to people and working with people to help them understand things.

[DiMatteo] 18:56:19

Um, the de-escalation tools we use, a big one is just listening.

[DiMatteo] 18:56:24

Uh, everybody wants to be heard. Everybody wants to feel like they have a voice, so...

[DiMatteo] 18:56:29

The best thing that I can do is just... I listen to people.

[DiMatteo] 18:56:32

Um, so sometimes through them just getting it out,

[DiMatteo] 18:56:35

They just wanted to vent sometimes, and...

[DiMatteo] 18:56:38

we're... I'll accept that. Uh, other people have legitimate concerns, like, well,

[DiMatteo] 18:56:42

I saw this happening in my neighborhood, walking me down, and then we'll... we'll try to talk through it, and...

[DiMatteo] 18:56:48

Uh, I don't try to deal in a whole bunch of generalities. I will try to...

[DiMatteo] 18:56:53

kind of, uh... not really pull the conversation, just kind of...

[DiMatteo] 18:56:56

get more information, or get them into a conversation about

[DiMatteo] 18:56:59

what it is they're looking for, because sometimes the...

[DiMatteo] 18:57:02

it'll be, I heard from somebody else that this is going on.

[DiMatteo] 18:57:06

And I'll ask more about, like, is that what you're seeing? Is that what you're feeling, or why?

[DiMatteo] 18:57:10

why is it like this? And try to get...

[DiMatteo] 18:57:13

both sides of it, so people think about, too,

[DiMatteo] 18:57:16

Think about the question of what can be done about some of the things they are seeing or experiencing or hearing.

Ben, okay, yes, Gabby, I saw... I thought I saw you can't go back up.

[Gabrielle Poccia] 18:57:26

Oh, actually, yeah, no, I do. Can I... if I could just follow up. Okay, so thank you.

Yeah, yeah, if you have a follow-up.

[Gabrielle Poccia] 18:57:30

I appreciate that. Yeah, thank you for that information. I'm curious, because I had also, um, like, heard about, like, the streaming, sort of there being, like, a bit of an aggressive element, like, via streaming, and I'm curious if you're, like,

[Gabrielle Poccia] 18:57:44

What is the strategy around when you see somebody coming in who

[Gabrielle Poccia] 18:57:49

Obviously, there's... there...

[Gabrielle Poccia] 18:57:51

allowed to be there, but if you see it kind of causing a problem, like, what's your strategy around that? Is it to separate people? Is it to, like,

[Gabrielle Poccia] 18:57:59

talk to the streamer. I'm just, like, curious, sort of, what's going on out there regarding that specific thing that's happening. And...

[Gabrielle Poccia] 18:58:06

Also, how often are you seeing that? Like, what's your take on that? Because when I read the paper, it seems like it's happening kind of a lot, and becoming, like, picking up steam.

[DiMatteo] 18:58:15

Yeah, so for the streamers, I just tell people,

[DiMatteo] 18:58:19

And it's... uh, I want to say, too, you have streamers who are on the left who are on the right. You have streamers who are Republican-Democrat. There are streamers from each side, each political view, from no political view out there.

[DiMatteo] 18:58:32

Um, and each one is trying to get their views out there, get their message out there.

[DiMatteo] 18:58:38

And I tell people that...

[DiMatteo] 18:58:40

a lot of what... what makes the streams

[DiMatteo] 18:58:45

Um, trying to think, uh...

[DiMatteo] 18:58:48

enticing, or where people want to view them?

[DiMatteo] 18:58:50

is the conflict. So, if you go over there and you take their bait, if they...

[DiMatteo] 18:58:55

If they're challenging you into this debate, or challenge...

[DiMatteo] 18:58:58

If you take the bait and go over there and talk to them,

[DiMatteo] 18:59:00

That's what's going to get the views. They're going...

[DiMatteo] 18:59:03

If it becomes an argument, if it becomes heeded, that gets more views for them.

[DiMatteo] 18:59:07

So, a lot of what I tell people is, don't take the bait.

Uh, do not detain or interfere unless there is an immediate threat to life and you have probable cause to believe a state crime is occurring.

Um, yeah, so regarding, excuse me, DHS.

Um... what can PPP do in the moment beyond verifying the identity of the federal agent? Can they give out red cards? Can they provide the phone number to

The DEA agent ran a stop sign,

[] 19:15:21

Intercyclist and subsequently killed them.

[] 19:15:24

Um, the DEA agent was, uh, initially charged in state court. He was moved to federal court.

And the judge, uh, McShane, and I'll put

[] 19:15:35

the, uh, decision here in the chat.

[] 19:15:37

You can read it if you would like.

[] 19:15:40

Essentially states that because the federal agent was operating, um, under... I'm giving you the Cliff Notes version here, it gets into more detail in what I put in the chat.

But essentially, that if... because they were

[] 19:15:52

essentially conducting a federal investigation and operating under federal statute that they could not

[] 19:15:58

be prosecuted in state court.

Um, but they operate under the same constitutional standard that we do.

what we deem to be foresight as excessive.

Um, that is just something that...

can be documented and set up via a report, and we feel like it's completely egregious, we... that's something that... that we can document and send it to the chain of command for review.

[Kat M] 19:49:43

But the people who pay the price are always the same. It's our unhoused neighbors, it's immigrants living in fear of ICE,

People of color and people struggling just to survive.

[Kat M] 19:49:53

So, like, right now, we have 12,000 people, maybe more, who are living without homes, and wonder when the police will come and take their belongings.

If they're going to be given a citation, or if they're gonna be arrested simply for their financial and residential status. That's not safety. That's cruelty dressed up as law and order.

Public safety cannot mean that we sweep people off sidewalks while officers walk free after misconduct.

[Kat M] 19:50:15

And it cannot mean protecting property while ignoring human life.

[Kat M] 19:50:19

And it cannot mean fear for some, so that comfort can exist for others.

[Kat M] 19:50:24

So I'm hoping that, like, as PCCEP continues growing, there is a demand for real transformation from the police. One, holding the Bureau accountable, no matter who's uncomfortable, to confronting bias and impunity that makes trust impossible,

Three, address the directives that turn neighbors into targets, and four,

[Kat M] 19:50:42

Strongly recommend that the mayor attends these meetings, not his staff like Chris Taft.

The mayor needs to be here. He needs to meet the community, not just those he likes and those who tell him to paint a rainbow with frogs on the sidewalk at the detention facility.

Portland can't claim to be progressive or compassionate while it's most vulnerable are punished for existing.

We need a police force that actually protects life and not power, that builds trust and not trauma, and that remembers that every person deserves to be safe, not just the privileged, not just the housed, and not just the comfortable.
