NARRATIVE:

On July 30, 2019 at 1711 hours, I received a page from Detective Sergeant Whattam to respond to SE 122nd Avenue and SE Ankeny Street, to assist with an Officer involved shooting. On July 30, 2019 at approximately 1815 hours, I arrived at SE 122nd Avenue and SE Ankeny Street. At approximately 2020 hours, in order to familiarize myself with the scene, I entered the crime scene, which was located on SE Ash Street, west of SE 122nd Avenue. I exited the crime scene at approximately 2025 hours.

Detective Sergeant Hughes asked Detective Reynolds and me to interview Officers Tom Chong and Bryan Anderson at East Precinct.

Officer Tom Chong interview:

On July 30, 2019 at 2240 hours, Detective Reynolds and I interviewed Officer Tom Chong, with union representative Daryl Turner present, at East Precinct, in the former District Attorney's office. The interview was audio recorded and I placed a CD copy of the interview into evidence, as noted on exhibit 1, item 1.

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[Note: For the ease of the reader, the following information is a summary of the interview. This summary may not follow the exact and precise chronological order of the interview as it progressed. Additionally, this summary does not contain each and every topic of discussion mentioned during the course of the interview. For additional information and specific details of the interview, to include the exact and precise chronological order of the interview as it progressed, and each and every topic covered during the course of the interview, please refer to the DVD recording of the interview.]

Officer Chong told me he was district 942 on July 30, 2019. Officer Chong told me he was dispatched to the old Safeway, which was located at 221 NE 122nd Avenue. Officer Chong told me the Safeway is no longer open for business. Officer Chong told me the call was regarding a witness who had witnessed a subject breaking into a Jeep. Officer Chong told me the suspect had confronted a security officer. Officer Chong told me the suspect told the security officer he was a Federal Officer and had "pulled a knife out." Officer Chong told me the call was at around 1630 hours, which was around shift change.

Officer Chong told me he received an additional update from dispatch, which was the security officer was backing up and the suspect was charging towards the security officer with a knife. Officer Chong told me the update stated that the security officer was keeping his distance and was not engaging the suspect. Officer Chong told me dispatch updated the suspect was near the entrance of the Safeway and was screaming and yelling. Officer Chong told me he received an update from dispatch that the suspect was walking towards a Tri-Met bus stop, which was on NE 122nd Ave, and was "trying to pick a fight with somebody" and still had the knife.

Officer Chong told me he believed he was the first officer to arrive on scene. Officer Chong told me Officer Zentner was with him as well on scene. Officer Chong told me he retrieved his 40MM less lethal launcher from his patrol vehicle. Officer Chong told me he updated dispatch and requested officers to meet at Safeway, in order to make a plan.

I showed Officer Chong a map which was previously printed from Google maps of NE Glisan Street and NE 122nd Avenue. Officer Chong told me he entered the parking lot from NE Glisan Street, west of NE 122nd Avenue. Officer Chong told me as he arrived, he observed the security officer near the west entrance of Safeway. Officer Chong told me he observed who he believed was the suspect, near NE 122nd Avenue. Officer Chong told me the security officer was keeping his distance from the suspect. Officer Chong told me he could not understand what the suspect was saying to the security officer. Officer Chong told me the security officer came to his patrol car. Officer Chong told me the suspect began to walk towards a bus stop, which was on the west sidewalk on NE 122nd Avenue. Officer Chong told me the suspect then walked southbound on NE 122nd Avenue and he lost sight of the suspect due to the Safeway building.

Officer Chong told me he drove his patrol vehicle towards where he last saw the suspect, near the northeast entrance of the Safeway and NE 122nd Ave. Officer Chong drew a line on the map and drew an "X" near where the suspect was positioned. See attached. Officer Chong told me the suspect was near the Tri-Met bus stop.

Officer Chong told me Officers Zentner, Santos, and Budey were on scene as well. Officer Chong told me there were pedestrians on the sidewalk and in the area. Officer Chong told me he had his 40mm less lethal slung around his shoulder. Officer Chong told me he regained sight of the suspect. Officer Chong told me he could not understand what the suspect was saying. Officer Chong told me Officer Zentner tried to communicate with the suspect. Officer Chong told me the suspect had a hatchet hanging on his belt. Officer Chong told me the hatchet had a green handle, and had no sheath. Officer Chong told me the hatchet was approximately one and a half feet long and was similar to a Gerber style hatchet. Officer Chong told me the suspect was moving back and forth. Officer Chong told me he gave the suspect a force waring. Officer Chong told me he warned the suspect that if he reached for the hatchet, he will be shot with a less lethal round.

Officer Chong told me the suspect grabbed the hatchet and raised the hatchet. Officer Chong told me he raised his 40MM less lethal towards the suspect. Officer Chong told me he was not comfortable with his backdrop due to the amount of pedestrians standing in the vicinity. Officer Chong told me he was approximately fifteen feet away from the suspect.

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Officer Chong told me he was concerned that if he used the 40mm less lethal and missed or it had no effect, he would have to reload based on the single launch system. Officer Chong did not want to precipitate a deadly force incident. Officer Chong decided not to use the 40MM launcher. Officer Chong told me the suspect walked away, southbound on NE 122nd Avenue. Officer Chong told me he asked for an ECIT Officer, and a additional 40MM operator. Officer Chong told me they did not have a good dialog established with the suspect. Officer Chong told me Officer Budey had his Glock out of the holster and Officer Santos had his Taser. Officer Chong told me he and the officers were communicating a plan, by dividing assignments, while waiting for additional resources.

Officer Chong told me the suspect continued to walk southbound on NE 122nd Avenue, while holding the hatchet with his right hand. Officer Chong told me at NE 122nd Avenue and NE Couch Street, he observed a dark colored SUV parked at the stop sign. Officer Chong told me he was concerned because the SUV was occupied and the suspect was walking towards the driver's side door of the SUV. Officer Chong told me the suspect continued to walk southbound on NE 122nd Avenue. Officer Chong told me he and additional officers continued to follow the suspect.

Officer Chong told me as they approached NE 122nd Avenue and E Burnside Street, his concerns increased because E Burnside Street is a heavily populated area. Officer Chong told me in addition, there is a Tri-Met Max platform as well. Officer Chong told me there were additional units arriving from the south. Officer Chong updated their location on the radio. Officer Chong told me officers arrived and tried to talk to the suspect. Officer Chong told me the suspect continued to walk southbound.

Officer Chong told me once they arrived at around E Burnside Street, Officer Chong told me he believed he heard what sounded like a 40MM launcher being fired. Officer Chong told me he did not see who fired the 40MM launcher. Officer Chong told me the suspect was near the south side of E Burnside Street. Officer Chong told me the suspect dropped the axe on the south side of E Burnside Street and NE 122nd Avenue, near the gas station. Officer Chong indicated their path of travel on the map labeled 122/Burnside, (see attached). Officer Chong told me he was near the north side of E Burnside Street, near the Max tracks. Officer Chong told me the suspect stopped walking. Officer Chong told me the suspect then walked into the southbound lanes of traffic on NE 122nd Avenue. Officer Chong told me the suspect was mostly in the outside (#2) lane of traffic. Officer Chong told me the suspect continued to walk southbound and then turned westbound on SE Ash Street. Officer Chong told me he believed the suspect was possibly having a mental health crisis or was under the influence of an unknown drug, and was in need of medical treatment. Officer Chong told me he told dispatch that the suspect was running westbound on SE Ash Street. Officer Chong told me he lost sight of the suspect. Officer Chong told me he was between E Burnside Street and SE Ankeny Street, on SE 122nd Avenue. Officer Chong told me a group of officers followed the suspect on SE Ash Street.

Officer Chong told me he stayed towards the north, in case the suspect ran towards the north. Officer Chong told me he heard gun shots. Officer Chong told me officers requested EMS by radio and additional officers arrived. Officer Chong told me he did not go to the crime scene. Officer Chong told me he returned to Safeway and contacted the Security Officer. Officer Chong told me the security officer said the suspect had a black folding knife. Officer Chong told me the security officer's name was Will Rosenbalm. Please see Will Rosenbalm interview for further details.

We concluded the interview at 2325 hours.

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
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

SUMMARY:

This report will document my initial role in assisting with the investigation into an officer involved shooting that occurred on July 30, 2019, at approximately 1640 hours, at 12026 SE Ash St, Portland, Oregon.

NARRATIVE:

On July 30, 2019, at approximately 1645 hours, I was in my office and was made aware of an officer involved shooting that had just occurred in the area of SE 122nd Avenue and SE Ash Street. Detective Sergeant Whattam requested I respond to the scene to assist with the investigation. I called my partner, Detective Harris, and requested he respond as well. Once on scene, I remained within the confines of the yellow police tape and checked in with Detective Sergeant Whattam. At approximately 1800 hours, I was assigned to conduct a telephone interview with the original 9-1-1 caller, WILLIAM "WILL" ROSENBAUM. I conducted the phone call from my vehicle and the call was recorded. The following is a summary of the interview with ROSENBAUM and is not necessarily in chronological order. For complete details of the interview with ROSENBAUM, please refer to the transcript and/or CD recording.

SUMMARY OF WILLIAM ROSENBAUM INTERVIEW:

ROSENBAUM told me on July 30, 2019, at approximately 1622 hours, he was working uniformed security for Sally Beauty, which is located at 11966 NE Glisan Street, Portland, Oregon. ROSENBAUM said from the store he observed a male in the parking lot who he believed was breaking into a red or black Jeep Wrangler parked near the store. To clarify, ROSENBAUM

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initially reported the vehicle as red in color but later realized it was actually black in color. ROSENBAUM described the subject as a white male; in his 30's; who appeared "scruffy"; wearing baggy, black pants; a black belt with diamonds on it; a black shirt; a black hat; and in possession of two backpacks. Further, ROSENBAUM said the subject had an open blade on his right side.

ROSENBAUM said he alone exited the store to speak with the subject. ROSENBAUM said he watched the subject take a red gas can out of the back of the Jeep. ROSENBAUM said when he initially confronted the subject, the subject told him the items he was taking belonged to him and that he (the subject) was a federal agent. ROSENBAUM said the subject told him to back away from him. ROSENBAUM said at that point, he noticed the knife he observed earlier was no longer on the subject's side. ROSENBAUM said he reacted by pulling his Asp baton and ordering the subject to back away from him. ROSENBAUM said the subject then began to rummage through his pockets while telling ROSENBAUM he was going to produce identification. At some point during this interaction, ROSENBAUM called 9-1-1 to report the situation.

ROSENBAUM said the subject started walking away from him and he followed at a distance of approximately 15 to 30 yards. ROSENBAUM said the subject charged at him and he ordered the subject to get back. ROSENBAUM said the subject walked near the neighboring Safeway store, put on gloves, and with his knife out, began yelling at bystanders. ROSENBAUM said he (ROSENBAUM) started telling the bystanders to get back. ROSENBAUM said an unknown male approached the subject and engaged him in a brief conversation. ROSENBAUM assumed this person was a friend of the subject because this person told ROSENBAUM that the subject was "okay" and was a "schizo". ROSENBAUM said the subject then reached into his backpack and produced an ax. ROSENBAUM said this occurred in the sidewalk area on NE 122nd Avenue next to a bus stop near Safeway. ROSENBAUM said at this point, the subject was claiming to be military police.

ROSENBAUM said the subject charged at him with the ax and he responded by pulling his Asp baton and ordering the subject to get back. ROSENBAUM said the subject then walked along NE 122nd Avenue and began hitting random objects with the ax. ROSENBAUM said the first Portland Police Officer had arrived on scene by then and he advised the officer of the ax. ROSENBAUM said the officer went to the rear of his patrol car to retrieve what he thought was a less lethal weapon system and told ROSENBAUM to stay behind. ROSENBAUM said he returned to his store and did not hear or see anything else. Finally, ROSENBAUM said Sally Beauty has video surveillance that captures the interior of the store and he was not aware of video surveillance in the parking lot of the complex.

At approximately 2020 hours, Detective Harris and I were assigned to conduct witness officer interviews at East Precinct. At approximately 2030 hours, I entered the crime scene in order to view the scene of the shooting in order to aid in the interviews I would be conducting. On 07/30/2019 at 1700 hours, I was assigned to assist Detective William Winters and Detective Anthony Merrill with an Officer Involved Shooting Investigation that occurred near the intersection of SE Ash Street and SE 122nd Avenue. At about 2030 hours, I entered a crime scene checkpoint at SE 122nd Avenue and SE Ash St. I walked to an apartment complex breeze way at 12026 SE Ash Street and viewed the scene from the public sidewalk.

At about 2122 hours, I was assigned to interview a witness, Officer Shanley Bianca, at East Precinct. The interview was audio recorded and transcribed. Detective Arjay Dran and Union Representative, Officer Scott Robertson, were also present. The following is a summary of the incident and not intended to be verbatim. Review the recording, which was later submitted into evidence under Property and Evidence Receipt #A123224, and/or review the transcription for the full record.

Officer Bianca advised she was working patrol and while leaving roll call heard a call of a man with a hatchet. She said she responded code 3 and found the mobile disturbance near the intersection of SE 122nd Avenue and SE Burnside Street. Ofc. Bianca told me she parked in this intersection and stepped out of her car. She advised she saw a white male subject flailing his arms, with unknown objects in his hands, making his way southbound on foot. She could see a group of other officers verbally engaged with the man, later identified as LANE MARTIN. Officer Bianca said as the group moved south, she and another officer, Officer Hristov, went back to a patrol vehicle, and began to follow the group, south on SE 122nd Avenue. Officer Bianca told me from her vantage as the passenger, she never saw MARTIN again, until later when he was challenged in the breeze way.

Officer Bianca said it appeared the group made its way west on SE Ash Street. She said she got of the vehicle and noticed officers continuing to verbally engage the subject at the nearby apartment complex. She told me she made it to the breeze way and took a position near a couple steps just off the public sidewalk, but behind a group of officers. She said she observed the officers addressing the subject who was standing just beyond the officers, but facing them. Officer Bianca told me she had her sidearm at a low ready position only. Officer Bianca advised she heard officers giving the subject commands and heard the subject reply, "No." Officer Bianca said she observed the subject raise his arms up so his elbows were bent, and hands in front of his chest, similar to a boxing stance. Officer Bianca told me she could see a knife in his right hand. She stated just after he raised them he took one or two steps toward the group of officers and then heard a volley of shots.

Officer Bianca told me she saw the subject slump to the ground. She said moments later, another officer produced a shield, and she moved forward, in-line with the other officers. At this point she told me she did point her pistol at the subject. She said they moved up to the subject and other officers started providing medical aid. Soon after, she noticed tenants from nearby apartments coming out and she described the scene as becoming volatile. She and another officers started to speak with tenants trying to calm them down. I asked Officer Bianca if she fired her weapon and she told me she did not.

After the interview, I assisted Criminalist Mark Johnson with the documentation of a weapon's count with Officer Shanley Bianca. She handed over her duty belt. I removed a Glock 19 9mm pistol with serial number BEAG694 from a duty holster. I removed the magazine and cleared the chamber which ejected one live round. I also assisted by removing two magazines from

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the duty belt pouches. They were unloaded and each of the three magazines had 17 live rounds in them. Criminalist Johnson took photographs and then all items were returned to Officer Bianca. I directed Officer Bianca to meet with command staff where she would need to review and sign a Communication Restriction Order.

I was clearing the garage at East Precinct when I heard "shots fired". I heard the location of SE 120th and SE ASH ST. I drove code 3 to get to the scene. I proceeded North bound on SE 119th Ave to SE ASH St and made a quick right turn onto SE ASH St and parked my car to the right. I ran up to the shooting scene to assist in any way. I got up to where the suspect was lying and I checked on A/Sgt. Kemple #39589 who was performing chest compressions on the suspect. Other officers on scene were rendering other first aid measures. I asked A/Sgt. Kemple if he was okay or if he needed relief and he said "yes". I told A/Sgt. Kemple that I was ready to switch as soon as he needed. A/Sgt. Kemple almost immediately told me he was ready to switch. I got into place to take over chest compressions and I did so as soon as he stopped. I continued with chest compressions until I was relieved by Portland Fire.

Once I was relieved by Portland Fire, I began taping of the front of the apartment complex (inner perimeter). Once I finished putting up crime scene tape, I started the crime scene log for the inner perimeter. I started by documenting the officers that were already inside the crime scene area. I did not put the time that they entered on the log because that information was not available to me. After I was able to document everyone that was already inside the crime scene, I was able to record everyone else who entered the inner perimeter and their times.

I remained at the entry point of the inner perimeter until we were given the all clear and advised that we were able to break it down. I assisted with picking up all of the medical packaging and trash that was left from the scene. We threw away one or two IFAK kits that were utilized and were contaminated.

I responded from my district in North Precinct to assist East Precinct on taking priority calls. Moments after arriving in East Precinct territory I was sent to the shooting scene to assist. I parked my vehicle on SE 122nd Avenue, just south of Burnside, behind several other PPB vehicles. I walked to SE 122/Ash and checked in with Sgt Lacey Sparling. I checked in with the crime scene log. Sgt. Sparling walked me over to Sgt Felts near the shooting scene. He directed me to the upper concourse in the apartment complex, directly above the shooting scene. I was directed to maintain scene security with other officers, as residents in the apartments were coming out and could potentially approach the shooting scene area. Several citizens were upset and some were yelling at myself and other officers. After a short period of time the situation calmed down. I attempted to speak with the citizens who were standing outside on the concourse to determine if any of them were witnesses to what occurred. None of the people I spoke with claimed to have seen anything, and most of those citizens said they did not want to speak with the police.

I was relieved by Sgt Felts at approximately 1910 hours. I then left the scene after checking in with Sgt Sparling.

On July 30, 2019 I responded to a disturbance. On the radio I heard reports of a suspect and that he was traveling south on SE 122nd Ave. I left East Precinct and started that way. I head the suspect was westbound. I heard someone say over the radio shots fired. I headed to the scene and saw cars on SE Ash St. I grabbed an IFAK kit out of a patrol car on Ash St. since I did not see one in my car. I walked into the apartment complex and saw officers providing first aid. I saw what appeared to be a possible bullet would on the back of the suspect so I placed a HyFin Chest Seal. Another officer (unknown who he was) asked for more chest seals so I took another HyFin Chest Seal out of the packaging and gave it to him. A/Sqt. Kemple was also providing first aid and I saw he was moving his 40mm Launcher to the side so I offered to take it so it would not be in the way. After the he was done with first aid, he asked me to secure the launcher so I placed it in the back lockbox of my patrol car. Prior to placing it in the box, I made the launcher safe by taking the round out of the chamber and placing it in the buttstock carrier. A/Sgt. Sawtelle later retrieved the launcher from my car. I returned to the scene to assist in setting up crime scene tape and holding a perimeter position to the south of the complex near unit #105 at 12026 SE Ash St. by the open gate to keep people out.

On Tuesday, July 30th, 2019 at approximately 4:22 p.m., I was on patrol in a marked Transit Police patrol vehicle and was in uniform displaying a badge. I heard a call dispatched that indicated a citizen had called police to report a male had just tried to break into a vehicle at 221 NE 122nd Avenue, Portland, Oregon. The suspect was described as a white male adult (WMA), wearing a black hat, black shirt, and black pants, while also carrying a backpack. It was reported that the suspect had confronted a security guard. It was reported that during the confrontation with the security guard the suspect had pulled out a knife. Portland Police officers started to arrive in the area and it was broadcast over the radio that the suspect was armed with an axe and was threatening people.

- I arrived on scene at approximately 4:35 p.m. and observed the male suspect walking southbound on 122nd Avenue while waving an axe. I further observed several Portland Police officers following the suspect while ordering him to "Stop!" and "Drop the weapon!"
- I parked and exited my patrol vehicle between Burnside and Davis on SE 122nd Avenue. My partner and I were standing on the passenger side of our patrol vehicle when the suspect walked into the street and came toward us. As the suspect approached us, he was waving the axe in his right hand. I yelled at the suspect to "put down the weapon," but he failed to do so. Instead, he continued past my vehicle, passing approximately 25 feet from me. I had my taser in my hand, but I did not point it at the suspect.
- I observed the suspect approach a vehicle on 122nd Avenue and, as he did so, he was waving the axe and yelling at the occupants of the vehicle. The suspect continued to walk south on 122nd Avenue and crossed Burnside while continuing to wave the axe around, causing multiple civilians walking in the area to jump out of the way to avoid him.
- I observed at least two different Portland Police officers fire less lethal sponge rounds at the suspect, striking him in the legs. The suspect continued to walk south on 122nd before being struck with an additional less lethal round. The subject did fall/go to the ground as a result of being struck by the less lethal rounds and, in doing so, dropped the axe onto the ground. The suspect did not remain on the ground; rather, he got back on his feet and began running from officers.

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As the suspect ran from officers I heard over my police radio an officer advise that the suspect still had a knife in his possession. I observed the suspect run around a corner at 122nd & Ash Street as Portland Police officers continued to follow him while directing commands at the suspect to "Stop!" and "Drop the knife!"

Approximately 30 seconds after the suspect ran onto Ash Street, I heard multiple gun shots, followed by an officer broadcasting over the radio, "Shots fired!" I did not see the shooting occur, but, as stated, I did hear the shots fired.

Following the officer involved shooting, while directing traffic at 122nd Avenue and Stark Street, I was approached by a person who claimed to have witnessed a portion of the incident. The witness identified herself as "Sarah Adonri." Adonri said she was at Burnside and 122nd Avenue when she saw the suspect waving an axe around. Adonri said that she heard Portland Police officers say, "Drop it!" but the suspect continued to head toward Stark Street, disregarding the officer's orders.

No further information at this time.



While on duty and assigned to East Precinct I responded to the area of SE 122nd Ave / SE Ash St when on scene officers requested additional support for a disturbance with a weapon.

Initial Call Remarks:

- 1 AGO, WTNSD SUBJ BREAK IN TO A RED JEEP, SUSP NOW CONFRONTING SECURITY CLAIMING HE IS A FEDERAL OFFCR...HE JUST PULLED A KNIFE OUT
- I arrived on scene as an officer broadcast over the radio that shots were fired and the suspect (Martin) was down. I located the group of officers in the walkway area of the apartment complex.
- I saw Martin laying on the ground. As a group we approached the suspect with the shield and took Martin in to custody.
- Officer immediately began giving the suspect medical attention. To include chest seals, tourniquets, and CPR. AMR arrived and cleared shortly after.
- I assisted by securing the area and placing business card markers near the bullet casing that were on the ground.
- I secured the downstairs walkway area of the apartment complex, to the South, and approximately forty feet away from Martin.
- I gathered statements from three apartment residence. Apartment # resident,
 John Grimes, said he did not see or hear anything leading up to the shooting.
 Grimes stated he was sitting in his apartment watching TV with the windows and door closed when he heard at least 6 or 7 gunshots. Grimes said he heard some sort of commotion outside his apartment afterward but did not know what it was.
- Resident of apartment # , Lori Miller, said she did not see or hear anything leading up to the shooting. Miller said she was sitting in her apartment with the

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windows and door closed when she heard about 6 gunshots. Miller said she heard a women screaming afterward but did not understand what she was screaming.

Resident of apartment # , William Deweese, said he was sitting next to the open window when he could hear police sirens in the distance. Deweese said he heard shouting coming from outside his window. Deweese said he heard multiple people yelling, "Stop (multiple times)" from what he thought were police officers.

Deweese said he heard about 6 gunshots outside his window. He said he looked outside his window and saw Martin "staggering" toward the officers from the staircase for a few steps. Deweese said he saw Martin fall to the ground. He said police immediately started giving Martin medical attention.

After FED processed the scene I assisted with the clean up of crime scene tape.

On 073019 around 1640 I was at East Precinct in the process of logging in for the start of my shift. I heard "shots fired" on the radio and responded immediately to SE 119th Ave / SE Ash St. I blocked traffic at this location. Ultimately I logged into CAD and attached to the call. CAD times will not be a an accurate representation actual arrival time.

While blocking traffic I spoke with WI - DUARTE-CAMARERO. He told me that prior to the shooting he was stopped at a red light on E Burnside St at SE 122nd Ave, facing east, in the left turn lane. He said that as his light turned green an Officer arrived in a vehicle and blocked traffic. He saw at least two other officers on foot following the suspect. He said that the suspect was holding a green axe, and showed me with his hands estimating that the axe was around 18"-24" in length.

DUARTE-CAMARERO told me that the Officers were telling the suspect, "Drop it! ...

Drop it! ... Drop it!" At the same time he said that the suspect was "waving it" (the axe) and was yelling, "No! ... No! ... No!" He said that the suspect ultimately set the axe down, backed away slightly, and then as the officers got closer he grabbed the axe again. He said that Officers were keeping their distance from him. He said that the suspect was soon after shot with no more than 2 "beanbag rounds". The suspect then ran west onto SE Ash St from SE 122nd Ave.

I showed DUARTE-CAMARERO my 40mm less lethal launcher, and he verified that this is what he saw Officers shoot the suspect with when he referred to a "beanbag".

Per the direction of Sgt. Felts, I walked DUARTE-CAMARERO to his house at DUARTE-CAMARERO retrieved his computer and let his dog out for a moment, then I walked him back out of the crime scene.

At 0011 on 073119 the crime scene was broken down and I departed.

SUMMARY
East Precinct officers responded to a 911 call regrading a male armed with a knife near SE 122nd Avenue and E Burnside Street. The male, later identified as LANE MARTIN, was contacted by responding officers, who learned he was also armed with a hatchet. Officer Kemple, as well as another officer, deployed his Less Lethal launcher at LANE MARTIN, which caused him to drop the hatchet. LANE MARTIN was subsequently fatally wounded by another officer. This report documents the countdown of Officer Kemple's Less Lethal launcher at the scene.

NARRATIVE

On July 30th, 2019, I responded to SE 122nd Avenue and E Burnside Street to assist with investigating an Officer Involved Shooting. During the course of the investigation, I was assigned to locate and conduct a countdown of Officer Kemple's Less lethal launcher. Officer Kemple was no longer in possession of his launcher, and I requested Acting Sergeant Sawtelle assist me with locating the launcher. A short time later, Acting Sergeant Sawtelle brought me the launcher and explained Officer Kemple had been providing medical assistance to LANE MARTIN with his launcher in the slung position, and Officer Valdez took the launcher from Officer Kemple and secured it in his vehicle. Prior to securing the launcher in his vehicle, Officer Valdez removed the 40mm round from the chamber and placed it into the buttstock pouch on the launcher. I later confirmed this statement with Officer Valdez (see Supplemental Reports by Officer Valdez and Acting Sergeant Sawtelle for complete details). At approximately 1955 hours, Criminalist Becker and I conducted a countdown of Officer Kemple's Less Lethal launcher. Criminalist Becker was also present to document the weapon countdown via photographs.

I noted the breech of the LMT 40mm launcher was empty. The buttstock pouch on the launcher, which is capable of holding two cartridges, contained one 40mm "eXactiMpact" cartridge, which I removed from the upper pouch. I then presented an empty launcher to Criminalist Becker. The launcher was a LMT 40mm Less Lethal launcher, SN #FW14939.

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There were no other 40mm cartridges, and the leg pouch containing spare 40mm cartridges was not present, but had been located inside the scene of the shooting. The Less Lethal launcher and 40mm cartridge were collected by Criminalist Becker.

I relayed the results of the countdown to Detective Winters. This investigation is ongoing.

SUMMARY

On July 30th, 2019, an Officer Involved Shooting occurred at 12026 SE Ash Street, Portland, Oregon. This report documents the interview of Officer Nicholas Bianchini who deployed less-lethal force during the incident.

NARRATIVE

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CONFIDENTIAL

On July 30th, 2019, at approximately 1711 hours, I received notification from Sergeant Whattam to respond to the area of SE 122nd Avenue / SE Ankeny Street to investigate an Officer Involved Shooting. I arrived on scene at approximately 1745 hours. Once the investigative team was assembled, I attending a briefing on the incident in the mobile command center given by the initial responding uniform personnel. At the conclusion of the briefing, Sergeant Whattam directed Detective Gradwahl and me to respond to East Precinct to conduct interviews of involved officers. I entered the inner crime scene at approximately 2031 hours to familiarize myself with where the shooting took place. I cleared the inner crime scene at approximately 2035 hours, and responded to East Precinct.

At East Precinct, Sergeant Hughes assigned Detective Gradwahl and me to interview Acting Sergeant Kemple, Officer Piombo, and Officer Bianchini. Refer to the report prepared by Detective Gradwahl for information on the interviews of Acting Sergeant Kemple and Officer Piombo.

The interview of Officer Bianchini was conducted in a meeting room off the lobby of the precinct, and began at approximately 2235 hours. The interview was audio recorded in its entirety. Officer Bianchini was represented by his attorney Nicole Robbins during the interview. The following is a summary of Officer Bianchini's statement.

On July 30th, 2019, Officer Bianchini started his shift at 1600 hours and heard a call on the police radio regarding the incident at NE 122nd Avenue and Glisan Street. He said Officer Zentner advised via radio that the suspect was waving around a machete, and she requested additional officers to her location. Officer Bianchini responded to the incident and while in route he heard an update on the radio that the suspect was walking near the intersection of SE 122nd Avenue and E Burnside Street. Upon arrival at that location, Officer Bianchini parked his marked patrol vehicle at the intersection of SE 122nd Avenue and E Burnside Street. He was wearing a standard Portland Police Bureau uniform, and deployed with his 40mm Less-Lethal launcher which he is trained and certified to use.

Officer Bianchini observed a group of officers walking southbound on SE 122nd Avenue, north of E Burnside Street, following behind the suspect who was near the northwest corner of the intersection. Investigators later identified the suspect as LANE MARTIN. Officer Bianchini said the suspect made frequent stops and turned around to face the officers. Officer Bianchini said there was a large amount of pedestrian and vehicular traffic in the immediate area at the time.

Officer Bianchini described the suspect as a white male in his 30's, wearing dark clothing and sandals. He said the suspect was unshaven and had a skinny build. Officer Bianchini described the suspect as looking very agitated. He observed the suspect holding a hatchet with a green handle above his head. He said the suspect was waving the hatchet in a threatening manner, and looking around at the Officers and civilians at the scene. Officer Bianchini described the suspect's actions as menacing.

Officer Bianchini said he gave the suspect a verbal command to drop the hatchet or be shot with the Less-Lethal launcher, but the suspect did not comply. Officer Bianchini said he heard several other officers give the suspect verbal commands to drop the hatchet but the suspect did not comply.

Officer Bianchini said he was joined at his position by Acting Sergeant Kemple. The suspect continued walking southbound on the west side of SE 122nd Avenue. Officer Bianchini said the suspect put down the hatchet at the southwest corner of the intersection of SE 122nd Avenue and E Burnside Street, but then picked it up again.

Officer Bianchini said the suspect continued walking southbound on the sidewalk and stopped by a tree where he made a chopping motion with the hatchet. Officer Bianchini said the officers continued giving the suspect verbal commands to

stop, get on the ground, and drop the hatchet. Officer Bianchini said the suspect continued walking southbound on the west sidewalk, and briefly put the hatchet down again. Officer Bianchini said the suspect picked the hatchet up again and continued waving it around.

Officer Bianchini said the suspect exited the west sidewalk and walked into the street where there were numerous motorists stopped in traffic nearby. Officer Bianchini said he was concerned that the suspect was moving into an area where he could harm someone. Officer Bianchini said the suspect was near the southwest corner of the intersection of SE 122nd Avenue and SE Ankeny Street. Officer Bianchini said he deployed a single 40mm Less Lethal round which he believed struck the suspect in the back of his right leg. Officer Bianchini said he believed the suspect was still armed with the hatchet when the Less Lethal round was deployed.

Officer Bianchini said after he struck the suspect with the Less Lethal round, the suspect ran south for a short distance then continued walking again. Officer Bianchini said he reloaded his Less Lethal launcher and continued walking southbound after the suspect. Officer Bianchini said Officer Zentner announced loudly to the officers at the scene that the suspect put down the hatchet, but the suspect still had a knife. Officer Bianchini said he did not observe the suspect put down the hatchet, nor did he observe the suspect with a knife during the incident. Officer Bianchini said he observed the hatchet in the roadway.

Officer Bianchini said the suspect continued walking southbound in the roadway, waving his hands around and yelling. Officer Bianchini said Acting Sergeant Kemple deployed a single 40mm Less Lethal round which struck the suspect in one of his legs. Officer Bianchini said the suspect ran off in a southwesterly direction and went westbound on SE Ash Street, where Officer Bianchini last saw the suspect.

Officer Bianchini said he decided not to follow the suspect any longer as there were already several officers doing so. Officer Bianchini said there were patrol cars left unsecured at the intersection blocking the Max line, and he wanted to tend to the vehicles and secure the scene. Officer Bianchini said the roadway was not blocked off at that time so he picked up his 40mm Less Lethal cartridge so it wouldn't be damaged by a motorist, and secured the cartridge in his pocket. Officer Bianchini said he joined Officer Zentner who was standing near the suspect's hatchet. Officer Bianchini said he then heard several gunshots. Officer Bianchini said he is unsure where the 40mm Less Lethal sponge round he fired ended up. Officer Bianchini said he later provided his 40mm Less Lethal cartridge to Detectives at the scene.

Officer Bianchini said he did not speak with any civilian witnesses at the scene.

I provided Officer Bianchini with a Google map image of the intersection of SE 122nd Avenue and E Burnside Street for his reference during the interview, and he made notations on the map.

We concluded the interview at approximately 2326 hours. I took no other investigative action and cleared East Precinct on July 31, 2019 at approximately 0140 hours.



SUMMARY

On July 30th, 2019, an Officer Involved Shooting occurred at 12026 SE Ash Street, Portland, Oregon. This report documents the interview of Officer Mark Piombo who was present when an officer involved shooting occurred.

NARRATIVE

On July 30th, 2019, at approximately 1711 hours, I received notification from Sergeant Whattam to respond to the area of SE 122nd Avenue / SE Ankeny Street to assist in investigating an Officer Involved Shooting. I arrived on scene at approximately 1725 hours. Once the investigative team was assembled, I attending a briefing on the incident in the mobile command center given by the initial responding uniform personnel. At the conclusion of the briefing, Sergeant Whattam directed Detective Law and me to respond to East Precinct to conduct interviews of witness officers. I cleared the scene at approximately 2035 hours, and responded to East Precinct.

At East Precinct, Sergeant Hughes assigned Detective Law and me to interview Acting Sergeant Kemple, Officer Piombo, and Officer Bianchini. Refer to the report prepared by Detective Law for information on the interview of Officer Bianchini and my report detailing the interview of A/Sgt Kemple.

The interview of Officer Piombo was conducted in a meeting room off the lobby of the precinct, and began at approximately 2124 hours. The interview was audio recorded in its entirety. Officer Piombo was represented by his PPA Union Representative during the interview. The following is a summary of Officer Piombo's interview.

Interview of Officer Piombo

On July 30th, 2019, Officer Piombo told us he responded to the initial call from East Precinct when the call sounded like it was escalating. He is an AR-15 operator and he thought this was a tool that may be helpful for the call. He arrived and stopped his car on SE 122nd Ave facing northbound just south of SE Burnside Street. He grabbed his AR-15 and exited his vehicle. He observed the suspect with the hatchet moving southbound in the lanes of traffic. He ordered the suspect to drop the hatchet and get on the ground.

He told us the suspect was later hit with 40mm less lethal rounds fired by other officer(s) and dropped the hatchet. The suspect then ran away southbound, turned west on SE Ash Street and went out of his view. Officer Piombo got back in his car and drove to the last area he saw the suspect. He parked and joined up with other officers at an apartments located at 12026 SE Ash Street where the suspect had ran to.

Officer Piombo joined up with a group of officers that were confronting the suspect and went to the left of the group. As he and the other officers were confronting the suspect and giving orders the suspect was reaching in his waistband area. Officer Piombo was convinced that the suspect was trying to retrieve a knife or something else and he would have to make a quick decision. Officer Piombo heard shots being fired to his left and observed a handgun being fired and saw the suspect go down. Officer Piombo was part of the group of officers that moved up to secure the suspect.

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Officer Piombo then walked Officer Doran to Officer Piombo's patrol car and Officer Doran got inside the car. Officer Doran later went with another officer.

Officer Piombo said he did not speak with any civilian witnesses at the scene.

I provided Officer Piombo with a Google map images of the intersection of SE 122nd Avenue and E Burnside Street and 12026 SE Ash Street for his reference during the interview, and he made notations on the maps.

We concluded the interview at approximately 2222 hours. I took no other investigative action and cleared East Precinct on July 31, 2019 at approximately 0140 hours.



SUMMARY

On July 30th, 2019, an Officer Involved Shooting occurred at 12026 SE Ash Street, Portland, Oregon. This report documents the interview of A/Sgt Kemple who was present when an officer involved shooting occurred.

NARRATIVE

On July 30th, 2019, at approximately 1711 hours, I received notification from Sergeant Whattam to respond to the area of SE 122nd Avenue / SE Ankeny Street to assist in investigating an Officer Involved Shooting. I arrived on scene at approximately 1725 hours. Once the investigative team was assembled, I attending a briefing on the incident in the mobile command center given by the initial responding uniform personnel. At the conclusion of the briefing, Sergeant Whattam directed Detective Law and me to respond to East Precinct to conduct interviews of witness officers. I cleared the scene at approximately 2035 hours, and responded to East Precinct.

At East Precinct, Sergeant Hughes assigned Detective Law and me to interview Acting Sergeant Kemple, Officer Piombo, and Officer Bianchini. Refer to the report prepared by Detective Law for information on the interview of Officer Bianchini and my other report detailing the interview of Officer Piombo.

The interview of A/Sgt Kemple was conducted in a meeting room off the lobby of the precinct, and began at approximately 2337 hours. The interview was audio recorded in its entirety. A/Sgt Kemple was represented by his PPA appointed attorney Nicole Robbins during the interview. The following is a summary of A/Sgt Kemple's interview.

Interview of A/Sgt Kemple

On July 30th, 2019, A/Sgt Kemple told us he responded to the initial call from the area of SE Stark Street/SE 82nd Avenue. He arrived and parked just north of northern MAX track on NE Burnside Street on NE 122nd Avenue. He observed a white male with what he though was a "machete axe combo" with a green handle near the northwest corner of the intersection with civilians around him. A/Sgt Kemple observed that Officer Bianchini had a 40mm less lethal gun and felt that he should deploy with his to supplement Officer Bianchini so he got his 40mm out of his car and loaded it. Officer Bianchini was giving commands to the suspect with the weapon and the suspect continued to yell and be aggressive. The suspect put the weapon down a couple times but kept picking it back up.

As the suspect continued to walk southbound with the weapon Officer Bianchini eventually fired his 40mm at the suspect which caused the suspect to drop the weapon but the suspect continued to walk southbound. A/Sgt Kemple fired his 40mm at the suspect, hitting the suspect in the leg, just to the south of where he dropped the weapon after A/Sgt Kemple felt the suspect was reaching into his waistband to retrieve another weapon. The suspect then ran southbound and turned west on SE Ash Street. A/Sgt Kemple pursued the suspect along with other officers.

When A/Sgt Kemple made it to SE Ash Street he eventually met up with other officers and made contact with the suspect. The suspect had stopped in a walkway within an apartment complex and was facing the officers and reaching in his waistband area with both hands trying to grab something. Officers were giving commands to the suspect at this point. At this point A/Sgt Kemple heard five to six shots and he saw the suspect go down. A/Sgt Kemple and other officers moved up to the suspect and took him into custody and started rendering aid. A/Sgt Kemple did chest compressions at one point and applied a

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tourniquet. Another officer relieved him of his 40mm gun while he was providing first aid. He said he placed his pouch with extra 40mm rounds on the ground in the area of the shooting. Portland Fire eventually took over CPR and later declared the suspect deceased.

A/Sgt Kemple assigned officers to start finding people to interview. Sgt. Felts later showed up and assisted in controlling the incident.

A/Sgt Kemple said he did not interview any civilian witnesses at the scene.

I provided A/Sgt Kemple with Google map images of the intersection of SE 122nd Avenue and E Burnside Street and 12026 SE Ash Street for his reference during the interview, and he made notations on the maps.

We concluded the interview on July 31, 2019 at approximately 0022 hours. I took no other investigative action and cleared East Precinct on July 31, 2019 at approximately 0140 hours.

Officer Bryan Anderson interview:

On July 30, 2019 at 2337 hours, Detective Reynolds and I interviewed Officer Bryan Anderson, with union representative Jeff Myers present, at East Precinct, in the former District Attorney's office. The interview was audio recorded and I placed a CD copy of the recording into evidence, as noted on exhibit 1, item 2.

[Note: For the ease of the reader, the following information is a summary of the interview. This summary may not follow the exact and precise chronological order of the interview as it progressed. Additionally, this summary does not contain each and every topic of discussion mentioned during the course of the interview. For additional information and specific details of the interview, to include the exact and precise chronological order of the interview as it progressed, and each and every topic covered during the course of the interview, please refer to the DVD recording of the interview.]

Officer Anderson told me he was assigned to East Precinct. Officer Anderson told me while he was logging on in his patrol car at around 1630 hours, he listened to the radio and heard the call which was in progress, regarding officers following a person who was armed with a hatchet and a knife. Officer Anderson told me he heard dispatch update that the suspect was trying to get into cars. Officer Anderson told me he voiced over the radio that he was en route.

Officer Anderson told me he arrived from the south and parked his patrol vehicle on the east side of SE 122nd Avenue and SE Ankeny Street. Officer Anderson told me he observed the suspect on the west sidewalk. Officer Anderson told me the suspect was walking southbound on SE 122nd Avenue and multiple officers followed the suspect. Officer Anderson told me the suspect appeared agitated. I showed Officer Anderson a map which was printed off of Google maps. The map was of SE 122nd Avenue and E Burnside Street, (see attached).

Officer Anderson told me he exited his patrol car with his patrol rifle. Officer Anderson told me the suspect had a long object in his hand, possibly a hatchet or a machete. Officer Anderson told me the suspect had the object to his side and then raised the object to about head level. Officer Anderson told me the suspect waved the object around. Officer Anderson told me he challenged the suspect. Officer Anderson told me the suspect did not comply. Officer Anderson told me he heard someone fire a less lethal round. Officer Anderson told me it appeared the suspect was hit by the less lethal round by the way the suspect's body maneuvered. Officer Anderson told me he heard the less lethal again for a second time. Officer Anderson told me it appeared the suspect was hit with the second less lethal round. Officer Anderson told me the suspect dropped the object he had in his hand. Officer Anderson told me he was unsure if the suspect was going to run away.

Officer Anderson told me the suspect ran westbound on SE Ash Street. Officer Anderson told me he got into his patrol car and drove west on SE Ash Street, south on SE 119th Ave, and then east on SE Ash Street. Officer Anderson told me he parked his patrol car on SE Ash Street, to the west of 12026 SE Ash Street. Officer Anderson told me he observed officers entering

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the entrance to the apartment complex. Officer Anderson told me as he exited his patrol car, he heard an officer say "shots fired" on the radio.

Officer Anderson told me he provided security at 12026 SE Ash Street, while officers provided medical aid to the suspect. Officer Anderson told me several residents exited the apartments. Officer Anderson told me Portland Fire arrived. Officer Anderson told me he tried to talk with several residents at the apartment complex, including several residents who were associated with an apartment which was on the 2nd floor towards the south of the apartment complex. Officer Anderson told me the residents told him they do not talk with the police and would not provide any contact information. Officer Anderson described the residents as two African American females in their late 20s and one African American male. Officer Anderson told me one of the females had shoulder length hair, was about 506" to 5'07," 150LBS, and wore a yellow shirt. Officer Anderson told me the second female was about 5'09", medium build, unknown clothing and unknown hair. Officer Anderson told me the male was in his mid-30s, had a goatee and wore a blue hooded sweatshirt and light colored blue jeans.

We concluded the interview at 2357 hours.

Summary

This report details my follow up phone interviews with two witnesses to this fatal officer involved shooting incident and collection of video surveillance. Refer to all additional law enforcement reports for further details.

Narrative

On July 30th, 2019 at about 1715 hours, I was paged out as part of the On Call homicide detail to respond and investigate a fatal officer involved shooting at 12026 SE Ash St with my partner, Detective William Winters, who was assigned as the primary investigator. Refer to Detective Winters' police report and all associated law enforcement reports for further details.

Tri-Met Max Platform video footage - 122nd& East Burnside St platform

On July 30th, 2019 at about 1900 hours, I talked on the phone with officer Aaron Dauchy, who is assigned as a Transit Officer with Tri-Met, and he told me there was video footage from the 122nd and E Burnside Max platform of part of this incident. Officer Dauchy told me he would save the relevant video footage and have it available for me to collect the following day. On July 31st, 2019 at about 1405 hours, I went to the Tri-Met office and met with Transit Coordinator Narcisa Delgado-Grubb and she gave me a thumb-drive with the relevant video footage. I collected this thumb-drive and gave it to Detective Winters.

I viewed this video footage prior to giving it to Detective Winters. I noted there were several different, video footage, perspectives from the different cameras from the Max platform and the time stamp of the relevant footage began at approximately 1636 hours to 1638 hours. This video footage showed from both a westbound perspective and an eastbound perspective from varying distances depending on the camera location a portion of the incident as the deceased subject, (LANE MARTIN), entered into the video. MARTIN walked on foot southbound on the west side of NE 122nd Ave and entered the Max platform video in the northwest corner of the intersection of NE 122nd Ave and E Burnside St. The video showed MARTIN dressed in mostly black with black shorts, a backpack, and carrying an axe in his right hand and an unknown object in his left hand. Several police vehicles are seen entering the intersection prior to MARTIN'S arrival in the video with

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their overhead lights on and parking in the intersection. MARTIN continued to walk southbound across both the east and westbound lanes of E Burnside St and the Max tracks to the south side of the intersection.

Several uniformed patrol officers on foot appeared to attempt to communicate with MARTIN from a distance. MARTIN appeared to by yelling back at them and pointing his left hand with an unknown object in their direction while he simultaneously swung the axe in his right hand somewhat in an upward direction as he continued to cross southbound over the Max tracks. The westbound camera perspectives show MARTIN as he had crossed southbound over the Max tracks and walked near a business area on the southwest corner of the intersection. MARTIN at one point appeared in this footage to lay the axe down momentarily and then pick it back up and continue to walk away southbound on the west side of SE 122nd Ave. Refer to the video for further details.

RICHARD MILLER phone interview 8/1/19

On August 1st, 2019, I called back RICHARD MILLER, after he left voicemail messages for both Detective Winters and I responding to the on-line media request for further information on this investigation. This phone interview was recorded, (Exhibit 1, Item #1) and later transcribed. This is a summary of the key points of this interview. Refer to the recorded interview and or the transcript for this interview in its entirety.

MILLER told me he heard in the media that police wanted to talk to the person driving the black or dark colored SUV during this incident when the subject tried to contact the driver. MILLER told me his SUV is a 2006 midnight blue Volvo XC-90 with Oregon License Plate 878HGD. MILLER told me he was driving eastbound on NE Glisan Street at the stop sign at the intersection with NE 122nd Ave. MILLER told me was going to turn right or southbound so he looked to the left or northbound to check for traffic and saw an aggressive subject approach his driver's side window. MILLER told me this subject appeared to be flashing some kind of identification card and began to pound the identification card in his left hand on MILLER'S driver's side window. MILLER told me he recalled this subject also appeared to have a, "hand full of stuff" in his left hand, including the identification card, while pounding on MILLER'S driver's window.

MILLER told me he next noticed there were several uniformed patrol officers that appeared to be pursuing this subject at his window. MILLER told me he became afraid for his safety because his sunroof was open so he quickly closed the sunroof so this subject could not climb on top of his car and enter his vehicle through the open sunroof. MILLER told me this subject was simultaneously yelling gibberish at MILLER and this subject was holding a "hatchet" in his right hand. MILLER described the hatchet as possibly black as he only got a glimpse of it and about 12" to 14" long. MILLER described this subject as being aggressive and hostile as MILLER told me he was afraid of this subject based on his behavior and the hatchet.

MILLER described this subject as a white male, burly, scruffy, appeared homeless, wearing possibly a black baseball cap, with maybe a sweater around his waist, and shorts. MILLER told me this subject was obviously, "getting away from the police". MILLER reiterated this subject had an aggressive posture. MILLER told me the police were on foot and, "keeping it calm, (police)". MILLER told me he eventually backed out with his vehicle. MILLER told me after the subject and police passed him he turned right on NE 122nd Ave and parked in front of the nearby marijuana dispensary and watched the event as it progressed passed E Burnside. MILLER told me he saw the subject cross the intersection of 122nd Ave and E Burnside St southbound. MILLER told me he did not see anything else relevant.

ESTHER VERBRUGGEN phone interview 8/2/19

On August 2nd, 2019, I called back ESTHER VERBRUGGEN, after she left voicemail message for both Detective Winters and I responding to the on-line media request for further information on this investigation. This phone interview was recorded, (Exhibit 1, Item #1) and later transcribed. This is a summary of the key points of this interview. Refer to the recorded interview and or the transcript for this interview in its entirety.

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ESTHER told me she was walking from her house located at located at 805 SE 122nd Ave. ESTHER told me she walked eastbound on NE Glisan Street from her house and once she approached NE 122nd Ave she cut through the old Safeway parking lot area adjacent to NE Glisan St and NE 122nd Ave located at 221 NE 122nd Ave. ESTHER told me she cut through the lot and was walking in a southbound direction toward the entrance of the old Safeway store, which is now closed and vacant.

ESTHER told me as she walked southbound through the lot she noticed a possible transient subject who, "looked very crazy", and appeared to be messing around with the window of a "jeep-like", possibly darker colored vehicle. She could not recall seeing anything in this subject's hands. ESTHER believed she saw this subject with this vehicle in approximately the middle of the Safeway parking lot. ESTHER told me this subject had a backpack on and possibly dread locks and appeared, "a little unstable". ESTHER told me she tried not to look to closely at him because he appeared crazy and she did not want him to yell at her. ESTHER described this subject as a white male, from 30's to 40's, and possibly brown, dread-locked, "messy" hair style. She thought he was skinny to medium build and average height.

ESTHER told me she simultaneously saw a security guard walking from the old Safeway store toward this subject. She described the security guard as a white male, in his 30's to 40's, with a dark shirt, and khaki styled pants, which she described as a security uniform. ESTHER told me she believed this male was either a security guard or a police officer. ESTHER told me the security guard approached the transient subject by the vehicle.

ESTHER told me as the security guard approached, the transient subject by the car began "yelling and swearing" at the security guard. ESTHER thought the transient subject was also yelling names at the security guard. ESTHER could not tell me what the security guard said because he was not yelling like the transient subject. ESTHER told me at this point she had walked right by the Safeway and was approaching NE 122nd Ave. She told me she looked back and saw the security guard's was facing her more and the transient subject's back was facing her and she could hear the transient subject "swearing" at the security guard a lot. ESTHER told me the transient subject was simultaneously heading toward her direction while "swearing a lot" at the security guard so she began to move away faster because she did not want to be near the transient subject. ESTHER told me at one point she saw the transient subject step toward the security guard and the security guard stepped back like he was afraid of him and concerned about his safety. ESTHER told me this subject appeared "aggressive" and she heard this subject, "drop the F bomb", to the security guard during this interaction. ESTHER told me she saw the security guard only talking and not do anything physical to the transient subject. ESTHER clarified she did not recall seeing anything in the security guard's hands and believed the security guard had his hands out as if he was, "trying to keep the peace".

ESTHER told me transient subject continued to back away from the security guard toward 122nd Ave so she walked right or southbound down 122nd Ave approximately six to seven blocks to the Midland Library to get away from this subject. ESTHER told me she heard cop cars a few minutes later. ESTHER told me she did not see anything else after that.

SUMMARY:

This report documents a recorded interview I conducted with Officer Budey in regard to his involvement with PPB Case#19-258996.

NARRATIVE:

On July 30, 2019, at approximately 2245 hours, Detective Harris and I interviewed Officer Budey in regard to his involvement in PPB Case #19-258996. Also present for the interview was Officer Robertson who acted as Officer Budey's union representative. The interview was conducted inside an office at East Precinct. The interview was recorded digitally and later transferred to a CD and transcribed. The CD and maps referred to in the interview were submitted to the Property/Evidence Division on PER A123567. The following is a brief summary of the interview and is not necessarily in chronological order. For complete details of the interview, please refer to the CD and/or transcript.

SUMMARY OF OFFICER BUDEY INTERVIEW:

On July 30, 2019, at approximately 1620 hours, Officer Budey was on duty, patrolling the 972 district of East Precinct. Officer Budey heard a call broadcast regarding a disturbance at the Safeway store, located in the area of NE 122nd Avenue and NE Glisan Street, involving a subject armed with a knife and claiming to be a federal agent. Officer Budey responded to the call and as he got into the area of SE 122nd Avenue and E Burnside Street (from the south), he was directed by officers on scene to stay south. Officer Budey observed officers giving commands to a subject who was on foot and who at one point had pulled

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
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an axe from his waistband. Officer Budey indicated the immediate area was crowded with vehicles and pedestrians and the subject was non compliant. Officer Budey observed an officer deploy a 40 millimeter round to the subject when the subject was in the area of SE 122nd Avenue and E Burnside Street. Officer Budey observed a second deployment of a 40 millimeter round to the subject when the subject was in the area of SE 122nd Avenue and SE Ankeny Street.

Officer Budey observed the subject approach a black SUV that was stopped on SE Ankeny Street at SE 122nd Avenue, facing east. Officer Budey said the subject had his axe in hand and was trying the door handles on the vehicle but the vehicle was able to leave the area in an unknown direction of travel. Officer Budey observed the subject put the axe down, kick off his shoes, and run south on SE 122nd Avenue and then west on SE Ash Street. Officer Budey joined other officers in foot pursuit of the subject onto SE Ash Street. Officer Budey stated that once he got onto SE Ash Street, he did not see the subject on the street, rather he saw a backpack disappear into the breezeway of the apartments located at 12026 SE Ash Street.

Officer Budey said he and other officers entered the breezeway and encountered the subject at a T- intersection of a walkway within the breezeway. Officer Budey said multiple commands were given to the subject but the subject did not comply with them. Officer Budey said the subject responded by yelling back at them, moving around, and rummaging through and around his waistband. Officer Budey said he could not see what was in the subject's hands and at one point, heard gunfire from one of the officers. Officer Budey said the subject sat down and then leaned against a pole. Officer Budey said the officers approached the subject with a ballistic shield and rendered first aid. Officer Budey said during this process he observed a folded, black pocket knife underneath the subject. Finally, Officer Budey said he was advised by a Sergeant to take photographs of the scene with his Bureau issued cell phone.





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

The interview was conducted inside of an office at East Precinct. Representing Sergeant Felts was Sergeant Perkins. The interview was digitally recorded and later transferred to a CD and transcribed. The original CD was later submitted to the Property/Evidence Division on PER A123567. The following is a brief summary of the interview and is not necessarily in chronological order. For complete details, please refer to the CD and/or transcript.

SUMMARY OF SERGEANT FELTS INTERVIEW:

On July 30, 2019, at approximately 1622 hours, Sergeant Felts was inside the Sergeants' Office at East Precinct when he heard via radio that there was a call in the area of NE 122nd Avenue and NE Glisan Street involving a subject with a machete or

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hatchet. Sergeant Felts did not know if any other sergeants were responding but recognized the event as having the potential to be significant. Sergeant Felts loaded his police car and responded to the area from East Precinct. Sergeant Felts said as he was arriving from the south on SE 122nd Avenue, he saw officers running and saw a police car turn west onto SE Pine Street from SE 122nd Avenue. Sergeant Felts said he believed this would turn into a containment type of call, so he stopped his police car on SE 122nd Avenue at SE Pine Street. Sergeant Felts said while he maintained his position, he heard gunfire. Sergeant Felts then drove to 12026 SE Ash Street where he provided officers on scene an Individual First Aid Kit (IFAK). Sergeant Felts took on the role of crime scene supervision and coordination while officers rendered first aid to the subject. During this time, Sergeant Felts directed Officer Budey to take initial photographs of the scene before PFB and AMR arrived. Finally, Sergeant Felts said he saw a partially folded black pocket knife on the ground within several feet of the subject.

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Utilizing the conference room of the mobile command center, I conducted round countdowns for Ofc. Doran (47826), Ofc. Kemple (39589) and Ofc. Bianchini (50575). Each round countdown was preceded by overall photographs to document the Officer's equipment. Dets. Merrill and Winters were present during the countdowns and photographs.

I collected the items listed on PER A120804 from Ofc. Doran at the conclusion of his round countdown.

The 40mm launcher used by Ofc. Kemple (PER A120805) was retrieved by Det. Kammerer and brought to the mobile command center. I photographed it and collected it as evidence.

Ofc. Bianchini told me that his 40mm launcher was in the back of his patrol vehicle. I retrieved the launcher from the patrol vehicle and returned it to the mobile command center where I photographed it. I found one (1) live round in the chamber of the launcher, which I removed to make the weapon safe. I placed the live round in the spare ammo carrier mounted on the launcher stock, and collected the launcher as evidence (PER A120806).

SUMMARY

On July 30th, 2019, 1624 hours, East Precinct Officers were dispatched to the area of NE 122nd/ NE Glisan Street on the report of a man breaking into a Jeep and was confronted by security and is claiming to be Federal Officer and just pulled a knife out on the security. Upon arrival officers engaged the subject in conversation and he pulled out a green hatchet and began swinging the hatchet around while walking away from officers. East Precinct Officers continued to give commands to the subject who continued to walk away from the police. The subject approached a vehicle at NE 122nd Avenue/ NE Davis and attempted to get into the vehicle. The subject continued to disobey commands given by police and approached

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the Max platform at NE 122nd Avenue/ E Burnside, while holding the green hatchet and a black folding knife, with a set of keys attached. The subject continued to walk away from officers while swinging the hatchet around in the direction of bystanders. At approximately SE 122nd Avenue/ SE Ankeny Street, Officer Bianchini and Acting Sergeant Kemple gave commands for the subject to drop the hatchet and he refused. Officer Bianchini and Acting Sergeant each fired a single 40mm less lethal round in the lower legs of the subject causing him to drop the hatchet. The subject began to run away and officers followed him from distance and followed him to an apartment complex located at 12026 SE Street, where officers gave verbal commands for the subject to stop and at some point the subject produced a black folding knife with keys attached. Officers gave numerous commands for the subject to drop the knife and he refused, the subject started to advance on the officers. Officer Doran fired his duty semi-auto handgun striking the subject. The subject fell to the ground and first aid was applied to the subject as medical personnel were enroute. Medical personnel arrived and attempted life-saving measures, but the subject was deceased. East Precinct Officers established a crime scene, supervisors notified command, the Forensic Evidence Division, Detective Division, the Multnomah County District Attorney's Office, the Multnomah County Medical Examiners Office, and the Portland Police Association. This report will document the countdown of Officer Doran's handgun inside the mobile precinct, as well as the statement by Officer Doran.

NARRATIVE

On July 30th, 2019, at approximately 1711 hours, I was directed by Detective Sergeant Whattam to respond to SE 122nd Avenue/ SE Ash Street to assist with investigating an Officer Involved Shooting. Once I arrived on scene at 1827 hours, I met with Detective Sergeant Whattam, who assigned me as the Primary Detective in this investigation. I was told by Detective Sergeant Whattam, there was only one officer who fired his handgun, who was Officer Doran. I arranged with Criminalist Becker, Detective Merrill, to assist with taking photos of Officer Doran and being present for the weapons countdown. Detective Merrill, Criminalist Becker, Officer Doran, his attorney, and I conducted the photos, and weapons countdown inside the back of the mobile precinct that was the scene of the incident.

At 1911 hours, Acting Lt.C. Roberts issued Officer Doran a Communication Restriction Order. A copy was giving to him.

At approximately 1917 hours, Detective Merrill asked Officer Doran if he would be willing to conduct an on-scene briefing at this time, and would he be willing to give a walk-through at this time. Officer Doran's attorney provided a written statement for his client, "At this time, I respectfully invoke my rights under both the US and Oregon Constitution, including my rights to remain silent and my right to counsel."

Officer Doran signed the piece of paper. I collected the paper and submitted as evidence on receipt number A132619.

I verified Officer Doran did not carry any other firearms beside his handgun on his duty belt, nor did he any other magazines for his handgun. I also verified Officer Doran had not reloaded his handgun, or changed magazines after firing his handgun.

Criminalist Becker took overall photos of Officer Doran.

I noted Officer Doran carried two spare magazines for his handgun on his duty belt. Criminalist Becker asked Officer Doran to remove his duty weapon a Glock 17, 9mm, semi-automatic handgun from the holster. Criminalist Becker asked Officer Doran to remove the magazine from the weapon and set it to aside. Criminalist Becker asked Officer Doran to pull the slide back, ejecting one 9mm cartidge from the chamber, the round was retrieved. Officer Doran's gun was a 9mm, Glock, Model 17, SN # HZK803.Criminalist Becker collected from Officer Doran. Criminalist Becker removed five 9mm cartidges from the magazine that was removed from the handgun,rendering it empty. Criminalist Becker asked Officer Doran for the magazine from the top pouch from his duty-belt. Criminalist Becker removed seventeen 9mm cartidges from the magazine, rendering it empty. Criminalist Becker asked Officer Doran for the magazine, rendering it empty.

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At the conclusion of the weapon countdown, it was determined eleven rounds had been fired. The handgun, magazines, and 9mm cartridge were all photographed and collected by Criminalist Becker. Criminalist Becker logged all the evidence on property receipt number #A120804.

At approximately 1935 hours, we concluded the weapons countdown process.

Criminalist Ware was taking photographs of the scene. After he took overall photos, I placed numbered photo placards near items of evidence and lettered photo placards near items of importance in the courtyard of the apartments.

I collected some of the evidence needed to create a path to the body. We assisted Deputy Medical Examiner John Kelly with photographing and removing the body from the scene.

Next, as requested by Sgts. Meyer and Hughes, I responded to East Precinct. I met with Hughes and Det. Harris. Officer Bianca brought us her uniform duty belt. I took digital photographs of Officer Bianca's firearm and accessories. I gave these items directly back to her.

I returned to the SE 122nd scene. I collected the remaining pieces of evidence with the assistance of Ware and Becker.

Upon returning to the FED Office I took additional photos of the hatchet and knife (placards 38 and 24) and sent these images to Detective Winters. All items were stored in the FED Evidence room.

During the next shift I assisted as Criminalist Outhaythip was reviewing and photographing some of the evidence with Detective Merrill.

During the remainder of the shift I examined and packaged the rest of the evidence. I took additional photographs of the black pants, Placard #27, and the contents of the pockets. I took photos of holes in the hat, placard #32). Again, the items were stored in the FED Evidence Room.

During the next shift I delivered all items (except for the cell phone given to Merrill) to the PPB Property Room via the FED outgoing locker.

Acting Sergeant Kemple had photos taken and a round countdown conducted. At 2111 hours, Detective Merrill and I conducted a walk through the scene with Officer Budey and his union attorney. 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



Summary:

On July 30th, 2019, East Precinct Officers responded to the area of NE 122nd/NE Glisan on the report of a subject breaking into a Red Jeep and was being confronted by security. Dispatch broadcast the subject was in a confrontation with security and had a knife. Officers arrived and attempted to contact the subject who pulled a Green Hatchet out and refused commands from officers. Uniform officers followed the subject as he continued to walk southbound on SE 122nd/ Avenue. At approximately SE 122nd/SE Ankeny Street, officers used less lethal 40mm on the subject, which caused him to drop the hatchet. Uniform officers followed the subject to 12026 SE Ash Street and an Officer Involved Shooting occurred. I was notified by Detective Sergeant Whattam, to respond as the primary investigator for this incident. This report will capture the round count down of A/Sgt. Kemple's firearm, Detective Kammerer conducted the round count of the less lethal 40mm used by Kemple. For additional information read other reports.

Narrative:

On July 30th, 2019, at approximately 2033 hours, Detective Merrill, Criminalist Becker, A/Sgt. Kemple, Attorney Nicole Robbins, and I met inside the Mobile Command Center which was at the scene of the Officer Involved Shooting. Detective Kammerer had already processed the 40mm launcher used by A/Sgt. Kemple. The purpose of this interaction was conduct a round count of A/Sgt. Kemple's firearm. Criminalist Becker took overall photos of A/Sgt. Kemple, then he conducted a round count of his bureau issued Glock 17, 9mm, semi-automatic handgun, SN #EEP349. A/Sgt. Kemple removed the magazine from the handgun and pulled the slide back of the firearm removing one live round from the firearm. Criminalist Becker removed the rounds from the magazine that was from the firearm. A total seventeen rounds were removed from the magazine. A/Sgt. Kemple removed his top pouch magazine and Criminalist Becker removed seventeen rounds from the bottom pouch. A/Sgt. Kemple stated this is how his weapon and magazines are set while on patrol. A total for fifty-two rounds were counted and that indicates no rounds were fired by A/Sgt. Kemple from his bureau issued firearm.

A/Sgt. Kemple stated he carries a back up firearm. The back-up gun he carries is a Walter PPS, SN #AB5548 and he keeps it in his front pocket of vest in a holster. A/Sgt. Kemple handed the firearm to Criminalist Becker who removed one round from the chamber, and removed the magazine from the gun. Criminalist Becker removed six rounds from magazine. A/Sgt. Kemple stated that is how he carries the firearm when on duty.

The round count was completed and a communication restriction was issued and I was a witness to the signing of the form at 2104 hours.

This investigation is still on going.

SUMMARY

East Precinct officers responded to a 911 call regrading a male armed with a knife near SE 122nd Avenue and E Burnside Street. The male, later identified as LANE MARTIN, was contacted by responding officers, who learned he was also armed with a hatchet. Officer Bianchini, as well as another officer, deployed his Less Lethal launcher at LANE MARTIN, which caused him to drop the hatchet. LANE MARTIN was subsequently fatally wounded by another officer. This report documents the countdown of Officer Bianchini Less Lethal launcher at the scene and firearm.

NARRATIVE

On July 30th, 2019, I responded to SE 122nd Avenue and E Burnside Street to assist with investigating an Officer Involved Shooting. During the course of the investigation, I was assigned to locate and conduct a countdown of Officer Bianchini Less lethal launcher and firearm. Officer Bianchini was no longer in possession of his launcher and it was in the back of his patrol vehicle. At approximately 2148 hours, Criminalist Becker and I conducted a countdown of Officer Bianchini's Less Lethal launcher and firearm. Criminalist Becker was also present to document the weapon countdown via photographs.

I noted the breech of the LMT 40mm launcher had a round in the chamber. The buttstock pouch on the launcher, which is capable of holding two cartridges, contained zero 40mm "eXactiMpact" cartridges, Criminalist Becker removed the round from the chamber and placed in back in buttstock pouch. Officer Bianchini presented a empty 40mm cartridge from his left cargo pocket.. The launcher was a LMT 40mm Less Lethal launcher, SN #FW14978.

There were no other 40mm cartridges, and the leg pouch containing spare 40mm cartridges was not present, but had been located inside the vehicle Officer Bianchini was driving. The Less Lethal launcher and 40mm cartridge were collected by Criminalist Becker.

Gradwahl: That's alright.

Kemple: Like a butt stock holder and then we also have a, a leg rig that holds four rounds.

Um, when I got out of my car, since the guy was right there and he was just starting I didn't have any time to like put a leg, my leg rig on or anything. I just, it was in the closed position so I just put it around my left arm and jumped in my, out of my car and immediately loaded one .40 millimeter round into my less-

lethal.

Gradwahl: Okay and do you guys talk to each other? Uh, you, you and Officer

BIANCHINI?

Kemple: So he's giving commands and this guy just looks super angry and he's yelling. I

don't know what he's yelling but he's yelling a lot. He looks very angry, he's got

the edge weapon and he looks very aggressive with it. And, so at first

BIANCHINI is giving him commands uh -

Gradwahl: What are those commands?

Kemple: Drop the weapon, drop the weapon and uh, the guy just

proceeds to go southbound towards the store and I looked at BIANCHINI, I didn't look at him, I just said if he goes we're not letting him go in a store, if he goes

towards the store then we're gonna shoot him. Um, and uh -

Gradwahl: With the?

Kemple: With the less-lethal.

Gradwahl: .40 millimeters?

Kemple: Yeah the 40's. Um, and so I also gave a command at that time to him, I said drop

the weapon or drop the, the machete or whatever or you will be shot. I didn't say what he was gonna be shot with I just said drop it or you're gonna be shot. And at, when he gets to this corner there's a, a – like a post, like the light post or something right here. He gets to about right here, BIANCHINI and I were kind of uh, we're walking kind of side-by-side. So we're about, I would say 20, 25 feet behind him engaging him and he puts the machete down right here at the post and he doesn't go in the store. And then he picked it back up and then he continued to walk southbound uh, very, very agitated. Screaming, yelling, still holding the machete and um, my concern was if he goes into the store with that thing he's gonna kill somebody or hurt somebody 'cause he's pretty angry. He's got this thing out uh, he's already threatened people with it and so I did not want him going into the store. He started walking southbound and we just trailed behind about 20, 25 feet. Continued to give him commands over and over, drop the, drop the machete, drop the machete. And I believe he put it down again right about, I

don't know somewhere here by the...

Gradwahl: ...can you draw ano- make another little circle?

Kemple: Yeah it was probably, I think this is the bus stop right here. I think he put it down

like right here and stopped for a second and then picked it back up again.

Gradwahl: Okay and you put a little X.

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Kemple:

Gradwahl: Um, it's on the south side of the store on the west sidewalk and then there's the

circle above it. Those are the two spots where he dropped it and picked it up?

Kemple: Correct.

X.

Gradwahl: Okay.

Kemple: Would you like me to number those two and three?

Gradwahl: Um, that's fine, that's –

Kemple: Okay just leave 'em as they are?

Gradwahl: Just leave it as is, it's fine.

Kemple: Okay.

Gradwahl: The uh, to that point um, you said you had uh, told him drop it or you will be shot,

did Officer uh, BIANCHINI, did he give any force warning uh, drop it or else

kind of commands that you remember?

Kemple: I don't remember his exact commands.

Gradwahl: Okay.

Kemple: I do know that he was giving commands and in those commands he was yelling to

drop it.

Gradwahl: Okay.

Kemple: I don't recall everything that he said and he was also engaging the guy prior to me

exiting my vehicle as well.

Gradwahl: Okay um, and then did you guys have any communication about what your plan

was like um, were you each independent of each other as far as if you were gonna, if you were gonna deploy or was there a, a plan like I'll shoot then you shoot if

we need to use these things?

Kemple: Uh, there was not a, a plan like that. Um, I kind of assumed that he would shoot

first since he was there first and generally how it works is with the .40 you have your primary guy and then you're secondary. And after the primary shoots and

reloads the secondary will shoot if necessary.

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Gradwahl: Is that so you always have one gun capable of firing?

Kemple: One gun, yes.

Gradwahl: Okay.

Kemple: Yup. And uh, so we, as he was walking southbound um, he picked up the

machete again and um, Officer BIANCHINI said something along the lines of hey I'm, I'm good if you are, as in I think we're good to shoot and I said yeah you're good. And so this guy, when he picks back up and I think that was after he picked up the machete the second time and continued southbound. And so I believe that BIANCHINI hit him, like he got about right here-ish and that's where, in my

mind I remember him shooting him the first time.

Gradwahl: And can you uh, let's put a number, where are we at here uh, a number two with a

circle around it.

Kemple: Yeah. So I believe that the dude was in, in my memory it was about right there.

And at that time, from what I recall, he still had the machete and after being hit he dropped the machete and continued southbound and we continued to give him commands and uh, once he got to about right here – I'll mark it as a three. Once he got to about this three location I continued to give him commands, stop, stop and then he stopped. He was walking away from us not looking at us after he put the machete down and he turned around and he started reaching into his waistband and at that point I thought that he was going to pull out a knife or some

waistband and at that point I thought that he was going to pull out a knife or some other weapon and I felt that he was an immediate danger still to uh, people that were around as well as Officer BIANCHINI and I who were still about 20, 25 feet away. And at that point is when I deployed my .40 millimeter launcher and I hit him somewhere in the legs, I don't recall exactly where. Um, after I hit him he walked a little bit southbound and then he took off running southbound. And right as he hit this corner we were chasing after him on foot then uh, he had a good, I don't know – probably well 20, 25 feet and so we slowed down about right here after he made the corner and then it was either one or two police cars drove by us and we were still on foot. And at that point somebody shortly after, somebody broadcasted that, that the uh, he probably still had a knife. 'Cause he had a knife earlier and that, I remember hearing that broadcast right here when I

was coming to uh, Ash. Right around the corner of Ash.

Gradwahl: Somebody broadcasted...

Kemple: ...that he probably still had a knife.

Gradwahl: Okay.

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Kemple:

Yup, and about that time somebody said that he was down the apartment complex, so like down this alcove. And so, and uh, I believe that was uh, CHRISTIAN SANTOS. He said he's right down here, he's right down here. So we waited for a few more people to make a contact team and then we went south on the alcove where we could see him. He was about right, right here kind of where all the apartments come together.

Gradwahl:

Can you just kind of put a, a bigger circle around that whole area, there you go.

Kemple:

Yup, yeah so we could see him and uh, he was standing there looking at us and he, he was kind of rocking back and forth a little bit. And he had this, he had a look in his eye. Um, he just, just had this uh, crazed look I guess you could say. And he was just kind of looking at us and it, it kind of felt like, like he was gonna charge us type look. Um, so we went and at this point from where we were - I'm gonna go to this, to the Ash Street map here.

Gradwahl:

Hey DAVID can I um, just so I can catch up on a few other things.

Kemple:

Yes.

Gradwahl:

To kind of break this up.

Kemple:

Yeah, yeah.

Gradwahl:

Um, this is had, did you recognize him as anybody you've ever seen before?

Kemple:

No.

Gradwahl:

Okay um, and when, back to this, the other officers, when you – or first of all um, when, when – the first time a .40 millimeter was deployed at him right before he dropped the, the hatchet where were you and Officer BIANCHINI at at that time? If you could do maybe a number four.

Kemple:

I think we were about right here. So we were in uh, like the inside southbound

lane of traffic.

Gradwahl:

Kemple:

And we were about 20, 25 feet away from him.

Gradwahl:

Okay and um, can you put maybe a triangle where he dropped the hatchet?

Kemple:

Yeah. It would be right on the corner of the uh, northwest corner of Ankeny and

 122^{nd} .

Okay.

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Gradwahl: Okay and then when you deployed your .40 millimeter um, can you put a number

five?

Kemple: Yup. So we were still probably in that inner southbound lane of traffic still about

20, 25 feet from him.

Gradwahl: Okay so they were both fired in the same direction but just further south the time

you fired it looks like?

Kemple: Yes.

Gradwahl: Okay. And then you heard the knife piece it sounds, if I remember right, earlier

in the, was, did you hear that, when's the first time you heard anything about a

knife?

Kemple: So the initial dispatch was that uh, at the Safeway and that he said that he was a

government agent and had a knife.

Gradwahl: Okay.

Kemple: Or something along those lines and had threatened somebody with a knife.

Gradwahl: Okay and then did you hear anything on the scene, clear voice from anybody

about a knife?

Kemple: Yes that was right when, so after he went uh, westbound on Ash uh, as we came

around the corner somebody broadcasted that he probably still...

Gradwahl: ...broadcasted over the radio?

Kemple: Yes.

Gradwahl: But not like face-to-face or somebody, did you ever hear it that it wasn't on the

radio? Did you, did anybody say anything?

Kemple: Not that I recall.

Gradwahl: When you were in the street or anything? Okay. And when you guys were in this

area here when you guys deployed the, the .40 millimeters you said earlier there was, there was people up in, in this area around Burnside, was there foot traffic or people around or vehicles or what was going on when you guys deployed the .40

millimeters?

Kemple: Um, so there was people in the gas station like getting gas but nobody, there was

nobody this wa- nobody on the west sidewalk. Uh, there was no vehicular traffic

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because police cars had blocked off southbound traffic. Um, there was uh, northbound traffic and that was backed up almost all the way to Stark but there was nothing, as far as our backstop goes for the .40.

Gradwahl: So as far as your backstop you're saying there, there was, there was, you had a

good backstop because there was not pedestrians?

Kemple: And this is also a slight hill here. Uh, so right at um, Ankeny it kind of, it starts

going uphill, Ash is higher than Ankeny so we had kind of a hill backdrop as well.

Gradwahl: Okay but as far as his access to people, whether they're in vehicles or on foot or bicycles did you still feel that if he wanted to he would have, was a threat to

people in that area?

Kemple: Yes. Yeah so there was, yeah there was cars uh, backed up in both lanes of

northbound traffic of $122^{\rm nd}$. So it would've been very easy and at one time he did, he did kind of start going into the street about, I think it was about right here and then he kind of went back in. So – uh, on, so I, like on Ankeny he kind of dipped

out into the street and then went back in.

Gradwahl: Okay.

Kemple: And there was, yeah so there was just loads of traffic right here, so with, you

know just a quick four second running burst he could've had access to any one of

these vehicles in traffic.

Gradwahl: Okay and then the other officers that were in the area were they to the north of

you or they, were they by you or to the south of you um, at that point where you

guys deployed the .40 millimeters?

Kemple: Uh, so there was people to the north of us and then other cars, there was a lot of

cars running in, coming in Code and so there were cars that were coming in from

the south that I could see.

Gradwahl: Okay.

Kemple: Um, I don't recall exactly who it was.

Gradwahl: But people were still showing up when this is going on?

Kemple: But people were still showing up, yes.

Gradwahl: Can you kind of give me a description um, the best you can of uh, you know race,

sex, you know height, age of, and clothing and, and miscellaneous that this guy

had?

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Kemple:

Yeah so uh, I'd say male white, probably 30's. Long kind of straggly hair. Uh, he had, I believe a backpack, dark colored shirt. I don't remember what he was

wearing for sh- pants or shorts. Um, yeah.

Gradwahl:

Okay. So up until this point Travis?

Law:

Uh, just um, you were heading off shift at the time but you're an acting sergeant?

Kemple:

Yes.

Law:

And as an acting sergeant was this your call to supervise when you got there?

Was there other supervisor's on-scene?

Kemple:

I don't know if there were or weren't.

Law:

Okay.

Kemple:

Or were not. Uh, I started heading there and in my mind I'm just gonna go, I didn't even attach to the call and in a situation like this it sounded like they would need a less-lethal or multiple less-lethals, at least two. So it was basically just going to fill whatever role I needed to fill to get the job done and when I got there it was already actively unfolding so fast that there was no time to like really make a, a plan. It was just we had to address the threat immediately and we just

addressed it.

Law:

That kind of answers my next question but as ECIT you guys, is it fair to say you

travel all over the city to deal with people that are in crisis?

Kemple:

Yes.

Law:

Okay and as part of that you, you will get to a call and you'll evaluate is this person, is this an ECIT call or is it, we have to deal with this call differently and was this, this incident was not one that you normally would deal with as strict E-ECIT where you get someone resources or some sort of help or you get them a ride to Unity or something like this. This was more than that, is that

correct?

Kemple:

Correct. This was a, a person that was actively aggressive uh, he was armed, he was in an area with a lot of people out and there wasn't, for me there was no time to do anything but just immediately engage. And, and to, yeah – for the safety of the public and for the other officers involved we just need to immediately deal with this guy. Talking to him was, he was yelling so much that there wasn't

gonna be much of a conversation.

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Robbins:

I just have a couple, sorry. Um, when you arrive on a scene is it easy to identify

who has a less-lethal option and who doesn't?

Kemple:

Uh, for the most part yes. Uh, people with less-lethals it's a pretty big looking

gun and then its got the orange strap.

Robbins:

And when you arrived on this scene were you able to see whether or not there was

a less-lethal option available to anyone?

Kemple:

I saw uh, Office BIANCHINI, I did not see any other less-lethals.

Robbins:

And you mentioned before you're trained to kind of, to partner up with a less-

lethal, is that right?

Kemple:

Yes, correct.

Robbins:

Okay, that's all I have.

Gradwahl:

So I think now we're to the point where things have transitioned to uh, going west

on SE Ash.

Kemple:

Um-hm.

Gradwahl:

And it sounds like, if I remember right, you lost sight of the individual when you,

when you got Ash you, somebody told you where he was at this point or did you

hear it on the radio or?

Kemple:

No I, I'm not sure how somebody saw he was there. 'Cause two cars, or I don't know if it was two cars for sure but people in police cars passed us and uh, I believe one of them may have seen him go in there or people may have pointed, I

don't know.

Okay.

Gradwahl:

Kemple:

Uh, but another officer, I believe it was Officer SANTOS said he's down this

corridor and so we, I said stop, hold on and we waited for a few guys. Um, i...

Gradwahl: .

...and are you fam- are you familiar with this area? This cor- this building or this

street or?

Kemple:

I am not familiar with this building, no.

Gradwahl:

Okay, okay.

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Kemple:

Um, I know it's a, I could see that it is an apartment complex and that there are

some people out but I'm not, I am unfamiliar with it.

Gradwahl: Okay.

Kemple:

Um, so we have probably five or six people there. I don't remember the exact

number.

Gradwahl: And you're saying, and when you say people are you referring to officers?

Kemple: Officers, yes.

Gradwahl: And are you seeing uh, civilians in the area?

Kemple: Yes there are civilians out um, and I remember there was people on the sidewalk

from, from just looking straight back though all we see is him.

Gradwahl: Okay.

Kemple:

And that's looking down this corridor here and there were people like on the sidewalk here milling about. I don't remember how many, I just do remember seeing people. But when we looked down here we can see him and he is where uh, the circle is where uh, there's a corridor that runs um, north/south all the way to the back of the complex and then another corridor that runs to the west and he was kind of dead center. In addition to that, right where he was there's also a stairwell that is attached to the, it would be the southern middle building and this stairwell goes up and would give you access to all of the upper levels. And so that is also right where he is. So this, he's right in the middle and has access to basically go any direction that he wants to.

Um, we move forward, we start giving him commands um, again we're telling him drop to the ground, drop to the ground. Um, you may be shot and uh, at that point I see him start again reaching into his waistband to grab something and at that point is when I hear the, I don't see what he's grabbing I, I just see that he is,

it looks like he is reaching to grab something.

Gradwahl: You, your, and you're showing me both hands, was he using both hands in his

waistband area?

Kemple: I remember both hands, yes.

Gradwahl: Okay.

Yeah both hands in the waist area and at that point is when I hear shots. Kemple:

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Gradwahl: Okay and how many shots approximately do you remember hearing?

Kemple: I kind of remember five to six, I don't, I can't say for sure but in my mind I'm

thinking five to six.

Gradwahl: And do, how many people do you think or officers were in the group that was up

there with this individual at this point?

Kemple: I think about five or six.

Gradwahl: And about how far away were you?

Kemple: About 20 feet. 15, I'd say 15, 20 feet.

Gradwahl: And do you remember who all was up there?

Kemple: Um, DORAN uh, CHRISTIAN SANTOS, BIANCHINI I think um, and I don't

remember who else.

Gradwahl: The – did you uh, this sounds like it was happening fast, was there time to, to

make a plan and assignments for everybody and, and really choreograph it?

No we just, we went in and just engaged immediately. Once he was down is

when we made a plan. Somebody walked up with a shield and uh, so after he, after the shots happened he kind of leaned against a pillar and we continue to give him commands he kind of slouched down. And when he laid down he laid down kind of looking at us but both hands were kind of like um, pulled to his chest and so we couldn't see if he had anything in his hands. So we were giving him

kind of looking at us but both hands were kind of like um, pulled to his chest and so we couldn't see if he had anything in his hands. So we were giving him commands um, and I again gave him the command, you know let me see your hands or you may be shot, let me see your hands, you may be shot because I believe, I believe that at that time he could've pulled out a weapon. I didn't see him pull out a weapon but being that he was reaching in his waistband I believe

that he could have.

Um, whoever I, I don't remember who had the shield but we made a plan to immediately go up and start uh, giving medical attention. So we approached and placed him into cuffs. I put a tourniquet on his right arm, somebody put a tourniquet on his left arm. 'Cause he had gunshot wounds to both the right and left. Somebody else put um, uhh – the clear bandage over the gunshot wounds in the back and at that point I said is he breathing, is he breathing? Somebody checked for a pulse, they found a slight pulse, he wasn't breathing. I said let's take the cuffs off and we're gonna start CPR. So we rolled him back over, I took

his cuffs off and at that point we started CPR.

Kemple:

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Um, somebody did CPR for, I would say probably 60, 70 compressions. I took over doing CPR for about 60 to 70 compressions and then somebody took over for me. Once they took over for me I started telling people to lock down different areas and at this point there was a lot of people up on the balcony yelling at us, fuck the police, hey – all sorts of stuff like that. People with their cameras and uh, so we started posting up people and started trying to get witnesses and then a short time lately Sergeant FELTS arrived and then kind of took over the supervisory role.

Gradwahl: Okay.

Kemple: And yeah, somebody did uh, while I was putting on the tourniquet I had slung my

less-lethal and so it kept banging into the ground so somebody took my less-lethal

for me. An officer.

Gradwahl: Okay.

Kemple: To get it out of the way so I could do medical attention and also at this point in

this corridor is where I dropped my uh, extra .40 millimeter rounds when we went

up to give medical aid.

Gradwahl: And did that get retrieved or was that left at the scene?

Kemple: I left it there figuring it was part of the scene so it stayed where I dropped it.

Gradwahl: Okay.

Kemple: So I have not retrieved it.

Gradwahl: And, and earlier we were talking about did you have time to make a plan um, it

sounded like prior to you guys going down the, the corridor that you were talking,

saying let's get together and go down together? Is that how it went or?

Kemple: M-more just waiting for enough officers to engage.

Gradwahl: Okay.

Kemple: Yeah.

Gradwahl: When, when you started moving down the corridor uh, southbound were there

commands being given at this point?

Kemple: I was giving commands, yes.

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Okay and what were the, what was the nature of those commands, do you Gradwahl:

remember some of the things you were saying?

Kemple: It was get on the ground, get on the ground or you may be shot, along those lines.

Gradwahl: Okay and was he responding to that?

Kemple: He still had that, it was just a crazed look in his eye. He didn't respond audibly.

He just kind of was staring at us and uh, he looked very amped up. Um, but he didn't say anything that I recall. He just looked at us and um, he looked like

somebody that just wasn't gonna give up.

Gradwahl: Okay and this area you, you're kind of pointing, the circle where he was.

Kemple: Um-hm.

Could, could've he kept going at that point as far as trying to elude or get away? Gradwahl:

Kemple: Yes he could've gone southbound and then probably behind the complex, I never

walked south to see where this corridor went. He could've gone up the stairs and then got to any of the upper level. Or he could've gone westbound and had access to any of these apartments and/or to the next corridor that also runs north/south.

Gradwahl: Okay. And then after the shots were fired um, do you know who shot the, or fired

the gun or, or did you, at that time?

Uh, I knew DORAN had fired, I didn't if there, anybody else had fired. Kemple:

Gradwahl: Okay and were you checking with people uh, to, to try to do that as, as an acting

sergeant to?

Kemple: I didn't ask who fired, I just asked if everybody was okay.

Okay. Once, once the shots were fired, medical aid is being rendered um, you Gradwahl:

talked about him dropping the, the hatchet further back that was a weapon that

you'd mentioned earlier.

Kemple: Um-hm.

Gradwahl: Was, did you see any other weapons at any point?

Kemple: I did not.

Okay. Uh, you know either dur- you know prior to the shooting, during the Gradwahl:

shooting or after the shooting?

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Kemple:

Gradwahl: Okay. Did uh, so people were rendering aid, giving CPR, putting seals on and,

and I think you said tourniquets, did AMR or, or fire, did anybody else ever show

up?

No.

Kemple: Portland Fire did. Um, and when they showed up they, they took over doing

CPR

Gradwahl: Okay and were they the ones that declared that the individual was deceased?

Kemple: Yes.

Gradwahl: Okay. How long when, when you, I guess from, well we'll do a couple things.

Approximately um, from the time you got there until the time the shots were fired

how, any estimate on the timeframe that was?

Kemple: It was probably under a minute.

Gradwahl: Okay.

Kemple: I can't, I don't remember exactly.

Gradwahl: Okay.

Kemple: It seemed like it happened very, very fast. It probably could've been 15 seconds,

I -

Gradwahl: Okay.

Kemple: Yeah.

Gradwahl: And the, the timeframe when, when officers, including yourself, moved down that

corridor uh, prior to the shots being fired to give commands, you know how long did that last and, you know obviously shorter than the whole incident but did that,

it sounds like it was really fast too.

Kemple: So from us uh, like when we first saw him and then started going down towards

him until the shooting or?

Gradwahl: Right, so like if you were, like if you were, if you were on Ash and then decided

to move toward him down the corridor.

Kemple: Yeah, yes it was, it was pretty fast. We just made sure we had enough people

there and then went to contact him and at, at that point I was feeling like we need

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to just contact this guy immediately. He's already gone up the street, ran from us um, and he had a lot of access to other places so I felt that we needed to immediately engage.

Gradwahl: So you, you're saying, you had concerns once he was in this apartment complex?

Kemple: Yeah.

Gradwahl: For, and what were those concerns?

Kemple: Uh, access to victims I guess. Uh, I felt that he was still an immediate danger to

the community and even more so now that he was in an apartment complex.

Gradwahl: Okay uh, po-post shooting um, you said you kind of ba-backed off, other officers

gave him CPR and other things were happening. Uh, somebody had collected your uh, .40 millimeter. Um, what did you do at, at that point? Was there any-

anything else that you were involved in that we need to know about?

Kemple: Um, no I was doing the, I put on the tourniquet and then I was doing CPR so we

were doing - we were just trying to work, work on the guy.

Gradwahl: Okay.

Kemple: So, and then yeah I had some people start doing interviews and yeah shortly after

FELTS arrived and kind of took over.

Gradwahl: Okay and it sounds like you also were trying to talk or, or you're aware of people

trying to talk to neighbors and stuff and -

Kemple: Yes.

Gradwahl: Um, do you know of any neighbors that were cooperative and gave statements or,

that you're aware of?

Kemple: I don't.

Gradwahl: Okay.

Kemple: Hm-um

Gradwahl: Did you interview anybody um, civ-civilians?

Kemple: No.

Gradwahl: Alright.

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Law:

Was it pretty hostile there after he had been shot?

Kemple:

Law: Okay.

Kemple: Very.

Law: And when you're doing CPR um, you guys are taking turns doing CPR, your

Yes.

focus is on the CPR and, and that's really all you're focused on?

Kemple: So LEONARD was there and kind of watching the back this way and then uh, I

believe PAUL VALDEZ, I think he's the one that took my less-lethal so he was there kind of watching people from uh, they were on the west side of us and there were other officers showing up at that time. But yeah it was, it was an extremely

hostile environment.

Gradwahl: Anything else Detective Law?

Law: No.

Gradwahl: Uh-

Law: Ms. Robbins?

Robbins: I do not.

Gradwahl: Ms. Robbins anything else?

Robbins: So you were asked if you ever saw him with a weapon after he had dropped the

machete or axe like weapon back on 122nd, did -

Kemple: Um-hm.

Robbins: Did he act like he had a weapon?

Kemple: Yes. When he was reaching into his waist area that is where people often times

have weapons and in my mind I believed that there was a good chance that he had

a weapon there.

Robbins: At any time was disengagement an option for you?

Kemple: No.

Robbins: Why?

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Kemple:

This guy was already a threat, had already threatened people with weapons. He had already um, he had threatened multiple people with weapons and in my opinion if we were to let him go and let's say he goes into the apartment complex or a similar place, into a park or just anywhere with people and he ends up killing somebody or hurting somebody that's gonna be on me.

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Gradwahl:

This is Detective Todd Gradwahl, 29981. It's Tuesday, July 30th, 2124 hours at

East Precinct in an interview room and I'm here with Detective Travis Law,

42652. And also present is Officer?

MARK PIOMBO. Piombo:

And your BPST? Gradwahl:

Piombo: 46529.

Gradwahl: Okay.

Kenney: Officer Zack Kenney with the PPA, 44439.

Okay and everybody is aware this is being recorded um -Gradwahl:

Piombo: Yes.

Officer PIOMBO you understand that? Gradwahl:

Piombo: I do.

Gradwahl: Okay. So we're here talking about the incident that happened um, this afternoon

on 122nd Avenue. Uh, what unit were you working? Oh, I'm - and uh, before we get started here and talking about this uh, do you understand that uh, in lieu of writing a report we're doing a recorded inte-interview to you per uh, directive and

policy?

Piombo: I do.

Okay. So uh, today on 122nd Avenue uh, what unit were you working? Gradwahl:

No I'm assigned to the Traffic Division and I was here for East assist day. Piombo:

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Piombo:

It's an assigned that day that each one of us from the Traffic Division have to um,

go work patrol with East Precinct and today is my day.

Gradwahl: Okay and how often do you do that?

Piombo: Once a week.

Gradwahl: Once a week and is it always the same day?

Piombo: It's always the same day but it's um, depending on staffing. So sometimes we'll

work it and sometimes we won't.

Gradwahl: Okay so Tuesdays are your, the, the day you would do it but sometimes if

staffing, if there's enough at East Precinct then you'll do your normal patrol

duties as a traffic officer?

Piombo: Correct.

Law: How long you been with the Bureau?

Piombo: I think 13 years now. 12, 13.

Gradwahl: And besides, have you had any special training um, you know you, I'm assuming

you went to basic academy and then advanced academy.

Gradwahl: Is there any other special training you've had with the Bureau?

Piombo: Uh, well prior to Portland Police Bureau I was a police officer in California.

Gradwahl: Okay.

Piombo: I was a police officer there for 12 years.

And I was actually on a SWAT team down there and I was firearms instructor.

Gradwahl: Okay.

And a defensive tactic instructor and uh, short barreled rifle instructor, patrol rifle instructor and less-lethal so – and then up here um, I went through the advanced academy. And for a while I was on RRT where I was less-lethal and other munitions. Gas and whatnot, delivery systems. And then um, going, went to the Traffic Division, obviously. And then from there I've taken the uh, patrol rifle class and so I'm authorized to carry a patrol rifle.

Gradwahl:

Okay. So I said uh, basic academy so you transferred up here and went to the

Portland advanced academy?

Piombo:

Correct.

Gradwahl:

Did, did, you didn't have to attend the basic academy?

Piombo:

The state academy, no.

Gradwahl:

Okay.

Piombo:

I did not, I just took the written test down there without going to the full academy

Gradwahl:

Okay and then um, is it uh, CIT training is that, have you, did you attend that

here?

Piombo:

A long time ago, yes.

Gradwahl:

Okay so you have attended that one in Portland?

Piombo:

Yes

Gradwahl: Okay. Um, so now that we got through that, anything else on that Travis?

Law:

No.

Gradwahl:

As far as training and experience. Um, tell us about today, how you became

involved in the incident.

Piombo:

Uh, today it actually started in the garage when I was checking out a car and getting my gear ready and settled in and before I could log onto the MDT (clearing throat) this call was coming out. I uh, intermittently heard different um, pieces of the call over the radio due to the fact that, talking to people out there,

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trying to get a car, trying to get my equipment, going back and forth from my bike to the car and this radio and that radio and the noise. Um, and I ended up hearing uh, something to the effect of directions in which the subject was going. Uh, I picked up on the radio that uh, armed with a hatchet, swinging the hatchet uh, in an aggressive manner. Kind of pictures is what I've got in my mind based upon a bunch of different uh, collage pieces of radio traffic. Um, then I could hear um, well and then I could hear the call progressing where more officers are responding and it sounded like uh, that there was, it was uh, on the move. That it was a mobile situation uh, that the subject uh, was armed and uh, swinging. And um, so I, do the fact that I had a rifle um, I uh, um, answered up on the radio that I was responding. I didn't have it on and I was trying to confirm that it was 122 and what. Um, and uh, I heard, heard it come out um, near Burnside so I ended up leaving the garage and there was another patrol car ahead of me with their lights on too. They were a little bit ahead and uh, so we both went to the call.

Gradwahl: Can you kind of tell me uh, what direction you went. So we're -

Piombo: Um-hm.

Gradwahl: At East Precinct right now and this is the precinct you left from?

Piombo: Um-hm, yes.

Gradwahl: Which is on 106th.

Piombo: Right.

Gradwahl: South of Washington I guess.

Piombo: Right.

Gradwahl: Or Stark.

Piombo: Right. So I turned north on 106 and then right onto Stark/Washington direction

and then went all the way to 122 and then left, north on 122 all the way to the scene. And I didn't make it all the way to Burnside, I was uh, closer to Ash due to the fact that um, I was not one of the first officers there and there was officers blocking the street and they'd, it looked like it uh, well the whole scene had

moved out into the southbound lane of traffic.

Gradwahl: Okay and what kind of vehicle were you driving?

Piombo: I was driving a marked patrol car, the FIU.

Gradwahl: Okay so the...

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Piombo: ...and I had the lights and sirens on driving to the call.

Gradwahl: And that's the SUV looking ones?

Piombo: Yeah.

Gradwahl: Okay.

Piombo: It's just an East uh, an East patrol car. I park my bike, transfer over to the marked

police car.

Gradwahl: Okay and uh, how did you park? Did you park on which side of, did you park on

122nd?

Piombo: Yeah, so as I came into the scene um, I then saw the subject in the lane of traffic

and he was moving southbound on 122. So I quickly stopped where I was which is right in the center median and um, and went ov- (clearing throat) excuse me. Went over to release the rifle and uh, reached up to grab it, press the button and grab it, momentarily lost sight of him and then pulled the rifle out, go to open the door and then I realize he was just off the front left portion of my vehicle and I was center median and he was basically in lane number two of the southbound.

Gradwahl: So um, for people that might not know what, what is lane number two?

Piombo: It's the uh, you start from the center is one and then as you move further from the

center of the roadway two, three, depending on however many lanes there are.

Gradwahl: Okay and was there only two lanes going southbound at that portion of 122?

Piombo: Yes, two lanes.

Gradwahl: Okay so it'd be the outside lane?

Piombo: Correct.

Law: Just to orient you this is...

I believe I was uh, about right here. Arrow inside the box indicating the direction

in which my car was pointing.

Which was north?

And I believe when I first saw him he was about right here.

You can just put an X there.

Piombo:

Something to that effect.

Gradwahl:

Okay and, and then what happened at that point?

Piombo:

Um, I kicked the door open, pulled, pulled the rifle out, stepped out between the door and uh, charged the rifle, looked up. He in the meantime um, had stopped for a moment and there was, I could hear officers giving warnings. Stop, get down, things of that nature. Multiple, multiple warnings. Um, I could see officers to my north. Um, I saw there was officers with less-lethal. Um, then I began to uh, I didn't want to get trapped between my car and him so I began to start moving north in line with my car basically. And the subject then came parallel with me, I had my rifle, started bringing it up at one point and then I brought the rifle back down. I didn't point it directly at him and I had it in a loaded press ready. And I was looking at his hand, looking to see what uh, you know what he was doing. His behaviors and taking a full judgement of the picture. He was, he was yelling, he was um, uh, he had the hatchet. He had a

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hatchet in his hand. Um, I'm trying to think, I think he had it in his right hand at one point and then he put it down.

Gradwahl: Will you describe the hatchet for me, what it looked like?

Piombo: Um, it was, I would call it like an average sized hatchet. Black but it seemed like

it had a colored handle of some kind maybe. Um, it was um, you know a typical, typical um, hatchet um, handle that I guess would be about 18 inches long with the standard handheld hatchet, hatchet blade that's um, that is, you know uh, hatchet shaped blade that's about the size of a claw hammer altogether.

Gradwahl: Okay.

Piombo: Um, it was that, that size and that dimension. Um, he was yelling. He, he made

eye contact with me and I gave him multiple orders. Get down on the ground, get down on the ground, put it down. He seemed to interact with me when I was yelling that. Um, he had already put the hatchet down at that point and then he started reaching into his clothing or around his clothing but um, I started to move.

Gradwahl: And you're indicating towards your chest area wh-where, do you remember

where he was reaching?

Piombo: Um, it was, it was lower than his chest area.

Gradwahl: Okay.

Piombo: It was down um, maybe pockets and stuff. It's, I had the rifle down low enough

um, then he ended up with what looked like an oversized wallet in his hand and it, and it looked like it had white paper on the front and he was like presenting that out at arm's length and yelling something. And I told him to get down on the ground a couple times and I don't know what he did with it but he actually, his body motions looked like he was gonna get down for a moment and then he, he looked back at the other officers, he looked at me, he was yelling. Uh, you could his, you know the emotions in his face clearly looked angry to me. And he looked hostile and then he like turned and faced me and kept yelling and then he turned southbound and started running. And he uh, I remember he ran out of his shoes, I think he had like slides or flip flops. And I took about three or four steps and then stopped and there was other officers uh, passing me and I realized that I should just probably go get in the car and uh, 'cause uh, he was running and to me that sounded like a better thing to do. There was other officers that – oh I forgot, I gotta back up. While that, while um, I was standing there backing up and he had the hatchet and stuff, at some point less-lethal was deployed and I believe it was twice. And I actually distinctly remember one of, the first one, I think it hit him.

So I heard the initial information that was being broadcast about him in

possession of the hatchet and I also heard, over the radio that he was swinging the

hatchet. I heard that also, specifically heard that.

Gradwahl:

Swing-swinging hatchet?

Piombo:

Swinging the hatchet and I, for some reason I almost want to say that um, swinging it at cars is what I want to say that I heard specifically. Um, but then after the incident I described occurred here and he ran off then officers that uh, were moving southbound past my vehicle and I was going northbound back to my vehicle, I don't know who it is but somebody said that uh, he, he's also armed with a pocket knife that he has on him. And I was getting in the car and I said

broadcast that out over the air so those officers know.

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Gradwahl: So they said it clear voice?

Piombo: Clear voice.

Gradwahl: And then, okay and then you said what?

Piombo: I said, I told them, broadcast that over the air so the other officers know.

Gradwahl: Okay and did that happen?

Piombo: I don't know.

turned around, make sure there's not somebody else flying by me and then trying

Uh, two uh, I, I rem- distinctly remember two patrol cars with their lights uh, pass

me going southbound so I get turned around, I follow them, I see them turn

Piombo:

It was somewhere between this curb edge and where I put that X.

Gradwahl:

So you lost si-sight of him right there, you get turned around and you said you

saw two other police cars turning onto Ash, is that correct?

Piombo:

Right so I have to, I'm running back, I have the interaction with those two officers that made the statement about he's armed with a pocket knife or a knife. I, I get into my car, get my rifle pointed down in the seat next to me, try to turn it around without, you know there's still, you know cars and stuff in the street and then I start following uh, what I believe to be his path southbound on 122 toward Ash.

Gradwahl:

Okay.

Okay.

Piombo:

And then I see these two other patrol cars who are ahead of me start turning onto Ash. There was a civilian vehicle there that was basically in the middle of the road. Uh, they could barely get around it and I was like eh, I don't know if this is gonna go well, it looked tight. I barely got around them too and then we moved up

to the final location.

Gradwahl:

If you could just draw the car again where you stopped your car.

Piombo:

I stopped mine - right there.

Gradwahl:

Okay.

Law:

And the next page of the map if you need it is we get, as we go al-along is um -

Piombo:

Yup.

Law:

It shows the alcove at -

Gradwahl:

So you, you get your car stopped and what are you seeing at this point?

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Piombo:

I saw officers running from the street be-between the buildings um, uh, of the

apartment complex.

Gradwahl:

And is that on the south side of Ash?

Piombo:

It's on the south side of Ash. Stairs and the uh, uh, wheelchair access ramp. Uh, there was an officer with a shield and I'm familiar with this apartment complex and the area and the internal area of the, outdoor internal area of this apartment complex and um, when I realized that he was no longer just running down the street but he'd now run into an apartment complex that I'd been to on multiple calls and for multiple reasons. Um, and every time I've been there there's always been a lot of people. A lot of people sitting around, I've talked to a lot of people here it, it's, it's a – to me, my impression from my patrol of this area as a traffic officer is that I've, we've actually chased a couple people in here um, in this area. Actually a little west but this whole complex. Um, every time I've gone there there's always people sitting around. There's always people sitting out, there's kids, there's, you know it's, it's a nice hot day, people have their doors and windows open. So when I realize that this is the path we're following, that now we're in a complex um, containing residents and people and kids and to me is known for people just hanging out and it's no longer on the street and I felt a, a further sense of urgency at that point. So I actually, I actually hustled, I double timed it and I didn't take the time to go up these stairs. I actually ran up here and actually jumped across; cut a couple officers off trying to get ahead of them. Um, just because I, at that point I had the rifle.

Gradwahl:

So you, you deployed with?

Piombo:

I still had, I deployed with my rifle again.

Gradwahl:

Yeah.

Piombo:

Because it's a far more effective uh, tool for stopping a threat and I knew that in, in here that this was, if this um, went bad that it would close, quick and dangerous and that the rifle would be the, the, the, the best tool for a bad situation. So –

Gradwahl:

And at that point how many officers were with you?

Piombo:

Um, I kind of scooted by a couple. It was just kind of a, maybe – I don't know, I just feel like I ran by three of them but I'm not, I'm not sure, I'm just totally guessing. And then as I ran south on the um, um, th-the sidewalk that is for the, like the ha- the wheelchair access, I could see south of me at the end there, I could see and hear what looked like three or four officers and um, I could see the subject um, behind them or in, actually in front of them but, you know. And it was almost like when you see something through a fence, the slatted where I

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could still – and as I approached and was bringing my rifle um, into like a, a low ready position I could still hear him, I could hear the officers, I could hear the get down, the stop, the lots of orders and I could see him moving quite a bit in-inbetween uh, them, the little views. I could see in-between the officers. I could see him moving around, I could see his clothing um, and I was looking for a gap in the officers and to the left side of them there was a gap and I started to move into that position to create a, a lane for myself to evaluate what was going on. With a clear view.

Gradwahl: Uh, how far away were they from the person that was running from you guys?

Piombo: Um, 25 feet, 20 feet.

Gradwahl: Okay. **Piombo:** Maybe.

Gradwahl: And I don't know this area um, where -

Piombo: I want to say maybe I better say, I mean more like 10 yards so, yeah 25. Yeah I'd

say 25.

Gradwahl: Okay. Uh, so this is an alcove type breezeway.

Piombo: Right.

Gradwahl: Between the two buildings. Is it dead end or did he have a path that he could've

continued going?

Piombo: If he, if he went to the west, the right it's open but um, where he was there's a

fence and there's um, front doors to apartments. Downstairs and upstairs and there's a stairway. I believe there's a stairway there somewhere, I can't

remember if it's on the right or the left.

Gradwahl: So -

Piombo: It's on the right. Right over here, I think.

Gradwahl: S-so he was stopped at this point but there was a, he could've continued on if he

wanted to or went into somebody's apart-those were his options kind of?

Piombo: Yeah.

Gradwahl: Either come toward the officers, continue...

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Piombo:

...so I believe there's a staircase there that, there's, I think there's a, it's a wood fence in the back um, and I, I think it goes behind the apartments back there. Um,

so – we, I've chased many people through here.

Gradwahl: Okay.

At times, so - and uh, they always get a way. I haven't caught one yet. They all, Piombo:

Officer Bowman and I, whenev- we're working traffic and the guy ran in there on

us, dumped his car and ran in there, we didn't get him so -

Gradwahl: Okay.

Piombo: But yeah.

Gradwahl: So he, he could've continued going if he wanted to?

Piombo: Yeah.

Gradwahl: Okay.

Piombo: Oh yeah.

Gradwahl: Um, so you, you're looking in-between the officers.

Piombo: Right.

Gradwahl: You said you moved into position on the left hand side.

Piombo: Correct.

Gradwahl: Of, so now it's three or four of you or so?

Piombo:

And what's being said at this point by him and what's being said by the officers Gradwahl:

from what you can remember?

Piombo: I, I can't really recall what he is saying. He was uh, he's yelling and saying stuff.

Um, he's uh, he was moving around a lot. He was just um, he was still angry, he was like digging at his clothes. Um, I could, heard officers yelling get down, get down um, show me your hands um, when I moved up um, I actually was really focused on his waistband and his hands were down in his waistband area and he was tugging away at, and I could, to me I had, had the impression that he had something and he was trying to get it out. I couldn't make out exactly what it was uh, that he was trying to pull out. Um, I started to come up with the rifle um, to

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uh, take aim at him and um, um, a couple things is um, obviously other officers says he was still armed with a knife so that was in my mind. And um, I could see that he had something but I also re- in my mind I was thinking he pulled out that wallet looking thing and pointed it at me. So I was coming up and aiming at him and my finger was either on the trigger or very close to being on the trigger and I was setting in and really preparing to, to shoot. Um, 'cause I was convinced he was coming out with a knife or something. I was, it was just that – okay here it is. So I was to that point of whatever gets presented I have to quickly make a choice here so that's where I was.

Gradwahl: And what happens at that point?

Piombo: Um, I hear um, shots. At first um, it didn't seem loud and to me it just sounded

like um, less-lethal again. Um, so I really thought it was less-lethal and then I realized the shots were coming from my left and low and I looked, I, I was up on target and I, and I kind of broke my cheek well for a minute and kind of turned really quick and saw a pistol, a slide functioning and then I realized its not less-lethal and I went back aiming and looking at um, and putting, getting my finger back on the trigger to see if I had to shoot and then I realized that the subject was, his, his demeanor changed. He was reacting to being hit. So I could see that, you

know his uh, he still had a hand in his waistband from what I remember.

Gradwahl: Do you remember which hand?

Piombo: I think it was his left. And then um, but his body motion where he was moving

around and his, and stuff and jerking was uh, slowed and I could see his face and h-he wasn't um, I could just see a complete change in his entire everything. So I realized that A; it wasn't less-lethal, I realized that um, shots had been fired and I realized that to me it looked like he was incapacitated and not able to carry out uh, his continued attack and behavior and at that point he was starting to slide and lean against a post that was there. I think it was a, I think that's probably the

staircase post.

Gradwahl: And...

Piombo: ... and I could see his arm looked like it was bleeding, his left arm I think.

Gradwahl: An-and at that point uh, did anybody say anything? Like officers as far as

announcing anything?

Piombo: Yeah I heard, I heard more um, somebody to my right was yelling uh, show us

your hands, show us your hands, show us your hands. Get your hands up, get your hands, get down and then I, I um, I realized he was sliding down to the ground and then once he was on the ground to me it looked like he was having

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labored breathing and his eyes weren't fixed on any of us anymore they were move down toward the ground. Then I realized that um, he was very incapacitated at that point so I know we had a shield so I said get the shield over here and um, I said let's, let's move up and let's take him and um, I said, I think I said I'm on lethal and I heard somebody else say I have gloves. I said let's go now, now so then um...

Gradwahl: ...and when you say take him what'd you mean by that?

Piombo: Go up and secure him. Get his hands, cuff 'em, make the scene safe. Um, and I, I

think before we even approached I said Code Three medical on the radio. I said send them in, Code Three medical 'cause I knew if they were staged or whatever that uh, by the time they come running up the stairs that we would be able to get a hold of his hands and control him if necessary. Um, so I'm pretty sure I said that and then I moved, we kind of all moved as a team pretty quick and efficiently. As I moved up I realized that uh, the threat was over. Um, other officers um, were continuing to verbalize commands to him. You know hey, come on buddy want to help, roll over, roll over, you know give me your hand, give me your hand. Um, he didn't seem to be doing much at that point and uh, some cuffing began to occur. Um, I backed off because I've got the rifle so I just backed off to get out of the way of what they were doing. And they were trying to roll him in a better position than the laying on the side he was at. And then I said uh, I got on the air and uh, requested a tourniquet because I remember his arm. So that came to mind, I thought well, you know get a tourniquet. I realize we all carry tourniquets but that didn't occur to me at the time. So I just was thinking he needs a tourniquet. Um, and then I um, I remember seeing somebody go by me with a red first aid pack and then I - I turned back to um, DELAN and actually before we approached he had his gun out. I, I put my hand on his shoulder and I grabbed him and I said stay here, stay. And so he, he just stayed where he was.

Law: You said DELAND?

Piombo: Uh, yeah RICK.

Kenney: DORAN.

Piombo: DORAN, sorry.

Law: Okay.

Piombo: Sorry.

Law: That's alright.

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Piombo:

Um, so I forgot that part. I, I told him to stay where he was.

Gradwahl:

And is that the person that you saw the...

Piombo:

...shooting.

Gradwahl:

The gun cycling next to you?

Piombo:

Yes.

Gradwahl:

On your left, okay.

Piombo:

Yes he was to my left and he was kneeling down. So when I did look I, I basically looked down and to the left and just saw the gun. Um, and uh, I didn't realize it was him until it was over and then I looked right at him and so then I realized we have to, we have a shield, we have everything we need, lets approach, let's get this guy he, he needs medical aid. And then I could tell he was getting up and starting to go too and I put on my hand on him and I said nope you stay here, stay here. So he did and I, I thought I heard him holster up I think is what he did. And then once I got up there and uh, the other officers got up there and they got the hands on and I backed off, I turned back to him and I grabbed him and I said come on let's get out. And so I escorted him back out and, of, through the breezeway back to the street. Put him in my car and um, and then um, I actually backed the car out of the scene at one point. Uh, not, just back down to 122.

Gradwahl:

Okay is that where it's parked right now?

Piombo:

No it, it got moved like three or four times.

Gradwahl:

Piombo:

But ultimately um, with him in and with him out of it and so ultimately it was outside of the red tape. It was just in the yellow so closer to the command post

and I ended up driving it back to the precinct here.

Gradwahl:

Okay.

Okay.

Piombo:

Yeah.

Gradwahl:

Uh, when you, who, did he go with somebody else or you, you were with him for

a while who, who was with him after you, do you remember?

Piombo:

Um, um – uh, I do um, what's his name? There was a couple different people.

Gradwahl:

Okay. Um –

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Piombo:

Drawing a blank.

Gradwahl:

That's alright, if you think about it you can just tell us.

Piombo:

Right.

Gradwahl:

It, it was a lot going on here. When, so you moved up with the shield and you

said officers handcuffed this individual at that point and were?

Piombo:

I-yeah.

Or?

Okay.

Gradwahl:

Piombo:

I think they did.

Gradwahl:

Piombo:

I mean it looked, I mean all I saw were their backs but to me it looked like he was

being cuffed.

Gradwahl:

And they were talking to him and...

Piombo:

...yes the whole time.

Gradwahl:

Did they, they move him at all? Um –

Piombo:

I don't know.

Gradwahl:

Like turn him, roll him or anything like that?

Piombo:

Yes. Yes I believe they did.

Gradwahl:

hl: Okay.

Piombo:

And then once, I mean I saw a, the backs of a bunch of officers. I could hear them talking in a calm manner to him telling him, you know do this, do that. Hey buddy, blah-blah-blah-blah. Then I saw an officer kind of go around them with the red first aid bag and then that's when I basically turned my back on everything

and we moved out.

Gradwahl:

Uh, did you, so did you see any weapons um, at any time back in here either

during, you know prior to the shots, during the shots or after the shots?

Piombo:

No.

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Okay. The, when he, what you said was tugging at his waist and it looked like Gradwahl:

intent, it sounds like, to get something and maybe it was stuck or whatever.

Piombo: Um-hm.

Gradwahl: Uh, was it both hands or one hand or which hand was, was he doing that with?

Piombo: It was both hands, both hands were down at his waist. I'd say center left a little.

Gradwahl: Okay.

Piombo: And he was vigorously, to me it looked like he had his hand on something and he

> was pulling on his waistband clothing and trying to free up whatever he had. Um, and so I began to focus on that. And also he's super jittery moving around within, you know uh, you know stepping to the left, stepping to the right, turning and, you know just body motion everywhere and so it was really hard to focus at that point on exactly what that was but to me it looked like he had an object that he was trying to free from his waistband and he was basically using both hands to do it. One hand was on that object and the other was tugging, pulling clothing or

trying to free it up.

Gradwahl: Okay.

In regards to your rifle um, you were, you've been kind of motioning that your Law:

hands were up towards your face kind of like you were holding your rifle.

Piombo: Right.

Um, and when you deploy with your rifle, just so people can understand um, are, Law:

you're, in this instance were you at the depressed ready or were you uh, pointing the rifle um, at this person or where was the, where was the muzzle of the rifle

pointed?

Piombo: So it was both.

Law: Okay.

At different times and it went back and forth throughout that, you know half Piombo:

second of this...

Law: ...sure...

... and a half second of that and a second of this so it was kind of up down and -Piombo:

And were you using the small aperture the large aperture of the rifle? Law:

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Piombo:

I was using the uh, the red dot retical.

Law:

Oh I'm sorry I...

Piombo:

...yeah...

Law:

...when I had a rifle a long time ago (laugh) we had aperture's.

Piombo:

Right, yeah.

Law:

And so that's a, that, that red dot isn't a, it's an additional uh, object or, or thing

that's added to the top of the rifle is that correct?

Piombo:

Right, right.

Law:

so when the rifle comes up um, what, what do you lose sight of when that

happens?

Piombo:

Um –

Law:

If anything.

Piombo:

Y-you, anything below the sight of the rifle is, is not in your view anymore. Um, you try to keep both eyes open but uh, it becomes a very small piece of what you're seeing. Especially at a close distance so um, it's um, basically I, I, I — when I brought the rifle up it restricted my view to like his chest and face. And then when I brought it back down in depress ready then I would have to take my, my eyes and bring them down also and look at his waistband and the rest of the scene or picture. So um, so it's kind of a, it's kind of a, a mixed bag because when you come up with the, when you decide that I think I need to shoot or I'm gonna have to, I might have to. You bring the rifle up but then the things that may force you to shoot you might not be able to see perfectly clear so then you've gotta bring it back down so um, and being close like that it's like the, you know it's, it goes back and forth so —

Law:

Okay.

Piombo:

So that's why it was like moments of seeing it and then not.

Law:

Because you can't accurately deploy the rifle um, well with seeing everything perfectly well and also uh, maybe possibly using the firearm accurately, is that

right? 'Cause you have to be able to look and fire.

Piombo:

You have to aim.

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Law:

You have to aim.

Piombo:

Yes.

Law:

So your, your attention could be on something else other than what's down range

of the rifle.

Piombo:

So and, and at, at one point when he was retrieving something from his waistband and he was not complying and he was still angry and still um, uh, moving around and jerking at whatever he's trying to get at in clothing, clearly to me hostile and a danger to all of us, especially at that close distance. At that point the rifle came up and then I'm looking specifically like center mass chest, that's what we're trained to aim for. The biggest portion of a person because I'm in an apartment complex and I know there's a lot of people there and so then I'm, I'm trying to pick my target on that person where I'm trying to get my shot. But that's very

pinhole view.

Law:

Um-hm.

Piombo:

And then things change and you want to get a, a bigger picture and confirm what you're seeing and it comes a little and you come off the target a little and you're looking at the hands and the waistband so you lose your point of aim and then you've gotta come back up and acquire again. So uh, it's, it's, it's just a mixed bag of seeing the whole picture and some of the picture and a part of the picture in

tens of seconds.

Law:

And you mentioned people, did you see anyone else out when this incident was

occurring?

Piombo:

I was pretty focused on all that so I don't recall.

Gradwahl:

The, who, do you know the uh, Officer DORAN, was there, do you know who the other officers were that were with you up in that ar- or in that area right there

where the shooting happened?

Piombo:

No.

Gradwahl:

Okay.

Law:

Do you mind just um, going through your rationale about basically telling, I think

it's, is it GARY RICK DORAN is that how you, is he a two first?

Piombo:

Um, I was -

Law:

Officer DORAN.

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Piombo:

RICK.

Law:

Okay.

Kenney:

I can clarify.

Law:

You can?

Kenney:

GARY is his first name.

Law:

Okay.

Kenney:

He goes by RICK.

Law:

Okay.

Kenney:

I believe it's his middle name.

Law:

RICK. So when you, when you told RICK to stop can you just go through the rationale between that, why you didn't want him to go up and then also the rationale between of, with moving him out away from the scene and putting him in the car I guess is -

Piombo:

Okay so the rationale behind my thinking at that point is the um, the threat that was possessed um, by this subject had been stopped uh, and RICK had um, uh, fired the shots and that that's a very dramatic thing and it's a big deal for a human being to deal with that and there's plenty of other officers there that are fully capable of stepping into the, the medical roles that need to be done, the custody roles that need to be done. All the control of scenes and, and, and making it safe and then providing the suspect with the help he needs. So in my opinion um, you know because of how dramatic things are of that nature and how stressful that,

you know RICK was out. He was done.

Law:

Um-hm.

Piombo:

That was just my opinion so he, an-and there was other capable people who know what they're doing to provide those needs for that guy so I, that's why I, I put my hand on him and I told him, 'cause um, I got the impression that he was moving forward. So I said no, stop, stay here and um, then I and the others went forward and did what we did and then um, um, to me uh, it looked like the man was dying and so I thought that um, uh, RICK uh, didn't need to see the rest of that so I thought it would be best if I just took him back out on the street and let those officers provide help with him and to get the medical people in and then get RICK out.

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Gradwahl:

Do you have anything else Travis?

Law:

Uh, did he make any statements to you?

Piombo:

Um, I made statements to him, he was like quiet and he, I said to him, I said hey, you're a professional uh, police officer, you've done your best, you did the right thing. I said um, everything's gonna be okay and then um, I said uh, you realize uh, doctors lose people on the operating table I said so uh, not, I said something like, you know not everything works out. I said but you're okay, don't worry about it. He was um, clearly in shock, in my opinion. He was kind of staring. So I got him in the car and uh, and I said what'd you need and he's like I, I need some water so um, I had some water for him. So —

Law:

And you didn't deploy any weapons or anything during the incident?

Piombo:

No I did not.

Law:

Okay.

Gradwahl:

Fire any?

Law:

I mean, I apologize.

Piombo:

I deployed.

Law:

You didn't fire any weapons or...

Piombo:

...no I didn't...

Law:

...or, or any tasers or any less-lethal or anything like that?

Piombo:

No I did not.

Law:

Okay.

Gradwahl:

Uh, do you have anything else that you want to add?

Law:

Anything we didn't ask you we should have that you think we should be aware

of?

Piombo:

Uh, let me kind of play it through my head.

Law:

How, how fast would you say, from the time that you got out um, of your car initially on 122^{nd} as you described to the time that you made it to the alcove and

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you're standing within 10 feet of him. How, how fast would you say that all happened?

Piombo: Oh boy – um, maybe three minutes. But I think when, when we were outside of

the apartment or when I was outside of the apartment and ran from there to where the suspect was with the officers and the shots were fired, I think that was, that was probably all within like, to me it seemed like about 15 seconds. And that includes my running time. So – in other words most of the time was me getting there and then what happened, happened. I mean I actually kind of like came into perfect clean view of everything, came up on target and then started, and then kind of started to see the action of the, him in his waistband. Shots fired, I

glanced away, looked back up and that was it. It's over. So -

Gradwahl: The, is that your radio piece right there?

Piombo: This, yeah.

Gradwahl: Okay um, is there anything else that, that you need to add?

Piombo: Nothing else I can think of.

Kenney: Um, just to like touch on a couple of things here. Um, obviously you were saying

that you heard uh, force warnings.

Piombo: Yes.

Kenney: Being given out like left to right, multiple officers?

Piombo: Right.

Kenney: Okay um, and those were um, uh, like a, a command or, and accompanied by like

a, or else you'll be - what, like shot or, or those?

Piombo: No I, I distinctly hear and um, I can distinctly remember hearing uh, you know

orders uh, get down on the ground and they were, they were well given orders. They weren't like the screaming type over excited police officer who's screaming at somebody on a traffic stop because they're far away. It was, it was very clear and concise. It was get down on the ground now! Kind of, I mean even though I was really focused I could, I could hear them doing it. 'Cause when I got up there I knew I didn't need to because whoever was doing it was doing a good clear job um, and I could hear them and I know the suspect was saying stuff. But I can't, I can't remember anything distinctly that he said. Um, so I could hear them really clear but I couldn't hear him. So um, I can't even think of one word that he said uh, at all but I, I, I could hear their commands clearly. Is that what you mean?

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Kenney:

Yeah and, and then this whole thing is happening in a very busy area, correct?

Piombo:

Yeah, very busy area.

Kenney:

Okay and...

Piombo:

...commute hour, lot of people, high traffic zone.

Kenney:

So 122nd is like a major thoroughfare right?

Piombo:

Very major thoroughfare.

Kenney:

Okay and so obviously um, is one of your concerns like potential pedestrians, people in cars, like can you kind of describe what concerns are of an officer right

there? Like what the hazards this guy's presenting?

Piombo:

Well like I said earlier this ap-apartment complex in particular um, every time I've been there there's people sitting out. Uh, sitting out on the railings uh, sitting out in the alcoves. It's usually, and this is summertime, people are outside. Um, and um, so when I saw officers heading in there I thought to myself this, this is not safe because now this guy is around a bunch of people. This is a known high traffic area to me personally and I thought to myself I hope to God he doesn't get into somebody's apartment. I mean and I, there's always kids around and stuff like that so I, I'm still shocked, I still don't know, I'd still like to know if there was people in this alcove and stuff or if people ran from him because I would not, I just wouldn't be surprised if there wasn't I'd be shocked. I'd be shocked. So -

Kenney:

And I guess what I was getting at too is like out on the, the street you guys are trying to, I, I'm assuming maintaining distance and trying to give him an

opportunity to comply.

Piombo:

Right.

Kenney:

But at the same point you kind of have to, I don't know put yourselves bet- would you say you have to put yourselves between uh, the public and this, this threat? I

mean that you can only disengage and pull back to a point right?

Piombo:

So it's like a triangle. So you have to, you have to keep him away from people, you have to keep him away from yourself but you need to give him enough space to be able to comply without feeling like there's this threat. Or, you know give him the room to lay down, to, to put down what he's got, to get - he, he had that room. That room was created and when I pull out of the car, got out of my car and looked at him I mean he looked right at me and I had it, and the rifle in depressed ready and was giving him those orders and he was saying things back

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to me so I, I can't remember what he was saying. I mean I could hear him but I, I just – maybe I will remember later on but um, I could hear him, I can't tell you what he said though. But um, so there was definitely that distance. I didn't rush him at, at that point and I don't remember any other officers running at him.

Kenney: So initially you guys are trying to give him as much as you can and then as he

starts making decisions that move him into a more and more confined space your

guys' options start to get limited?

Piombo: They do.

Kenney: Um, and then he goes into the apartment complex and you're expressing the

concerns you did. You see your options get even more limited right? I mean you

guys have to kind of like put yours...

Piombo: ...I don't know if that's a, a correct...

Kenney: ...I, I, I guess I'm trying to understand like –

Piombo: Yeah.

Kenney: You know with, you know we're required by policy to try and um, uh, engage in

de-escalation techniques and it sounds like that's what you're seeing out there is

people are trying to like hold back...

Piombo: ...well I can tell you this...

Kenney: ...give him an opportunity to comply and do things.

Piombo: Right

Kenney: And then as the situation becomes more dynamic you get into a tighter confined

area, possible access to victims, you guys are required to get a little closer than

you had to out in the middle of 122nd which is five lanes across.

Piombo: Yeah.

Kenney: Yeah and then – I, I guess that's what I'm getting at.

Piombo: But there was, while we were here there was still ample room for him uh, to

comply, to lay down.

Kenney: Um-hm.

Piombo: To do all that stuff, nobody rushed him.

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Kenney:

No and that's what I'm getting.

Piombo:

Yeah.

Kenney:

Is you guys are giving him as much space as you possibly can.

Piombo:

And all those officers were in line, nobody was...

Kenney:

...while still trying to accomplish your purpose of keeping the public safe,

correct?

Piombo:

Right 'cause you have the obligation...

Kenney:

...okay...

Piombo:

...to communicate to him and try to, he's gotta hear your orders.

Kenney: Okay.

Piombo:

In order to comply to so -

Kenney:

Yeah.

Piombo:

I felt that that was, the distances were reasonable.

Kenney:

Okay and then at the point that like uh, deadly force was um, deployed you

mentioned you were getting close to that point yourself?

Piombo:

Yes I, I'll, I was believing and I was just given information he was armed with a knife, I saw him with a hatchet, I had no reason to believe he wasn't and the motions and the way he was um, trying to arm himself. Um, and I was, at the distances we were I felt that it would have to be a very quick reaction on my part. That I would have to shoot quickly in order to stop him if um, because we were

gonna be in danger if he decided to attack us at that point so -

Law:

Do you remember the name of the officer or officers or said he has, he has a

knife?

Piombo:

I didn't even...

Law:

...when you were on 122nd?

Piombo:

I didn't even look at them.

Law:

Okay.

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Piombo:

And I, I don't even know if they were talking to me because I actually, I think I was, I was going northbound, they were going southbound, I think we were parallel or slightly past each other and I heard that. And then I was getting into the car and I said put that out over the air so the other officers hear it or know it.

Law:

Was it your impression in, in hearing that that was the reference to the knife he set down on the ground or the, the, the hatchet or axe that he put down on the ground

or some additional weapon that he had on him?

Piombo:

Additional weapon.

Law:

Okay.

Piombo:

Yeah at no time did I think it was anything else but that.

Law:

Okay. I got nothin' else.

Gradwahl:

Okay, 2222 hours, ending the interview.

Harris:

Okay, cool. Uh, we are investigating Portland Police case number 19-258996, an officer involved shooting. Uh, that occurred at 12026 SE Ash Street. Um, just a little background information, Sergeant NUTTING you've been with Portland

Police Bureau for how long?

Nutting:

January 25th of 2007, so approximately 12 and a half years.

Harris:

Okay and you were promoted when?

Nutting:

April of 2019.

Harris:

Okay and you're currently assigned to?

Nutting:

East Precinct afternoon shift.

Harris:

Okay and do you have any um, special roles or were you like ECIT, you work

SERT, EDU, anything like that? NRT?

Nutting:

So in the past I've been assigned to SERT uh, I am ECIT, I'm a .40 millimeter

operator less-leth - or sorry a uh, AR operator, a firearms instructor, AR

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instructor, taser instructor. Did I already mention I was part of SERT at some

point, I don't remember?

Dran: Um-hm.

Nutting: Okay.

Harris: Okay uh, and what's your, your current assignment is a patrol sergeant?

Nutting: Correct.

Harris: And what shift and days off do you have?

Nutting: So C shift which is our afternoon shift.

Harris: What are the hours for that?

Nutting: 4:00pm to 2:00am.

Harris: Okay.

Nutting: My current uh, days of work are Thursday through Sunday.

Harris: Okay so today is a regular work day?

Nutting: No.

Harris: Sorry.

Nutting: Overtime day.

Harris: Okay. Um, what uh, so you, did you go to the briefing, were you at roll-call?

Today?

Nutting: I was at roll-call, yes.

Harris: Okay and how were you made aware of this call or wh-what first happened?

Nutting: I was preparing for the shift in the sergeants officer, I had my radio on in my

earpiece and I heard this call uh, at what point I don't reca-recall. Um, but I heard some radio updates coming out. Uh, as I'm preparing to go get logged on and as

that's occurring uh, it was dispatched that shots were fired.

Harris: Okay. So let's back up a little bit um, what did you first hear that you remember?

(pause) Or was there anything that drew your attention to this particular call or

did it just seem random? I mean -

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Nutting: Yeah, sorry trying to think of the first radio update that I'd heard which was,I

believe uh, that he, he - a subject in a call uh, had a machete and was backing

away from officers.

Harris: Okay. And that perked your interest a little bit?

Nutting: Yes.

Harris: Okay. Uh, what did you do next?

Nutting: Uh, at that point, like I said I was continuing to get ready to log, log on.

Harris: Okay.

Nutting: And continued listening to the radio.

Harris: Okay did you have any intention of responding to this or is it just a monitoring

type situation or? Kind of give me what your role is for something like that.

Nutting: Uh, at that point I was monitoring it uh, like listening to it, obviously and getting

ready to go out to my car and seeing how things evolved would determine my

response.

Harris: Okay. Were you aware of uh, is it routine that another supervisor get attached to

this call? Do you know if another supervisor was on this call or is this routine standard operating procedure? Based on what you knew at the time. I mean

you're just starting your shift I'm not, I'm not trying to...

Nutting: ...it depends.

Harris: Okay, okay.

Nutting: Uh, I would say based on the geographical nature of East Precinct it depends if

somebody's close if they attach uh, if they self-assign. Uh, I wouldn't say it's

abnormal for a sergeant to acknowledge that call and be enroute.

Harris: Okay. How does it work here uh, do sergeants have different, do they have

sectors, do you're, you're afternoon shift do you have the whole East Precinct or

do you have a section of East Precinct? How does that work?

Nutting: We don't divide it.

Harris: Okay.

Nutting: On afternoons.

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Harris:

Okay and just to sim- maybe just close this up do you know if a sergeant was

attached to this call or already monitoring?

Nutting:

I do not.

Harris:

Okay. So you get in your car, you're getting things ready and all of a sudden you

hear shots fired, is that, did I get that correct?

Nutting:

I'm actually still in the office uh, when that broadcast happens.

Harris:

Okay. So then what happens?

Nutting:

I go out to my car and I respond from East Precinct.

Harris:

Okay, respond to where?

Nutting:

Uh, I initially responded to the area of uh, 122^{nd} Avenue uh, at SE Ash Street.

Harris:

Okay. And then?

Nutting:

Uh, so at that point I'm seeing a bunch of police cars and officers out of their cars. Traffic is very heavy uh, I came from south of uh, I went Stark all the way to 122^{nd} Avenue and I drove northbound, I actually went past the initial scene because I'm seeing cars lined out all the way up to the Safeway area. So I turn around uh, I come back southbound on 122^{nd} Avenue and I stop at about 122^{nd}

Avenue and SE Ankeny Street.

Harris:

Okay. Um, are you getting updates while you're enroute? What, what's going on

there?

Nutting:

Uh, I'm hearing updates about medical and uh, medical aid being provided.

Harris:

Okay um, are, is anybody else above an officer taking charge or what, what's

you're uh, recollection of that?

Nutting:

I recall Sergeant FELTS being on-scene and providing some radio updates as to what's occurring and so I'm trying to figure out what it is I can do to assist him.

That scene in that role.

Harris:

Okay and so you arrive and what do you do?

Nutting:

Uh, at that point uh, I figure out exactly where our incident, our officer involved shooting is and uh, knowing Sergeant FELTS was on-scene with that I was letting him manage that and I started managing the larger crime scene that spanned uh, from the information I gathered about $122^{\rm nd}$ Avenue of Burnside, along the west sidewalk, curb line area uh, down to SE Ash which is a long two blocks.

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Harris:

Sure.

Nutting:

So I start establishing that crime scene area, managing that. Uh, coordinating any other responses we need whether that be uh, you know notifications uh, mobile precinct, all the other things that come with an officer involved shooting. While we're still allowing Sergeant FELTS to take care of the incident scene itself.

Harris:

Okay. Um, at some point are you briefed by Sergeants FELTS or what happens

next?

Nutting:

So shortly after I arrive uh, I'm starting to try and figure out uh, if we have multiple crime scene areas, what we need to establish, tape off. Divert traffic, I'm trying to get that locked down and I speak with uh, Acting Lieutenant uh, LACY SPARLING who is currently the acting lieutenant for afternoon shift. Uh, she was on, on-scene shortly after I was and uh, Captain KRAIG DOBSON who were at the intersection of 122nd and Ash. And we start working through that process of figuring out the information of what we have, where things occurred and establishing the pursuant crime scene.

Harris:

Okay. Uh, did you have any involvement or do you know, let me back up. Did

you witness any use of force?

Nutting:

No.

Harris:

Okay. Um, were you aware of who the involved officers were at this time?

Nutting:

About that time I became aware, it might've been shortly before, shortly after that um, it was at, so I'd had a conversation with Acting Lieutenant SPARLING and right in about that timeframe I was made aware of who our involved officer was.

Harris:

Okay did you, were you delegating any responsibilities as far as to policies or whatever? Separating people or just to help facilitate that sort of thing or what,

what was your role there?

Nutting:

Yes we were starting to work on separation of involved and witness members. Uh, specifically I was tasked with uh, getting a Public Safety Statement uh, of our

involved officer.

Harris:

Okay um, did you assist with any of the uh, processing of the involved officers or um, were you delegated some task from the Homicide Division or anything like

that?

Nutting:

At that point, no.

Harris:

Okay. What, what were, what was next that you did?

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Nutting:

So after I obtained my public safety statement from our involved member onscene uh, I determined what needed to happen next was just continuing what I was already doing of ensuring the separation and identifying witness and uh, involved members at that point. And getting them uh, separated and married up with another uninvolved officer. Our mobile precinct was on-scene shortly thereafter and ensuring our crime scene was cordoned off and we established a point of entry for that. Uh, and during that process uh, I'd learned that the, there was an initial crime scene uh, piece to this at 122 or sorry, 122nd Avenue at SE Ankeny uh, on the south sidewalk and so I ensured that that was maintained and assigned officers to stay there as we taped off a larger perimeter area.

Harris:

Okay.

Nutting:

And then I started delegating where the witness officers were going as I learned who was a witness, who was involved and had them go to the mobile precinct with an officer who not a witness or involved to maintain that they did not speak about the incident. I advised all of them that they could turn their radios off at that point. They had checked in with me, I knew who they were and advised them verbally that they were not to talk about the incident as they sat in the mobile precinct.

Harris:

And then what?

Nutting:

And then going through the uh, notification process outlined in 1010.10 which is our uh, post deadly force uh, policy which outlines our notifications of sergeants and crime scene management aspects. I began to continue to ensure that those had been done and coordinate uh, the other unit's responses to that location.

Harris:

Okay and then what?

Nutting:

And then uh, after I'd walked the crime scene uh, again it, it was a large crime scene based on the geographical nature of it. Uh, ensuring that ingress, egress routes uh, for uninvolved pedestrians were blocked off and cars as well. Uh, ensuring that that was all captured and locked with crime scene tape and that we had officers posted at appropriate places. I had uh, gone down to where uh, the officer involved shooting occurred at 12026 SE Ash Street and I checked in with uh, Sergeant FELTS and I believe Sergeant SAWTELLE was there at that time, or Acting Sergeant SAWTELLE. Uh, to see what other resources they needed and ultimately identified two other witness officers who I removed from that area who had already been uh, removed from the initial scene and took them back to the mobile precinct as well. Again advising them verbally of the things I'd previously stated. Um, subsequent to that I, some time lapsed uh, and the homicide detectives were on-scene and I briefed them about the incident and what we knew.

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Harris:

Okay and then what?

Nutting:

And then I continued to maintain the overall crime scene aspect of that area. Um,

and ensuring all of our tasks were being done appropriately and I was

subsequently released from the scene by homicide detectives to return to East

Harris:

Did, were you given a specific duty at East Precinct?

Nutting:

Uh, to await this interview.

Harris:

Okay. Got anything?

Dran:

I have nothing, thank you.

Harris:

I have nothing further, do you have anything you want to add that you think

would be helpful?

Nutting:

No not that I can think of.

Perkins:

Not that I can think of either.

Harris:

Okay I will conclude this, it is 11:54.

Okay my name is Detective Tony Harris, I'm here with Detective Arjay Dran. Uh, we're at the East Precinct um, on July 30th, 2019, it's about 9:22 in the evening. We are here investigating an officer involved shooting, Portland Police case number 19-258996. Uh, also in the room is, and I'll just have you state your name, officer?

Bianca:

Officer SHANLEY BIANCA.

Harris:

Okay and your BPST?

Bianca:

57552.

Harris:

Okay and present also is her rep.

Robertson:

Scott Robertson, 31290.

Harris:

As union representative and okay, this is a recorder uh, and you know this is

being recorded?

Bianca:

Yes.

Harris:

Okay. Uh, how long have you been employed with Portland Police Bureau?

Bianca:

Um, I've been employed with Portland Police Bureau for about two years.

Harris:

Okay and your primary duty?

Bianca:

Bianca: Okay so I pulled up pretty much right in the middle of the intersection at 122 and

Burnside.

Harris: Why don't you put like a rectangle of a car where you, where you think you –

Bianca: Okay.

Harris: Parked.

Bianca: Um, I would say like right here.

Harris: Okay.

Bianca: Um -

Harris: And can you put a circle where you first, where he was? The subject.

Bianca: Uh, when I pulled up he was about right here.

Harris: Put a circle.

Bianca: Um, they were to the north of him. I'll do a star.

right there.

Um, like I said I think there was a knife in one hand, something in the other. Um, wasn't responding to what officers were saying. Um, just kind of yelling and I can't, again I can't remember exactly what he was saying. Um, but as he very quickly was pushing south.

Okay. So let's continue so he, you say he's pushing south, he's making his way

south along the western side of 122nd?

Bianca:

Correct.

So then what happened?

Bianca:

So then what happens is he continues to walk pretty quickly um, south along 122 uh, officers were sort of running, fast walking to kind of keep up with him. Um,

and I did that...

Harris:

...and what were you at your, what, what are you doing?

Bianca:

So I was with the group um, walking quickly as well. Um, but then I noticed that, we just sort of had this big group of officers out in the open and I thought maybe one of us should have a car um, so me and HRISTOV, I said hey why don't we get in a car 'cause he's not stopping, he's just move- he might end up running. Um, let's at least have a car with us. So he said yeah let's do that. Um, and he said let's take my car. So we ran back to his car, got in, he got in the driver's seat, I got in the passenger seat. Um, and then we drove south on 122 um, with this group of officers. Uh, I had lost sight of the suspect at that time. Um, as we were driving our vehicle, we were driving pretty slowly um, five to 10 miles an hour. Um, we drove it south on 122. There was another, someone else decided to bring a vehicle with the situation as well. So there was another patrol vehicle in front of us. Um, we followed that patrol vehicle past An-Ankeny. Yeah.

Harris:

I think so.

Bianca:

Yeah we followed it past Ankeny down to an apartment complex on Ash, I believe. Um, this apartment complex.

Harris:

So, so what I hear, and correct me if I'm wrong, is the subject's briskly walking

south.

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Bianca:

Um-hm.

Harris:

Is he turning his back, is he ignoring the officers, is he trying to get away, is he

taunting, going back and forth? What would you -

Bianca:

I don't know because um -

Harris:

You lost sight for a while?

Bianca:

I lost sight, we got in the car.

Harris:

Because you had to run back, you had ran backwards to the car.

Bianca:

Correct.

Harris:

So your back's to him for a while.

Bianca:

Um-hm.

Harris:

You get, you guys get in the car and then you catch back up to the officers, is

that?

Bianca:

Correct, yup.

Harris:

Is that correct, okay.

Bianca:

And I still um, and we caught back up with the group. I still didn't see him again because we had the group of officers and another patrol car in front of us so we were just kind of following them. 'Cause obviously, I imagine they still had sight

on, on him.

Harris:

So you're in the car and the officers are between you and the subject?

Bianca:

Um, we're in the car, the officers are to my right, so to the west.

Harris:

Um-hm.

Bianca:

Um, and slightly in front of our car.

Harris:

Okay.

Bianca:

And then there's a patrol vehicle in front of us.

Harris:

Okay.

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Bianca: I don't know if there was anyone, any officers in front of that patrol vehicle or if

they were sort of acting as the lead -

Harris: Um-hm.

Bianca: Armored vehicle.

Harris: Okay.

Bianca: I couldn't see.

Harris: But you don't see the subject again on 122nd, did I get that correct?

Bianca: I don't see him, no.

Harris: Okay, are you hearing commands, are you, what's, what are the officers doing?

Bianca: I can hear, so I put my window down a little bit and I could still hear officers um,

shouting. I heard someone say he went that way, he's moving west. Um, and so pretty quickly after hearing that the patrol vehicle in front of us, and I don't know who was in that car, they took a right so they turned west on uh, SE Ash Street.

Harris: Okay, before we get to Ash do you recall, understanding you had your back for a

while and you disengaged what was going on, did you see the group pause at all?

Was there any pausing or was it all pretty continuous?

Bianca: It was pretty continuous movement. Um, I don't remember us even really

stopping our vehicle. I mean we were driving somewhat slowly because they're

all walking, walking quickly.

Harris: Okay. Had you seen the su-subject drop anything at all?

Bianca: Um, I didn't but I think, I heard over the radio a female um, officer, a female

voice say I have the hatchet I think. Um, I think that's what she said but I do very

clearly remember her saying he still has a knife.

Harris: Do you know, have we come to that part in this story yet or is that later?

Bianca: She, no actually so I heard that, we were in our car um, I think it was before we

had turned onto Ash Street. So I want to say I heard it in between Ankeny and

Ash maybe.

Harris: Okay.

Bianca: Um, I think that's when I heard her say that over the radio.

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Harris:

Okay. So we can get back, then you hear that he's, he's going west on Ash and

you see the car in front of you turn west?

Bianca:

Yes. Um-hm.

Harris:

Okay and then what happened?

Bianca:

So we turned as well um, and then some officers they cross in front of our vehicle moving to the south side of the street on Ash. Um, so that made me think that he was somewhere on the south side of the street. Um, and so we pretty much, as soon as we turn onto Ash we stopped the car maybe within 50 feet or so, or take.

Um, I jumped out.

Harris:

Would you write a little box where you think you stopped the car.

Bianca:

Okay. Mm -

Harris:

Okay.

Bianca:

About there. Right, yeah so we pretty much turned onto Ash.

Harris:

And the car that was in front is still in front of you?

Bianca:

They were still in front of us, they stopped.

Harris:

Okay.

Bianca:

Um, and a couple officers walked right in front of our vehicle to the south side of the street so I thought, okay he must be on that side of the street. Um, but because that vehicle in front of us stopped um, me and HRISTOV we decided to jump out. So I jumped out of the passenger side, crossed in front of my vehicle and then um, kind of followed the few officers in front of me and I heard one, I think it was maybe Officer SANTOS. I'm not sure exactly. I heard someone say that he had gone into these apartments um, to our south. Uh, I guess 12026 SE Ash Street. Um, that he was in that, that apartment complex area.

Harris:

Are you familiar with that complex?

Bianca:

I've been there uh, probably at least five times.

Harris:

Okay. And you kind, you've been there but are you super familiar of its layout

and?

Bianca:

Not super familiar.

Harris:

Are you familiar with any of the residents or tenants there?

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Bianca:

No I don't know...

Harris:

...okay...

Bianca:

...any of them by name.

Harris:

Okay, okay but you've been there before?

Bianca:

I've been there before, yes.

Harris:

Okay. So you hear that on the radio that he's entered the complex.

Bianca:

Um-hm, and then pretty much right after I heard that um, I walked up, if I can

refer to this picture.

Harris:

Yeah, yeah sure.

Bianca:

Um, so I'm walking west and I walked up to these stairs and I saw um, a group of officers in-between two buildings at the apartment complex. Um, and they were all yelling pretty loudly and once I kind of looked past them I could see that same subject I'd seen earlier um, just ahead of them. Probably...

Harris:

...just put an X where you, where you think where you saw him. I mean it's, it's

gonna be hard on that dark -

Bianca:

Yeah.

Harris:

But just -

Bianca:

Like further down here.

Harris:

Okay and for purposes of the recording we're looking at a, a face on shot of the address and the breezeway and you've indicated you stopped at some steps here right along the sidewalk and saw officers further to the south in the breezeway, is

that correct?

Bianca:

Correct.

Harris:

And about how far into the breezeway are the officers?

Bianca:

The officers were about 10 feet into the breezeway give or take.

Harris:

Okay and the suspect was about how far?

Bianca:

He was another probably, I'd say at least 10 to 15 feet in front of them.

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Harris:

Okay and purposes here you put an X and that's pretty much in the center of the

breezeway.

Bianca:

It is, he was, I remember um, where the breezeway, if you're walking on it your

first opportunity to take a right, so to walk west on the path, that's where he was.

Harris:

Okay.

Bianca:

If that helps.

Harris:

Yeah. So if we look at this top down.

Bianca:

Um-hm.

Harris:

We see a breezeway going south and then to the west is this area?

Bianca:

Yup, he would be right at that T intersection.

Harris:

So at, at that T, okay.

Bianca:

Um-hm.

Harris:

Okay.

Bianca:

And officers were...

Harris:

...okay...

Bianca:

...15 feet behind him.

Harris:

And what are you, what's, what's the suspect doing? That you can see?

Bianca:

He um, he was yelling um, he -

Harris:

Do you know what he's yelling this, at this point?

Bianca:

N- not in, not in particular. I think he said no a couple of times. Um, but like

before at the intersection he was extremely animated. He kept kind of making

these furtive movements with his hands. Um, and I...

Harris:

...and when you say furtive movement what do you, what do you mean?

Bianca:

Um, he kind of uh, put his arms up, put them down um, and I thought I saw a

knife in one hand.

Harris:

Okay.

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Bianca: Um, and I thought that that was also true because of the information broadcast

that he still had a weapon.

Harris: Okay.

Bianca: Um, I think maybe it was his right hand. Um –

Harris: Did you see a knife in his right hand?

Bianca: Yes.

Harris: Okay.

Bianca: Yup.

Harris: And I'm gonna ask again, do you remember what it looked like at that point?

Bianca: Um, I, I want to say maybe like six inches long, give or take.

Harris: Okay.

Bianca: I'm, I'm not sure exactly but I remember seeing some sort of a, a, some knife of

some sort in his, I want to say right hand.

Harris: Okay and there is officers and beams and stairs and things that are obstructing

your view, is that correct?

Bianca: Uh, correct, yup.

Harris: Or do you have a pretty good shot?

Bianca: No so there were officers in front of me.

Harris: Okay. And you hear him say no a couple times, do you think he was in response

to commands he was being given or just?

Bianca: Uh, I couldn't say.

Harris: Okay.

Bianca: Um, I got there kind of after, probably that conversation started between him and

the officers.

Harris: Okay.

Bianca: So I'm not sure why he was saying that or what, you know they had said before.

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Harris: Sure, sure. Do you remember which officers were in front of you?

Bianca: Um, I want to say I believe SANTOS was there, I think BIANCHINI was there

um, DORAN, HRISTOV, I remember he, I think he got out of the car but I don't remember seeing him so I'm not sure if maybe he was also behind me. Um, other than th-that I can't say who else. 'Cause I was kind of looking at him and not

really trying to look and see at who the officers that were there.

Harris: Sure. Um, do you know, as police officers we obviously ha- obviously have lots

of tools at our disposal, did you see any tools out?

Bianca: Um, I think everyone had, the officers there all had either maybe their, their gun

out or um, I think I saw someone with a less-lethal. I think maybe it was...

Harris: ...and what's a less-lethal...

Bianca: ...BIANCHINI, like a beanbag. Um –

Harris: Okay.

Bianca: I mean I think he was to my left with that tool out but I couldn't say for sure.

Harris: Okay.

Bianca: Um, 'cause again I was kind of just focusing on the threat in front of us.

Harris: Did you have any tools out?

Bianca: So yeah I, I pulled out my um, gun, my Glock. Um, and I had it at the low ready

because I had these officers sort of next to me and slightly in front of me. Um, I didn't point it at him uh, because I was worried about those officers in front of me

and I knew that we already had enough pr- weapons on him.

Harris: Okay and I apologize uh, if you already answered this but do you remember

specific commands in this breezeway?

Bianca: Um, I heard drop the knife. Um, I heard put it down, put it down several times.

Stop um, it's kind of what specifically stood out.

Harris: Okay. Um, did you hear anything deployed?

Bianca: Um, I heard uh, it kind of, I heard – what sounded like the less-lethal maybe. Um,

but then also I would say at the same time I heard what sounded like gunshots too. So it all, if you, to me it all kind of happened at the same time. Um, and it, it was in response to, I remember seeing uh, the subject take a step, maybe two steps towards us and life up um, I believe both of his hands. He kind of pulled them up

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to him and like started to move towards us. And then that was when all of the um, sound of gunshots and maybe less-lethal tools, that all occurred pretty much at the same time I think.

Harris: Okay, I want to clarify what, what you mean by pulling up your hands. You kind

of demonstrated to me um, were they down low?

Bianca: So...

Harris: ...maybe at his side or how, how would you –

Bianca: They were sort of down um, and like I said I think he had a knife in his right

hand. They were down and then as officers were telling him um, to stop and to drop it he, I'd say within five seconds, it happened pretty quickly. He pulled his

arms up and then took at least...

Harris: ...so like this, when you say up above his head or up to his chest?

Bianca: No I'd say up to about um, maybe, yeah chest level.

Harris: And is it both hands?

Bianca: Kind of where your heart is.

Harris: Is it both hands coming up at the same time? Was it just one side, do you

remember?

Bianca: Um, I think one hand was slightly elevated.

Harris: Okay.

Bianca: Um, a little bit higher than the other hand but I, I remember them coming up to

his chest and then he took, I remember he took at least one step um, towards us.

Harris: Can you describe that step?

Bianca: Um, I would say I think he took maybe his – I can't remember which foot he used

to take that step forward. Um -

Harris: Is it a normal walking gait or quick or...

Bianca: ...no I would say it was slightly smaller...

Harris: ...okay...

Bianca: ...than a normal step. Um, maybe like a half step.

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Harris:

Was it a quick move- quick movement or just?

Bianca:

Um, it was a quick movement. He pretty much put one uh, leg out in front of

him.

Um-hm.

Harris:

Bianca:

And put that foot down on the ground as, I'd say at the same time that he kind of

brought both of his hands uh, upward.

Harris:

Okay so all kind of simultaneous?

Bianca:

Simultaneously, yeah.

Harris:

And I know this, I think you said this happened probably in milliseconds and I

know its difficult to -

Bianca:

Oh yeah. Um-hm.

Harris:

What would you say the timeframe from you getting to the steps.

Bianca:

Um-hm.

Harris:

Until you hear the deployment?

Bianca:

Mmm -

Harris:

What was the elapsed time that you hear?

Bianca:

I would say less than 10 seconds. I'd say five to 10.

Harris:

Okay.

Bianca:

Yeah it happened pretty quickly so I would say five to 10 seconds.

Harris:

And you'd told me that you kept your uh, firearm at the low ready position, did

you ever deploy your firearm?

Bianca:

I did not but um, I did pull it up and point it at him um, once I had brought myself

up and leveled myself up with the group.

Harris:

Okay.

Bianca:

Um, because then I knew that I wasn't gonna accidentally hit an officer.

Harris:

Sure.

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Bianca:

That was in front of me.

Harris:

Sure. Going back a little bit before that, 'cause what I understand, correct me if I'm wrong, you hear a deployment of uh, gunfire and/or less-lethal rounds.

Bianca:

Possibly less-lethal, um-hm.

Harris:

How many total rounds do you think you might've heard?

Bianca:

Um, at least five.

Harris:

Okay.

Bianca:

Um, I think it was more than that um, it all seemed to happen at the same time and it all kind of seemed to end at the same time, if that makes sense.

Harris:

It does.

Bianca:

And I would say...

Harris:

...well to clarify I...

Bianca:

...five to 10 rounds.

Harris:

A real quick volley or was it a, a succession? Does that make sense? Was it a,

you know-

Bianca:

Mm –

Harris:

Within a coup- a second or was it?

Bianca:

I would say uh, I would say it started and ended, being the first gunshot to the last

one within about two to three seconds.

Harris:

Okay and did, did you see anything hit him or strikes or what was his reaction to

it?

Bianca:

Um, he, I, he was hit because he, I believe he went to his knees first. Um, he, he went down on the ground, I think he may have fallen to his knees. Or maybe on his butt. Um, something like that but he still had his hands in front of him. Um, and he was, I would say he was facing us, maybe slightly angled to the west. Um, and after the gunfire stopped um, myself and the other officers we continued to give commands 'cause we still weren't really sure. He had his eyes open um, you know so we just wanted to make sure that he wasn't going to continue to be a

threat to us.

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Um, so we continued to challenge him and say, don't move um, and I don't believe he made any movements after that. Um, and he's sitting on the ground um, and then that's when uh, we had a shield I think on our le- on my left side. Uh, so to the east of where I was standing. And I was about in the middle of the group. Um, but I remember someone saying alright let's move forward now.

Um, and so then this group, and I was maybe a step behind, they moved forward to him. Um, they were, because of like, I mean there were a, quite a few officers here um, so they kind of surrounded him and I'm not sure who did what but um, handcuffs were put on and then I believe um, they pretty much started applying medical aid right after that. And I remember hearing on the radio um, let's get medical in right now or something to that effect.

Harris: Did you see any injuries?

Bianca: Um, I saw uh, what appeared to be um, entry wounds. I want to say to his torso

area. Um, I think I saw a couple entry wounds, I think.

Harris: Okay. Do you know if he, were you injured?

Harris: Do you know if any of the officers were injured?

Bianca: I don't believe so.

Harris: Do you know who fired the lethal rounds?

Bianca: Um, I believe...

No.

Harris: ...did you know at the time?

Bianca: Uh, at the time I had assumed that it was Officer DORAN because um, uh, an

officer said someone stay with DORAN. Uh, and so then, and this was after we

had approached the subject.

Harris: With the shield?

Bianca: With the shield, um-hm.

Harris: Okay.

Bianca: Someone said um, so they're tending to him, I heard someone say someone stay

with DORAN and so then I took a few steps back uh, and stayed with DORAN

and he was um, I believe he put his uh, sight on, in his holster.

Bianca:

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Harris:

Okay.

Bianca:

And so I didn't see him shoot but I assumed that he had because I heard that and I know that in officer involved shootings you stay with those that are involved.

Harris:

And earlier we described it was, it's a sunny day um, 5:00, its summertime lots of light and visibility, however this looks like it's in a breezeway or alcove of some

sort.

Bianca:

Um-hm.

Harris:

Describe the lighting in there.

Bianca:

Um, I mean the, there was lighting.

Harris:

Or how was visibility?

Bianca:

Visibility was clear. Um, there was lighting from the sunlight. Uh, I don't believe there were any like artificial lights on the building or anything like that.

So I could see everything fine. Visibility was fine.

Harris:

Okay, no shadows, he wasn't in the shadow of anything or?

Bianca:

No.

Harris:

He was clearly visible and you could see?

Bianca:

Yes.

Harris:

Okay.

Bianca:

Um-hm.

Harris:

Did anybody, were there any uh, citizens in the area here inside the?

Bianca:

Um, no it was just him. Um, but directly after uh, shots were fired um, then I started to hear all these people um, off to my right. Uh, that was down the

breezeway to the west. Kind of at that T intersection we'd talked about.

Harris:

Uh, do you have anything?

Dran:

Yeah a couple things. When um, so in the breezeway you described he had the

knife, you thought it was in his right hand.

Bianca:

I think so.

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Dran:

And you said at one point you got yourself on line with the other cops so that

guns are all on a line.

Bianca:

Um-hm.

Dran:

Did you point at him before or after the shots were fired?

Bianca:

After the shots were fired.

Dran:

Okay so um, not to put words in your mouth but, but maintain cover on him?

Bianca:

Yes.

Dran:

Lethal cover. (Clearing throat) Pardon me. When the shield and the rest of the

team went up to address him.

Bianca:

Um-hm.

Dran:

That's when you stepped back to be with Officer DORN?

Bianca:

Yes.

Dran:

Okay, did you at any point, or were you in a position to witness them ren-

rendering aid to this guy?

Bianca:

Um, I was because I stayed with Officer DORN, or excuse me uh, DORAN for just a brief period of time, maybe 10 to 15 seconds and then um, another officer

just a brief period of time, maybe 10 to 15 seconds and then um, another officer, I

think it was PIOMBO.

Dran:

Um-hm.

Bianca:

He said um, I got you and he came right up to DORAN. Um, and then DORAN walked off. I imagine he exited the breezeway because he walked to the north. Um, and then Officer PIOMBO went with him. So then I um, knowing that he was still with somebody I moved up to the group and when I moved up to the group and again it was, they're still really close to, I mean they were close to us. Um, so I just kind of walked up and they were immediately um, cutting his pants. I think someone asked for a tourniquet. Um, and then several officers were asking for um, a first aid bag. One of the red bags. Um, and within about 15 seconds I want to say we had two to three um, of those bags.

want to say we had to

Dran:

The IFAK's or in-initial first aid kits?

Bianca:

Um-hm, yup. Um, and there were – and at least four officers that were working on him. They were sort of this group around him. I didn't want to get in the way, I knew that there was enough, so I could see that they were um, providing medical

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attention to him. Um, but as I was observing that and as that was happening um, people started coming out of their apartments and there were several women to the west that were screaming. Um, so then immediately me um, and SANTOS walked down there to kind of address that situation because it was almost kind of, not getting out of hand but they were becoming extremely loud and yelling at us.

Dran: What were they yelling?

Bianca: They were yelling what are you doing, you just shot somebody um, uh, what's

going on um, what did you just shoot someone and then I remember one lady said is that my husband? Her husband showed up within a few minutes after that. Um, but uh, they were extremely distraught and getting louder and louder. So then immediately me and SANTOS, we knew we needed to go and kind of

address that situation and calm them.

Dran: Okay, did it work?

Bianca: Um, not, not immediately, it took us, I'd say at least five minutes to kind of get

them to settle down a little bit. Um, I got one lady's uh, name and info um, and then after she kind of settled down she uh, I asked her if she would just wait inside of her apartment while the investigation happened. Um, and she said that

was fine and she walked into her apartment.

Dran: Do you remember which number that was?

Bianca: It was, I don't remember but I wrote it down in my notebook.

Dran: Okay.

Bianca: And I'd say there were, as SANTOS and I were standing there talking to people

that were coming out of their apartments there were anywhere from two to like

eight people coming out yelling at us.

Dran: Okay.

Bianca: And like asking is he dead um, why did you shoot him, things like that.

Dran: Okay real quick let's remember for afterward uh, for the round count to get the

notebook...

Harris: ...yup...

Dran: ... with that info. Um, when they were, the cops were providing first aid on this

guy did you see, what did you see around him? Besides his cut clothing?

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Bianca:

Um, I remembering seeing some casings um, his cut clothing um, I think there was a little bit of debris in the breezeway, like some trash and stuff like that. Um, I can't, I don't remembering seeing much else just because there were a lot of officers around him. Um, and I had kind of looked at them tending aid to him and then pretty shortly after that my ten- attention was diverted to this group that was yelling behind me. So then I just went down that way and didn't return back to, you know him and see what was there.

Dran:

Okay uh, were you able to see his hands?

Bianca:

Um, no. Just with the number of officers around him and working on him I remember them cutting his pants and trying to provide aid to him but then I

immediately left.

Dran:

Did you see the knife when they were rendering aid?

Bianca:

No. No.

Dran:

Okay, did you see or hear anybody talk about moving the knife away from him to

make the scene safe?

Bianca:

Um, I don't remember hearing that.

Dran:

Okay.

Bianca:

But that doesn't mean it wasn't said.

Dran:

Sure. The uh, last question I have is when you exited (clearing throat) pardon me,

the car at, in front of the apartments.

Bianca: Um-hm.

Dran:

And you ran up to join the group.

Bianca:

Um-hm.

Dran:

And I think you said that the group was about 10 to 15 feet from him.

Bianca:

Um-hm, give or take.

Dran:

And, okay and they're...

Bianca:

...a couple feet.

Dran:

Commands are being yelled at him to drop the knife.

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Bianca:

Um-hm

Dran:

And he's yelling back, you hear him say no a couple of times. Was that when you

heard him say no or was that earlier on?

Bianca:

Um, I think I heard him say no as I was walking up to this group in the breezeway. Um, and there was, there was a lot of noise and a lot of yelling but, I mean yelling on, the officers giving him commands when I entered the group and then him also yelling back. Um, and I think I remember him saying no. Um, yeah it was like this kind of row of officers and then him slightly in front of them and he very clearly was not doing what everyone was trying to get him to do. Um —

Dran:

How did, how did you personally feel about what was going on? What, what,

what emotions were going through your head while you're observing?

Bianca:

Um-hm.

Dran:

Having just observed the behavior prior to.

Bianca:

Um-hm.

Dran:

And then now you're in the breezeway close, within close proximity to him

what's, how are you feeling at that point?

Bianca:

Um, I felt like it was, the whole thing was just sort of chaos and completely out of hand based on his behavior. Um, based on pretty much everything that I had observed from when I got to that intersection at 122 and Burnside up until the breezeway. Um, he was agitated and upset and wasn't dropping um, the knife, wasn't listening to what officers were saying. Kept trying to get away from us and then I felt like um, when I heard he went to these apartments um, he could be, he was already obviously a threat but I kind of felt like we were at a new level because I was worried that he might go into one of these units and possibly hurt

someone.

Dran:

Um-hm.

Bianca:

Um, so once I knew that, or he's no longer like on the street but now he's in this apartment complex um, you know things might get worse. And then up until that point it appeared to me that he was always kind of walking or jogging to get away from us and then in that breezeway that's when kind of things changed because all these commands are being given to him and he pretty much decided to then move to us. Um, and I felt like that this turning point and then when he kind of made that small movement towards us in the breezeway um, that was when there was the gunfire.

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Dran:

Okay.

Bianca:

So those are just kind of my thoughts and feelings up to this point.

Dran:

Okay, any other emotions that you were feeling when this, when he made that,

made that step towards you guys?

Bianca:

I mean yeah I was definitely worried about what was gonna happen, about what

he was gonna do. Um -

Dran:

And you can, you can plain language it, I mean if -

Bianca:

I mean yeah I was scared. Um, I felt like he wasn't always only a threat to the community and, you know people on the street or in those apartments but then also to us. Um, especially when he um, was yelling back to us and in that breezeway and then kind of made that small movement towards us. So I felt, you know like I was in fear of my life. Um, and I had my gun out but again I didn't have it on him because I was aware of, you know a couple officers that were slightly in front of me and I didn't want, you know to obviously accidentally shoot one of them.

.

Dran:

Right.

Bianca:

So I just kind of kept my gun at the low ready. But I still felt like he was a threat

to me. If that makes sense.

Dran:

Yeah. I think that's, those are the only questions I had. I'm want to just try to find in the notes though real quick when you did, because I remember you said he was saying no and I don't want to get the (clearing throat) pardon me, the

sequence wrong on when he -

Bianca:

Um-hm.

Dran:

Okay so it looks like you said (clearing throat) pardon me. You didn't say pardon

me. You said when you first arrived he, at the intersection.

Bianca:

Um-hm.

Dran:

The officers were giving commands and um, he was, he was saying no, he said,

he said no a couple of times. Um, so we'll call that the street confrontation.

Bianca:

Um-hm.

Dran:

At the apartment confrontation you, you remember...

Bianca:

...I think I heard it again.

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Dran:

Okay.

Bianca:

Yeah like – I think I heard it at that intersection and also in the breezeway.

Dran:

Okay. Alright.

I um, I think I heard a less-lethal. Um, but that was when I was on the way back to the car. Um, so I'm not sure if that hit him or if it didn't um, I remember hearing that. It was still loud at that intersection with the number of people um, the radio and just the officers yelling. I think I heard that, I didn't see it again 'cause I, I believe when I heard that I was already kind of enroute back to um, HRISTOV's car. So again I don't know if he was hit or what that was about.

And when you say that you just, you just heard the reports of -

What sounded like.

What sounded like, you didn't hear anybody on the radio, you didn't hear

anybody say I just used, that's just your own perception of what you heard? Did I

get that right?

Correct.

Dran: I'm good.

Robertson: Nothing.

This is Detective Travis Law, the date is July 30th, 2019, the time is approximately 2234 hours. Uh, we are here at East Precinct in an interview room off the lobby. Uh, with Officer NICK BIANCHINI, B-I-A-N-C-H-I-N-I uh, DPSST number 50575. Um, also present is my partner, Detective Todd Gradwahl uh, 29981. And Officer BIANCHINI is uh, represented by his attorney uh, who is also present, Nicole Robbins. R-O-B-B-I-N-S. And this is a recorded statement in regarding to Portland Police case number 19-258996 and this going to be an officer involved shooting that happened uh, earlier this evening, July 30th. The incident, the original incident happened at 122 and Glisan and Officer BIANCHINI um, you're familiar or you're aware this is being recorded and you're okay with us recording it?

Bianchini: Yes.

Law:

Okay. And um, Ms. Robbins you're aware we're recording?

Bianchini:

Law:

Okay. And just before we get started um, this recording um, is in lieu of a uh, written statement uh, regarding this incident and we are taking this recording or

you're providing this statement per directive, is that right?

Bianchini: Yes.

Law:

Okay. So let's just go ahead and start with some general uh, background

information. Um, NICK how long have you been with the Bureau?

Bianchini: Over 10 years.

Law:

Okay and you're currently assigned to uh, East Precinct, is that right?

Bianchini: Yes.

Bianchini: C shift.

And what are the hours of sh-C shift?

millimeter launcher when you go out on shift, is that right?

Okay and just for the benefit of the recording uh, Officer BIANCHINI is wearing a standard Portland Police Bureau uniform with badges and patches displayed and

he's wearing an exterior vest, is that right?

Bianchini: That is correct.

Law: Okay um, and what district do you normally work at um, East Precinct?

Bianchini: Um, I am a rover. I'll work wherever they need me.

Law: Okay and do you work with a partner or by yourself?

Bianchini: Usually by myself.

Law: Okay and what are your days off?

Bianchini: Uh, Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

Law: Oh okay, well good for you. Um, and today or this incident that happened this

afternoon um, what shift or what district were you assigned to?

Bianchini: I was assigned to 974.

Law: Okay and in my day 974 was down at like 112 and, and Holgate but is 970's uh,

which area of nor- of East Precinct in 970's?

Bianchini: Uh, it's from Division to the north, Holgate to the south.

Law: Okay.

Bianchini: 82nd all the way out about 136th.

Law: Okay and that's an area you work frequently?

Bianchini: Yes.

Law: Okay and what, you started your shift at 4:00 and does, do they still do a roll-call

before shift and then you roll out and start taking calls?

Bianchini: Yes.

Law: Okay and um, how did you become involved in um, the incident um, that

happened, that originated at 122nd and Glisan?

Bianchini: Um, I logged on um, to my patrol car after roll-call and I heard the call going on

uh, near 122nd and Glisan. Um, I wasn't gonna respond to it originally because it

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seemed like there was ample officers already on the call but um, I heard Officer ZENTNER say that the uh, suspect had a machete and he was waving it around and she needed more officers there as quick as, as we could.

Law:

Okay and did you just head that way, attach yourself to the call via CAD or?

Bianchini:

Um, I think I did via CAD.

Law:

Okay.

Bianchini:

Yeah.

Law:

Um, and when, when an officer asks for more assistance like that is that common for an officer to, to ask for assistance and give an update that someone has a machete or did it seem like sort of an uncommon call that you would go on.

Bianchini:

It's unusual.

Law:

Okay.

Bianchini:

Yeah.

Law:

Um, and did you have some initial concerns, when you heard the information that you heard before you left uh, I don't want to put words in your mouth, but you were getting information before you left the precinct as you logged on, is that

right?

Bianchini:

Um-hm.

Law:

And what kind of information were you getting?

Bianchini:

Um, I wasn't paying very close attention to it but I heard there was mention of a

weapon.

Law:

Okay.

Bianchini:

Um, and uh, especially when Officer ZENTNER said that he was waving around a machete, I knew that um, having a .40 millimeter would've been uh, an asset to

that call.

Law:

Okay.

Bianchini:

So-

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Law:

And um, did, when, when she mentioned that he was waving a machete around

what did it sound like on the, on the radio to you?

Bianchini:

Uh, it sounded like he was about to hurt somebody and uh, her tone of voice it

seemed like she, you know needed help there.

Law:

Okay.

Bianchini:

So –

Law:

You work around Officer ZENTNER frequently?

Bianchini:

Yes, um-hm.

Law:

Okay and um, so this call, kind of my understanding is, is from the way you

described it is this is not your average theft, cold theft call, this is more of an

active incident that you felt like you needed to respond to?

Bianchini:

Yes.

Law:

Quickly. Okay and you responded um, did you drive um, had you made your way

from the precinct or did you go directly there from here?

Bianchini:

Um, I was at about 112th and Market when I um, heard that.

Law:

Okay.

Yes.

Bianchini:

That information and I uh, responded Code Three down Market Street out to

122nd then I turned north on 122nd.

Law:

Okay and northbound on 122 to the, to the scene, is that about right?

Bianchini:

.

Law:

Okay and when you arrived uh, where, where did you initially encounter this call?

Bianchini:

Um, I heard an update that the suspect was approaching uh, Burnside on 122nd, heading southbound. So uh, the direction I was going was going directly towards the direction the suspect was walking. Um, so when I got to 122nd and Burnside I saw a group of officers walking north of Burnside um, in my direction and I decided to uh, park my patrol car in the intersection and get out and uh –

Law:

Okay and I, and I have a map here um, it's, this is an overview of 122nd and Burnside oriented to the north. This is 122 and Burnside here. Um, this is the gas station on the corner um, this big overflow parking lot for the MAX. Um, do you

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mind just drawing uh, where on the map you sort of um, initially parked your car and where you saw um, the, the person involved in this incident and the officers?

Bianchini: Yes. So -

Law: And if they're outside of the map that –

Bianchini: Okay.

Law: That's fine we can –

Bianchini: Um, so I drove up 122nd and I parked my car about right here and I saw the group

of officers walking down the street kind of like that.

Law: Okay.

Bianchini: This way and I eventually uh, there's a group of people on the sidewalk with the

suspect that were in civilian clothes that were apparently following him, it looked like to me, so I had a hard time at first picking out uh, which one was the suspect 'cause there was quite a few people walking in the area. But I saw the suspect

walking on the sidewalk about right here.

Law: Okay.

Robbins: Can you label your car at?

Bianchini: Yeah.

Law: If you draw a little arrow pointing the direction that your car was facing, kind of

like a traffic crash diagram. There that'll work. And so you saw this person that was involved in this incident at, was that north of the intersection at 122 and

Burnside moving south?

Bianchini: Yes.

Law: Okay and do you remember um, what that person was wearing, generally

speaking? Their clothing?

Bianchini: Yeah I think he had a um, dark clothing. I think he was wearing black pants and

he had a black coat. Um, it was a white male, kinda scraggly um, unshaven, skinny. And uh, he looked very agitated so he was um, different than the other

people that were around him. I can easily pick him out.

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Law:

Okay um, and can you describe the area um, how the, the traffic was and the pedestrians that were, if there were any um, at that time of day when this incident was taking place?

Bianchini:

Yes um, traffic was jam packed. There was cars backed up um, on Burnside and they were backed up 122^{nd} , I think there might've been a patrol car right at the intersection here blocking traffic. Um, but there were a large group, there was a large group of people in the MAX uh, station right here. Um, kind of gathered on the platform. Um, there was people on the sidewalk so there was just, there was a lot of people and some people were getting out of their cars as we um, more and more of a larger police presence, you know developed.

Law:

Okay um, so in addition to um, the people that were following, y-y-you didn't have any, there wasn't any question I guess, there wasn't any question in your mind who was, who this incident was, was in regard to? This person that was walking down the street you didn't, initially you could pick him out of everybody else 'cause there was something about him that was, that, that caught your attention, is that right?

Bianchini: Yes.

Law: And that was his, the way he was acting, his clothing and him...

Bianchini: ...that's what drew my attention to him.

Law: Yeah.

Bianchini: And upon further, further focus he had a hatchet above his uh, head that he was

raised.

Law: Okay and can you describe the hatchet?

Bianchini: It was a uh, about a foot and a half inch or a foot and a half, you know long. It

had a, a blade on the end of it that was maybe three or four inches. Um, one side looked like it was sharp and the other side looked like it was like a hammer end.

Your typical hatchet and it was bright green, the handle of it was.

Law: Okay um, and you say he was holding it up above his head, is that right?

Bianchini: Yeah um, that's, when I saw it it was...

Law: ...do you remember which hand it was in? You're using your right hand, was it

your, was it his right hand?

Bianchini: I think it was his right hand.

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Law:

Okay. Um –

Bianchini:

Law:

And do you remember like which way the blade was facing as he was holding it

up?

Bianchini:

It was facing outward.

Law:

The blade was facing away his body?

Bianchini:

Uh, it was facing not towards him but towards anybody he would be approaching.

Law:

Okay and if I remember correctly you said there was officers that were behin-so in-between you and the officers was the subject of the call and there was officers

walking behind him?

Bianchini:

Yes.

Law:

Okay um, and with the hatchet um, was he doing anything other than holding the

hatchet above his head?

Bianchini:

Um, he was yelling uh, he was, he looked like he was menacing with anybody

that was near him.

Law:

Um-hm.

Bianchini:

Menacing to us, the police. Um, the way he raised it and then looked in our direction, looked in other people's direction, the way he waved it around. Um, he, he didn't look like he was doing it for, for fun, he looked like he was doing it, you

know to, to harm somebody. Or go in that direction.

Law:

And the people that were on the sidewalk uh, with him were, were they, were they

trying to interact with him?

Bianchini:

They were, there were people um, yelling towards him uh, telling him, I can't remember exactly what they were saying but they were trying to, I think help defuse the situation because they didn't want to see him hurt any more than we

did so.

Law:

Okay and when you took a position here what, what was your initial act, what, what was your initial actions when you arrived? I see you parked in the

intersection via your drawing here what, when you got out of the car what'd you

do?

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Bianchini: Um, my initial reaction was that I needed to grab my .40 millimeter. Um, I

decided not to grab my AR-15 because of the nature of the call. I thought maybe the .40 would be a better decision. Um, I thought that I'd be more likely to be able to use that um, you know to benefit the, the situation. So I, I popped my trunk 'cause I keep my .40 millimeter in the uh, lockbox in the back and I got that out as soon as I could and uh, turned on my red dot and uh, started giving

commands from that point.

Law: So when you deploy your less-lethal like that or when you make the decision to

either deploy with a rifle or deploy with a less-lethal your, your, is it fair to say that you're evaluating the force options that are available to you at that point and you make a decision based on whichever one you think is gonna be the best for

that situation?

Bianchini: Yes.

Law: Okay um, and if there was, had there been like a whole bunch of officers out there

that you could that had less-lethal you would've taken maybe a different force

option that you would've brought with you?

Bianchini: Yes

Law: But that your sense was that you were going to use, deploy with your .40

millimeter?

Bianchini: Yes.

Law: And how, how you keep your .40 millimeter um, uh, other than locked in the back

of your car how do you keep it um, is it loaded, unloaded and if its not loaded

how do you keep the rounds?

Bianchini: Um, I keep it unloaded. There's two rounds in the side saddle on the butt of the,

of the launcher and then I keep a uh, uh, several extra rounds on a belt that I

didn't grab today.

Law: Okay.

Bianchini: Based on, I didn't have enough time.

Law: So you had the two rounds on, on the side saddle?

Bianchini: Um-hm.

Law: And um, is it customary for you to load the less-lethal launcher as you deploy it or

just wait to see how things are gonna unfold and then do it then?

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Bianchini: Um, in that situation I was gonna, I loaded it as soon as I could.

Law: Okay and where did you go, on which side of your vehicle did you go when you

initially addressed this person um, and started giving commands?

Bianchini: I went around to the front of my vehicle.

Law: Okay and you, you motioned onto the uh, driver's side of the vehicle?

Bianchini: I think so.

Law: Okay and can, before I forget can you describe, other than the clothing can you

describe the person um, that was holding the um, sledge or the uh-

Gradwahl: Hatchet.

Law: Hatchet above his head?

Bianchini: Yeah um, he seemed very disheveled, he was wearing dark clothing. Uh, dark

pants, dark jacket. Had a scraggly beard, white male, thin build. Um, screaming uh, waving a hatchet around in the air in a threatening manner and uh, surrounded

by, you know other people that had um, are just in the area.

Law: And you know about, generally how old he was?

Bianchini: I'd say he's in his 30's.

Law: Okay, anything else distinguishing about um, him, his possessions?

Bianchini: He seemed a little um, maybe dirty. Um, uh – he was wearing sandals uh, not

wearing shoes.

Law: Okay. And you mentioned that you had given verbal commands um, were there

other verbal commands that were given by the officers that were sort of on the

other side of the, this person?

Bianchini: There were.

Law: Okay and can you tell what those commands were?

Bianchini: Um, I remember I gave a command for him to uh, drop the hatchet or I would

shoot him with my .40 millimeter. Um, he didn't seem to pay any attention to me. Um, somebody else uh, chimed in and also gave him a warning uh, asking him to drop the hatchet. Um, asking him to uh, there were several commands being given um, it wasn't from one particular officer at a time. Or it was from one

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particular officer at a time but it wasn't, we weren't talking on top of each other so it seemed like when he wouldn't respond to somebody, somebody else would try.

Okay. And how, about how many officers do you think were on-scene when this

was all taking place?

Bianchini: Um, I don't know how many officers were north of Burnside but I saw a pretty

good group, at least four I think um, and uh, shortly after I engaged with uh, the suspect here I uh, had another officer join me on this side of $\,$ my patrol car.

Law: Okay so um, when he wasn't responding to your verbal commands um, you, you

said you guys weren't talking over each other but um, this, this wasn't like a bunch of police that were standing at this intersection screaming and yelling at this person to drop the hatchet. This was officers that were giving uh, concise verbal warnings to uh, drop the hatchet or force would be used against him, is that

fair?

Bianchini: Yes.

Law:

Law: Okay and um, you say you were joined by another officer and do you remember

who that officer was?

Bianchini: Officer KEMPLE.

Law: Okay and that's DAVID KEMPLE?

Bianchini: Yes.

Law: Okay and did the officer resp- I'm sorry did the subject um, and do you know the

subject? Have you ever had contact with him before?

Bianchini: I don't think so, I don't believe so.

Law: Okay um, and did he respond? Did he uh, comply with the verbal commands to

put down the hatchet to um, to do whatever the other officers were telling him to

do?

Bianchini: Um, yes and no. So he eventually crossed over to the south side of uh, Burnside,

over onto the corner of uh, 122nd and Burnside right here.

Law: Okay.

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Bianchini: And uh, for a few seconds he did drop the hatchet on, on the ground and uh,

picked it back up within a matter of seconds. So he was, he was thinking I think to uh, maybe drop the hatchet but for some reason he picked it back up so.

Law: And what was his uh, his path through here? Was he running, was he walking,

jogging?

Bianchini: Um, he would, he was walking but he would uh, he would stop um, uh, pretty

frequently to turn around and uh, face the police that were trying to talk to him. Face the, the public that was sort of, you know gathered on the MAX platform. He just, he seemed very uh, maybe overstimulated and he was uh, uh, just unable

to really focus on anybody that was talking to him.

Law: Okay. Um, did you take any action? Uh, did you an-and use any uh, lis-less-

lethal force options uh, at your vehicle here, at the intersection before he crossed

the street to the south side?

Bianchini: No.

Law: Okay. Um, and was there a reason why you didn't deploy less-lethal at that

point?

Bianchini: Um, I did not like my backstop. There was a lot of people behind him, next to

him and around him. Um, there were just too many people in that small area for

me to I think deploy.

Law: Okay.

Bianchini: And he um, had he taken a more aggressive or uh, you know threatening or

menacing uh, posture directly at somebody I think I probably would've. But at

that point I wasn't at the threshold of, of deploying on him.

Law: Okay so you, you evaluated your backstop at, at the point that he was at the

intersection here.

Bianchini: Um-hm.

Law: And the less-lethal round uh, the .40 millimeter re- excuse me, .40 millimeter

round is a sponge round is, is that correct?

Um, I'm told its equivalent to about a, a 100 mile per hour fastball.

to target on, if you're going to deploy the less-lethal is that right?

Bianchini:

Law:

Okay um, so they don't just give you the gun and say here go take it out on the

street and use it. You go through sort of uh, regular training to use it?

Bianchini: Yes.

Law:

Okay and um, you said at one point he, he, uh, I guess before we get to where,

when you did use your less-lethal um, did, did you want to talk about anything?

Gradwahl: Yeah I got -

Law:

Okay.

Yes.

Gradwahl:

A couple questions here. The uh –

Law:

We're gonna kind of take this in stages, like the initial, your initial contact to, you know the up, between here and when he actually turned off of 122nd. So we're

know the um, between here and when he actually turned off of 122nd. So we're

kind of breaking it up so he has a few questions about -

Gradwahl:

The uh, I guess back to the training uh, have you attended any CIT or ECIT

training?

Bianchini:

Um, yes when I was hired I uh, I did uh, some CIT training.

Gradwahl:

Okay and is that, I, I think, is that Crisis Intervention Training, is that what that's

called? Yes.

Bianchini:

. .

Gradwahl: Okay um, the, earlier you made some indications on the map where you pointed

to, where you drew another police car besides yours which is on the far north side of the map, actually in the middle of 122 and Burnside, you drew a picture of another police car um, just for the recording that is just south of Burnside uh, in the northbound lanes of 122^{nd} there's a square that you put. And then you put, you pointed to a MAX platform and um, and that would be where you pointed on the west side of 122^{nd} in-between the eastbound and westbound lanes of Burnside,

is that correct?

Bianchini:

Yes.

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Gradwahl: Is that the MAX platform you're referring to?

Bianchini: Yes.

Gradwahl: And then you had drawn an area on the west sidewalk just north of Burnside on

122nd where you said a group of civilians were and that's also the, the person that we're talking about was intermingled kind of in that crowd where you drew a, a

circle, is that correct?

Bianchini: Yes.

Gradwahl: And then there's four dots with an arrow pointing uh, southbound at the top end

of the map here and that's the officers that were following the suspect, is that

correct?

Bianchini: Yes.

Gradwahl: Okay. You said you heard him uh, or I guess what was he yelling or saying? Did

you, were you able to understand or remember what he was yelling or saying uh,

during...

Bianchini: ...no...

Gradwahl: ...this interaction?

Bianchini: I don't remember exactly what he was saying.

Gradwahl: Okay. You said that he had dropped the hatchet but picked it back up. can you

make a little star or something on the, the map indicating that, that area?

Bianchini: Yes there is a um, there's a little uh, dirt circle on the sidewalk and I believe he

dropped the hatchet, he set it down in that circle right in front of the, the doors to

the uh, the, the convenience store right there.

Gradwahl: Okay so that on the map is just right on the, the northeast corner...

Law: ...south, southwest corner.

Gradwahl: The, the northeast corner of that building.

Law: Oh.

Gradwahl: Which would be the southwest corner of the intersection, is that correct?

Bianchini: Um-hm.

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Gradwahl: Okay and you put a little circle there?

Bianchini: Yeah.

Gradwahl: Okay that's all I had.

Law:

Robbins: Can I ask a couple questions please?

Law: Yeal

Robbins: Sorry. You, you mentioned that you felt the .40 millimeter was a better decision

over your AR, was the backstop taken into consideration when you made that

decision?

Bianchini: Yes.

Robbins: And why is that.

Bianchini: Uh, the .40 millimeter requires much less of a backstop than a .223 rifle. Um, the

.40 millimeter round will likely be stopped when it hits the person that we're, you're trying to hit. The uh, you know the, the rifle round um, is by far more

dangerous within a crowd situation to fire so -

Robbins: And is it fair to say it was a very crowded area?

Bianchini: Yes.

Robbins: Okay.

Law: Was that it? Okay. So could you tell what was going on when he put the um,

hatchet down and he picked it back up? Um, was he putting it down because they told him to put it down or was he doing something else and he set it down so he

could address some other thing he was doing or?

Bianchini: No.

Law: Did, did it look to you like he was complying at that moment or wh-what was

your impression of what was going on?

Bianchini: It gave the illusion to me that he was complying even though he wasn't

interacting with us. Um, you know we're telling him to put the hatchet down and he, he did. And uh, he would, he would walk a few feet away and then he walked right back over to the hatchet and uh, had I had time to deploy my .40 miller, .40

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millimeter launcher to prevent him from going back to the hatchet I would have but I didn't have enough time to have a, a shot on him for that.

Law: Okay and can you explain what transpired as, as this incident went on?

Bianchini: Um, so he continues to pick up the hatchet and um, move southerly on 122nd on

the sidewalk. Uh, there's a tree right about here and he almost uh -

Law: And here, just for the reference is just south of the circle that you drew on the uh,

southwest corner of the intersection.

Bianchini: Um-hm.

Law: And you said he continued to pick up the hatchet so he put it down more than

once or was it just put it down once.

Bianchini: So he picked up the hatchet over here and he held onto it. Walked towards the

tree um, and he started uh, almost pretending to chop the tree but I don't think he actually hit the tree. But he was definitely uh, motioning the hatchet in a

chopping manner.

Law: Okay.

Bianchini: Towards the tree.

Law: Do you mind drawing a star next to the tree where you had just um – thank you.

And what happened next?

Bianchini: Um, more commands are being given. Uh, he continues to...

Law: ...and what are those commands that are being given?

Bianchini: Um, drop the hatchet, we don't want to use force against you. Drop the hatchet

um, you know we, we uh, you know don't want to hurt you. Um, you know, please listen to us um, just your uh, your standard commands to hey, stop walking

um, get on the ground.

Law: Okay.

Bianchini: You know, that type of thing.

Law: And what happened next?

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Um, he continues to go south, southerly on 122nd, he briefly puts the hatchet down Bianchini:

again on the ground. Sets it down. Um, moves a couple feet away from it and

then picks it back up. Uh -

Law: Can you draw just generally speaking um, you can do a, a, a square as to where he

picked it, set it down and picked it back up again.

Bianchini: It could've been anywhere um, in this area.

Law: Okay so you've just drawn a rectangle on the...

Bianchini: ...yeah...

Law: ...uh, west sidewalk there south of the intersection. So he set it down and picked

it back up again and then what took place?

Bianchini: Um, well he picks it back up and he's still threatening, he's waving it around and

he starts moving into the street. And um, cars are backed up on 122nd Avenue. So he, he's walking towards the backed up cars and traffic um, traffic going southbound uh, is not blocked but uh, I think the cars are backed up behind the group of police officers that are blocking the street now. Um, I communicate with KEMPLE about um, telling him okay I, I'm, I'm there for deploying my .40 if you're ready 'cause we like to deploy in uh, teams if we can so we have a uh, follow-up shot with the other launcher being right next to you or being together.

And uh -

Law: And is, is that because um, and, well why is that?

Bianchini: Um, just because he's, he's moving into, into an area where there's potential for

him to harm somebody. Um, there's motorists in the roadway and he um, you know is still just very agitated and threatening and he's got a weapon in his hand.

It, it seemed like he was going to use against somebody.

Law: In regards to the .40 millimeter less-lethal launchers can you explain um, how um,

you, you fire a round and how you fire a second round.

Bianchini: Yes um, so our launchers fire one round at a time. Uh, once a round is fired you

> have to pop open the launcher which breaches open at the barrel, pull the spent cartridge out, load a new one in and then close it up again. And it takes a couple seconds to do. Um, it uh, you know it shifts your focus from the suspect who

you're trying to monitor to doing another task, reloading. So –

And is that why you and KEMPLE, as you had mentioned would, would be in a Law:

pairs to, to cut out the time in-between loading um, so you could have -

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Bianchini: Yeah.

Law: Okay.

Bianchini: Yes

Law: Um, multiple rounds if needed.

Bianchini: Um-hm.

Law: Okay and um, go ahead and continue to tell us what happened.

Bianchini: Um, he goes into the street.

Law: And at this point you say there's vehicles, there's a lot of vehicles that are stopped

at the light there. Stopped at -

Bianchini: Yeah they're stopped over here. Um –

Law: And when you say he's threatening with it um, threatening towards whom

exactly? Would it be, did you feel that he was threatening the officers with the

hatchet? Um, community members in the area um, or both?

Bianchini: Uh, both definitely. Uh, he clearly was showing aggression towards us and I felt

that anybody that approached him um, on the sidewalk or in the direction he was

going they were fairly in danger also. Um -

Law: Okay.

Bianchini: The way he was acting. Um, uh, I decided to deploy my launcher when he was

approximately in this area.

Law: Okay, maybe that pens – if you would just draw um, uh, just put the number one

here in the circle to where -

Bianchini: Okay.

Law: And is that where you were standing or where he was standing?

Bianchini: I believe I was standing somewhere in here.

Law: Put a number two.

Bianchini: Okay.

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Law:

Okay. And so you put the, the number one is where the subject was standing um, that's one block south of Burnside uh, on the west side of 122nd and he was approximately, you're saying, on the uh, the southwest corner of that intersection?

Bianchini: Yes.

Law:

Okay. Um, you can finish drawing the circle around it so it'll be easier for later on. And when you deployed um, what, why did you deploy it at that point?

Bianchini:

I deployed it because he, I still believed he had the hatchet in his hand, that he was acting threatening and he was still moving um, in, in, into an area where there potentially could be uh, you know victims or people that, you know can be hurt by him and the way he was acting I didn't want him to continue uh, waving this hatchet around in public in this crowded uh, intersection.

Law:

So to take a step back when this call originated where, where was it, your understanding of where it all started?

Bianchini:

Um, I beli- as I, I understood that it all started near 122nd and Glisan.

Law:

Okay so and at this point you're now down at 122nd and Burnside.

Bianchini:

Law:

And do you know how he got from 122nd and Glisan to 122 and Burnside?

Bianchini: He walked.

Yes.

Law:

Okay and you, you got that inf- did you know that, you just, you heard updates about that or was that just your impression based on what you saw when you arrived on the scene?

Bianchini:

Yes that was just my impression.

Law:

Okay so he was continuing to move southbound and at that point he's now at

Burnside and he's continuing to move south?

Bianchini: Yes.

Law:

And um, but the time that you heard um, Officer ZENTNER mention that she needed more officers there because this, the subject had a, a hatchet how, about

how long did it take until you arrived?

Bianchini:

Um, it probably took about a minute.

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Law:

Okay.

Bianchini:

Maybe a minute or two minutes.

Law:

So in that minute to two minutes um, when you arrived and he still had the hatchet he, he obviously um, he, he was still on the move with, with the hatchet?

Bianchini:

Yes and I was surprised how much ground uh, I was, I was surprised that they

said he was approaching Burnside already.

Law:

Bianchini:

Because I was expecting to go to Glisan.

Law:

That he would've been back up towards -

Bianchini:

Yes.

Law:

Where the call originated.

Bianchini:

Um-hm.

Law:

Okay and what concerns do you have as a police officer in regards to somebody

that's um, walking um, I mean Burnside to Glisan is what, approximately how

many blocks?

Bianchini:

Uh, five blocks.

Law:

Okay and with the information that you had what sort of concerns do you have as you look at this situation with the number of people out here, what, what level of

concern are you at the point when you become involved in this incident?

Bianchini:

Yeah I mean the public looks at us to protect them and this guy was clearly a danger to other people out there and its our job to prevent him from hurting

anybody.

Law:

So other than um, seeing him walk with the hatchet did, were you made aware of

um, some of the things that took place prior to your arrival as to why the police

were called on this person?

Bianchini:

Um, I wasn't.

Law:

Okay.

Bianchini:

Yeah.

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Law:

So you just heard conversation about it, you weren't really paying attention.

Bianchini: Yes.

Law:

And then you heard Officer ZENTNER uh, mention that she needed back-up.

Bianchini: Right.

Law:

Okay. And um, so when you deployed, well kind of now we're fast forwarding back. When you deployed um, who, you had Officer KEMPLE with you or I

think he's an acting sergeant, is that right?

Bianchini: That is correct.

Law:

Okay and um, you deployed because, if I'm not mistaken, he had the hatchet and,

and he wasn't complying, he wasn't putting the hatchet down for good and

leaving it alone, is that right?

Bianchini: Right

Law:

Okay and uh, when you deployed your less-lethal what was your um, was there

something about your backstop that had changed at that point that you felt more

comfortable with?

Bianchini:

Yes um, behind uh, the suspect all I could see was open road. There was nobody

behind him um, I didn't feel like anybody was in danger if I took the, the shot at

that point.

Okay and your hope when you took, when you deployed the less-lethal uh, was to

do what?

Bianchini:

I wanted um, the suspect to drop the hatchet and to uh, surrender so we can take

him into custody.

Law:

Okay. And where did, when you deployed the round did the round hit um, the

person? Did it strike him?

Bianchini:

It did.

Law:

Do you know where it struck him at?

Bianchini:

I believe it hit him in the right leg, possibly in the back of his right leg.

Law:

Okay so he was um, the back of the right leg closer to the knee or closer to the

buttocks?

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Bianchini: Um -

Law:

Or down by the, the ankle?

Bianchini:

Uh, probab- I think near the knee, I can't...

Law:

...okay..

Bianchini:

...I can't say if it was above it or below it.

Law:

Okay.

Bianchini:

So -

Law:

And um, so he was facing away from you walking away?

Bianchini:

Yeah he was kind of bladed. Uh, couldn't really see his hands at that time but he

um, kept focus on the police, us that were behind him.

Law:

So -

Bianchini:

So-

Law:

So he was looking back at you at some point?

Bianchini:

Yes.

Law:

Okay was he, did he do it, did he only look back just at that moment or had he

been looking back at you guys as this in-incident was transpiring?

Bianchini:

Uh, during the whole incident. Um, it was him walking backwards, it was him walking to the side, him walking uh, facing away from us. He um, was very

sporadic.

Law:

Okay and is that concerning to you it had, had this person just been walking down the street not paying attention to you, to your location um, does that change the dynamic of, of this incident when you have someone whose actually um, looking

back to acquire where you're at in relation to their position?

Bianchini: It does.

Law:

Okay and is that, what, how does, how does that, why does that concern you?

Bianchini:

Um, he's doing, he's clearly disregarding our, our orders for him to stop walking, to drop the, the weapon that he was carrying and it was a, an act of defiance and

uh, he was also threatening as he was doing it towards us.

Okay. And you struck him uh, with the less-lethal round in the back of the left

leg and how would -

Bianchini: Right leg.

Law: I'm sorry, the back of the right leg. Um, and how did he react to that?

Bianchini: Um, he uh, appeared to feel the pain from the impact. Uh, he um, ran uh,

approximately 10 to 20 feet after being struck by the round. Uh, he, he was favoring his right side um, is what it seemed like to me 'cause after uh, he felt the

pain of it he um, wanted to get away from me.

Law: And when you gave the initial force warning to him and I believe your words

were, you know something to the effect of drop the hatchet or I'll, I'll use my

less-lethal or you'll be shot with a less-lethal.

Bianchini: Yes.

Law: Um, how, how long did things transpire or were there additional warnings given

to him before the um, round was fired?

Bianchini: Uh, there were multiple by other officers I believe. Um, I, I'm not sure if I gave

him any more warnings after that first one.

Law: Okay and what took place next?

Bianchini: Um, I went to reload my launcher and uh, while I was doing that I continue to

walk forward with the other officers I was with and I uh, watched Officer

KEMPLE uh, also deploy a round.

Law: Okay and generally speaking where was Officer KEMPLE at when he deployed

the round?

Bianchini: Um, I believe -

Law: And, and you can mark it with a number three since we have a one and a two

already.

Bianchini: Okay. Think he was around here.

Law: Okay so the number three is just east of the, where the number one was marked so

he's standing basically close to where the um, subject had been when you

deployed your less-lethal round?

Bianchini: Um, yes.

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Law:

And is that because the subject is continuing to move?

Bianchini: Yes.

Law: And did he change his pace at any point or did it, was it sporadic or?

Bianchini: Um, it was sporadic so after I struck him with my launcher he um, hustled um, so

he, he ran for approximately, you know 10 to 20 feet and then he slowed down

and continued to uh, walk at a slower pace.

Law: And so is it, is it fair to say that your less-lethal round wasn't effective?

Bianchini: Um, it -

Law: For the desir- for your desired, the reason you used it was to stop him at that point

and did it, did it stop him at that point?

Bianchini: It didn't stop him, no.

Law: Okay. He continued moving south, is that correct?

Bianchini: Yes

Law: Okay and um, where was the hatchet at when this was trans- when, when, when

this was taking place?

Bianchini: Uh, the hatchet at this point was um, on the, on the uh, the asphalt right about

right here. Officer ZENTNER uh, said that he, he dropped the hatchet but he still

has a knife.

Law: Okay um, and when you deployed the round, your less-lethal round he had the

hatchet am I correct?

Bianchini: I, I thought he did, I believe he did.

Law: Okay and when you were, when you deploy a less-lethal um, how do you aim it

and, and how is it, I've never fired one so I don't know and most people I don't think have. Um, how, how is it fired? I mean how do you acquire your target

when you're firing the less-lethal?

Bianchini: Um, I shift my focus from the large picture to a uh, red dot reticle um, where I am

at the suspect here.

Law: So it has a um, a sort of a scope if you will or some sort of optical on the top of

the .40 millimeter less-lethal launcher towards the back?

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Bianchini: Yes.

Law: That you have to look through?

Bianchini: Um-hm.

Law: So when you look through something like that what do you, what, what do you

lose with, is there, is there any vision that you lose when you, when you look

through that?

Bianchini: Yeah I believe I, I, you lose all the peripheral vision because you're focusing

through a small scope.

Law: And you're doing that to make sure that you, when you deploy the less-lethal that

you deploy it in an area that it's de-designed to be deployed or that you're trained

to, is that correct?

Bianchini: That's correct.

Law: Okay and um, you believe that he had the hatchet when you deployed the less-

lethal and after you deployed the less-lethal did you see, did you ever see him put

down the hatchet?

Bianchini: I never saw him put down the hatchet.

Law: Okay so was it your belief that as you continued south with him that he had the

hatchet with him? Or at some point do you think he put the hatchet down?

Bianchini: Um, after I deployed my less-lethal I saw that he no longer had the hatchet 'cause

the hatchet was on the ground.

Law: Okay.

Bianchini: And I can see that.

Law: Okay and um, how far was it, how far was he from the hatchet when you saw it on

the ground?

Bianchini: Um, approximately seven to 10 feet.

Law: And is it fair to say that you guys were gaining ground on the hatchet and he was

going further away from the hatchet?

Bianchini: Yes.

As he moved? Okay um, and I think you said that um, Officer ZENTNER um, did she, who, did she address the hatchet or did some- did somebody else address

Bianchini:

I believe it was Officer ZENTNER.

knife, is that fair?

Bianchini: Yes.

Okay, were those her exact words or just what you remember?

Bianchini:

That what I remember, something similar to that.

Okay and prior to that um, prior to her saying that um, did you see him with a

knife?

Yes.

Bianchini: No.

Okay and was that, so that was new information to you at that point?

Bianchini:

Okay um, so what, what took place next um, after she said uh, basically I have the

hatchet but he still has a knife. Where, where was he going?

Um, he was going towards the middle of 122nd and uh, he was still um, wavwaving his arms around and yelling and threatening the same way he was when he had the hatchet and um, the same movements, same behavior and it uh, and

Okay and when the second deployment was done was that done by, who was that

done by?

Bianchini:

Officer KEMPLE.

Law:

Okay and do you know where the round stuck the individual at?

Bianchini:

I believe it also hit him in one of his legs.

Law:

Okay and did it have a desired effect?

Bianchini:

Um, it caused the suspect to run southbound on 122nd.

Law:

So it wasn't effective?

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Bianchini:

I mean I, I know you can't speak to Officer KEMPLE's deployment or sergeant, Law:

Acting Sergeant KEMPLE's deployment but your understanding of the

deployment of your less-lethal round was to have him stop.

Bianchini:

And to take him into custody. So he ran off after the second round? Law:

Bianchini: Yes.

Law: Okay and where did he go?

Bianchini: Um, he ran um, westerly to the corner of ...

Gradwahl: ...southerly.

Oh sorry, yeah - kind of south westerly like back over to the uh, sidewalk and Bianchini:

around the corner to this street.

Okay and this is um, SE Ash Street and you, you pointed to the uh, northwest Law:

corner of Ash and 122nd and you, you're, you drew a line that he rounded the

corner there.

Bianchini: Yes.

Law: Todd is there anything in regards to the less-lethal deployment before we get

around...

Gradwahl: ...just real quick um, when you're saying uh, this red dot is um, is that like a

battery operated or um, something that illuminates?

Bianchini: Yes.

Gradwahl: With, within the, the scope we'll call it on top of the gun. Does that, something

that you're looking at and lining up with the target or is that like a laser that

you're gonna see projected on the person?

Um, it's just a, a target that you're trying to line up with your -Bianchini:

Bianchini: Yeah.

Gradwahl: Thank you.

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Law:

So at this point um, if you don't mind just your rationale of what, wh- do you feel like you're losing control of the situation or your, your gaining control of the situation at the point that he runs off and round the corner on Ash?

Bianchini:

Um, I felt better knowing that he no longer had the hatchet. Um, you know he wasn't waving that around anymore. Um, so when he took off running, you know there's still a concern for the public but he no longer had the, the large hatchet that he had been waving around previously.

Law:

Okay.

Bianchini:

As far as I could tell.

Law:

Okay um, but it, and based on the information that you had with, from Officer ZENTNER that he was still armed with a knife um, did that information concern you as he ran off southbound and then turned a corner? That you guys, I mean I'm assuming that from the way you drew it you lost sight of him or is, is that not true?

Bianchini:

That's true.

Law:

Okay so when you lost sight of him and he ran off, in light of everything's that happened and the less-lethal rounds that have been deployed do you feel like that that was um, something that was um, a good thing or a bad thing?

Bianchini:

Um –

Law:

I, I realize that he got rid of the hatchet.

Bianchini:

It's still a bad thing.

Law:

Okay.

Bianchini:

Yes.

Law:

And um, did you feel like you guys had control, the officers that were out there

had control of the situation?

Bianchini:

No.

Law:

Okay and when did you next um, see the, the person involved in this incident?

Bianchini:

Uh, that was the last time I saw him.

Law:

Okay and why is that?

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Bianchini: Um, I decided not to chase after him as there was um, several officers who did.

Law: Okay.

Bianchini: And uh, I decided to stay with all the uh, patrol cars that were left unsecured on

122nd and kind of help uh, maintain that scene and let the other officers deal with

the suspect so.

Law: Okay um, so when you last saw him, just so I'm clear, he, he was rounding the

corner going west on Ash Street and um, did you see anyone, any um, civilians in

the area or did you see, was he just running and that's all you saw?

Bianchini: I, I just saw him run uh, around the corner and the last I saw of him.

Law: Okay and uh, what was your understanding of what took place after, after that?

Bianchini: Um, so after that happened I turned around to go walk back over uh, to where um,

the hatchet I saw on the ground was. Uh, I picked up the .40 millimeter casing that I fired. Um, I didn't want cars to run it over. Uh, 122nd wasn't closed off at that point and uh, I joined Officer ZENTNER who was standing near the hatchet

and uh, that's when I heard uh, several gunshots go off.

Law: Okay and when Officer ZENTNER mentioned that he, he, being the person

involved in this, still had a knife um, did that information ever get broadcast over

the radio that you're aware of?

Bianchini: Um, I didn't hear it. I – so –

Law: Okay.

Bianchini: Yeah.

Law: So it's just word of mouth you didn't hear it get dis- you didn't hear someone an-

announce it to everyone over the radio?

Bianchini: No but it was very clear um, to officers who were on the scene dealing with him

that he still had a knife 'cause that voiced very loudly so that other officers could

hear.

Law: Okay and you moved your uh, .40 millimeter round to where?

Bianchini: I, I put the -

Law: The cartridge.

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Bianchini:

Cartridge in my pocket.

Law:

Okay.

Bianchini:

Yeah.

Law:

And do you still have it on you?

Bianchini:

No I turned it over to uh, a detective.

Law:

Okay do you remember which detective you turned it over to?

Robbins:

Merrill and uh -

Law:

Winters?

Robbins:

Winters uh-huh.

Law:

Okay and then the, the spent round do you know where that ended up?

Bianchini:

Um, I don't know.

Law:

Didn't see it in the roadway or anything?

Bianchini:

I didn't see it in the roadway.

Law:

Okay and did you see the hatchet? I know that you said Of- that Officer ZENTNER stayed with the hatchet, did the hatchet stay there or did somebody

pick it up?

Bianchini:

It stayed right there, nobody touched it.

Law:

No one touched it, okay. Um, and then did you have any other um, did you have

any other roles in this incident once you heard the gunshots?

Bianchini:

Um, yes I put up some crime scene tape as quick as I could across 122^{nd} to block cars from coming into the, into the scene and then there were, there were three cop cars or police cars that were parked in the intersection of 122 and Burnside that were blocking, they were blocking the MAX tracks and there was a MAX train trying to get through. There was people upset because the police cars were blocking the train from picking them up during rush hour so I uh, moved all three

of the cars out of the roadway. Including my own.

The police cars, okay.

Bianchini:

Yeah.

And did you get flagged down by any witnesses or did any witnessed make

statements to you um, that they had seen any part of this incident?

Bianchini:

Uh, no.

Law:

Okay um, so you don't have any reports to document um, statements from any

witnesses at the scene?

Bianchini:

Law:

Okay.

No.

Gradwahl:

I don't have anything.

Law:

Ms. Robbins?

Robbins:

No.

Law:

Okay um, is there anything we didn't ask you that you think we should be aware

No.

Alright this is Detective Greenlee with the Portland Police Bureau. Today's date is July 30th, 2019, the time is 2337. And we're here talking about case number 19-258996. I'm here today with Officer ANDERSON and your first name is

Greenlee: And 122nd. Um, so when you arrived where, where, which way did you come

from and where did you arrive?

Anderson: So I came from the south off Stark and approached uh, went on 122 northbound

towards Burnside.

Greenlee: You can kind of draw a line if you'd like.

Anderson: Um, oh this is all good. Um, and I got – see, what's the event location, so I kind

of got to about right, he was walking southbound still from Burnside. Um, and he was kind of in this area here if I'm hearing correctly. Yeah 'cause this is, these

are the apartments here, correct?

Greenlee: Uh, correct.

Anderson: Okay.

Greenlee: And just for the recording we're looking at a map of 122nd and you're kind of

circling roughly around NE Ankeny, uh, SE Ankeny off 122nd.

Anderson: Yes. So um, I see there's a whole slew of officers right here uh, and the suspect's

kind of actually out on the sidewalk here. Eventually he gets out in the street still going southbound. I didn't want to be in their backdrop in case something did happen so I kind of pulled out um, to the east side of 122nd and I got like an L on

him.

Greenlee: Um-hm.

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Anderson: I got out with my rifle. Um, I didn't have a great backdrop um, but I had it up

ready to snap to if I needed to. Um, and I yel...

Greenlee: ...about what time did you arrive?

Anderson: Oh uh, that I can't, I don't, I don't know off the top of my head.

Greenlee: Okay, alright.

Reynolds: Did you voice on the air that you arrived or?

Anderson: I did not. I, like I say I wasn't even logged on yet. I just got there and kind of

saw what was unfolding and just kind of addressed it quickly. Um -

Greenlee: So at this point in time you were not logged onto the car, to the, on the MDC at

this time?

Anderson: No.

Greenlee: Okay.

Anderson: I was not. So everything I was getting was just via ear uh, on the radio.

Greenlee: Okay.

Anderson: Um -

Greenlee: We'll kind of cover that, what time do you think you got in your patrol car at

East?

Anderson: Probably just before or at 4:30.

Greenlee: 4:30, okay and drive time to this location, how long do you think that took?

Anderson: A minute tops, driving Code Three there.

Greenlee: Okay.

Anderson: By the time you get out of the garage and kind of navigate your way there.

Greenlee: Alright, perfect.

Anderson: Um -

Greenlee: We're looking maybe, approximately, a little around 4:30 or so you arrived.

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Anderson: Approximately yeah, in there.

Greenlee: Okay. Alright so you kind of position your car as an L?

Anderson: Um-hm.

Greenlee: And then you kind of had a triangulation light on the guy.

Anderson: Yup, so they're coming southbound still yelling at him. I come and I'm directly

to the east of him and there was another officer I saw behind me with a long gun as well. Um, and I quickly challenged him, I just said hey, you know drop what you have in your hand, go to the ground and there was zero compliance. He was yelling but I couldn't make out what he was yelling. Um, I let the officers that

were kind of all in a group do commands at that point.

Greenlee: Um-hm.

Anderson: Um, and then I heard less-lethal. Heard the, the round, less-lethal round go off.

Um, he appeared like he got hit by it. Uh, he kind of did this, I don't know what he did in the street, I don't even know how to, like a-he maneuvered himself in a

way where he, I would believe that he got hit with the less-lethal. Um -

Greenlee: And, and prior to the round going off can you describe was, did he have, was he

carrying anything in his hand, was there any weapons that you saw?

Anderson: He had a long object in his hand. I couldn't tell if it was like a hatchet or like a

machete. Um, but it was a long object he had.

Reynolds: Did you see what color it was?

Anderson: I didn't. Um –

Greenlee: Could you tell, what was he doing with this object?

Anderson: He was carrying it kind of, and then like by his side and then he had it up. Um,

and then he'd bring it down, he'd wave it around.

Greenlee: Wave it around when he had it up, like above his head or?

Anderson: Eh, head level, I mean he had –

Greenlee: Head level?

Anderson: You know I don't think he like went above his head but he had it up. Just wa-

waving it around. I'd say, you know shoulder height.

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Greenlee: Okay.

Anderson: Um, I heard them say less-lethal, a less-lethal uh, .40 millimeter go off. Um, as I

said it seemed like he got hit by it. and then I heard less-lethal again, they deployed it a second time that I heard and then it appeared that he got, you know hit by it again. Um, I don't recall exactly at what point but he ends up dropping what he has in his hands and he's kind of like this dance in the street. Of like he doesn't know he's gonna run at us or if he doesn't know if he's gonna run away.

It's like this debate it seems like he's having with himself.

Greenlee: Um-hm.

Anderson: Um, and then which at one point...

Greenlee: ...and before that how far away were the officers from him when, you know or

right before the, the .40 millimeter, the round went off, how far away were they

from him?

Anderson: 25, 30 feet.

Greenlee: Okay and can you talk about also was there any vehicle traffic at this time?

Anderson: Uh, they had it pretty much blocked off coming southbound. I stopped my car in

a lane of travel so I didn't have anybody coming directly on me but there were still cars, you know kind of squeezing their way through. Um, behind me on the east side going northbound. Uh, I don't remember seeing anything coming south though, I think they had that pretty well blocked off with them moving down.

Greenlee: Okay and then same kind of question when it comes to bystanders, pedestrians,

can you tell us about that. Like did you witness any pedestrians or bystanders at

this time?

Anderson: No I was pretty focused on him. I wasn't sure what he was gonna do.

Greenlee: Okay.

Anderson: Um, other than just vehicle traffic. No I mean it was, I mean it's typically a busy

time of day.

Greenlee: Okay. Alright so the second round goes off, he kind of does this dance that you

weren't sure if he was gonna, you know run or what he was gonna do.

Anderson: Um-hm.

Greenlee: Um, what happened at that point in time?

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Anderson: Um, so he ends up running to this next street to the south and I debated about if I

was gonna chase after him but I had the long gun still and I wasn't probably gonna be very effective with that. So I ran back to my car and got in. Um, and

then..

Greenlee: ...and your car was here probably?

Anderson: Car was right in here, yeah or just north of. It was...

Greenlee: ...north..

Anderson: ...in this intersection.

Greenlee: Intersection of Ankeny and Burn – uh, at 122^{nd} ?

Anderson: Yes.

Greenlee: And you said he ran uh, to the next street and that'd be Ash Street?

Anderson: Uh, yeah if I, I was to recall correctly that'd be Ash.

Greenlee: Okay.

Anderson: So Ankeny and then Ash.

Greenlee: Alright.

Anderson: Um, so he starts running southbound and then I see him start to drift to the, to the

west on Ash. Uh, so say I wanted to get, make sure if he was gonna run, typically when people run they like to run into, to yards, try to dip out in the blocks pretty quick. So I went back to my car and I kind of we- drove uh, westbound on

Ankeny, or was it never Ash, I forget.

Greenlee: Uh, this is uh, Ankeny.

Anderson: Ankeny and this is Ash.

Greenlee: Ankeny, Ash.

Anderson: So I drive westbound on Ankeny. Um, paralleling in case they put out, I, I was

waiting to hear update come out uh, kinda where he was gonna go. Um, and then I came out he was running towards an apartment complex. So then I sped around to this next street which I believe is 119. Uh, west, I cut south and then came

eastbound on Ash.

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Um, I got probably just to the west of the apartment building or maybe even just a little bit further up from this southern or this western entrance I guess. Um, parked, I kind of, I saw officers running...

Greenlee: ...can you put an X...

Anderson: ...sorry...

Greenlee: ...kind of where you parked as well.

Anderson: Yeah so I parked right, right in here.

Greenlee: Okay.

Anderson: Um, and I saw officers going into this eastern, I guess entrance, if you want to call

it that, to the apartment complex. So then I ran out, as I'm getting out of the car um, I hear that being, come out on the radio shots fired, shots fired. Um, I didn't hear any of the gunshots at that point. I don't know if it happened as I was in the car still um, or if I just wasn't paying attention. Um, so then I ran from the car with my rifle to the, this entrance and then I see kind of the wall of officers. Um, ran up to 'em, I kind of looked quickly just to make sure that no ones' acting like they were, they were hit. I didn't see any indications that officers were hurt at

that point.

Greenlee: And I have another map here is, does this look familiar to you?

Anderson: Yes.

Greenlee: Okay and this, and I'm showing uh, the address is 12026 SE Ash Street?

Anderson: Yes.

Greenlee: Okay and where did you see the officers when you?

Anderson: So they were all like in a row across this main sidewalk here.

Greenlee: A row on the sidewalk in the corridor here?

Anderson: Yes in the corridor so they'd be in a line from east to west.

Greenlee: Okay.

Anderson: Uh, I remember seeing an officer with a shield, there was an officer with his gun

out. Uh, there was another officer uh, with her gun out. I believe there was a fourth um, but I don't remember who that was. Um, I moved up to where I could see kind of what happened. Um, I saw the, the suspect down on the ground. Uh,

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and then from there um, we were gonna go on, go hands on with him at, at some point. He wasn't listening so we had to say um, they were gonna convince him to get his hands out, stuff like that. Um, you see he was alive at one point and then you see that switched to where you can tell that he had died. Or um, or was in a point to where he was unconscious.

Um, so I figured at that point we were gonna go hands on. Uh, I had, I tap Officer BIANCA on the shoulder and told her to holster up uh, so we have an extra set of hands. Uh, I told them that I would be lethal and they moved up with the shield. Um, and then two officers took him into custody, placed him in handcuffs.

Then as I looked around I kind of saw people starting to come out. It's a really tight area in there in terms of the complex. Um, and there was actually an elevated, you can see it here, this is actually the second story in here. So people can come out these top doors, actually look down on you.

Um, so I go, it better not have a rifle hanging on me so I went back to my car real quick. Secured my rifle, came back. Um, officers were uh, giving medical treatment at that point. Applying tourniquets, I saw chest seals uh, being applied. They were cutting clothes off uh, to render medical aid. Uh, they called for Code Three fire to come in.

Um, and so at that point with how many people were coming out I was provided an outer, security in case they were gonna try to run up on us. Uh, just to ensure that, you know the officers were, could focus on the suspect down and not have to worry about what was behind them.

Greenlee:

Alright. So they called for medical and then what happened from that point? Trying, you were kind of doing security, making sure the scene was safe.

Anderson:

I, I checked in periodically. Uh, officers are performing CPR on him. Um, that was it. Fire came in, they took over at that point. Um, and then they, kind of everything stopped and then we just held everything. They, preserve the stuff. Um, that was about it and mainly what I did after that was just crime scene security and, you know keeping people back. Tried to talk to a couple um, people in the residence directly, I don't know the address off the top of my head.

Greenlee:

Um-hm.

Anderson:

But it's the second floor uh, in this corner, apartment on the south side. Um, they were out and they were talking as if they kind of saw what happened but then I asked them, you know what happened, they said we don't talk to cops, we're not talking to you and they wouldn't give me any information at all.

Greenlee:

Could you describe what they look like?

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Anderson: Uh, African American female uh, I believe there was two females there and a

male.

Greenlee: So were there, was it two African American females?

Anderson: Yeah then an African American male.

Greenlee: Could you tell about, you know let, let's just start with the girls. How old were

they?

Anderson: Uh, late 20's, early 30's maybe.

Greenlee: Anything about the description, their descriptions that would stand out to you that

you can recall?

Anderson: Uh, main one that kept yelling that she wasn't gonna talk to police was a little bit

shorter, heavier set. Uh, probably a little longer than shoul-shoulder length hair.

Um, she on like a yellow shirt.

Greenlee: Yellow shirt?

Anderson: Yeah.

Greenlee: Okay. And you set heavy set, how, about how much do you think she weighed or

so?

Alright this is Detective Greenlee with the Portland Police Bureau. Today date is

Jan, July 30th, 2019, the time is 2240. Uh, with me here today is Detective

Kenneth Reynolds, is DPSST number is?

Um, and we're here today to interview uh, TOM CHONG and your DPST

I was district 942 today uh, and I was dispatched to old Safeway at 221 NE 122nd. It's closed now, it's been closed about a year, about one year or so roughly. And it was a call about a uh, uh, witnessing a subject breaking into a red Jeep uh, and then uh, subsequent the rest of the information was that confronting security uh, the suspect what I, you know suspect was telling security officer that uh, he was a federal officer and had now had pulled a knife out. He was talking, again I couldn't understand what he was saying and I didn't want to interrupt because Officer ZENTNER was already trying to talk, talk to him.

Greenlee:

Um-hm.

Chong:

Um, he was taking a couple steps back and forth, kind of moving back and forth and I wanted to get my force warning out there given the initial call about him pull, pulling a knife on the security officer and now I'm seeing an axe on him. Or a hatchet. So I told him that, don't reach for the knife or the axe or I was gonna, he was gonna get shot with a less-lethal round.

Greenlee:

Um-hm.

Chong:

About that time he grabbed it, I raised my .40.

Greenlee:

What did he grab?

Chong:

He took the hatchet out.

Greenlee:

Took the hatchet out?

Chong:

Uh, yeah, I don't know if – I don't know what kind of, I thought he was basically, he was, he wasn't holding onto it initially. Like he was able to take it off his

waistline so he had it in his right hand. I raised my .40 at him, I was gonna, considered firing at him, the fact that he grabbed onto it. But I didn't like my

backdrop, there were other folks standing around it. Uh –

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Greenlee:

And where was he located at this time when he pulled out the hatchet?

Chong:

He was, he was about the same, same area. I mean he hadn't moved or anything.

Greenlee:

Same area, okay.

Chong:

And uh, I didn't like my backdrop because other folks standing around there.

Reynolds:

How many people do you think were standing around there?

Chong:

Uh, I couldn't tell you for sure. Um, I know there were at least a few people. I just remember um, I didn't like my backdrop uh, I have used .40 at that very store, Safeway about a year ago when a guy was cutting himself with, the neck and stabbing himself. Uh, with knife.

Greenlee:

Um-hm.

Chong:

Uh, I fired two rounds, a .40, another officer fired two, I think three, four for sure between us and maybe fifth round. Uh, that didn't stop that guy from the previous incident, not this gentleman. And uh, we, we had to use two tasers on top of that. So I have personal experience using this new less-lethal system that uh, .40 is not always effective. Uh, personal experience and plus I know after first round in case, if I had, if I were to miss or it didn't have any effect on him that I would have to reload and based on our single launch system it would take a few seconds to reload and I didn't want to cha- take that chase and in case it wasn't effective or if I missed and I wouldn't have time to reload and then we would have to result to deadly force. So I didn't want to precipitate anything that we weren't quite ready for yet and uh, the fact that he had it and so I did not. I decided not to take the shot, I did not use the .40.

Greenlee:

Um-hm.

Chong:

And then just about that same time he started walking southbound. Walking away

from us.

Greenlee:

And when he took the hatchet out how far away were officers from him at that

time? Like just an approximation.

Chong:

Oh, I would say, we were pretty close. We were pretty close initially. Um -

Greenlee:

Could you, pretty close is um, you know we're in a room here um, I would say

that's probably almost 15 feet I would say.

Chong:

Something like that maybe.

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Greenlee:

Okay.

Chong:

Um, we stood our ground um, and we didn't approach, we wanted to give him some room and then as soon as he did, he started taking off uh, southbound. He didn't take, I'm sorry he didn't take off, he started walking southbound.

Greenlee:

Okay.

Chong:

Um, I knew given the time of the day we were on shift change and initially, like I said, there were only four of us. Um, I asked the, my other cover officers if any of them were ECIT. Uh, I think uh, Officer ZENTNER said no. Nobody else responded. So I wanted ECIT there, I wanted secondly, in fact I asked for a second .40 uh, launcher operator because I want a second one before even think about if I, if I thought about even deploying mine I want to have second one just in second.

in case.

Greenlee:

Um-hm.

Chong:

As well as other resources, even perhaps even a rifle because he's, if he's moving it'll be much easier to get a decent shot using rifle platform than a pistol with

other people around. Um -

Greenlee:

And did you ask this over the radio?

Chong:

No because this event happened quickly.

Greenlee:

Um-hm.

Chong:

And uh, he wasn't, I think it was fair to say that he wasn't gonna just stand there, give up, not give up but just listen and comply. He was, he wanted to move and he's been moving and what he was saying wasn't making too much sense to us.

Greenlee:

Okay.

Chong:

So we didn't have much of dialog going on or any kind of communication going.

Um, so with, you know I didn't want to rush it.

Greenlee:

Um-hm.

Chong:

Um, I asked uh, I saw Officer BUDEY with his Glock out. Officer SANTOS has taser out, on their own. And of course I had my .40 so I asked who was gonna be my lethal. I think Officer BUDEY answered up or I assumed that he was since he already take his handgun out. And I asked who was gonna be my radio person and I think Officer ZENTNER volunteered by default because um, I don't think,

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and I, as much as it was my call I didn't want to be using the radio and then going back, switching with a, with my .40 in both hands.

Greenlee: Um-hm.

Chong: And of course Officer SANTOS with taser and BUDEY with his Glock probably

ZENTNER would've been better person, even though she was trying to talk to

him at the same time.

Greenlee: Okay.

Chong: So we kind of divided up assignment, that was my plan and see, stick with that

until more resource got there. Just buy time and hopefully that he would either

stop on his own or we can talk to him into surrendering peacefully.

Greenlee: Um-hm.

Chong: Once he started walking he continued. Uh, he was just walking pace. We kept

our distance, he was still, was still holding the axe in his hand. Um, more...

Greenlee: ...could you, which hand was he holding the axe in?

Chong: I believe his right I believe.

Greenlee: Alright.

Chong: Um -

Greenlee: And what was he wearing at this time?

Chong: Mainly black clothing.

Greenlee: Okay.

Chong: I don't remember exactly what he was wearing but I was more focused on, you

know which way he was gonna go. As we approached toward Couch Street by the old Ron Tonkin Ferrari shop there I became slightly concerned because there was a car coming out of that street stopped at the stop sign and I can- I think it was like an SUV. And it was stopped and this, our subject started walking toward the driver side door and as I trailed behind with the other officers I didn't know if he was trying to open the door and tried to get in the car or take his car possibly

like car jack.

Greenlee: Um-hm.

Chong: I wasn't quite sure and I was getting a little nervous and uh –

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Greenlee: So the car was parked at the stop sign.

Chong: It was parked at the car.

Greenlee: And Couch Street?

Chong: And there was enough room for him to go in front but he kind of walked towards

uh, uh, driver's side door, that's what I saw.

Greenlee: Can you describe this car? What kind of car was it?

Chong: It was, I want to say darker SUV type, I don't remember what kind of car it was.

Uh, I was almost expecting to either, him to front door op- um, swing the door

open, driver's side door open.

Greenlee: Um-hm.

Chong: And that, I thought maybe that's why he's going toward that direction but he

didn't and instead uh, he continued walking southbound and the driver did not flag me down or other officers down to indicate that maybe he was trying to open the door or try to steal his car. So we just ke-kept following him from a distance and as he approached Burnside, which was my next concern because it's a busy,

busy street.

Greenlee: And on the SUV too was, how many people were inside the SUV?

Chong: I only saw the driver, I don't know if he had a passenger or not but uh –

Greenlee: Okay.

Chong: As we approached the uh, Burnside its, there's MAX stop there. There's market

there, there's bus stops on both sides of 122nd. Um, so I know it's a busy street working that area for many years. Um, foot traffic and vehicle traffic as well as MAX train. So that was my second concern as we neared uh, Burnside. I didn't know if he was gonna get on the train with the hatchet still in his hand or if he

was gonna get platform or possibly get on the bus.

Greenlee: Um-hm.

Chong: Um, so that was my next concern. Um, as this was going on more units were

arriving from the south uh, what I assumed was afternoon shift officers arriving. Um, when I didn't hear Officer ZENTNER broadcast uh, uh, locations, when I thought maybe we should have I got on there and give little bit more description, not description, excuse me. Give location where we're coming up on so people

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will have a little bit better idea where, as where we're approaching. Whether we're still on 122nd or had turned off, turned off.

Greenlee:

Chong: So I give that short um, quick transmission about where we're approaching and

that we're still southbound on the west side of 122nd so officers could plan for us. My hope was that as officers arrived in the area that they would um, prevent him continue from southbound and hoping that he would, that would cause him to stop and hopefully that we could talk to him there and then, and then getting, getting, get his compliance and take him into custody in a peaceful manner. Um, officers arriving um, they tried to talk to him but he kept walking and there was heavy

traffic on the southbound by then.

Um, once we got to about Burnside um, there were more officers. Um, and then right about there I think I heard uh, I can't remember how sh- uh, what I heard. What sounded like a .40 millimeter being launched and I didn't see who fired it but I, I had heard the sound like a .40 millimeter lau-being launched. I was still

walking southbound and uh, I don't know if I hit that...

...and if we can just pause at this moment. Here's a map here of 122nd and Greenlee:

Burnside. It's kind of cut off here but as you guys were walking along the west

side 122nd. Um, here's Burnside.

Chong: Um-hm.

Uh, 122nd, here's a pen. Greenlee:

So I was still walking from, I was one of the officers, last officers and he had, I Chong:

think, crossed the tracks by then and he was somewhere right at Burnside or on

the south, on the south side Burnside when I heard it. Um -

So when you heard sh- uh, the, what sounded like a... Greenlee:

...like a .40 being launched... Chong:

....40 millimeter? Greenlee:

Chong: Yeah.

He was almost to the south side of -Greenlee:

Of Burnside.

Chong: Yeah.

Greenlee:

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Chong: I don't know if it was, if it impacted him or not. Uh, but it did uh, he did drop the

uh, axe on the south side of Burnside on 122nd somewhere.

Greenlee: And prior to you hearing that sound what was he doing?

Chong: He was walking and uh, I, he just kept walking and I couldn't hear anything he

was, if he had, did, if he did say anything to anybody. Uh, there were some other people still on the same side street as we're walking by. Um, he didn't threaten

anybody.

Greenlee: And he was still holding the, he was still holding the axe.

Chong: Was still holding the axe.

Greenlee: At the time.

Chong: And uh -

Greenlee: What was he doing with the axe at this time?

Chong: He was just walking.

Greenlee: Just walking?

Chong: He was walking and uh, we were trying to keep an eye on him, make sure that we

didn't lose sight of him and uh, we're just basically, my plan was hoping that we

would basically cut off his path.

Greenlee: Um-hm.

Chong: And at least immobilize him and cause him to stop and at least that, that would

give us chance to negotiate with him. Um, and then use more resources such as ECIT and whatnot to gain his compliance and take him into custody like I said.

Greenlee: Okay.

Chong: Um, once, what I assumed was he got hit with a .40 um, he dropped hatchet and it

almost looked like he was about to give up. That's the impression I got from, looking from where I was, from my vantage point. And he kind of stopped for a second, okay now and I said to myself, okay we're done. He's giving up kind of

thing.

Greenlee: Um-hm.

Chong: And then he started to –

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Greenlee: Can you talk about that, what made you, what was he doing that made you feel

that he was gonna give up at that time?

Chong: The axe got dropped and then he kind of stopped walking and is like, he had

almost like okay I'm going to surrender now kind of thing. Um, then he started walking into the traffic lane of southbound lanes so I, and then I said to myself, okay maybe he's gonna start running and trying to get away from us. But he didn't. He stayed in the uh, those traffic lanes but he actually didn't cross 122^{nd} at all. Instead he kind of picked up speed and then he continued southbound on 122^{nd} . And eventually he turned right for himself which would be westbound on

Ash.

Greenlee: Okay and when he was going down the, the southbound lanes of 122nd there's, is

there two lanes of traffic for southbound?

Chong: Yes.

Greenlee: Um, was, what lanes of traffic was he in?

Chong: He was in the uh, I guess that would be the outside lane and then I don't

remember if he actually got into part of an inside lane as well.

Greenlee: Um-hm.

Chong: And that's when I was thinking to myself, oh he must be about to look based on

the initial uh, few steps I thought he was gonna run across and maybe try to run

um, diagonally across 122nd perhaps.

Greenlee: Okay and could you see any traffic at that time on, while on Burnside.

Chong: Um, I don't recall by then officers, more, we had more officers arrive from the

south and I don't know if they had blocked traffic or not. Uh, I know the officers

were uh, positioned along the 122nd. And uh –

Greenlee: Okay and where did he drop the hatchet?

Chong: I don't remember exact location but I want to say near the gas station over here

somewhere.

Greenlee: By the gas station?

Chong: South of Burnside, maybe between uh, Ankeny and Burnside I want to say,

somewhere in there.

Greenlee: Okay and do you want to kind of...

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Chong:

...on the west side.

Greenlee:

Just mark with an X for about -

Chong:

So it would be like uh, I cannot pinpoint exactly but somewhere in here.

Greenlee:

Okay.

Chong:

Would be the location.

Greenlee:

Alright.

Reynolds:

How far away were you from the, from him at this point? When he gets bean

bagged? I'm sorry, .40 millimeter.

Chong:

I think I was still trying to cross Burnside if I remember correctly.

Reynolds:

So for like distance wise would you say, if we were gonna break it down into a

block, maybe like half a block, quarter block, eighth of the block?

Chong:

Oh boy – I'm terrible with distances.

Reynolds:

That's okay.

Chong:

Um, (pause) I want to say somewhere between the north side of Burnside, between the tracks and maybe north side when I thought I heard what sounded like a .40 millimeter being launched. Maybe right to the track almost there perhaps. Maybe crossing the track line of, in the – somewhere in there.

Greenlee:

So maybe you were crossing the track line you said?

Chong:

Yeah. Somewhere in there. I wasn't too concerned about him outrunning out

because we had all the units coming, come...

Reyonlds:

...right...

Chong:

...approaching from the uh, south to north because of shift change and ev-

everybody seems like coming up 122nd.

Greenlee:

Um-hm.

Chong:

So I knew they had w- uh, south side pretty well contained. Um, so we were

basically going walking along with him.

Greenlee:

Um-hm.

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Chong:

And make sure that he wasn't gonna double back in case.

Greenlee:

Um-hm.

Chong:

So it, there, I, I, I felt there was no need to keep up the distance and close the

distance for that matter.

Greenlee:

Right.

Chong:

And once again I'm precipitating anything because we had more resources and I felt comfortable and it was just a matter of where do we stop him, cause him to

stop. And now we can kind of triangulate and then try to talk to him,

communicate, see how he's doing or what, if he's in crisis or if he's high on drugs or alcohol, whatever it is because at that point I couldn't tell you why he was

doing what he was doing.

Greenlee:

Can you tell me, us about his demeanor at this time? What he was doing.

Chong:

He was walking and he had mostly back, his back to us and we're just merely following him at a distance that keeping an eye on, on him. Like I said just basically trying to make sure that we didn't lose sight of him given that he still had hatchet and then previous threat to security officers and so many people in the vicinity that minimum I think, I thought he want, he had to either, he has mental health crisis or he was under drugs or alcohol or maybe both. Either way, minimum I was thinking he need to be taken to hospital for mental health evaluation.

Reynolds:

Were there a lot of people as he was walking? From, around here?

Chong:

Um -

Reynolds:

Or seen here?

Chong:

Seems like there's more uh, pedestrians on the north side.

Reynolds:

Okay.

Chong:

From the north of Burnside toward Glisan then south. Although there was a bus stop right or just on the south side Burnside right in front of the uh, gas station

there.

Greenlee:

And did you see any people under that, that, that gas station there?

Chong:

No it seems like there were not as many people there. It seemed like most people

were on the north side of Burnside for today.

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Greenlee: Okay and then same kind of, you know about his demeanor. After he dropped,

after, you know the hatchet was dropped and he was continuing to walk what was he doing at this time? How, can you describe his demeanor at this time, what was

he doing?

Chong: Um, he, he – when the hatchet got dropped I really thought he was gonna give up,

I thought he was gonna say okay that's it.

Greenlee: Um-hm.

Chong: Uh, whether the pain caused him to drop or he decided to drop it himself and

maybe then get hit with a .40 round. Either way I thought he was gonna be uh, stopping himself and complying with what we were about to ask him to do. Uh, but then again he took a couple steps into traffic lane so I thought maybe he's

gonna run.

Greenlee: Um-hm.

Chong: And then when he didn't and he started southbound, okay so he's gonna try to

outrun us this time. and once again I wasn't too concerned trying to catch up with him because we had officers coming from the south to north and they were already ahead of me and they were, they were in better position to keep an eye on

him and then follow if that need to be better than where I was.

Greenlee: Okay. Could you see his hand when he was running?

Chong: No, by the time uh, other than the axe I could, I don't think he had anything else

that I could see from where I was.

Greenlee: Okay. Alright so then he ran and then you said he turned westbound on –

Chong: Ash. So the first street would be right by the gas station, I believe that's Ankeny.

Greenlee: Um-hm.

Chong: And then that should be Ash if my –

Greenlee: Okay he runs and uh, kind of, kind of like how you drew the line here on

Safeway.

Chong: So he continued down there and then he turned and I los-lost sight of him and I, I

um, got on the air and said he was going west on Ash.

Greenlee: Westbound, okay.

Chong: And then I'll...

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Greenlee:

...you want to just initial kind of by the line here.

Chong:

Just right here?

Greenlee:

Yeah, perfect.

Chong:

Okay.

Greenlee:

And I'll have you initial the Safeway as well right here. Okay so he turned

westbound on Ash and uh, and this is for the recording.

Chong:

122nd.

Greenlee:

Just from, from NE 122nd.

Chong:

Yup.

Greenlee:

And then what happened once he turned?

Chong:

Um -

Greenlee:

Onto Ash Street.

Chong:

I was still back here somewhere, not even close and watched him uh, go out of my

sight. And officers, some of the officers...

Greenlee:

...and same kind of que- how far away were you at that time when he turned?

Chong:

Um, I think maybe I was just getting here, somewhere in here between Ankeny

and Ash I want to say.

Greenlee:

Okay.

Chong:

I mean, I'm sorry, Ankeny and um, Burnside. If I remember correctly. And some of the officers on 122nd uh, south of me started following him into the uh, blocks here on Ash Street and I couldn't tell you how many officers there were but I just, I saw a group of officers going down Ash. What I assume was trying to keep an eye on him, look for him down Ash. Make sure he's not trying to attack other

folks or hurt, or hurt himself for that matter.

Greenlee:

Okay, alright and then what happened from there once you saw the officers

following him on Ash?

Chong:

I stay on 122nd um, and by then I thought about maybe just kind of keep an eye on Ankeny, make sure he didn't uh, cross jump between the fences and come out

back on Ankeny. Um, so that's what my thought was. I was considering doing

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that, maybe just stay on 122nd, keep an eye on, down Ankeny Street. See if I can help out with maybe some kind of perimeter. But at the same time I didn't hear anything else to indicate that he was jumping fences or necessarily running away. Um, I didn't hear anything until I heard um, gunshots.

Greenlee:

And you heard gunshots?

Chong:

Yes.

Greenlee:

And where were you standing when you heard the gunshots?

Chong:

Um, somewhere here on 122nd.

Greenlee:

On 122nd?

Chong:

Yeah.

Greenlee:

You're pointing kind of 122nd near Ankeny.

Chong:

I was on the west side of 122nd.

Greenlee:

Okay and how many shots did you hear?

Chong:

Three, four.

Greenlee:

Heard three to four shots?

Chong:

Maybe more.

Greenlee:

Okay and what happened after you heard the shots?

Chong:

Well I, initially I wasn't sure if that was gunshots even though we've had shots fired in that, that same vicinity before so my concern was are we involved in shooting with this same subject or is something else going down the street that

officers kind of ran into without realizing it.

Greenlee:

Um-hm.

Chong:

Um, then there was no indication once again on the tra- air traffic to indicate there was something else they had encounter. So I assumed that it was related to our subject and then the next thing I heard was uh, officers requesting uh, EMS and -

Greenlee:

Okay, alright so they requested EMS and then what happened from there after?

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Chong:

Um, needless to say more officers arrived, more units arrived, sergeants arrived. Um, I did not go down Ash Street. Um, based on there was no request for that. I assumed they had enough um, I saw sergeant, uh, Sergeant FELTS arrive uh, park his car on Ash. Um, so I want, when I stayed down there on Ash and uh, see if uh, whether we need to move his, whether I needed to move his car or not figuring that either ambulance or fire trucks would be on their way. I didn't know how, I didn't know how far the officers and subject was down along Ash Street. So in case we need to move the patrol cars out of the way I was standing by to do that.

Greenlee: Okay. So you stood by while more units arrived.

Chong: Yes

Greenlee: And you have, you did not go down Ash Street?

Chong: I did not.

Greenlee: Okay.

Chong: I stay right at the uh, 122nd and Ash.

Greenlee: Okay.

Chong: Uh, to move cars.

Greenlee: At any time did you go down, did you go down to Ash Street?

Chong: Not at all.

Greenlee: Okay.

Reynolds: Did you ever see any other weapons on him?

Chong: Um, I heard Officer ZENTNER say he's still got a knife. Uh, I didn't see the knife personally. Um – security officer said that he did have, the subject did have

a folding knife, a black one. Not that I saw, so -

Greenlee: And when did you hear this?

Chong: Uh, I talked to him after everything was somewhat settled. Uh, where I went back

to uh, where my car was up at Safeway and I wanted to make sure that our initial caller was still there somewhere in the vicinity. And uh, he was still there so I made sure that he was still okay because I didn't have a whole lot of time to talk to him initially when I got there because I was grabbing my .40 out of the car. And uh, and then by that time the subject had walked out of my sight on one- onto

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122nd where the bus stop, in front of the bus stop was so I want to join uh, Officer ZENTNER and other officers since I was the only one with .40. Um, so I wanted to go back and talk to him. Make sure that, make, there were no other things to cover, make sure he was okay, that we didn't miss something out in the parking lot per-perhaps evidence wise, whatnot kind of thing.

Greenlee: Okay and when you first arrived to you no- you noticed there was a hatchet, did

you notice any other weapons?

I didn't, I, that hatchet got my uh, um, attention and then I was uh, I was focused

on the hatchet more than anything else. He, I didn't see knife um – I know Officer ZENTNER said he had, still had the knife. Security officer told me after

the fact that he still had kni- uh, he had knife to start with.

Greenlee: The comp but what did the security officer tell you about the knife?

Chong: Um, basically the security officer was um, he was the one who called and he said

that he saw subject um, what he thought was breaking into red Jeep which turned out to be black Jeep, not a red one. Uh, he was hanging out by the back of the Jeep and he was, looked like moving some stuff in and out of the back of the trucuh, Jeep. So security officer went up there and asked him what he was doing and uh, pretty much right away the security officer said that sub-subject told him that he was federal officer, that uh, he was gonna get him, he was gonna get him and pulled out a knife from his pocket. Um, the way uh, security officer showed me was that security officer had a little pocket knife with a clip that he could have on the pocket pants there. With a clip showing the, outside the pants, except security officer told me that the subject's knife was reversed so the handle portion will be

sticking out not the clip portion.

Greenlee: Hm.

Chong:

Chong: Um, so once he got the knife in his hand security officer say he didn't, initially he

didn't have the blade out. Open, he didn't open the blade but he was, he was holding the knife so he backed up and kept his distance and the whole time the subject was telling security officer that he was federal officer. That um, that he was gonna get him. Um, so security office apparently had a concern and he did have his uh, asp with him and he said he did take asp out. Extended it and then when the subject started walking away from him that he collapsed the baton and then um, put it back in his uh, um, the vest. Not the, not the tactical vest uh, 5-11

with a moy gear thing that -

Turner: Carrier?

Chong: Carrier, a basic little carrier. Um, he did have pepper spray, he wasn't armed.

Uh, he said the only thing he had was an asp with him. So he said he collapsed it

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and uh, when the subject started walking away and kept the distance. And uh, started calling 9-1-1 about what he was reporting.

Greenlee: And did the security officer kind of show you where the Jeep was? Like the car

was located that he was trying to break into?

Chong: Jeep was – oh boy. (pause) think it was over here somewhere. Yeah I think Sally

Beauty store is right there, I think it was right in here somewhere.

Greenlee: Okay and for the recording kind of circle the area in the parking lot of Safeway,

kind of it it's a shared parking lot. And you said, you mentioned that's Sally's

Beauty?

Chong: Sally Beauty store is um, just west of the old Safeway there and apparently that

security officer was uh, working for Sally Beauty store, not the Safeway. Um, watching the lot. So he was wor- yeah Sally Beauty store and then he saw the sus- subject uh, when he stepped out, saw him over here and he pretty much it was a direct line with uh, Sally Beauty store and I believe the Jeep was right here.

Greenlee: And can you recall the security officer's name?

Chong: Uh, was WILL ROSENBAUM and gave that off- uh, information to officer, uh,

um I'm sorry, Detective Kammerer.

Greenlee: Okay. At any time could you understand, could you hear or understand anything

the suspect was saying?

Chong: No.

Greenlee: Okay.

Chong: No I couldn't. In fact uh, security officer, when I was talking to him afterwards

> that, who made or possibly know the subject. Uh, it sounds like maybe that gentleman had stopped uh, and I don't know how long the encounter was but he said that it sounded like that, that gentleman possibly he might know the subject.

Greenlee: And we kind of went over his clothing but can you recall anything else about the

suspect's clothing or anything else that he was carryng?

Chong: No it was mostly black. Um, I wasn't concerned about the clothing, I knew we

had right person based on the uh, suspect, I mean the security officer pointing him

out. Um, Officer ZENTNER's init-um, initial contact with him.

fitting that description or acting in that same manner with a hatchet.

He, I would say he's maybe 40's uh, or so. He was a white gentleman. I believe Chong:

it was mainly black clothing if I remember.

Greenlee: What about height, weight?

Chong: He wasn't that tall and I want to say on the skinny side, thin side. He wasn't a big

You know if, if I'm thinking right I think it was Davis.

Merrill:

So, sorry I'm trying to get this thing acclimated here at the right spot, give me one second. (pause) Okay so if you're on uh, Burnside and 122nd and –

Miller:

Yeah.

Merrill:

If you're going, let's see if your going – you, you were turning onto 122^{nd} and you were trying to, you were trying to turn south you said on 122^{nd} , correct?

Miller:

Yeah.

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Merrill:

And you, do you know know where Burnside was in relation to where you are at

that point? You said like maybe a block over?

Miller:

Yeah it'd be south of Main.

Merrill:

South or north?

Miller:

Well what I did was I went past the building, turned right onto Burnside.

And then uh, turned right on the next uh, uh, street and then, and then was trying to get in behind the building but it was authorized access only so I went to the next street. So I'm heading north now and I think it would've been, I think its Davis right before Burnside.

(Phone dialing & ringing)

Rosenbaum: Hello?

Well (unintelligible) no you're not type deal then he keeps on moving. He moves back, you know away from me and then I put, I just, I put the asp back up and then he turned around again, okay I'm gonna show you my credentials, my credentials right there. Like he pulled out Oregon ID. Like the, can you step back a little bit because, you know I need you to step

back.

Dran: So hold on a second. So does he have, is he, is he pressing towards you making

you walk backwards?

Rosenbaum: Yes sir.

Rosenbaum: I was walking back the whole time man.

That's kind of, it's another reason why I had my asp out there, okay just for my (unintelligible), all I had on me. Inside of the pocket knife and that's it, I don't

have any mace on me, it's actually inside the store.

Dran: Okay so he's, he's telling you he's gonna get his credentials and he's going into

his pockets and that's making you nervous?

Rosenbaum: Pretty much.

Dran: Okay so at one point you said you put your asp away and then what happened?

Rosenbaum: When he was walking away I put it up.

Dran: He was, he was walking away?

Rosenbaum: Uh, he was moving, yeah I was on my phone with PD, he's like hey you're lucky

it's (unintelligible) I mean but then it's like my asp. It'll protect me whatever 'cause it'll (unintelligible) a knife. He (unintelligible) okay, cool, cool can you keep on following and just kind of see (phone breaking up - indiscernible). Yes ma'am I sure will. And so in fact maybe 15 or 25 yards away from when he kept on charge, like I was trying to charge a little bit like how long, pretty fast towards me and I was backing up pretty quickly. And I yelled out commands, get back,

get back, get back, get back.

Dran: Wait, I'm sorry who was yelling that?

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Rosenbaum: I was yelling get back several times. Like get back, get back, get back and I said

it while I was on the phone with uh, I believe I was on phone with uh, dispatch.

Dran: Did you call 9-1-1 or non-emergency?

Rosenbaum: I called, yeah I called 9-1-1.

Dran: Okay.

Rosenbaum: And <u>(unintelligible)</u> and displaying a knife. That's when I, like I was

kind of fearing for my life at that time because I know...

Dran: ...and at which point did he display the knife?

Rosenbaum: Uh, within maybe 45 seconds of talking to him.

Dran: Okay and was this after you put you asp away?

Rosenbaum: I never had my asp out when I was close to him. I approached him

(unintelligible) what, what he was doing, he put (unintelligible)

Dran: Okay so I'm, I'm confused. At, at which point in all of this did he, did he pull the

knife out?

Rosenbaum: Okay well actually when I saw the physical blade when (phone breaking up)

Safeway by the ma- more the Safeway area.

Dran: Okay so you, you guys have already kind of exchanged words and, and is he

walking away when he has the knife out?

Rosenbaum: Yeah he was walking away I, I saw him put it back up, that's why, one of the

reasons why I took my asp back out.

Dran: Okay.

Rosenbaum: ...(unintelligible) then um -

Dran: Well hold on -

Rosenbaum: (Unintelligible).

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Dran:

As he's, hold on a sec WILL, as he's walking away from you but then at times

charging back at you does he have the knife out?

Rosenbaum: Uh, I didn't see it at the time but I didn't know if he had anything else in his hand

or not.

Dran: Okay.

Rosenbaum: (Unintelligible) I saw a closed (unintelligible) closed fist or not but I know he had

a knife <u>(unintelligible)</u> a couple times out he tried basically to throw it in my face and I, I was like hey man get back please, you know get back, get back.

Dran: Okay did he ever, did he ever uh, like point the knife at you or threaten you with

the knife?

Rosenbaum: Uh, he did when I was really close to the Safeway area, like I, he put some gloves

on, like a white, a black and white glove. I don't know if he had it on him or not when after he left but um, I saw what appeared to be a knife in his pocket 'cause, 'cause he looked like he was trying to yell at somebody, a bystander who was not involved. And I looked, I saw an object that appeared to be a knife. I go my god he just displayed a knife in someone's face and then it's like okay so then I tried to step back a little bit more and I tell everybody, like hey please get back, you know please move away from this guy, he's dangerous. And then his friend came over, talked to him for a second and said he's okay he's a schizophrenic and uh —

Dran: How do you, how do you know this guy was his friend?

Rosenbaum: Oh 'cause he, like he like (unintelligible) hey dude,

what's up, calm down type deal. The guy was so fuckin' paranoid type deal and

then he reached in that bag, all of sudden (phone breaking up) pull out.

Dran: I'm sorry your, your phone, your phone cut out. He reached into the bag and

what happened?

Rosenbaum: Oh I'm sorry. He reached in the backpack and then his friend left and that's when

I saw what appeared to be a uh, a, an axe. And so I said, he has an axe.

Dran: And this is all by the Safeway?

Rosenbaum: Uh, yes sir.

Dran: Was it in the Safeway...

Rosenbaum: ...probably uh -

Dran: Was it in the Safeway parking lot or was it towards the road.

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Rosenbaum: It was more in the sidewalk area where, at this point when he pulled out the axe

and knife it was actually by where the carts are at. By that, by 122nd and where

the, the cart rack was at.

Dran: Okay so there's, so a cart rack, a cart rack at 122nd?

Rosenbaum: I believe, yes sir, in that area. It's the one by the uh, uh, bus stop area

<u>(unintelligible)</u> bus stop so <u>(unintelligible)</u> and the officer, I mean uh, not the officer but the uh, dispatch lady was like what are you trying to say? Like now

he's claiming he's a uh, military police officer.

Dran: Okay.

Rosenbaum: An-and military police.

Dran: Okay then what happens?

Rosenbaum: When he pulled the axe out um, well then he was already here but he was in the

back of his trunk getting out non-lethal, he's like still saying the <u>(unintelligible)</u> waiting on backup, okay. And then it looked like he was trying to charge with his

axe, I go get back - get back - get back.

Dran: Wait hold on.

Rosenbaum: I had my asp –

Dran: Hold on, what did, who did he charge with the axe?

Rosenbaum: He charged, started charging towards my direction with an axe, with an axe and

then I pulled my asp back out. Like get- please get back, get back, whatever. (Unintelligible) officer and then when I go okay cool and I put it back up again so he, looked like he had it down but he didn't have it towards me. He had it actually down, like in his hand, he was carrying it. I felt more comfortable.

That's when I come back here until the police got here.

Dran: Okay and was this, was this guy, was he stationary or was he moving again at this

point when he had the axe to his side?

Rosenbaum: Which one?

Dran: The -

Rosenbaum: The guy?

Dran: Yeah the guy with the axe, was he walking away at this point, what was he doing?

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Rosenbaum: He started to.

Dran: Okay and which direction was he...

Rosenbaum: ...and he was, he was walking that way...

Dran: ...which direction was he walking?

Rosenbaum: Uh, towards 122nd. When he was walking away he kept on hitting the axe on the

side the, uh, the cart racks were at and a bike rack, he was hitting it several times. As he was walking away, that's when I let the officer know hey he has an axe in

his hand right now and she's like he's -(phone breaking up).

Dran: Is the uh, Safeway located east or west of 122nd?

Rosenbaum: Uh, I'm not really sure, it's like the right side of Sally's.

Dran: Okay. I, I can look it up so, but he's walking towards 122nd and you said he's

hitting things with the axe?

Rosenbaum: A-firm.

Dran: Okay and then what, what'd you see next?

Rosenbaum: Then he's like walking away, when he was walking away he kept on banging the

axe on uh, against a rock part of the uh, what's uh, the - where the carts just go at.

Dran: Okay.

Rosenbaum: And he hit it once or twice with the uh, axe, on the uh, bike rack, there's a

<u>(unintelligible)</u> bike rack. He was hitting it like there too.

Dran: Like the, a bike rack where people can park their bikes and lock 'em up or the

bike rack on a vehicle?

Rosenbaum: Uh, bike rack, the, the bike rack to the biker uh, bicycles, sorry.

Dran: Okay.

Rosenbaum: It's one of those small ones.

Dran: Okay and then what happened?

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Rosenbaum: Then when he walked away then uh, I looked back and I hear the officer calling,

calling for me and that's when I was on the phone with dispatch and I let 'em know hey he has an axe in his right hand I believe <u>(unintelligible)</u> type deal. He goes oh okay. He told me to stay over here basically when he drove over there

and that's all I know from that point.

Dran: Okay, you didn't see anything else?

Rosenbaum: No sir. I was kind of looking around, I know that they tried to make uh, contact

with him but all I saw 'cause I was, I stayed by the door at that time.

Dran: Okay uh –

Rosenbaum: Yeah so I tried to make sure people stayed clear of that area in case anything did

happen I didn't want anybody, anybody else get hurt or (unintelligible) hostage.

Dran: Okay so from that point you were trying to keep people away from the direction

this guy was walking in?

Rosenbaum: Yes sir, for a little bit then I, when the sidewalks cleared up I went by Sally's.

Budey:

Yes the MAX platform, yeah sorry. So there were a lot of people there and people realize that he has an axe in his, in his hand so they start running and just getting away from the guy and he continues um, southbound crossing the, the

eastbound Burnside.

Dran:

Okay.

Budey:

Um, when he crossed over e- on the other side of Burnside so he's on south,

southwest corner now.

Dran:

Okay.

Budey:

Um, there were other officers that pull up in the intersection. They were like on

122nd.

Dran:

Um-hm.

Budey:

That were addressing him as well. At that moment he, on that intersection for a moment he, he was challenged again to put the axe down. Um, he slowly put the

axe down but then picked it back up.

Dran:

Okay. I'm gonna back up just for a second, do you remember aside from you and Officer CHONG remember who else, who the officers were that drove past you

and then joined him to cover him?

Budey:

Um, yes I believe it was Officer SANTOS and um, she's 902 um, sorry I'm

spacing with the names. She works B shift with me.

Dran:

Uh, ZENTNER?

Budey:

ZENTNER, sorry, yeah.

Dran:

No that's fine.

Budey:

Yeah.

Dran:

And then do you remember who the officers were that had pulled up on 122nd?

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Budey:

I do remember uh, seeing uh, Acting Sergeant KEMPLE.

Dran:

Okay.

Budey:

I do not remember anybody else really in that intersection right there.

Dran:

Okay. So he's put the axe down at one point.

Budey:

1 00.

Dran:

How long was the axe...

Budey:

...down?

Dran:

Down for?

Budey:

If I had to guess, five, 10 seconds.

Dran:

Okay and what is he doing after he put the axe down on the ground?

Budey:

He picks it right back up.

Dran:

Right back up.

Budey:

Yeah so maybe even less than that 'cause he -

Dran:

Okay.

Budey:

You know he puts it down and -

Dran:

And that was when he challenged the other officers uh, A/KEMPLE that had

pulled up?

Budey:

Yeah they um, they, they challenged him.

Dran:

Okay.

Budey:

I believe, yeah.

Dran:

That's what I meant, I'm sorry.

Budey:

Yeah.

Dran:

The other officers challenged.

Budey:

Yeah.

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Dran:

Challenged him, the acting sergeant. Up to this point had anything been deployed

on him? Less-lethal, taser, pepper?

Budey:

A less-lethal, the .40 millimeter was deployed at the intersection.

Dran:

Okay and do you remember or know who that was that deployed that?

Budey:

Do not.

Dran:

Okay. How did, how did he react to it?

Budey:

Um, he like flinched.

Dran:

Okay.

Budey:

You know he knew something hit him.

Dran:

Okay and was this -

Harris:

Just one round?

Budey:

Yes I believe so.

Dran:

Was this before or after he'd put the axe down and picked it back up?

Budey:

Uhh –

Dran:

And once again if you don't remember just tell me...

Budey:

...I don't remember. To be honest with you I don't remember.

Dran:

Okay.

Budey:

If that was -

Dran:

That's fine.

Budey:

When was, when it was exactly.

Dran:

Okay so at some point he picks the axe back up.

Budey:

Yes.

Dran:

Budey:

What does he do next?

Continue walking southbound.

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Dran:

Okay. Did he have any other interactions with members of the public while you

guys are giving or while he's being given commands to drop the axe.

Budey:

There, there are a lot of people in that area um, I know that he walked up to a

vehicle.

Dran:

And where was that vehicle located?

Budey:

Um, I believe um, I believe it was SE Ankeny Street.

Dran:

Okay.

Budey:

Um, the vehicle was pulling out, the vehicle was facing eastbound.

Dran:

Okay eastbound on Ankeny.

Budey:

Yes.

Dran:

Coming up, coming up to 122nd?

Budey:

122nd and he walked up to the driver's door and he had the axe in his hand and I

thought he was gonna smash the window or get in the car because he's trying the

door handles.

Dran:

Right.

Budey:

And I could see that the, the driver in the vehicle is trying to, trying to lock the

doors.

Dran:

Okay.

Budey:

Like he is act- you know actively looking to lock the doors in, in his vehicle.

Dran:

What'd that car look like?

Budey:

It was a, I believe it's a black SUV, I believe it's a Chevy Equinox.

Dran:

Okay.

Budey:

Like an SUV.

Dran:

Okay.

Budey:

Yeah.

Dran:

Like a mid-size.

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Budey:

Yeah.

Dran:

Black SUV?

Budey:

Yeah.

Dran:

Okay and what did that driver do? They drive away, they reverse, did they get out

of their car and run?

Budey:

I actually I don't remember.

Dran:

Okay. Alright and what happened next?

Budey:

Um, that's, so when the car was no longer in there, I don't know, I'm, I don't

remember what exactly happened. He was still at that intersection.

Dran:

And he still has the axe in his hand?

Budey:

He still has the axe in, in his hand. Um, he puts it down um, slowly.

Dran:

Um-hm.

Budey:

Down on the ground um, and he gets beanbagged.

Dran:

Beanbagged or .40 mill?

Budey:

Sorry.

Dran:

That's okay.

Budey:

.40 mill.

Dran:

I still call it beanbag too.

Budey:

Yeah, yeah. That's less, less-lethal round um, and he is not on the sidewalk, he's

like on the southbound lanes of 122.

Dran:

Okay.

Budey:

Uh, closer to lane number two, the bike path.

Dran:

Okay.

Budey: Dran:

The -

So lane number two being the, is that the inside lane you're describing or?

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Budey:

That's the outside lane.

Dran:

Okay.

Budey:

Next to the bike lanes.

Dran:

Okay. How did he react to the?

Budey:

He felt it, like he jolted back a little bit and um -

Dran:

Did he say anything or yelp out or?

Budey:

I don't remember.

Dran:

Okay.

Budey:

Um, he, what he did is he had some flip flops on and he kind of kicked 'em out

out of his feet.

Dran:

Okay.

Budey:

And uh, took off running.

Dran:

Which direction did he run?

Budey:

Southbound.

Dran:

Okay uh, where did he go once he started running south?

Budey:

He started running south and next block he made a right turn.

Dran:

Ash?

Budey:

Ash, yeah.

Dran:

Okay and (clearing throat) pardon me, did you guys, what did you guys do at that

point? When he started running.

Budey:

Started running um, I follow behind like walking.

Dran:

Okay.

Budey:

And then I saw that he was actually sprinting and he's making a right turn

towards Ash Street. I took off running too.

Dran:

Were you alone or were the other cops with...

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Budey:

...no there, there's other officers with us.

Dran:

Okay.

Budey:

Uh, there were officers on foot and officers in vehicles.

Dran:

Okay. So you get onto Ash Street.

Budey:

Dran:

And what do you see?

Budey:

Don't see anything.

Dran:

Okay.

Yes.

Budey:

I don't see him anymore.

Dran:

He's gone?

Budey:

He's gone.

Dran:

Okay.

Budey:

So continue down on Ash Street and we're where's he at, where's he at and when I see to the left I see um, just a backpack, that's the only thing I see is somebody is wearing a backpack and making a left or turn towards the um, the breezeway in

the apartment complex.

Dran:

Okay so which side of Ash Street is this on? The south side?

Budey:

Southside.

Dran:

Okay.

Budey:

On the left side, yeah.

Dran:

I was gonna say south or north.

Budey:

Dran:

So he's on the south side and you see the backpack.

Budey: Dran:

Um-hm.

Do you see the backpack while it's still on the south side of Ash?

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Budey: Yeah so basically I see just like a person's walking through, and the only thing I

see is um, there's the breezeway and the only thing I see is just the, a backpack

disappearing.

Dran: Okay I'm gonna take you back to the maps real quick before I forget to do it. So

this is the map of still 122nd, it's a continuation of the prior map.

Budey: Okay.

Dran: And – so we have 122nd, and correct me if I'm wrong.

Budey: Okay.

Dran: This would be Burnside.

Budey: Yes.

Dran: This is the gas station.

Budey: Yes.

Dran: Ankeny.

Budey: Yes.

Dran: And then Ash.

Budey: Yes.

Dran: Can you, with an X for me, mark where you saw that person in the black SUV

that he approached.

Budey: I believe it was right here.

Dran: Okay and then with a circle can you mark for me where he stopped the first time

and put, put the, the axe down?

Budey: It was just right outside um, the store.

Dran: Okay and then the second time that he put the axe down, just if you can write the

number two. If you, if you remember where that happened.

Budey: Uhh - it was in this intersection right here.

Dran: Okay.

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Budey:

But I do not know if it was on the south side or north side of intersection. I

believe it was on the south side.

Dran:

Okay if you just want to draw like a bracket to incor- to incorporate both sides of

that and then put a number two next to that. Does that make sense?

Budey: Make a bracket and?

Dran:

Yeah. So you, so you basically connecting the intersection.

Budey:

Okay I'm sorry I'm -

Dran:

Here I'll, I'm gonna, I'm gonna draw it for you.

Budey:

Yeah.

Dran:

And that way it'll just be a little easier. Um, this is to show that this is the general

area and I've marked it with a number two.

Budey:

Yes.

Dran:

Please take a look at that and tell if me that's...

Budey:

...yes...

Dran:

...correct.

Budey:

Yes.

Dran:

Okay.

Budey:

And I believe the, the axe that he dropped was on the south side.

Dran:

Okay.

Budey:

Of that intersection.

Dran:

And then with an arrow can you mark on, this is Ash Street.

Budey:

Yes.

Dran:

Can you mark where this breezeway or this, where you saw the backpack rather.

Budey:

Is right here.

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Dran:

Okay. Thank you. Okay so you see this backpack and what's going through your

mind as far as who do you think that person is?

Budey:

I, I thought it was him.

Dran:

Okay.

Budey:

I thought it was him and uh, as I am getting closer I see Officer SANTOS, he's

already there.

Dran:

He's already at the breezeway?

Budey:

By, yeah at the breezeway and he's pointing he's right here, he's right here.

Dran:

And he's, he's, Officer SANTOS is verbalizing that as well?

Budey:

Yes, yes.

Dran:

Okay. Then what, what happens?

Budey:

I told him to stay back, like to go after him.

Dran:

Okay.

Budey:

Wait for me, so I join him.

Dran:

Okay.

Budey:

And we walk up to the breezeway.

Dran:

Okay, I took a look at the breezeway and I can't remember how far south it goes until, I think there was a chain link fence at the very back end of that property.

Budey:

Um-hm.

Dran:

From the sidewalk, let's call that the entryway to the breezeway.

Budey:

Okay.

Dran:

From the sidewalk how far in was...

Budey:

...is he at?

Dran:

Budey:

Was he?

Yeah he was – I believe um, at that stairs that go up.

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Dran:

Uh-huh.

Budey:

Or just a little bit in, like kind of past the stairs.

Dran:

Okay.

Budey:

'Cause the, the, they're, the - so the breezeway goes in and then goes to the right

can - for the other units.

Dran:

It's like, yeah there's like...

Budey:

...it's like a T.

Dran:

If I remember correctly it T's and it goes west.

Budey:

Yeah it goes west and you continue straight. I believe he was past that a little bit.

Dran:

Okay.

Budey:

Maybe.

Dran:

And where were you guys?

Budey:

We were like at the entrance, we just had got in there.

Dran:

Okay then what happens?

Budey:

Um, other officers were right behind us.

Dran:

Okay.

Budey:

Uh, we challenge him.

Dran:

Uh, and what'd you mean by that?

Budey:

Um, get on the ground, get on the ground. Uh -

Dran:

How's he responding to that?

Budey:

He's not listening at all.

Dran:

Okay.

Budey: Dran: He's just yelling.

He's just yelling?

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Budey:

Yeah.

Dran:

Do you remember what he was yelling?

Budey:

I don't.

Dran:

Do you remember any citizens being out and about within the interior of that

complex observing what was going on?

Budey:

I know there were some people but I'm not sure if they were out before or after

the incident.

Dran:

Okay. Alright and so it's challenging him, it's you, it's Officer SANTOS.

Budey:

Um-hm

Dran:

And who else was with you? If you, if you remember.

Budey:

Officer DORAN.

Dran:

Okay.

Budey:

I later know, knew that he was there.

Dran:

Okay.

Budey:

Yeah.

Dran:

But there's other cops with you.

Budey:

Yeah.

Dran:

You just don't know...

Budey:

...yeah, yeah...

Dran:

...exactly who it is.

Budey:

Yeah.

Dran:

What's your focus at this point?

Budey:

Him.

Dran:

Him, okay and he's yelling at you um, he's left the axe behind?

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Budey:

Dran:

What condition is he in? What is, what, what's in his hands or not in his hands,

what's, where's the backpack?

Budey: He's wearing the backpack.

Yes.

Dran: Okay.

Budey: Um, and I forgot to mention that um, when he dropped the axe and he took off

running southbound um, there was an officer that got on the air that said that, there was an officer who reported that he had a knife. Because the init-initial

report was he had a knife.

Dran: Okay.

Budey: And -

Dran: so this, this was like an update saying hey, keep in mind before all this stuff has

happened -

Budey: Yes.

Dran: He had a knife. It was, as opposed to I saw him just now with a knife.

Budey: Yes.

Dran: Okay so just reminding you guys of the officer safety information.

Budey: Yeah and the um, the initial report said that it was a knife that he had.

Dran: Okay. Okay so again I'll repeat the question.

Budey: Yes.

Dran: Maybe just a bit more simply. What, what do you observe about him when he,

while he's yelling at you and you're giving him commands?

Budey: He's digging in his waistband.

Dran: Okay.

Budey: He started digging in his waistband to, right side in the waistband and he is like

moving.

Dran: Like what'd you mean by that?

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Budey: He – he just would not stay still. He, he like digging in his waistband and he's

just continuously moving left, right, back and forth.

Dran: Is he covering, is he covering a, a large distance with that movement or is he just

kind of staying in the same spot but his body's moving around quite a bit while

he's digging in his waistband?

Budey: The kind of moving around while he's digging in the waistband, yeah.

Dran: Okay but he's, in other words he's not moving to the front door of an apartment

or down, down, back further?

Budey: Not that the –

Dran: Feet away, just it's kind of concentrated to that area.

Budey: Yeah not that that, yeah he, he was, he was kind of moving towards us and away

kind of, and side to side.

Dran: Okay.

Budey: It wasn't like a movement that he was going towards a door or anything like that.

Dran: Okay, do you remember if he pulled anything out of his waistband?

Budey: No.

Dran: Okay.

Budey: I don't, I don't – I do not see what he has in his waistband or what he pulls out.

Dran: Okay and so he's digging around...

Budey: ...at that time.

Dran: Okay.

Budey: At that time I didn't.

Dran: He's digging around, he's moving around.

Budey: Yes.

Dran: He's yelling at you guys, commands are being given back to him.

Budey: Yes.

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Dran:

To um, I think you said to get on the, was it get on the ground or?

Budey:

I believe so, yeah.

Dran:

Okay.

Budey:

And I do know that distinguishes you, somebody said don't do it.

Dran:

Okay.

Budey:

Right before the, the shots.

Dran:

Okay so the commands are being given.

Budey:

Yeah.

Dran:

He's moving around.

Budey:

Yes.

Dran:

You hear somebody say don't do it.

Budey:

Yes.

Dran:

And then you said you hear shots.

Budey:

I hear pops, yeah.

Dran:

Hear pops, were you able to tell if there, there was a difference in the s-like the sound of pops. In other words if it was a pop of a taser or a pop of a shotgun, the

pop of a less-lethal, the pop of a handgun, the pop of a rifle?

Budey:

Like immediately, no.

Dran:

Okay.

Budey:

Then I knew, maybe took me like a second or two to realize it was actual shots.

Dran:

Okay like gunfire?

Budey:

Gunfire, yes.

Dran:

Okay, do you remember how many shots you heard?

Budey:

I don't. It was just like a quick pop, like come – you know.

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Dran:

Like a, a quick series?

Budey:

Series, yes.

Dran:

Okay. How does he react to that?

Budey:

See that's, that's the thing, that's what took me a second to realize 'cause he just

kinda staying there. Nothing really -

Dran:

He's just standing there?

Budey:

Yeah.

Dran:

Okay.

Budey:

And its like, like a slow motion, he going to, it's like – moves to the right and

then goes down to his knees.

Dran:

Okay. Did he stay on his knees or did he, did he lay down, did he sit down?

Budey:

Yeah he kind of, knees I believe and then he kind of sat and he leaned over a,

there, there was a pole.

Dran:

Uh-huh.

Budey:

And kind of fell over.

Dran:

Okay. Did you notice anything about him at that point?

Budey:

Um, I noticed that he had like - red marks on his arm. Like, just like maybe

blood.

Dran:

Okay.

Budey:

On, on his arm.

Dran:

Did it appear fresh? Or was it scabs or was it?

Budey:

I, see I don't, I don't know.

Dran:

Needle marks?

Budey:

I don't, no it, it wasn't like a needles marks, little bigger than that.

Dran:

Okay.

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Budey:

It was like on his forearm.

Dran:

Okay. Were, were they actively bleeding?

Budey:

I saw red, I did not -

Dran:

Okay. Okay.

Budey:

Did not know, did not realize if, did not see if it was actively bleeding.

Dran:

Sure.

Budey:

Yeah.

Dran:

So he, the, the, you hear the shots, he reacts slowly, goes down to his knees and

then kind of falls against a pole and -

Budey:

Yeah.

Dran:

Does he, does he wind up prone on the ground or?

Budey:

Yeah he kind of goes down kind of on, on his right side.

Dran:

Okay.

Budey:

Kind of laying.

Dran:

what happened then?

Budey:

Um, I heard somebody saying need to approach him, get the shield. Somebody

brought a shield out.

Dran:

Do you know who that was?

Budey:

Don't.

Dran:

Okay.

Budey:

Um -

Dran:

Were you part of the team that went up to contact him?

Budey:

Yes, yes.

Dran:

Okay what'd you guys do?

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Budey:

Um, I gr- got a hold of his right arm, I'm sorry, left arm.

Dran:

Okay.

Budey:

How he's laying and we got him on his stomach.

Dran:

Okay.

Budey:

And uh, he was handcuffed.

Dran:

Okay.

Budey:

Um –

Dran:

Whose handcuffs were used, do you remember?

Budey:

The officer who was next to me to the left, do not know.

Dran:

Okay that's fine. You get him handcuffed and then what'd you do with him?

Budey:

Um, as soon as he is rolled over I see that there was a, a knife um, like a black

knife that was folded in underneath him.

Dran:

Okay.

Budey:

Like underneath his buttocks.

Dran:

So was it like a belt clip type folding blade knife? Was it a, a bigger knife – de-

describe this knife to me in, in a bit more detail if you, if you could.

Budey:

Maybe it's yea long.

Dran:

The handle?

Budey:

Yeah it's folded, it's like -

Dran:

Right.

Budey:

All total folded like this.

Dran:

Okay so you're, you're...

Budey:

...and it's black.

Dran:

You're showing about three and a half, four inches.

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Budey:

Yes.

Dran:

Okay. And uh, did you see a belt clip or anything like that on it?

Budey:

I, I don't recall.

Dran:

Okay and where, where was the knife when, when you saw it?

Budey:

When we immediately rolled him over it was right there, like where his butt or his

quads would be.

Dran:

Okay, okay I'm, I'm gonna ask the question.

Budey:

Um-hm.

Dran:

I probably already know the answer but did you notice the knife on the ground

there prior to uh, the shots being fired...

Budey:

...no...

Dran:

...during this confrontation?

Budey:

No.

Dran:

Okay. What kind of, what, what did you guys do with him after you, you rolled

him over?

Budey:

Uh, there were officers giving him first aid. I saw somebody run up with a first

aid kit.

Okay.

Dran:

Okay um, do you remember any broadcasts for um, medical to respond?

Budey:

I did hear Code Three medical um, that's pretty much it.

Dran:

Okay. Did you remember at any point and I'm, I'm gonna back way up. Do you

remember if the ECIT was requested or...

Budey:

...yes. Uh, Officer CHONG, the primary officer, when I rolled, when I was

getting to the scene, when I was north of Burnside he asked if there was an ECIT

um, that would be responding.

Dran:

Budey:

So he asked for someone.

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Dran:

1.

Okay. Getting back to towards the end here, so other officers are, are rendering

aid to him is he saying anything? Is he conscious?

Budey:

No.

Dran: I, I mean, and I apologize that's a two-part. Is he conscious?

Budey: No, well his eyes are open but -

Dran: Okay.

Budey: Yeah.

Dran: And then the second part is was he saying anything?

Budey: No.

Dran: No, okay. Thank you. Uh, what did, what did you do while the officers were

rendering aid to him?

Budey: Um, the sergeant, one of the sergeant, I'll remember his name, told me to start

taking photos of the scene.

Dran: Okay.

Budey: So I, I snapped a couple photos.

Dran: And what did you use to snap the photos?

Budey: My Bureau issued phone.

Dran: Okay, did you upload those?

Budey: No not yet.

Dran: Yet, okay. Um -

Budey: And I don't, I don't know how many I have.

Dran:

Budey: I just took some photos of the ground where the shell casings were and the

doorway where the, there was a lady that was looking out.

Dran: Okay.

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Budey:

Um –

Dran:

(sneeze) Pardon me.

Budey:

That was Sergeant FELTS that told me to do that.

Dran:

FELTS?

Budey:

Yes.

Dran:

Okay. So you took some photos.

Budey:

Yes.

Dran:

And then what'd you do?

Budey:

Um, I uh, went back to 122^{nd} Avenue and asked for one of the officers to give me

a ride back to my vehicle 'cause I left it unsecured, window rolled down.

Dran:

Okay.

Budey:

Um, and my, it's a bad area, people go and steal stuff.

Dran:

I understand. I understand.

Budey:

Yeah.

Dran:

Okay I'm gonna ask you and, and, and be honest. Um, not that you'd be dishonest but this, this is kind of a, a difficult question and we're all cops so we're all, we're all rough and tumble and we can take care of ourselves but at that moment when you're confronting him in that, that breezeway and um, the distance described uh, seems like it's, I mean for all intent and purposes relatively

close.

Budey:

It is.

Dran:

What's going through your head? How are you, how are you feeling?

Budey:

Um, (deep breath) it was nerve wracking, you know.

Dran:

Desc-describe your emotions for me.

Budey:

Um, 'cause he was right there, was not listening to our commands and the, the way he was acting and even prior to that with him running around with the axe

and not - doing anything we ask him to do.

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Dran:

Um-hm.

Budey:

Or tell him to do.

Dran:

And he's, he's digging in, he's been digging around in his waistband.

Budey:

Yeah I really thought that he was, was gonna try to break into one of the units.

Dran:

Okay.

Budey:

Um, because, you know earlier he tried to get in a vehicle.

Dran:

Um-hm.

Budey:

It appeared so um, and, you know through my thoughts like if he's starting to, you

know swing at that vehicle, you know what are we gonna do.

Dran:

Right.

Budey:

Yeah.

Dran:

Right.

Budey:

Or start swinging his axe at 122nd and Burnside where there's people walking by

him.

Dran:

Did you at any point fear for your own safety?

Budey:

Oh yeah.

Dran:

Would you say that that was a fear that you had at any one particular time or was

it, it different times throughout this, this incident?

Budey:

Yeah it — as soon as he got the axe out, you know I rolled up thinking it will be a next, you know another thing where you just talk to a guy that, you know is high on drugs or so-something's going on with him 'cause that's the whole day was. People high on drugs climbing trees and falling off so — thinking that would be a simple thing where he, then he whips out the axe and from then on it was just

intense, rapidly evolving.

Dran:

Okay. Tony can you think of anything or have any questions?

Harris:

And this is only uh, uh, because I'm trying to write as fast as I can. Uh, initially

you did pull your gun out?

Budey:

Yes.

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Harris:

Near the Safeway?

Budey:

Yes.

Harris:

Did you have it out the whole time?

Budey:

No.

Harris:

When did you put it back?

Budey:

I don't remember exactly where but I do know that I was in a Sul position

walking behind him while he's going southbound.

Dran:

Can you describe what a Sul position is for folks that may not know.

Budey:

Basically my gun is pointing down and I keep it close to my chest with my left

support arm underneath my handgun.

Dran:

Its kind of a new thing we're teaching...

Budey:

...yes...

Dran:

...instead of depressed -

Budey:

Yes.

Dran:

Ready or - yeah.

Budey:

So I, then I holster. Um, and then I had my gun out again wh- at the com- where

we confronted him at, at the apartment complex.

Harris:

Did you fire your gun?

Budey:

No.

Harris:

Do you know why you didn't fire?

Budey:

I did not exactly see what he had in his waistband.

Harris:

Right, you knew he was digging in his...

Budey:

...I knew he was digging. I, I-

Harris:

(Unintelligible) something, maybe (unintelligible)...

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Budey:

...I knew, I, I knew something was coming. I knew something was coming, I was

getting ready.

Harris:

And you did not see anything in his hands?

Budey:

Mm - I, from my -

Harris:

Vantage.

This is Detective Arjay Dran, the time is approximately midnight on what is now July 31st, 2019. I'm with Detective Tony Harris, we are at East Precinct uh, in an interview room. Present with us is uh, Sergeant KEVIN FELTS, KEVIN can you spell your last name for us please?

Felts:

Uh, F-E-L-T-S.

Dran:

And what's your DPSST number?

Felts:

29650.

Dran:

Thank you sir and representing Sergeant FELTS is Sergeant Tom Perkins and

Sergeant Perkins what's your DPSST number?

Perkins:

21046.

Dran:

Excellent, thank you sir. So we are here uh, in reference to Portland Police Bureau case number 19-258996, this is an officer involved shooting that occurred yesterday's date, 07-30-19, at approximately 16, well the call was dispatched at 1622 hours, the OIS or officer involved shooting essentially occurred uh, at the address of 12026 SE Ash Street. Sergeants FELTS can you tell me how long have you been employed by the Portland Police Bureau?

Felts:

Uh, over 24 years.

Dran:

Any prior police work prior to Portland?

Felts:

Yes.

Dran:

And who was that with?

Felts:

Uh, Troutdale PD.

Dran:

How long, how long were you with them?

Felts:

Six months.

Dran:

Six months, okay and how long have you been a sergeant or when did you get

promoted to sergeant?

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Felts:

Uh, November of 2017.

Dran:

Okay, that made it official to sergeant?

Felts:

Correct.

Dran:

Did you have any acting time beforehand?

Felts:

Yes I did.

Dran:

Approximately how long?

Felts:

About 11 months.

Dran:

Okay and what is your current assignment?

Felts:

Uh, East Precinct, afternoons or C, C shift.

Dran:

C shift, okay and what are the hours for that shift?

Felts:

Uh, 1600 to 02.

Dran:

Okay and what are your normal work days off?

Felts:

Uh, Thursday, Friday, Saturday.

Dran:

Okay. So today is your normal shift?

Felts:

Yes.

Dran:

How many sergeants were, were working C shift, what is now yesterday, with

you?

Felts:

Uh, two other sergeants.

Dran:

Okay yourself and who else?

Felts:

So three including me. Uh, myself, Sergeant BRAD NETTING and Acting

Sergeant uh, TROY SAWTELLE.

Dran:

Okay my understanding is there's also a B shift at East Precinct?

That's correct.

And what are the hours for that shift?

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Felts: Uh, that is uh, 10:00am to 8:00pm.

Dran: Okay do they have sergeants designated?

Felts: Uh, they do uh, however uh, they, they have two sergeants designated um, one is

currently off on uh, light duty uh, the other one doesn't start until Wednesday so

they have Sunday, Monday, Tuesday off.

Dran: Okay. Did they have an acting sergeant today on B, B shift?

Felts: Not for B shift.

Dran: Okay.

Felts: Not that I'm aware of.

Dran: Okay. Alright so as I kind of briefly touched on earlier, 1622 hours this call

comes out. Um, tell me about how you came to know about this call for service.

Felts: Uh, well uh, our shift starts at 1600 uh, I don't recall exactly what time roll-call

let out um, but I do remember being in the sergeant's office um, at East Precinct and hearing uh, something about a guy with, had a machete or an axe and was running around in the area of 122 and Burnside-ish. In that general area.

Dran: Okay so that caught your ear.

Felts: That got my ear and then he was running uh, I heard just basically the air traffic

that he was uh, in and out of traffic and um, just from my experience um, I know that that is a heavily populated area. That's right along the MAX line um, and just my I guess general intuition or, you know how long I've been a police officer

I knew that it had the potential to be a uh, a significant uh, police event.

Dran: Okay so when you heard this, caught your attention, what did you do?

Felts: Uh, I grabbed my essential items, got in a patrol car and uh, headed that way.

Dran: Okay, did you have a chance to log onto your computer in the car? That you

remember?

Felts: I don't remember.

Dran: Okay, did you put yourself enroute to that call?

Felts: I do not remember. The, I know that the air traffic was pretty, they – by the time I

got out and started headed that way um, they put out that they were chasing him

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on foot and you could tell from the uh, the officers, in their voice, that they, you know that they were elevated. And so at that point uh, air traffic was kind of a premium, I didn't put myself on it. Um, I'd talked to the day shift sergeants just before I left the office and asked hey, is there a day shift sergeant on this call yet? Or is there or I didn't, I didn't know who they had working.

Dran:

Okay.

Felts:

Uh, so I didn't know so I was like yeah I'm just gonna head that way.

Dran:

Did, did you get an answer?

Felts:

That I, nobody really knew.

Dran:

Okay.

Felts:

So-

Dran:

Okay so you're, you're going there, you're staying off the air uh, to preserve radio

uh -

Felts:

Yeah.

Dran:

Availability, air time and um -

Felts:

As I'm headed there they started, got into a foot pursuit with the guy um, so he's running and I'm – 'cause I was uh, driving east on uh, 122 um, or sorry, east on Stark heading towards 122.

Dran:

Um-hm.

Felts:

When they put that out. Um, and as I turned and start heading north on 122^{nd} I can see people running. Because of the lay of the roadway it's kind of an uphill and then a downhill but I can see officers just a little bit, they're running and they say he'd, 'cause he was headed south on 122^{nd} from Burnside.

Dran:

Um-hm.

Felts:

Uh, then as I get up there they say he's running west on Ash, so I'm thinking okay they're gonna set a perimeter and, you know we'll get a K-9, wrap this guy up. Um, so I post up, I seen a car go down Pine, I posted up at 122 and Pine and literally within seconds uh, of being there I hear, I hear shots fired, not on the air but I actually hear the shots.

Dran:

Okay.

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Felts:

Um, and start driving, go over to Ash and lock it down and I, you know I hear that its an officer involved, that there's shots fired. So I know, okay we're gonna start locking this down. So I park there, grab a trauma kit and just start running up to the uh, uh, where the scene actually was.

Dran:

Okay so Pine is south of Ash?

Felts:

A block south.

Dran:

One block south?

Felts:

Yeah.

Dran:

Okay so I think what you said was in your mindset get into a position for

perimeter for...

Felts:

...set a perim- yeah.

Dran:

Okay, to use other assets to try to keep this guy contained.

Felts:

Correct.

Dran:

So you can get him into custody. Um, you said that you actually heard, with your

own ears, you heard the shots fired.

Felts:

Correct.

Dran:

Um, was there anything about the shots that was distinguishable? Like did one, did one sound different than another, for example um, I'm gonna throw out the tools we have, taser, shotgun, rifle, .40 millimeter and handgun.

Felts: Yeah.

Dran:

Anything sound different?

Felts:

Uh, well I, I, the different sound between uh, like the rifle and a handgun, yes. Um, and all of those sound different to me they sounded like uh, handgun shots.

Dran:

Okay. Did you remember how many shots you heard fired?

Felts:

I heard four or five.

Dran:

Okay and what was the tempo of the shots?

Felts:

Uh, they were quick.

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Dran:

Quick?

Felts:

Yeah.

Dran:

And then I think you said the, the officers broadcast that shots had been fired.

Felts:

Shot fired, yeah.

Dran:

And so you said you responded to Ash, SE Ash to lock it down, what'd you mean

by that?

Felts:

Uh, to secure, basically we're gonna, I, as soon as I heard that we're gonna be moving into um, securing effectively what is gonna become a crime scene.

Dran:

Okay.

Felts:

Um, so that was, that was the first spot that I knew okay I can throw a car here, at

least we'll st- get that going and I knew that, okay well he's gonna probably need

some kind of medical.

Dran:

Okay.

Felts:

Something so -

Dran:

So you grabbed a -

Felts:

Grabbed a trauma kit out of the car.

Dran:

The individual first aid kit?

Felts:

Yes.

Dran:

Okay did you deploy that kit at all?

Felts:

Uh, it was, yes. I, so...

Dran:

...you personally or did you hand it off?

Felts:

Uh, I opened it and handed it off to the officers.

Dran:

Okay, once, and when you handed it off, when you got there up to the officers

with the guy what did, what did you see?

Felts:

So as uh, I'm, I took off running west on uh, Ash. Uh, as I got up to where uh,

the uh, apartment steps or the opening into the, I don't know if you want to call it

a breezeway or whatever it is.

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Dran:

Um-hm.

Felts:

Um, (clearing throat) Officer PIOMBO was walking um, Officer DORAN.

Dran:

Um-hm.

Felts:

Uh, and we basically passed each other quickly and Officer PIOMBO told me

he's involved.

Dran:

Okay.

Felts:

And he kept going and I uh, he got him out there to the, I don't know which direction on Ash. Um, and I took the trauma kit into the, to the officers who were already uh, working on getting this guy some uh, medical. They were - boy I'm,

apologize, I'm, I'm tired...

Dran:

...I understand...

Felts:

...that they were medically assisting, yes.

Dran:

Okay um, anything specific about the individual that you observed? Uh, wounds, personal affects, his actual uh, stature, how he was, how he was displayed when

you got there?

Felts:

He was uh, as I recall he was laying on his stomach. I could see a um, I could see what looked uh, looked like maybe an exit wound in his back, his upper back. Um, and they, they're quickly uh, soon as they got, they had trauma shears, start cutting away his clothes and started getting a, I think um, they got a um, (deep

breath).

Dran:

Chest seal?

Felts:

Chest seal, thank you.

Dran:

Um-hm.

Felts:

A chest seal...

Dran:

...you demonstrated with your hands, for the record.

Felts:

Yes I demonstrated with my hands I just couldn't think of the actual words in the

moment.

Dran:

Okay.

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Felts:

Um, but uh, getting a chest seal on him. Um, and as I, once they started doing that um, Officer, there were several uh, there was quite a few officers there. Um, one officer uh, that basically people who weren't actively engaged in providing this guy with medical uh, aid, I started directing them. Uh, Officer BUDEY I directed to immediately start taking pictures right then. Uh, because I know from experience we're gonna get a medical personnel in there.

Dran:

Um-hm.

Felts:

And there's gonna be a lot of people and as soon as we could start collecting this evidence and preserving it where it's at um, it's gonna be better for the

investigators later.

Dran:

Okay.

Felts:

Um, so I had Officer BUDEY start taking pictures. Uh, he did, he did that and then I posted uh, Officer SWALKO uh, they started marking where ca-shell casings were using business cards.

Dran:

Can you, can you spell that officer's last name for me?

Felts:

Uh, SWALKO, S-W-A-L-K-O.

Dran:

Okay, thank you.

Felts:

Um, and I knew since we were gonna be bringing medical in I had him post up right where the shell casings were which were just uh, to the north of um, where the individual was uh, where they were ta-tending to him.

Dran:

Okay.

Felts:

So that they could maintain that uh, and kind of direct people uh, medical

personnel through.

Dran:

Okay, did you notice anything else about the suspect or what -

Felts:

He showed no, no signs of life.

Dran:

Okay.

Felts:

I, and I got there probably within 30 seconds and he was uh, an ashen gray.

Dran:

Felts:

Okay.

And I saw no response at any point.

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Dran:

Okay, did anybody, any of the officer's on-scene make any statements to you or give you any evidence to – for like for safe keeping or to, to make sure, or to make you aware of any evidence that needed to be, other than the shell casings.

Felts:

Uh, not, not that I recall. Um (clearing throat) once, once the scene had become stabilized um, I, I remember, recall uh, Officer IONESI um, he'd been doing CPR for quite a while and then um, fire personnel took over. Once uh, we got everything secured and basically started transitioning from okay they determined this guy was deceased and they're not gonna be moving him um, I had officers posted up. The, the scene was pretty dynamic as far as the um, the apartment complex. Uh, there's a lot of uh, hostility towards the police there.

Dran:

Um-hm.

Felts:

Uh...

Dran:

...was that exhibited last night?

Felts:

Uh, yes, yes it was. Um, a lot of people yelling at the police um, it – it, it's a, that, the, the apartment complex in that uh, complex's in that area are the subject of a lot of uh, or quite a few police calls.

Dran:

Okay.

Felts:

Anyway so it took a significant amount of officers to secure the scene. Um, so I just, we, we're taking care of that. Um, once we determined who, we get that stabilized uh, then we started figuring out okay which officers are in there, are, did, were they witness officers.

Dran:

Felts:

Who actually witnessed. Uh, once we determined that then um, transitioned to get those officers swapped out.

Dran:

Okay.

Okay.

Felts:

From being posted on the scene. Um, and then Officer IONESI was actually, as he's coming out I asked him, I said hey, which way did the shots actually go? And he said they all went to the south so -

Dran:

Okay. Any issues or problems with mitigating the folks from the complex? In other words did any of those folks make it into that immediate crime scene or was everybody at bay and just being vocal with you?

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Felts:

The, primarily the, the folks that I saw when I got there uh, from my recollection was that uh, they were on the upper level and that was an area that wasn't uh,

secure at that point. The primary focus was the, the main level.

Dran:

Um-hm.

Felts:

It's kind of a two-tiered kind of hallway. There's staircases uh, so I posted two officers at the top of the staircase that's right there in the immediate scene.

Dran:

Okay.

Felts:

Um, and there were citizens or the residents were coming out and they were, had their phones out taking pictures and, and uh, whatnot of this guy as he was...

Dran:

...okay...

Felts:

...he was laying there.

Dran:

After medical attended to him?

Felts:

Yeah and during the -

Dran:

And during?

Felts:

Yeah.

Dran:

Did uh, any of these folks come forward and say I witnessed what happened and I want to provide a statement or I have video on my phone or?

Felts:

Uh, no I don't, and we asked. I, I asked them uh, kind of trying to appeal to the um, you know I mean it was a pretty, that's a pretty grim scene. Um, and, you know asked folks hey did you see? Most had just heard, nobody said oh I saw it

or had it on video.

Dran:

Okay.

Felts:

Or-

Dran:

And as far as you know nobody that was present, non-law enforcement that was

present inside that complex was able to make it into the immediate crime scene

down where the deceased was?

Felts:

Not, no.

Dran:

Okay.

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Felts:

Not that I'm aware of.

Dran:

Alright. So you mentioned how you started delegating tasks, you...

Felts:

...correct.

Dran:

You had the, you had the uh, I forgot the name, SWALKO take, no not...

Felts:

...yes...

Dran:

..take pictures?

Felts:

Uh, I had Officer BUDEY.

Dran:

BUDEY.

Felts:

Take photos.

Dran:

Oh BUDEY, that's right, thank you.

Felts:

Uh, then SWAL- Officer SWALKO, I had him post on the actual, kind of where

the casings were and the -

Dran:

That's right.

Felts:

Yup.

Dran:

Okay and then you began the process. Once, once you got that scene kind of stabilized you began the process of swapping out witness officers with other

personnel to maintain the crime scene integrity?

Felts:

Correct.

Dran:

And any other tasks that you took on while, while there at that scene?

Felts:

I assigned the crime scene log to uh, Officer CURTISS.

Dran:

Okay.

Felts:

Uh –

Dran:

The crime scene for the actual scene within the breezeway?

Felts: Dran: Correct.

Okay.

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Felts:

Yeah.

Dran:

I ask, I ask because I personally encountered I think two crime scene logs. One

on, one at the initial point at, at the intersection.

Felts:

At 122 and...

Dran:

...and Ash, yeah.

Felts:

Yeah.

Dran:

So then I, then there, I saw Officer um, CURTISS at the entryway to the

breezeway.

Felts:

Yeah and I had, I, I directed him to start locking down that uh, securing the, the,

at the inside the apartment complex.

Dran:

Um-hm.

Felts:

Uh, with red tape there.

Dran:

Okay. What does the red tape mean?

Felts:

Uh, the red tape is that's the, like a critical crime scene that...

Dran:

...okay. Okay. So you've done all those things.

Felts:

Yes.

Dran:

Anything else that you, I know, I know that it, well let me ask you this, at some

point did another sergeant show up to provide you any assistance?

Felts:

Several, yes.

Dran:

Several, okay.

Felts:

Um, Sergeant uh, BRAD NUTTING and uh, Sergeant SAWTELLE and then um,

Sergeant LACY SPARLING who is the acting lieutenant.

Dran:

Okay.

Felts:

Yes. And I coordinated with Sergeant NUTTING um, with uh, both then the, the

outer, because we realized we had an additional, like a larger scene.

Dran:

Um-hm.

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Felts:

I coordinated with him getting the witness officers out um, and then with Sergeant

SAWTELLE with the over, with the overall scene.

Dran:

Okay.

Felts:

And then with um, Sergeant SPARLING as well.

Dran:

Okay. And so it sounds like your role was primarily supervising inside this, the

scene within the, the breezeway.

Felts:

Yeah.

Dran:

Basically.

Felts:

Essentially I guess by default I was sort of the incident commander uh, for a brief

time until uh, Sergeant SPARLING, acting lieutenant was on-scene able to gather

the information and then uh, take on the overall scene responsibility.

Dran:

Okay.

Felts:

Yes but that breezeway was, that was my scene, yes.

Dran:

Okay and who relieved you from the breezeway scene?

Felts:

That would later uh, quite a while later um, how much time, it might've been an

hour or longer. Uh, would've been uh, Sergeant SAWTELLE.

Okay and then what did, what did you...

Felts:

...and, and that was after detectives, everybody else had -

Dran:

Had already arrived or?

...don't blame you.

Uh, because of the length of time it was, we knew it was gonna take, I mean the, this scene essentially got locked down roughly 4:30, 4:45-ish in the afternoon. Uh, its midnight and to my knowledge uh, we still have that scene secured. It, it may have been released by now but uh, knowing what I know I know the scenes are gonna be locked down for quite a while so taking a break. I went back to the scene, relieved Sergeant SAWTELLE and then started making sure that the officers who were in the crime scene and secure or securing the crime scene, the perimeter of it. Um, we had to have officers on, several officers, it took seven essentially to secure it.

Dran:

The apart, the apartment scene?

Felts:

Yeah.

Dran:

Okay.

Felts:

Uh, the breezeway because we had both the main level where the primary incident was but then we had a second, an upper uh, breezeway essentially because of the stairways uh, that we had apartments that people could've come out of their apartments and then contaminated the scene.

Dran:

Sure.

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Felts:

Ву-

Dran:

From above?

Felts:

From above, yes thank you.

Dran:

Yeah, okay. Um, does, were there any other administrative type things that you

did um, that I haven't covered with you to this point?

Felts:

And I'm reviewing some notes that I took for myself.

Dran:

Sure.

Felts:

Uh, okay I had the officers check uh, apartments in the breezeway for any other

bullet strikes.

Dran:

Okay, did you find any?

Felts:

Um, did not find any.

Dran:

Okay.

Felts:

And then I also had an officer check the um, fencing and the parking lot to the south of where the actual scene was in case there were uh, bullet strikes that went through. There's a, in this breezeway to the south there is a cyclone fence.

Dran:

Um-hm.

Felts:

Approximately 30, 40 feet south of the, the where the actual shooting happened. Uh, beyond it maybe seven or eight feet is a, like a cedar fence and then beyond

that is a parking lot for another apartment complex.

Dran:

Okay.

Felts:

Uh, so I had an officer uh, it was MOORE or MOHL, M-O-H-L maybe.

Dran:

Okav.

Felts:

Check that but was unable, couldn't find any, any uh, strikes on the fencing and couldn't, didn't see any strikes in the parking lot to the, to the south of.

Dran:

Okay. And then you said you, after taking a, a break you, you'd gone back out to

relieve Acting Sergeant SAWTELLE.

Felts:

Correct.

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Dran:

Kind of did some more coordinating, if you will, at the scene and uh, eventually at some point you were summoned to respond back to here. Who released you to do

that? Was that detectives, was that your command, was?

Felts:

Alright, it's July 30th and the time is 11:31 PM. And we are at East Precinct in the

Captain's office. I am Mitch Hergert, a Detective with Portland. My number is

Yeah, and Union representative.

Ionesi:

Yep. The, uh, old Safeway.

Hergert:

Correct, yeah.

Ionesi:

Um, the way I understand it that's where I headed first 'cause that's where, uh, I thought the incident was looking at the CAD. Then I heard the update that the guy

had walked up to Burn, Burnside.

Hergert:

Burnside.

Ionesi:

My understanding, he was somewhere on the, uh, south intersection. Uh, so when I pulled up I came heading southbound on 122 and, uh, saw these cars at a stop sign. And I pulled in my patrol car in front of the, um, southbound lane to block those vehicles, um, because I knew there was, this guy might be in the street somewhere, I hadn't spotted him yet. And s-, as I got out of my car I actually saw him walking in front of my patrol car so I was the closest guy, uh, to him. And I saw him, uh, waving around an axe. That's when I kinda started backing up, um, getting behind my car and other units, um, started arriving as well.

Hergert:

Okay. So you arrived at the intersection y-, and again correct me if I summarize something wrong or repeat something.

Ionesi:

Um-hm.

Hergert:

That's not accurate. You blocked the traffic for southbound.

Ionesi:

Hergert:

And as you're doing that you see the subject over here. Um, obviously you see that he's waving an axe.

Ionesi:

It was, uh, from...

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Hergert: Can you describe that for me?

Ionesi: ...what I remember it was an axe, and the thing that stood out the most for me

with the axe, it had a green, like, a neon green handle on it.

Hergert: Neon green handle?

Ionesi: Yeah, that's what my eyes picked up first was that, um...

Hergert: Okay.

Ionesi: ...neon green color.

Hergert: And how big was the axe?

Ionesi: Um, it's, uh, I would say, consider it, um, when I think of axe I guess it's a, a long

axe, but his would be more of a hatchet size. Um, just a regular, standard hatchet

size.

Hergert: Like, if this paper is 8 by 11, like, 11 inches there, how, how close you think

our...

Ionesi: Um-

Hergert: ...hatchet would be with?

Ionesi: I-it had to be probably just a little over a foot and a half, or close to a f-, between a

foot and a foot and a half in length.

Hergert: So it was a pretty good size.

Ionesi: With a standard, uh, hatchet axe head size.

Hergert: And when you said you saw him and he was waving it around, w-what, what was

he doing with it?

Ionesi: He had it raised above his head. Um, and he was waving it above his head, um,

like he was getting ready to attack someone with it. Um, not usually the way

people carry hatchets, you know.

Hergert: And was he saying anything, or, um?

Ionesi: Uh, my adrenaline was, was kicking in pretty hard at that point and, um, I was

focused in on that axe and what he was doing. I remember him yelling, but I can't

remember what he was saying. Uh, just that...

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Hergert:

Ionesi: ...there was a lot of, a lot going on and I was concerned, you know, watching out

Hergert: Right. Do you recall how many people? I mean, you said there was vehicles that

you stopped?

Ionesi: There was, so I stopped-

Hergert: The people in the area, or?

Ionesi: I stopped the traffic over here because I was concerned for them. Um, and then I

> know there was another unit behind me, probably two or three more units in the intersection with officers um, close to their, their patrol cars. As well, I saw AR-

15s out, I saw, uh, less-lethals. Um, (unintelligible) -

Hergert: And how about non-police? Was there, was there civilians around?

Ionesi: Yes there was. Um, there was civilians on the sidewalk where this individual was

walking with the axe. Uh, I recall someone pulling out their cellphones, starting to tape. And there was people walking, uh, on southbound and northbound, uh, on the crosswalk. Due to the lanes being stopped they had a red light, so there were,

there was a lot of people in the area. It's a pretty busy MAX stop area.

Hergert: Did you recognize or see any response from the pedestrians that were

encountering him or getting near him?

Ionesi: Um, some of 'em, uh, started, you know, backing away from him, and a lot of

people were pulling out cellphones but I saw people were trying to, um, avoid him

or just stood in place where they were s-, were at.

Hergert: Okay. Do you recall what he was wearing or what he looked like?

Ionesi: Um, he had, uh, mostly black clothing on and I remember him having a backpack

on. And I think a hat, but I can't remember for sure.

Hergert: And do you remember what hand the hatchet was in?

Ionesi: When I saw him I remember the hatchet being in his right hand.

Okay. So when you see him, and just for purposes for the recording you were Hergert:

pointing to the north side of, of Burnside.

Ionesi: Yes.

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Hergert:

Um, facing south.

Ionesi:

Correct.

Hergert:

On 122. And he was coming from the north, approaching Burnside.

Ionesi:

Yes.

Hergert:

On the west curbside.

Ionesi:

Yes.

Hergert:

Okay. Um, so you get out and you immediately see him, hatchet.

Ionesi:

Um-hm.

Hergert:

You know this is the individual.

Ionesi:

Um-hm.

Hergert:

What do you say or do then? Or I guess continue there what you see and what.

Ionesi:

Um, I remember other officers starting to give commands. So my role I switched to, um, just getting ready to be hands on if necessary. Um, like I said to, there was already, uh,less-lethal operators there as well as AR-15 operators so I knew our lethal and less-lethal side were covered and I wanted to keep my hands available

for, uh, a hands on if we needed to...

Hergert: And I know-

Ionesi:

...have hands on him.

Hergert:

Okay. And I know you know this but, um, for my clarification is that because you saw people, officers with that or you heard officers say they have that? Or what

was your?

Ionesi:

I saw officers with AR-15s and less-lethal.

Hergert:

Okay. Alright. And what commands were you hearing given?

Ionesi:

Um, again with the adrenaline kicking in and probably some audio exclusion, all I

remember hearing was drop the, drop the axe, drop the axe.

Hergert:

Okay. Okay. Was, was he dropping the axe? When you heard that was there a

response, or what was his response?

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Ionesi:

What I remember, he started crossing, um, southbound on the west side, uh, crosswalk on Burnside. He started crossing and so there was two events. He, he got, uh, hit by less-lethal operators I remember I th-, at least two rounds going off from less-lethal. I can't remember if he dropped the axe before or after less-lethal was deployed. I just can't remember, or can't recall it right now.

Hergert: And where did that occur at?

Ionesi: Um, it probably occurred just after the intersection. So this is a minimart right

here, somewhere around this, this area on, close to the sidewalk.

Hergert: Okay, they're at the southwest corner of the intersection?

Ionesi: Correct.

Hergert: Alright. So he d-, I guess you can continue from where he walked across the street

and what was happening then.

Ionesi: Um, after he got hit w-, uh, with the less-lethal he took off running without a

hatchet in hand. He took off running southbound on the west side of the street,

and which, is this Ash right here? Um-

Hergert: I think that's Ankeny actually.

Kenney: Yes.

Ionesi: Or Ankeny.

Hergert: Yeah, Ash is right there. Ankeny is the first street south of Burnside I believe, and

I think Ash is the second street south of Burnside.

Ionesi: Okay. Um, so this is the comp-, this is this complex right here?

Hergert: Yes, I believe.

Ionesi: Right here?

Hergert: Yeah, photo three is a blow up of that...

Ionesi: Okay.

Hergert: ...right there.

Ionesi: So he took off running. Um, but before that incident let me backtrack a little bit.

Hergert: Okay, yeah.

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Ionesi:

When he's out here still being aggressive I went over to a Sergeant's car and opened up the trunk and pulled out our ballistic shield. Uh, I noticed there, uh, you know, we probably eventually will have to form a custody team and, um, I figured a ballistic shield would be a good tool to have to approach him. Um, because my understanding was he had the hatchet and a machete or some sort of knife on his person as well. So I grabbed the ballistic shield and then, um, I ran up with the rest of the, or most of the officers to provide that cover if needed 'cause we were away from our vehicles. Um, and, kind of, exposed out in the open, so.

Hergert: Um-hm.

In It is a state of the state

with the shield as well, running up, up, or southbound on, uh, 122. Still on the west side. Uh, he took off, uh, then westbound on Ash Street and I rounded the corner with the shield and saw, uh, officers running up towards this complex. I

was a little slower since I was running with a shield.

Hergert: Sure.

Ionesi: And, um, when I came up to this complex I saw a line of officers here, so I came in and stood on the east, east side right, uh, to the l-, if you're facing southbound I

was just, uh, right on the left side. I think there was a post somewhere around here. I hunkered over there with the shield, uh, to again provide cover, we were in an alleyway, for, for the officers, um, as soon as we needed to go up to take custody. A lot of shouting going on, commands being given. On top of that I had auditory exclusion, just adrenaline was still rushing really hard and, uh, I remember hearing, um, shots being fired, um, distinctive loud pops. I didn't count 'em, I can't remember. And then I saw our, uh, suspect, uh, fall from the shots. And then we formed a quick custody team. I went up first with my ballistic shield and with, um, less-lethal and lethal. And then, uh, hands on guys, we went up. I put my shield down and then we rolled him over. I took out my handcuffs and with the assistance of of-, other officers I handcuffed him. And then, uh, immediately took out, uh, my trauma shears and started, um, cutting off clothes, uh, his backpack. He had on a, a Nike weightlifting belt, which is a little thick so I cut through that, cut through the t-shirt, cut through the straps. Um, cut the pants off, snipped off, uh, the underwear. And the reason I did that, I've, I formerly was an EMT, still licensed in the state as an EMT and so I knew this was a trauma and we needed to examine everywhere he could've been shot or hit, uh, to plug up any, um, wounds. So that's the reason I, um, cut all the clothes off him. We did locate some, um, entry points, or what I believe were entry or exit, I wasn't sure. But all, I saw him bleeding so we put on chest seals, which are really sticky and do great at, um, occluding holes. Found that on his back and we were, rolled him over, found some more, um, entry wounds on his shoulders I believe, patched those up too. Checked the pulse, saw that the pulse was starting to go away

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slowly. And at that point we decided to, uh, also tourniquets were applied, one of my tourni-, tourniquet off my equipment was applied on his arms 'cause his arms were hit. Um, pulse was starting to go away. Um, we decided to take the handcuffs off to begin CPR. So we removed my set of handcuffs and, uh, I started on CPR. Um, while doing CPR I asked for them to prepare two, uh, uh, get a nasal, an NP, a no-, nasal pharyngeal airway, it's just a little green thing you can stick down the nose to help keep the airway open. I had someone take over CPR from my end and then I inserted, um, an airway, an, uh, NPA in both nostrils. And, uh, CPR was still going on. And I continued looking for wounds on him and found an additional, uh, what looked like a wound on his shoulder. Patched that up. Patched up his arm, which, uh, looked to have been blown open by maybe a st-a stray round. Um.

Hergert:

Okay.

Ionesi:

Put gauze on that and wrapped it up with a Israeli bandage.

Hergert:

You sound like applied a lot of medical.

Ionesi:

Hmm?

Hergert:

It sounds like you applied a lot of medical.

Ionesi:

I, I pretty much took over the medical side.

Hergert:

Well, given your -

Ionesi:

Yeah.

Hergert:

Your (unintelligible).

Ionesi:

Yep. I heard, uh, the Of-, they called for Code Three medical to come straight in

and I took over care of him until medical...

Hergert:

Copy.

Ionesi:

...could get there.

Hergert:

Good. Let me, uh, just ask you a question for more clarification. You said that

when he was running.

Ionesi:

Um-hm.

Hergert:

Um, that you had heard that, I think you actually said hatchet, axe, or hatchet,

machete, and knife.

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Ionesi:

Um-hm.

Hergert:

Um, did you hear or did you think that he, he possibly could've had all three or a

combination of those weapons?

Ionesi:

Uh, he had-

Hergert:

Or is that-

Ionesi:

He had some black clothing on and a backpack, so I don't know what he could've

had on his person. Uh, h-

Hergert:

Well I guess what I'm asking is, is, and I'll be real clear, when you heard knife on

the radio...

Ionesi:

Uh-huh.

Hergert:

...or say a hatchet, or hatchet and machete, were you thinking that was all one

item? Or were you thinking that potentially...

Ionesi:

Um, I was thinking of separate.

Hergert:

...there was mul-, okay.

Ionesi:

Yeah, separate items.

Hergert:

Alright. And you had seen the hatchet.

Ionesi:

I've seen, yeah that's the one. The weapon I did see.

Hergert:

Did you ever see a machete or see a knife?

Ionesi:

Uh, I did not see him pulling any of that stuff out.

Hergert:

Okay. Did you ever see one at any time during, from start to finish see a knife or

machete? Anything separate than the hatchet that you described?

Ionesi:

No. When I was, uh, holding the shield in this area I had the, the, the shield up, keeping an eye on him, um, and my fellow officers as well, so I wasn't really watching his hands, uh, per se. I couldn't have gone for a weapon either way

because I was, both of my hands were occupied on...

Hergert:

Right.

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Ionesi:

...on the shield, ready to go up if I needed to. So, uh, my attention was distracted, or split between my fellow officers and the suspect. On top of all the adrenaline

kicking in, so.

Hergert: Correct, right.

Ionesi: I don't recall...

Hergert: Okay.

Ionesi: ...seeing that.

Hergert: And I think you mentioned, and again correct me if I'm not accurately stating it,

is when you arrived with the shield there was a line of officers across, you

approached on the east side of this alcove?

Ionesi: Yes, yep.

Hergert: And you describe, kind of, hearing lots of screaming or lots of, lots of, uh,

loudness.

Ionesi: A lot of commands being...

Hergert: Commands.

Ionesi: ...given, yeah.

Hergert: Um, was that screaming or c-, was it commands from the officers and was he?

Ionesi: Commands from the officers, um, is what I kind of remember hearing.

Hergert: Do you remember what those commands were, any of 'em?

Ionesi: I, I don't. I mean.

Hergert: Do you remember any statements from him that he was saying or...

Ionesi: I can't remember.

Hergert: ...screaming or doing?

Ionesi: I, I.

Hergert: Okay.

Ionesi: If there was I didn't, I didn't hear it.

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Hergert:

And then you mentioned about, um, uh, trauma shears and gauze...

Ionesi:

Um-hm.

Hergert:

...and, and all that stuff. Is that stuff that you routinely, uh, do you carry that with

you all the time? Is that-

Ionesi:

Um, we carry IFAK kits in our patrol cars, uh, that have all those medical

supplies. I carry my own set of trauma shears, o-or raptor shears.

Hergert:

Does that...

Ionesi:

(Unintelligible) -

Hergert:

...stuff come in from your own?

Ionesi:

Uh, the only...

Hergert:

Are your person-

Ionesi:

...thing that I used from my end was my own, uh, sh-, my own shears. They're,

can cut through very thick, uh, stuff. Even metal if needed, so.

Hergert:

How did you get access to the, all the other stuff? The medical stuff you provided.

Ionesi:

Um, I was calling for someone to go grab a, uh, a-a kit.

Hergert:

Okay. So somebody brought that to you...

Ionesi:

Yep.

Hergert:

...immediately after the shooting?

Ionesi:

Yeah.

Hergert:

And, okay. Do you recall, um, I know you stated when you first arrived at the area

of 122 and Burn, you saw him waving the hatchet.

Ionesi:

Um-hm.

Hergert:

Um, around and, um, do you recall anything else that, that he was doing with the

hatchet? Um any other?

Ionesi:

Hergert:

Other, I remember him...

Anything that stuck out?

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Ionesi:

...waving it around. At one point I did turn my, uh, my back to him to open up the

Sergeant's, uh.

Hergert:

Um-hm.

Ionesi:

Car to, there was enough officers, he had gone up, up the street at that point and the Sergeant's car was right in the middle of the intersection. And, um, so I did lose sight of what was happening while I was pulling out that shield. Um, but I, I do remember the hatchet dropping, or him putting down the hatchet. And I did remember seeing two, uh, less-lethal rounds being fired w-, uh, from two different officers.

Hergert:

Do you know who those officers were?

(Long pause)

Ionesi:

I th-, I think, like, uh, I can't make a solid statement on, and if I remember exactly who I'm thinking of because there were a couple of operators that had less-lethal

capabilities now and I want to make sure I'm not...

Hergert:

That's fine.

Ionesi:

...thinking of him and saying...

Hergert:

Sure.

Ionesi:

... I think he's the one 'cause he had, so I-I'm not sure. I just remember...

Hergert:

Okay.

Ionesi:

...two separate ones firing.

Hergert:

And it was, when you saw two separate, it wasn't one person and then two

rounds, it was?

Ionesi:

One person fired and then another person fired.

Hergert:

That w-, okay.

Ionesi:

Um, a little, a little bit later.

Hergert:

And do you know how much later as far as time? What's your?

Ionesi:

I remember the first one going off, I want to say less, less than a minute the

second one was fired.

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Hergert:

Okay. And did you see, um, did you have visual of the subject at that point wh-

Ionesi:

Yeah, I saw him get hit. I remember him flinching.

Hergert:

On the f-Ionesi: He looked like he got hit in the legs.

Hergert: On the first shot or second one?

Ionesi: Uh, I remember him, seeing him get shot in the first one and him flinching. The

second one's a little hazy. I can't remember it too clearly.

Hergert: And do you remember what he was doing just before?

Oh, before he got shot? Ionesi:

Hergert: With the, uh, and w-, and when I, and when I say less-lethal, and just so we're

clear now, we're...

Ionesi: Oh.

Hergert: ...talking the 40 millimeter?

Ionesi: Yeah. Yep.

Hergert: Okay.

40 millimeter. Ionesi:

Hergert: Okay.

Ionesi:

Okay, alright. Hergert:

So-

Ionesi: So before he got impacted by the 40 millimeter?

Hergert: For the first one, correct.

Ionesi: Oh, what I remember, h-he was, kind of, s-sidestep, he was-, he was facing us. I

> remember that, so he was facing our direction. Um, he was, kind of, sidestepping a little bit. Not really doing too much. Though what I remember is after he got hit,

that's when he took off on a full on sprint.

Hergert: Was he still holding the hatchet?

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Ionesi:

No, he had dropped it.

Hergert:

And he dropped it after he got shot or before? Do you (unintelligible) -

Ionesi:

And that's the part I ca-, I can't remember.

Hergert:

Okay. And then when did you hear the second 40 millimeter less-lethal?

Ionesi:

About a minute after the first. But again I, I just can't recall.

Hergert:

And was that after he ran or before he ran?

Ionesi:

He, he didn't run after he was hit with the second one.

Hergert:

Okay.

Ionesi:

From what I remember.

(Pause)

Ionesi:

Or, what I mean by running, I mean a full on sprint.

Hergert:

So he was hit first time. Some, at some point he dropped the hatchet.

Ionesi:

Um-hm.

Hergert:

Ran, and there was a second encounter with him?

Ionesi:

He w-

Hergert:

And correct me if I'm wrong on that.

Ionesi:

He was, he was hit with the first one. Um, he started, he started moving away from our direction. I wouldn't say in a, in a s-, a sprint. As soon as he got hit with the second one, uh, impacted with the second munition he, that's when I

remember him taking off.

Hergert: Okay.

Ionesi:

I can't remember in that time slot.

Hergert:

Right.

Ionesi:

I can't remember when he had dropped the hatchet.

Hergert:

But at some point...

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Ionesi:

I g-, I remember him...

Hergert:

...you remember that?

Ionesi:

...dropping it, I just.

Hergert:

Okay.

Ionesi:

It's so, it's, kind of, hazy right now. I can't remember if it was before or after or

in the middle. So.

Hergert:

Do you recall what happened to the hatchet after he dropped it?

Ionesi:

I took off running with, to catch up to him so I'm not sure. It should be s-

somewhere between, um, 122 and Burn. And, um, probably clo-, um, just before

Ash, so between here and here.

Hergert: Okay. (Unintelligible) -

Ionesi:

Somewhere along here should be-

Hergert:

Alright. Going to Ankeny.

Ionesi:

In that block.

Hergert:

Okay.

Moran:

Uh, just-

Hergert:

Do you have any questions, follow up?

Moran:

Y-yeah, if you don't mind just a couple questions...

Ionesi:

Sure.

Moran:

...SAM. So i-in, in, uh, when I called for a backup unit I'm gonna give a Code,

you know, Code One, Code Two.

Ionesi:

Um-hm.

Moran:

And you said you were calling for more, they were calling for more cars.

Ionesi:

Um-hm.

Moran:

Do you guys also use a code response? Or is it just, kind of...

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Ionesi:

Yes.

Moran:

...like, you hear it in somebody's voice, or?

Ionesi:

Um, when I decided to respond I started coming at first Code Two, which is just

Moran:

Yeah.

Ionesi:

Um, as soon as I heard them ask for more cars I stepped it up to Code Three.

Moran:

Okay.

Ionesi:

Uh, to get there.

Moran:

Okay. Um, and then, um, was he ever, uh, close enough to a pedestrian that if he would've reached out with a hatchet or swung it in a manner he could've?

He could've s-, he could've struck, uh, uh, plenty of people in that block.

Ionesi: Moran:

A bystander...

Ionesi:

He was, he was in-

Moran:

...or a pedestrian?

Ionesi:

Moran:

He was within that kinda distance of 'em?

Ionesi:

Yes. Yeah?

Moran:

Ionesi:

Yeah.

Moran:

Okay. Uh, and then do you remember, uh, w-when we did get down to, we'd call

it an alleyway, a breezeway, uh, wh-

Ionesi:

Yeah, the-

Moran:

What do you call it?

Ionesi:

Whatever this is. I think it's a breezeway.

Moran:

Okay.

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Ionesi:

I, you know, I call it an alleyway, but.

Moran:

Do you remember, was he making any kind of movements at the, i-in that

alleyway? Or do you remember his movements at all?

Ionesi:

All I remember is him standing there. He hadn't moved, uh, from where I was to

where he was, I want to say it, maybe fif-, bet-, less than 15 feet-ish.

Moran:

Okay.

Ionesi:

Somewhere along that, um.

Moran:

Okav.

Ionesi:

That distance. Again, my attention was s-, was split between him, my o-, the

officers and the shield I was holding.

Moran:

Yeah.

Ionesi:

And so I, the, my reasoning was there's plenty of officers to watch his

movements, I'm gonna concentrate on holding, on being ready with my shield.

Moran:

Um-hm.

Ionesi:

To go up if needed.

Moran:

Okay.

Ionesi:

Or to block if, you know, if he charges or anything, so.

Moran:

Okay. Um, and I think you might've mentioned his clothing already. And er-,

anything else you remember about what he was wearing, or?

Ionesi:

Um-

Moran:

What he had on?

Ionesi:

I remember he had, I think two pairs, when I started cutting his stuff off I think he

had on two layers of t-shirts. He w-, he had, like, a t-shirt and some sort of light jacket. Um. But I do remember cutting through multiple layers of clothing.

Moran:

Okay.

Ionesi:

Yeah.

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Moran: Alright. Uh, do you remember if in-, there was anybody else in, uh, any civilians

or anything around that, uh, little breezeway or anything when you guys were

down there? Anyone?

Ionesi: I noticed af-after the fact.

Moran: After the fact?

Ionesi: After the sh-, after the shots were fired.

Moran: That you noticed w-, uh, what did you notice?

Ionesi: There was people standing, um, in the, uh, so there's this breezeway and then

there's, the second floor has this balcony sort of thing to get to the other units, and

I remember people coming out of their, uh, units to see what had happened.

Moran: Okay.

Ionesi: After the fact. But from my position I, I don't remember seeing anyone out.

Moran: Okay.

Ionesi: The back, I remember looking at the backstop, um, behind him and I think it's just

a fence there. I didn't see anyone behind him. It was just him.

Moran: Okay. Alright. Um, I didn't think I, I don't think I have anything else.

Kenney: I do, um, so SAM you're a newer officer correct?

Ionesi: Uh, less than two years on, yeah.

Kenney: Yeah, okay. And, um, would you describe th-, I, you described, uh, like, auditory

exclusion and adrenaline and stuff, which is all things we discussed in training, but is this one of the more traumatic events you've been involved in as a Police

officer?

Ionesi: I would say out of my short career this is the number one most traumatic incident

I've been to.

Kenney: Okay. And the most dynamic, the mo-, I mean...

Ionesi: Yes.

Kenney: ...like, I g-, I guess can you, kind of, give some context to-

Ionesi: I have, I have nothing to compare this incident to. This is by far the most intense.

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Kenney: And w-, it was like that from moment number one, not just the aftermath?

Ionesi: It was-

Kenney: Or, or, or at what point did it start to ramp up where you're, like, this is uncharted

territory?

Ionesi: Uh, when I s-, got out of my vehicle and I realized my proximity to him and

seeing the axe in his hand I realized he's not making any attempts to put it down or comply to commands. In fact he kept on crossing the street towards officers, uh, with, with that axe still in hand. So that's when I realized, um, he's, he's not

gonna be willing to, um, listen and this might turn into a deal.

Kenney: Okay. And at what point were you thinking that, um, deadly force might end up

being an option o-on, th-that it's gonna have to be used in this? I mean, are you,

when you're-

Ionesi: Th-the f-

Kenney: The hatc-, the hatchet? I mean, like, when you first showed up?

Ionesi: The first, the first time I thought we were gonna have a, a shooting in the middle

of the intersection due to his noncompliance and his proximity to, um, the public where he could've taken a hostage or swung at somebody, and I was really concerned. There was a lot of people out, a lot of potential crossfire, you know? So all this stuff is rushing through my mind, and my training just reminded me let's, let's get a shield out, like, you know, we're, kind of, out, exposed right now. And so that was my, uh, that's what I focused on, was I relied back on my training. You know, I saw the other officers there, we have all our bases covered with lethal, non-lethal, o-or less-lethal and lethal. I figured w-what job can I do? Let me either be hands on, I'll grab that shield and just be ready for whatever's

onna happen.

Kenney: And we're trained to try and use, um, they're called de-escalation techniques.

Ionesi: Um-hm.

Kenney: As part of our policy. Um, and would y-, uh, in this are w-, did you feel like

officers are trying to give him some distance? People are trying to give him an o-,

you know, an avenue to escape? But, I mean...

Ionesi: Yep.

Kenney: ... obviously y-, you have to balance that, and I guess you kinda explained, you

have to balance that with, you have p-, obviously it's...

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Ionesi:

Yep.

Kenney:

...the public that's in danger.

Ionesi:

Yep.

Kenney:

And you gotta, kinda, put yourself in a position where you're between the threat

and the public.

Ionesi:

Yep.

Kenney:

Can you, kind of, explain that, that whole thing?

Yes. So, um, like I said earlier this, um, MAX stop is extremely busy. Uh, this is a very busy intersection, um, 122 and Burnside. And, uh, I was very concerned for the amount of people that were out, and this guy's, um, out there waving an axe. We didn't cut off, we didn't surround him in the sense of his, he had egress, he could've gone up, uh, westbound on Burnside. Uh, officers were mainly in the intersection right around here. No one was blocking him, blocking him off in particularly. And so, uh, we, part of de-escalation is, kind of, keeping a distance and giving him a chance to comply. And we kept plenty of distance, uh, between him. And so we wanted to give him an opportunity to, uh, comply to our demands. Another de-escalation technique we have is having multiple officers on, uh, in the area. And so we had, uh, plenty of man power that had come in, a lot of officers came in Code Three. So we had the man power, um, available for whatever might've happened. So we tried to get him time, we gave him distance, and, uh, we gave him I think every opportunity to, to comply with our commands, but we're, we were balancing public safety concerns on top of everything else. Moran:

Do you remember what the commands were that were being given to him?

Ionesi:

All I remember was, um, and not, not word for word, but something along the line

of to drop the axe or drop the hatchet, drop the weapon.

Moran:

Okay.

Hergert:

And SAM, I know we talked about this before the recording started, as far as you

giving a statement to Detectives.

Ionesi:

Um-hm.

Hergert:

I don't know if I actually covered that at the beginning like I wanted to, but this

statement is in lieu of a report that you're...

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Ionesi:

Correct.

Hergert:

...giving according to Bureau directives.

Ionesi:

Um-hm.

Kenney:

Hmm.

Hergert:

I know we covered that before, I just want to make sure we go on record with that

too. So I appreciate that, it's. Any other details-

Moran:

Yeah, is there anything else that you think.

Hergert:

We haven't covered or anything you want to elaborate on? That sticks out.

Ionesi:

Um, I wish I had a clearer picture, but I just, this is the best I can recall due to the t-, the tawl-, totality of the circumstances, everything that happened. I'm trying to remember, and this is the clearest recollection that I have so far of the incident, so.

Hergert:

Okay. Yeah. Alright. Then if there's nothing else, we'll go off the record. The

time is 12:04, AM now. And I'll stop the recording.

Reynolds: This is Detective Ken Reynolds, I'm with my partner Matt Moran with the, the

Oregon State Police, DPSST 53146. Officer Habkirk, DPSST 29192, Officer uh, DEVONA ZENTNER, DPSST 41483. We're in the East Precinct uh, detective's office discussing the events of today for case number 19-258996. Uh, it's approximately 10:04pm and you understand this conversation is being recorded?

We're in the East Precinct uh, detective's office discussing the events of today for case number 19-258996. Uh, it's approximately 10:04pm and you understand this conversation is being recorded?

Reynolds: Mr. Habkirk you understand this conversation is being recorded?

Habkirk:

Reynolds: Okay, alright let's get started Officer ZENTNER. What district were you

working today?

Zentner: 902.

Reynolds: Okay and what time did your shift start?

Zentner: 10:00am.

Reynolds: And how did your shift go?

Zentner: Uh, it was relatively quiet but fairly steady also.

Reynolds: Okay, kind of let's talk about a, a call that came out towards the end of your shift.

What can you tell me about that?

Zentner: Uh, I was dispatched to the Safeway at 122nd and just north of Burnside on a

> disturbance call. It sounded like a person had pulled some kind of machete or an axe, I heard both versions. Um, pulled it on the Safeway security guard and was

menacing him.

Reynolds: Okay and were you dispatched as the primary officer?

Zentner: I think I was because she originally dispatched two day shifters.

Reynolds: Okay.

Zentner: And I said um, let, let one of those people go and send me and so I think that, that

she had switched me to primary at that point.

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Reynolds:

Okay and where were you when you first got dispatched to the call?

Zentner:

Uh, I believe I was parked at 45th and Stark.

Reynolds:

Okay. And when you get to the dispatch call location what do you see?

Zentner:

Um, I approached from the south and I was heading northbound and I could the front of the Safeway to my left and I was, had, had read the description of the subject wearing black clothing and a camo backpack and I saw him standing outside of the Safeway near the bus stop on 122nd on the we- on the east side of

the Safeway.

Okay so I have a map right here and I've labeled, 'cause this is, 'cause we're

looking down.

Zentner:

Yeah.

Reynolds:

I took the liberty to label the Safeway.

So we're not trying to figure out where we're going. Can you -

Draw on the map where you saw him when you first arrived?

Yeah, so I'm taking it that this north? This way is north right?

I watched him for a minute and it seemed like he was gathering some stuff to maybe leave. He was um, moving really quickly grabbing like some coats and maybe a blanket and I saw he had on the camo backpack and he was just, you know doing the tweaker Thai-chi stuff just like wailing his arms and acting goofy.

So I figured that was gonna be our person.

Reynolds:

Okay did you, could you hea- how far away were, were you from him when you

first saw him?

Zentner:

When I parked I s-pi- purposely stayed back from him so it was probably 20 or 30

feet.

Okay.

Reynolds:

Away from him.

Reynolds:

Could you hear what he was saying?

Zentner:

No not at that point.

Reynolds:

Okay.

Hm-um.

Reynolds:

And so what happened from there?

Zentner:

Um, SANTOS had followed me around, we both kind of u-turned in front of the building so he was directly behind me so I knew I had him with me and uh, TOMMY CHONG was talking to the security guard it sounded like. Trying to

determine if we had PC for a crime or what, something like that so -

Did, did you see Officer CHONG talking to the security guard?

Zentner:

No I didn't.

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Reynolds:

Okay.

Zentner:

: No.

Reynolds:

Did he voice that over the radio that?

Zentner:

Yeah. Okav.

Reynolds:

Zentner:

Yeah he did. He did so um, me and SANTOS got out of our cars and um, I kind of stood in my, my uh, door frame for a second and I was like hey, dude are you okay? Like just trying to um, make contact with the guy and he was just like, just yelling, I could tell it wasn't like saying something was wrong or anything specific, it was just like words. Just like crazy tweaker words. Um, and so he wasn't making any sense. So he was just acting so erratically that I didn't feel super safe approaching him so I told SANTOS let's go behind our cars and get on the sidewalk and just keep an eye on him for a minute until we see what's gonna happen and we find out if, if we have PC for him or if he's just gonna run away or like, you know let's just try to observe him for a minute.

Reynolds:

Um-hm.

Zentner:

But not sit in our cars. So we did that and he, he continued to yell just random. I, I don't' remember a specific thing that he said but random things that didn't seem to make any sense. And it was really hard to hear anyway because it was really trafficky there and it was like 4:20 so it was rush hour at that point. So I couldn't make out anything he was saying but um, I asked him to sit down. I yelled to him, hey will you sit down and talk to a minute and tell me what's going on or what's wrong with you and he um, he was just dangling these keys and I was like, I tried to ask him like what, what's up with the keys and he didn't answer me specifically. And then he put the keys away and he pulled out, had like a, it looked like an ID card of some kind and was trying to like badge me or show me his ID and apparently that's what he was doing to the security guard. He told them that he was some kind of law enforcement with a badge or with the ID card so I think that was the same thing.

So um, so he did that and then at that point um, TOMMY came, I, I hadn't seen the machete or axe thing. I guess I'll, I'll call it an axe 'cause it was an axe. A machete is like a bladed thing, right, yeah. So it was an axe. So I hadn't see the axe, I didn't know where it was but I'd heard he had one and a knife. So I was a little bit cautious about that but TOMMY came over so we were all three kind of facing him on the sidewalk.

Reynolds:

Okay and where...

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Zentner:

...he was still at the bus stop area right there.

Reynolds:

So were you, where were you? Can you draw like a circle of where you guys

Zentner:

I was probably just here-ish.

Reynolds:

So like -

Zentner:

Not in the street but up against where those trees are.

Reynolds:

Right, okay so on that, by the trees.

Zentner:

Yeah, um-hm.

Yeah.

Okay.

Reynolds:

I'm just gonna make that a little darker so I can see it.

Yeah. So us three were in a line just trying to be like, hey what's your problem

dude, why you, why you going on like this? And um, TOMMY asked him to sit down too and he was just like uh, not, not responding to our questions or our

statements with anything that made any kind of sense.

Could you communicate at all with him?

I mean we tried.

But he wasn't, like he...

what's wrong, he would just like – was yelling words.

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Reynolds: Were they, so words that didn't go together or just, or things that you couldn't

understand? Like, you know like babble?

Zentner: Some, some of both.

Reynolds: Okay.

Zentner: Some of both, yeah. Um, so at one point um, he was just square on facing us. He

turned around and faced us and then I could see that he had like that um, hatchet handle sticking out of his pants. So I told TOMMY, I was like hey he's got that hatchet and TOMMY yells to guy, hey we see you have a hat-have a hatchet, don't pull it out or I'll be forced, used, use force against you or whatever. He did a little force warning. So um, the guy um, of course immediately pulls out the hatchet right after TOMMY said that we saw a hatchet. And then he, he holds that for a second and then he turns around to start walking away and as he walks away he holds it above his head a couple and swings it down below a couple times and then he faces us and walks backwards away, or walks backwards but still facing us and then he walks with his back away from us. Like just kind of doing circles as he walks away to the south on that same sidewalk.

Reynolds: Okay are there people around?

Zentner: Yeah there's a ton of people around. There's a lot of people around. A lot of

traffic, a lot of people. So I was, I took lethal cover, TOMMY had his bean gu-

beanbag gun out and SANTOS had his taser out.

Reynolds: Okay.

Zentner: And so we just kind of, at that point we were just following him, we weren't sure

what he was gonna do, we weren't sure what, I didn't know if there was PC for anything yet but I assumed since the security guard had said that he was menacing him with an axe that we had PC for menacing. But TOMMY never specifically told me that. So we were just trying to keep him corralled and try to talk him into dropping the thing which I thought he was gonna. I didn't, there was no indication that he was gonna but um – so he did, he, he didn't drop it yet. Um, we

just kept following him. We went, jeez I don't even know how many blocks.

Four blocks probably.

Um, and at one point a vehicle pulled up that was headed eastbound um, and he approached the driver's door and so I got on the radio and I said it looked like he's gonna try to get into this car but he just kind of knocked on the window and talked to the driver though the window and then the driver pulled away. So he

didn't, I don't think he tried to get in the car.

Reynolds: Did, where, where was the axe at this point?

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Zentner:

He was holding it.

Reynolds:

Okav.

Zentner:

Yeah he had it in his hand. He still had it. Um, so then I asked, I think that was the point where I asked for more cars and a lot, a lot of people were coming. A lot of people were coming from the south to the north.

Reynolds:

Um-hm.

Zentner:

So I could see that. I saw, I think it was BIGONI that was one of the first people that was, that came from the south and I could see him um, see that he was in the line of fire and so then he decided to go back to the, to the east and then come out back behind us I think is what he did.

And then um, at some point right there and somebody, like two or three other officers came and they, they came from the south, got out as a pod, approached him. Somebody had a beanbag in that group and I think it was um, BIANCHINI. Ended up bean bagging him because I could hear the, the shot and then him doing the little dance in the street. I thought he was gonna fall down and stay down but he didn't. He fell down and dropped the axe there. But then he popped back up and started continuing again southbound. So then I had the axe at my feet and I was like trying to decide should I follow with my people or should I stay here with the axe? There were tons of people around so the same reason I didn't shoot was the same reason I didn't leave the axe there because there's so many citizens.

Reynolds:

Um-hm.

Zentner:

You know like it was just, there, there were just way too many people out there for um, for me to have a shot when it seemed like maybe it was a possibility. Um, there were just a lot of citizens on the sidewalk coming and going both ways and some of them, I mean he was holding that axe sometimes up and something down. And there were citizens five or 10 feet in front of him that didn't know he was right behind them. So it was a pretty dangerous situation.

Um, so anyway he got bean bagged, fell down, popped back up, he left the axe. I stayed with the axe. I picked it up initially because I thought I was just gonna pick it up and keep walking with my pod but then I decided that I can't really um, I should probably put it back down. So I put it back down although I moved it to the right a little bit because traffic was still coming, it hadn't been stopped.

Reynolds:

Okay.

Zentner:

So I didn't want it to get run over.

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Reynolds: So do you know about roughly, roughly where, where that was?

Zentner: Um -

Reynolds: If this is, so here's the uh, just for reference this is the gas station right here. Um,

and then -

Zentner: So the Safeway isn't on this?

Reynolds: And this is Ankeny right there. So yeah the Safe-Safeway is up, it's gonna be –

we had to, and we had to take out some blocks or else we would've just had a

really -

Zentner: Yeah.

Reynolds: Either too big of a map.

Zentner: It was a huge area.

Reynolds: Yeah.

Zentner: So you're asking where did he?

Reynolds: Yeah roughly and if you can't remember it that's – that's okay 'cause it...

Zentner: ... yeah it was basically right next to the 76.

Reynolds: Okay, so and this is the 76 up here?

That followed and as, as he went west down, I learned it was Ash, he went west

down Ash. Um, I lost sight of him. But I did hear the shots.

Shortly thereafter.

Reynolds:

Okay um, did you see him with any other weapons?

Zentner:

I didn't.

Reynolds:

Okay.

Zentner:

I heard he had a knife but I never saw it.

Reynolds:

How did you hear other?

Zentner:

That was what the dispatcher said.

Reynolds:

Okay.

Zentner:

And I think I said it too on the radio. He, he dropped the axe but supposedly he

still has a knife.

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Reynolds: Okay. Could you describe the axe?

Zentner: Um, it was a metal axe with a head about three or four inches long. There was a

black metal um, looked sharp and some kind of plastic. I think it was yellow, a

plastic yellow handle.

Reynolds: Okay and you stayed with it right?

Zentner: Yup

Reynolds: Until you were relieved?

Zentner: Yeah

Reynolds: Okay. And you saw him drop that?

Zentner: Yeah, um-hm.

Reynolds: So could we talk we little bit more about his demeanor? What was his demeanor

towards officers versus civilians versus -

very angry.

think you kind of covered it right there but can you help me understand that a little bit more about what led you to believe that there was no, you, you know

what I mean? Like there was -

Zentner: Yeah, well he, I know he heard our commands to drop it.

Zentner: And we were close enough several times.

Zentner: For him to, for us to speak and him to react. Although he wasn't answering our

questions or doing the things we were telling him to so -

The Oregon State Police (OSP) Forensic Services Division (FSD) provides an important link between collection and court presentation of such evidence. It sometimes happens, however, that materials submitted to the laboratory prove inadequate for proper analysis or that improper collection or packaging methods destroy valuable evidence.

A member of the Criminal Justice System may not know the proper way to collect and preserve evidence in all situations he/she may encounter. In addition, they may not in every case understand what the various laboratory methods may involve or why some seemingly "irrelevant" piece of evidence should require such careful handling. Therefore, the FSD reserves the right to select the appropriate methods for analysis. It also reserves the right to transfer evidence between the laboratories of the Division to best be able to service the request.

Because the laws and legal precedents concerning the collection of physical evidence are subject to change, it is impossible to give specific up-to-date information on acceptable procedures. It is, however, of utmost importance that great care be taken to use only approved methods when obtaining evidence of any kind. Therefore, it is imperative that during an investigation a close liaison is maintained between the District Attorney's Office, the Oregon State Police Forensic Laboratory and those persons responsible for the collection of physical evidence.

Firearms and IBIS

When weapons are test fired in the Oregon State Police Forensic laboratories, eligible Integrated Ballistics Identification System (IBIS) cartridge casings will be automatically forwarded to the Portland Metro Laboratory for entry into the IBIS system.

*** SHARPS ***

Syringes, razors, and other sharp objects ("sharps") will not be accepted unless the District Attorney's Office has given notice of their intent to prosecute the case. All sharp objects will be separated from other evidence that requires analysis.

Approved sharp objects that are submitted for analysis must be packaged in such a manner as to protect personnel during handling. The packaging must be protective enough to ensure *no* possibility of being injured or punctured. Commercially manufactured puncture-proof ("sharps") containers are available for purchase. Contact your local laboratory for information. The sharps container should be placed in a plastic evidence bag so it can be visually examined to ensure it is properly packaged.

*** BIOHAZARDS ***

Any biological fluids, items removed from a body orifice as well as syringe contents should be labeled with a "BIOHAZARD" label.

Hergert:

Okay. So what route did you take to get to the location?

Santos:

Um, I just went north until I hit, uh, Division, then I went west until I hit 122nd.

Then I went north until I hit the Safeway.

Hergert:

Okay. Alright, so I want you to continue with, you're hearing information from

dispatch.

Santos:

Um-hm. Yeah, um, and as I'm a-, uh, going up 122nd towards the Safeway, um, the car in front of me, um, uh, was, I believe her name was ZENTNER, um, Officer ZENTNER, um, she goes over the radio, says hey I think I see the guy right over here on the sidewalk. Um, so we both anchor it, get out of the car, um, and start talking with the guy. We see that he is, uh, you know, he's been shouting the entire time so when we get out of the car he's still shouting. We're trying to calm him down. We see that he has a axe in his waistband, like, a re-, like, shoved in his belt, like, all, the whole thing is exposed, it's just hanging from his belt. And, uh, we say hey we see the axe, don't reach for it. He's, uh, shouting at us a whole bunch of incoherent things. Um, I'm not even too sure what he was saying, but we're giving him, uh, like, force warnings, hey, uh, don't reach for that axe, you might get tased. Um, I had my Taser out. Um, and, uh, next thing he, you know, takes out the axe and then starts waving it around. Um, at this point CHONG comes up, uh, TOMMY CHONG and, uh, GREG. Uh, I have my Taser out, CHONG has less-lethal, um, and ZENTNER and GREG both have their guns out and were, you know, giving him commands to drop the axe. Um, giving him force warnings, like, hey don't, you know, drop the axe or you might get tased, you might get hit with the less-lethal, all that. Um, and he starts walking away from us southbound on the sidewalk.

Hergert:

Okay.

Santos:

Um-hm.

Hergert:

Um, is, I just want you to say a little bit about that, so-

Santos:

Okay.

Hergert:

This is the map here and it shows 122 and...

Santos:

Um-hm.

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Confidential Taped Statement Transcription Case # 19-258996

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Hergert:

...Glisan. And when you said you, and Officer ZENTNER?

Santos:

I think that's, I'm not too-

Hergert:

Okay.

Santos:

I just met her, so...

Hergert:

When you arrived.

Santos:

...I think her name is ZENTNER.

Hergert:

W-where out here did you guys arrive where you first encountered, where,

where...

Santos:

Oh, right...

Hergert:

...you saw him.

Santos:

...near this bus stop.

Hergert:

You can you mark it if you want.

Santos:

Yeah, it was, like, right-

Hergert:

Just kinda put where you saw him.

Santos:

Right at the corner near this bus stop.

Hergert:

Okay, so-

Santos:

It was under an overhang. I-, there was shade. I don't know if it was just 'cause

the shade from the sun.

Hergert:

Um-hm.

Santos:

On the building, or, but it was...

Hergert:

Alright.

Santos:

...definitely shaded.

Hergert:

And you're marking the northeast corner of the Safeway it looks like.

Santos:

Yeah.

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Hergert:

Okay. And that's where you saw who you believed the subject?

Santos:

Yes.

Hergert:

In the call.

Santos:

Um-hm.

Hergert:

Alright, can you describe for me what, what made you think it was him? What did

he look like, what was he wearing that?

Santos:

Um-

Hergert:

Made you think it was him.

Santos:

Uh, well his description matched what was put out in the call. Um, uh, my

memory's foggy, I can't really tell...

Hergert:

That's fine.

Santos:

...you what the description was right now, but he definitely, you can see plain as

day he had an axe in his belt and he was shouting at everybody, so.

Hergert:

Okay.

Santos:

Those were the main indicators that I keyed onto.

Hergert:

Right. And can you describe the axe for me? What did the axe look like?

Santos:

Um, the axe was long, it was about, I don't know, two feet long, like a hatchet, uh, you know, had the working end on one side and was flat on the other side. You know, looks like it was for chopping wood or something, like a hardware

axe.

Hergert:

Do you remember what color it was?

Santos:

I believe it was all black. Can't say for certain though.

Hergert:

Okay.

Santos:

But it wasn't like one of those red fire axes, it was like a, like, an axe that you'd

see someone chopping wood with.

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Hergert:

Now when you saw it on his, in his belt you said?

Santos:

Um-hm.

Hergert:

Where was that at?

Santos:

Um-

Hergert:

Um, like, what side?

Santos:

I can't tell for certain.

Hergert:

Okav.

Santos:

But it was somewhere in the center. It was, you know, in front of him. If you were

staring at him you'd see, like, oh there's an axe around that guy's belt.

Hergert:

And when you approached, how far away was he when you first saw him from...

Santos:

Um-

Hergert:

...in your car when you guys were, drove up?

Santos:

Well I was, uh, you know, we pulled over, we had th-, I, we both flipped a U-turn right here. Um, I initially saw him, or we both initially saw him when we were in the center turning lane turning into the Safeway parking lot, um, but we just flipped a U-turn, got over to the shoulder and he was shouting at us as we were

pulling up. Um, so he was, like, facing us, no more than 20 feet.

Hergert:

Alright, and you said he was shouting at people?

Santos:

Yeah, yeah there was, there was a bunch of people all along the sidewalk. Um, we were having to direct them, like, hey that guy has an axe, you don't want to be

around here.

Hergert:

And when you say a bunch, just, how many do you think?

Santos:

Um, less than 10 but more than five.

Hergert:

Okay.

Santos:

You know, it was, it was a busy sidewalk, um, like, you know, as we were going southbound there, we were running into, uh, like, people. We were having to

direct people away because, you know, and he was walking pretty fast and people weren't walking as fast as him and they, their backs are to him so they didn't see

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him coming up on them, so we were having to, like, holler at them to get out of the way.

Hergert: And do you recall what he was saying or what he was doing, what his focus was

as you guys arrived?

Santos: Um, it's, it's, uh, kind of, blurry. But he was shouting at us, like, get away, he

kept, I remember he said get away a lot. Um, get back, uh, you know, he was, uh, swinging his axe around at things. I ca-, I can't tell you quotes of what he was

saying, but...

Hergert: Yeah.

Santos: ...it was basically, like, I know at one point he said, like, fuck off, get away. So

that was, like, the, the vibe was him just shouting to get back.

Hergert: And CHRISTIAN, if I were to repeat something that wasn't accurate that you said

or...

Santos: Um-hm.

Hergert: ...heard that I'm misinterpreting, just go ahead and correct me, okay?

Santos: Oh yeah. Yeah, no problem.

Hergert: So, uh, you and the other officer do a u-ball?

Santos: Um-hm.

Hergert: You get out, you engage him in conversation. He's, he's...

Santos: Um-hm.

Hergert: ...hollering at you guys.

Santos: Yeah.

Hergert: So, is his focus on you guys now and, more than the other people around? Or is

it?

Santos: Um, it was on and off.

Hergert: Okay.

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Santos:

Uh, we had to, like, get his focus because he tried to turn and walk away from us. It was, our, our time with the initial contacted before he started going off, or, uh, sort of, like, walking away from us, um, and towards other people, it was pretty brief, I'd say less than, less than two minutes, definitely where we were engaged in, you know, him...

Hergert:

When you s-

Santos:

...talking to us and him showing his ID, so.

Hergert:

When you say we, were the other two officers there already then?

Santos:

Yeah. Yeah.

Hergert:

Okay. And at what point did he, you said he had the hatchet in his hand, at what

point did he get that out of his waistband?

Santos:

So we told him, um, you know, we see the axe, don't reach for it. He started reaching for something, he pulled out an ID. Um, and started shoving it, uh, towards us. Um, and he was shouting something, I can't remember what it was. Um, but then, uh, you know, we told him, like, hey. Just, we know you have the axe, just don't reach for that. And then he reaches for the axe and he brings it out.

Hergert:

You indicated it in his right hand?

Santos:

I'm not too sure...

Hergert:

Okay.

Santos:

...which hand it was, I just did that...

Hergert:

Right.

Santos:

...because I'm a righty.

Hergert:

Right. Okay, fair enough.

Santos:

It might've been in his right hand, could've been his left.

Carlson:

Was the axe in, like, a holster? Or when it was in a belt how was it fashioned to

his belt? Could you remember?

Santos:

Um, I think it had, like, a green, like, I don't know. A, not a sheath, but it had something green around the sharp end. Uh, it looked like a foam green piece. It

didn't look like a sheath though, I don't know what it was.

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Carlson:

Over the blade? Over...

Santos:

Yeah, over the blade.

Carlson:

...the axe?

Santos:

When it was inside his, uh, pants. When he took it out he immediately discarded

that and had it, like-

Carlson:

The blade was then exposed?

Santos:

Yeah.

Carlson:

It looked different than when it was on his belt?

Santos:

Yes.

Carlson:

Okay.

Santos:

Yeah.

Hergert:

And the green thing did not stay on his belt, it fell to the ground?

Santos:

Yeah, it fell to the ground...

Hergert:

Okay.

Santos:

...as he was taking out the axe. Um, so. Yeah.

Hergert:

And what was he saying when he pulled out the axe?

Santos:

He was shouting and cussing, um, just in general. Uh, we were d-, you know, like, we were all giving commands. Someone was on the radio, but, you know. I'm not

too sure exactly what he was saying, but.

Hergert:

Do you remember exactly what commands were given?

Santos:

Yeah. Um, I know I said, you know, you know, drop the axe, you might get tased.

Hergert:

Um-hm.

Santos:

Um, other people, you know, were giving similar force warnings.

Hergert:

Okay. What happened then?

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Santos:

Um, so he starts, you know, like, brushing us off and starts, you know, marching

down the sidewalk southbound, um, towards people. Um-

Hergert:

What is your concern at that point?

Santos:

Well, he's waving his axe in the meantime. He's waving it around, like, like, you know, I don't want to say anything bad but like a crazy person, you know? He's waving it around, um, like he c-, wants to hit someone with it. Um, yeah. And, you know, he'd, he'd be hitting objects. Cone, I know there was a cone on the side of the road, he hit that with it. Um, and he's walking towards people where, you know, he's getting within feet of people and we're trying to, like, get their attention to get 'em out of the way before he either purposefully or inadvertently

hits someone with his axe that he's waving.

Hergert:

Okay. So you said he starts walking southbound?

Santos:

Um-hm.

Hergert:

Ignoring your guys' commands, going...

Santos:

Yeah.

Hergert:

...southbound with his axe waving. What happens after that?

Santos:

Uh, we continue southbound just giving, uh, commands, directing people to get out of the way. Um, eventually more officers meet up. I'm too sure who they were but one of them had a less-lethal, another one had a Taser so we had more

options. Um, and then we keep continuing-

Hergert:

How did you become aware of that?

Santos:

Uh, just by, you know, they came into our periphery. They have, they arrived in

their vehicles, you know, their lights were going.

Hergert:

So you saw them?

Santos:

Yeah, I saw them.

Hergert:

Okay.

Santos:

Yeah.

Hergert: Carlson: Alright.

And less-lethal, you mean the 40? Or do you...

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Santos:

Yeah, the-

Carlson:

...know for sure?

Santos:

Yeah, the 40millimeter with the rubber, you know...

Carlson:

Yeah.

Santos:

...projectile. Um-hm.

Hergert:

Okay, so more officers arriving with less-lethal, he's continuing southbound.

What happens after that?

Santos:

Um, yeah, it just keeps continuing. He's ignoring our commands, um, you know, we're, we're, we keep saying, like, we're worried we're gonna, he's gonna hit somebody with his axe or he's gonna charge at someone with his axe. Uh, we keep going south all the way towards the, uh, the Burnside MAX platform. And there's a, there's a whole group of people there that we're trying to, like, direct,

like, get off the platform, this guy has an axe. Um-

Hergert:

How many are, how large a group is that?

Santos:

Like, another, like, it was a constant stream of people. So, like, at least, at least five more people at the MAX platform. I know there was a couple that he walked past and they're, like, fearing for their lives, getting hit by this guy with the axe. I

know they're, like, hugging each other.

Hergert:

You're putting your hands on your chest right now. Is that them physically...

Santos:

Yeah, they were-

Hergert:

...pulling themselves back?

Santos:

Yeah they were, they were, like, hugging each other as he's walking past. Um, yeah and he's still swinging his axe, shouting at us. Um, still ignoring us. He's not putting it down. Um, and this whole time I have my Taser, but I, I don't have any good shot on him. He's too far from me to tase and he's walking around swinging the axe, and I don't want to rush up to him and tase him and he rushes back at me

and axes me in the face, so.

Hergert:

Obvious. Just (unintelligible) -

Santos:

Yeah, we were keeping our distance.

Hergert:

Sure.

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Santos:

Just trying to use commands for the time being. Yeah.

Hergert:

Did anything seem to be working?

Santos:

No.

Hergert:

That calmed him down or...

Santos:

Hm-um.

Hergert:

...(unintelligible) him up?

Santos:

Nope. No. He was getting agitated and he was walking towards a group of people, so we just h-, kept having to keep trying to give more commands, hey put the axe

down, you know.

Hergert:

So this continued all the way down to, you indicated, like, Burnside area here?

Santos:

Yeah, so we passed the MAX platform. Um, still on the sidewalk.

Hergert:

He's on Burnside?

Santos:

Yeah, once he...

Hergert:

At this point.

Santos:

...passes Burnside he gets off the sidewalk right over here. Uh, s-, or somewhere around here. In this, this general area, yeah. So he goes past this, you know, area right here, goes somewhere into the road over here. Um, and at that point he's away from people. Um, suddenly commands start working. Um, y-, we told him to drop the axe. He threw the axe to the ground and we secure it. Um, and we're telling him at that point, like, get down on the ground, like, get to the ground, um,

you know, so we can put him in handcuffs and apprehend him. Um.

Hergert:

Who got the axe?

Santos:

Um, ZENTNER, the one who was standing next to me initially.

Hergert:

Okay

Santos:

She secured it. I initially went but she put her foot on it, said I'm securing it, I'm go-, I got it. Um, so yeah. So she got the axe. Um, and, you know, we're all giving commands at this point. I still have my Taser, still have, everybody still has their roles. Um, someone sh-, hollers out, you know, uh, use the 40, the less-lethal 40 millimeter rubber rounds. Um, and someone used it. I'm not too sure

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who it was 'cause there were multiple people with the less-lethal. Um, and it worked.

Hergert: So before that, what was his response when you guys were telling him to get

down on the ground after he threw the axe?

Santos: Um, he was still super up there. He wasn't listening to us to get on the ground, he

wasn't listening to anything we were saying. He was, kind of, shouting still. Oh (Snapping fingers), before this, before he crossed the road on Burnside right her I forgot to mention there was a, um, there was a car. There was a car, um, it was a black, like, SUV and he, like, took an axe to the window and, like, trying to, like, go for the, the door handles. And, um, after that failed, uh, that was when he

threw the axe down and went into the road.

Hergert: And that was an occupied vehicle or unoccupied?

Santos: It was an occupied vehicle.

Hergert: Okay.

Santos: Yeah, it was in the lane, you know, these people were in, like, super scared. Um,

yeah, so we kept on telling him, like, don't go for that car or, or he's going for the car and we kept shouting at him. Uh, he threw his, threw the axe to the ground, uh, goes, runs towards the middle of the road. We keep shouting at him get on the

ground, get on the ground. He's still, you know, super animated, super-

Hergert: And that's where you secured the axe?

Santos: Yeah, yeah. And, um, yeah. Yeah. And then we do the, the 40 millimeter round. It

hits him in the leg or somewhere, somewhere low. He goes down to the ground, grabs his leg. Um, but immediately hops back up to his feet. Um, so we aren't

able to get control with that. And then he books it.

Hergert: And was that just one shot you heard?

Santos: If I remember correctly. I can't, I'm not 100% sure 'cause it was just happening

so fast. I think it was just one round but it wouldn't surprise me if there was more

than one.

Hergert: Do you know who shot?

Santos: No.

Hergert: In the 40?

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Santos:

Hm-um.

Hergert:

Okay. So he gets up from the ground.

Santos:

Gets up, gets up and books it southbound on 122nd.

Hergert:

And when you say it hit him in the leg, is he wearing shorts or pants, do you recall

at that point what...

Santos:

He was...

Hergert:

...he was wearing?

Santos:

...wearing shorts.

Hergert:

Shorts?

Santos:

I think he was wearing shorts. Um, 'cause I remember his exposed leg, um. Yeah.

Hergert:

Do you remember anything else with him? In his hands, or...

Santos:

Yeah, he-

Hergert:

...do you remember...

Santos:

I remember when...

Hergert:

...he had anything in his hands?

Santos:

...he went down he was, like, reaching down to his leg so I assumed he got shot

in his leg. Um, but then he got back up. It, it was all so fast, you know?

Hergert:

Alright. And where does he go from there? What happens?

Santos:

He runs southbound and I immediately give chase. Uh, um, I see him the whole

time I'm chasing him. Uh, GREG is chasing him with me. Um, and we just keep

running-

Hergert:

What's GREG's last name?

Santos:

I forget. It's-

Hergert:

That's fine.

Santos:

He's Ukrainian.

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Hergert:

Okay.

Santos:

Uh, I know his name isn't conventionally GREG, it's, like, GRIG, G-R-I-G.

Hergert: Okay.

Santos:

Um, yeah so we just give chase southbound. Keep, keep running, keep running.

He's no more than, like, 20 feet in front of me. Um, I'm just keep, we keep

chasing 'em, keep, you know, telling him stop. Um.

Hergert: Is he responding or saying anything to you when you're telling him to stop?

Santos: Not that I can, not that I could tell. I was also telling cars, like, oh he's going this

way as they were approaching. Uh, we-

Hergert: Via the, via the radio?

Santos: Oh no, no, no, I wasn't giving commands on the radio. Just, like, uh, people who

were arriving on scene, um.

Hergert: Okay.

Santos: I'm pointing at this person right here. Um, eventually we turn westbound, so we

hook a right here on Ash.

Hergert: Can you draw that?

Santos: Yeah. So we-

Hergert: So when you have to, you said you had to point him out to officers as they're

coming in, or cars.

Santos: Yeah. Cars are coming in on scene-

Hergert: Why is that? I-is he not the only one in the roadway at that point?

Santos: Well it was, he-

Hergert: Was there other people? Is that?

Santos: It, it m-, it was crowded. There was cars around, there were cars on the street. I

know when we were crossing her here on Ash we crossed through cars. Um, so

just so everybody was aware, as I'm chasing him I'm pointing.

Hergert: Right.

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Santos:

He's still going this way. Just in case, you know, someone over there doesn't turn the wrong way. I'm just having him pointed out as I'm running. Um, yeah. And we hooked through here. He crosses over cars and is running on the south side of the street. Um, still in the street. And then he goes in towards these apartments right here. I believe this is it. This little.

Hergert:

South side of the street there, that first alcove it looks like?

Santos:

Yeah, yeah the first alcove of these, uh, in this apartment...

Hergert:

So he's-

Santos:

...complex. And he runs in there. I still have him in sight. Um, he goes all the way to the back, oh perfect. Um, he goes all the way to the back there. Um, I can't

really see him.

Hergert:

Um, when you say perfect is it, you're...

Santos:

Oh, I mean perfect like this is-

Hergert:

...talking about, you're looking at the third photo here?

Santos:

Yeah.

Hergert:

That's the alcove?

Santos:

Yeah, this is, this is what I remember.

Hergert:

Okay.

Santos:

Um, so yeah, it's covered. I still see him but I, you know, I don't have, like, uh, it's dark. So I see him run all the way to the back, there's a wooden fence at the back there and he hits a wall and he starts, you know, turning back towards me. I still have, I took out my Taser 'cause GREG is still with me. He has his gun out, um, and we s-, keep giving him commands, you know, like, hey get on the ground. I know, um, GREG said, uh, get on your knees and I said get on the ground. Um, and we're, we're just giving him commands at that point. Um, people are starting to come out of the apartments. Um, starting to, like, gawk and look. Um-

Hergert:

Is there anybody else in the alcove back here with him at that point?

Santos:

No, no. Not that I saw. Um, but I mean I was focused on this guy. But I did, I was aware that people were, you know, peering at us. Um, like, I can hear people's

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voices, like, oh cops are here and all this and that, so I knew there were other people other than police officers watching us. Um, like, a lot of voices. And, uh, I'm standing at, like, the far right. I'm the far right officer standing over here...

Hergert: (Unintelligible).

Santos: ...giving commands. And there are, at this point there's, like, a line of us going

from wall to wall. Um, and we're all giving him commands, you know, get down on the ground, get down on the ground. Another officer to my left, um, I don't

know who it was, but they shout out that he has a knife. Um, and-

Hergert: Do you know who, do you know who said that?

Santos: I don't know.

Hergert: Okay.

Santos: I'm not too sure, but I did hear from another officer he has a knife. Um, we're

telling him don't reach for anything, don't reach for anything, uh, don't reach for the knife. Um, we're still giving him force warnings, you know, I said, uh, you know, don't reach for the knife or you'll be tased. Um, and then, you know, he's really erratic, going, he's not listening to us. He's going, he starts reaching and digging around in his, uh, his beltline. And, uh, he's, like, too far back for me to

get a good shot with the Taser, um, so I didn't fire. Um, and-

Hergert: You're all keeping your distance?

Santos: Yeah, we're still keeping our distance 'cause we don't know, this guy had an axe

and was swinging at people. Um, and then I hear the shots go off. And then, you know, he goes down. Uh, we still keep giving him commands, show us your hands, don't reach for the knife. Um, someone calls up for a shield, shield was already there. Um, comes up, uh, they call for a custody team. Um, I'm holstered up. I was already gloved up so I join the custody team. Someone shoved in front of me so I say okay, they have enough people for a custody team, I'm out. And then, um, they go approach, we all approach as a line. I see the knife, uh, next to his feet. I secure it. They put him in handcuffs and start, uh, doing, um, you know,

medical on him.

Hergert: Okay. So you said there was a line of you. How many officers do you think were

there? Like, do you-

Santos: Um, I'm not too sure. At least, I'd say at least five of us.

Hergert: Okay.

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Santos:

But I can't, I'm not too certain.

Hergert:

Okay. What was the lighting like in there? What, h-how well could you see?

Santos:

Um, there's this awning right here. There's, like, a walk pad up here, like, a-

Hergert:

Um-hm.

Santos:

Like, it's all, this is a second floor with, like, a full path. Um, so it was very, i-it was, like, you know, there's a roof over your head, so to speak. Um, there's still sunlight going in, but it's, like, going in from out here where it was really bright to in there it seemed like it was super dark. Um.

Hergert:

Are there doors in this alcove too that go-

Santos:

Yeah, yeah. There, we were standing right next to an apartment door.

Hergert:

Okay.

Santos:

Um, and there was another door right where he was standing and another door,

um, behind, when he, you know, where the fence was back there.

Hergert:

And when you heard an officer say that he had, he has a knife.

Santos:

Um-hm.

Hergert:

Were you able to see the knife? Did you see the knife?

Santos:

I didn't see it.

Hergert:

You didn't see that?

Santos:

Not from where I was standing, I didn't see it.

Hergert:

Alright. And do you recall what he was saying at that point? What the words

were?

Santos:

No. No, I don't recall exactly-

Carlson:

Had his demeanor changed at all?

Santos:

No, he w-, well I mean th-, he was super amped up. He was, like, like, uh, very angry. Yeah. Yeah, he was not listening to us and he seemed like he wasn't having it. Everything that we were telling him to do he was super defiant. Um, you know, 'cause, like, every single time we asked for him not to reach for

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something he started reaching for something. Um, you know, when we told him to, you know, stop walking he'd start running, you know, so.

Hergert: And do you recall any specifics that he said?

Santos: Uh, no.

Hergert: Okay.

Santos: No.

Hergert: Um, and then you said you heard shots?

Santos: Um-hm.

Hergert: Do you recall how many shots you heard?

Santos: No, no. Um, but it was a, it was a quite a few, you know.

Hergert: Did the shots sound different, sound the same? Uh...

Santos: No, it was...

Hergert: ...how would you describe that?

Santos: ...uh, it was all just, like, a (Snapping fingers) pop, pop, pop, pop, pop, pop. It was

steady.

Hergert: Okay. Did any of the officers say anything at that point? Did you hear what was

said, or?

Santos: N-, uh, n-, uh, we just kept on giving commands. Well, 'cause after the shots were

finished, uh, guy kinda staggered and fell over. Was sort of, like, fading in and out

of consciousness, but we were still continuing with commands.

Hergert: Um-hm.

Santos: Hey, show us your hands, don't reach for anything. And at that point we were,

simultaneously someone was saying hey, let's a shield. A shield immediately

approached and then we went on to custody.

Hergert: So as you, as you said you were, you guys were walking up and...

Santos: Um-hm.

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Hergert:

Commence of the commence of th

...you saw a knife at his feet?

Santos:

Yeah, the knife, um.

Hergert:

Okay.

Santos:

During that, uh, you know, ordeal.

Hergert:

Y eah.

Santos:

Um, when he fell to the ground I'm guessing the knife fell...

Hergert:

Yeah.

Santos:

...onto the floor. Um-

Hergert:

What'd the knife look like?

Santos:

It was a pocketknife. Like, a flip knife.

Hergert:

So how, how long would you guess...

Santos:

Um, probably...

Hergert:

...the knife to be?

Santos:

...about four to five inches. Yeah.

Hergert:

The whole knife or the blade portion (unintelligible)?

Santos:

Oh, the, well it was, it was folded so it's, uh, if it was to fold out it would be

longer. But I don't know. I put it aside.

Carlson:

It was closed when you found it?

Santos:

Yeah, it was closed when I found it.

Hergert:

What color was it?

Santos:

Black.

Hergert:

Black? How far away from him was, was the knife when you walked up?

Santos:

Well, it was right next to his feet.

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Hergert:

Right next to his feet?

Santos:

Um-hm.

Hergert:

Like, inches, feet?

Santos:

Oh, inches.

Hergert:

Okay.

Santos:

Inches.

Carlson:

So when he fell his, his head fell back away from you? So as you're approaching

the first then you come to...

Santos:

No, no, he fell-

Carlson:

...contact with are his feet?

Santos:

He fell parallel with our line, so he fell to his side. And there was a, kind of, like,

a beam.

Carlson:

Uh-huh.

Santos:

There was, sort of, a beam that he, like, fell back and leaned on.


