I will try to put in the chat:

1) The force data shows 30% of people subjected to force were BBlack in Q1 (in the file online) but it said 21% on the slide

2) Rapid Response Team is being reformed with 35 members who quit when one of their members was indicted. Why are they using the same people and the same name? WHY did the chief introduce the team at a news conference instead of a meeting such as the TAC?

3) 5% of custodies with force is way up from a few years ago which was 3%.

4) The deminimis force-- while it's good pointing a firearm is being taken more seriously (look at the ALec Baldwin trial that happened today) if you are the person subjected to "force against resistance" it's not "deminimis" to you. If a community member touched a n officer that way they'd be charged with assault.

4b) the Lt (I think) said officers will be more likely to use these low levels of force knowing they don't have to fill out paperwork, that is of great concern.

4c) I wonder how much of the 7 hours or paperwork was CAUSED by the review of BWC footage, which officers are not allowed to do in Category I or II cases.

Executive Summary

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Q4 2023

- ▶ 3,207 custodies
 - ▶ 5.24% resulted in a use of force (168 subjects)
 - ▶ 0.49% increase in percentage of custodies that result in force compared to Q3
- ▶ 62,905 calls
 - ▶ Force used in 0.26% of calls (166 cases)
 - ▶ 0.03% increase in the percentage of calls that result in force compared to Q3

Q1 2024

- ▶ 3,202 custodies
 - ▶ 5.22% resulted in a use of force (167 subjects)
 - ▶ 0.02% decrease in percentage of custodies that result in force compared to Q4
- ▶ 63,492 calls
 - ▶ Force used in 0.25% of calls (160 cases)
 - ▶ 0.01% decrease in the percentage of calls that result in force compared to Q4

Revision to Directive 910.00

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- ▶ Category IV reporting, investigation and review:
 - ▶ Resource Intensive: 14 FTE members
 - ▶ Officers: 20 work weeks
 - ▶ Sergeants: 92 work weeks
- ▶ Body Worn Camera Implementation:
 - ▶ Provides a recording of officer's actions
 - ▶ Can be reviewed if necessary
- ▶ Benefits:
 - ▶ Time given back to officers and sergeants
 - ▶ Reduce crime and the fear of crime
 - ▶ Engage with the community
 - ▶ Address criminal behavior

De Minimis Force Review & Reporting

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Currently

- ▶ Category IV
 - ▶ Box-in (dynamic)
 - ▶ Control against resistance
 - ▶ Handcuffing against resistance
 - ▶ Hobble restraint
 - ▶ Pointing of a firearm
 - ▶ Takedown - controlled

Changes

- ▶ Move to Category III Review:
 - ▶ Box-in (dynamic)
 - ▶ Pointing of a firearm
 - ▶ Takedown-controlled is combined with Takedown-dynamic becomes Takedown
- ▶ Remove from Category IV Reporting, Investigation and Review requirements:
 - ▶ Control against resistance
 - ▶ Handcuffing against resistance
 - ▶ Hobble restraint
