# Street Tree Inventory Findings

## Why Street Trees?

Street trees are a valuable asset to the community. Beyond aesthetic benefits, street trees improve air and water quality, provide shade, increase property value, and contribute to the safety and livability of the neighborhood.


## Laurelhurst Tree Inventory and Tree Plan

In 2014, the Laurelhurst Tree Team worked with PP&R Urban Forestry to organize volunteers and conduct a street tree inventory. Over the course of four work days, 73 volunteers contributed 526 hours collecting data on tree species, size, tree condition, and site characteristics for each of the neighborhood's 3,694 street trees.

After analyzing the results, the Laurelhurst Tree Team created a vision statement, set goals, created objectives, and made property owner recommendations designed to improve the health of the community's urban forest. The result is the Laurelhurst Tree Plan, which will guide the team's stewardship activities in future years.

## Inventory Findings

- Laurelhurst has 3,694 trees of 92 types.
- Mature maple, ash, cherry, and elms dominate Laurelhurst's street tree population. Laurelhurst does not meet recommended species diversity guidelines.
- Nearly 40% of trees are large and old. Preservation, maintenance, and monitoring is necessary to promote continued health and to limit potential hazards.
- Less than a quarter of trees are young, leaving few trees to offset mortality as the population ages.
- 82% of all street tree planting spaces are currently stocked with trees.
- Planting efforts should focus on the largest sites first, as large form trees will provide the most long-term benefits to the neighborhood. More than 700 sites are identified for planting.
- The replacement cost of the street tree population is valued at \$28.6 million.
- Laurelhurst's street trees provide \$742,000 annually in environmental services and aesthetic benefits.

# Laurelhurst Tree Plan

## VISION STATEMENT

Our trees serve and protect our neighborhood in many ways. The Laurelhurst Tree Team (LTT) seeks to improve the health of our neighborhood trees as part of a larger effort to build community so we all thrive in our urban forest.

## GOALS

1. Provide learning resources to the community so that we can improve the health of our trees.
2. Establish base information to promote neighborhood ownership of the tree canopy.
3. Provides skills and expertise to help organize tree related events.
4. Build community through positive local action.

## SHORT TERM OBJECTIVES

1. Develop basic communications and a flyer for people to join the LTT.
2. Put together communications for engaging folks in the annual Friends of Trees (FoT) planting.
3. Determine a small section of available tree planting spaces and connect with residents about selecting a FoT tree.
4. Solicit volunteers for FoT Planting events.
5. Develop list of materials we will need for LTT related info and database.
6. Develop plan for Urban Forestry workshops and our own Neighborhood Tree Tour.

## LONG TERM OBJECTIVES

1. Develop the core materials for ongoing LTT communications and activities.
2. Support the delivery of UF workshops.
3. Determine long term workshop and walking tour needs.
4. Develop relationships with sponsoring and partnering organizations.
5. Develop calendar of events for full year.
6. Establish ongoing funding sources.
