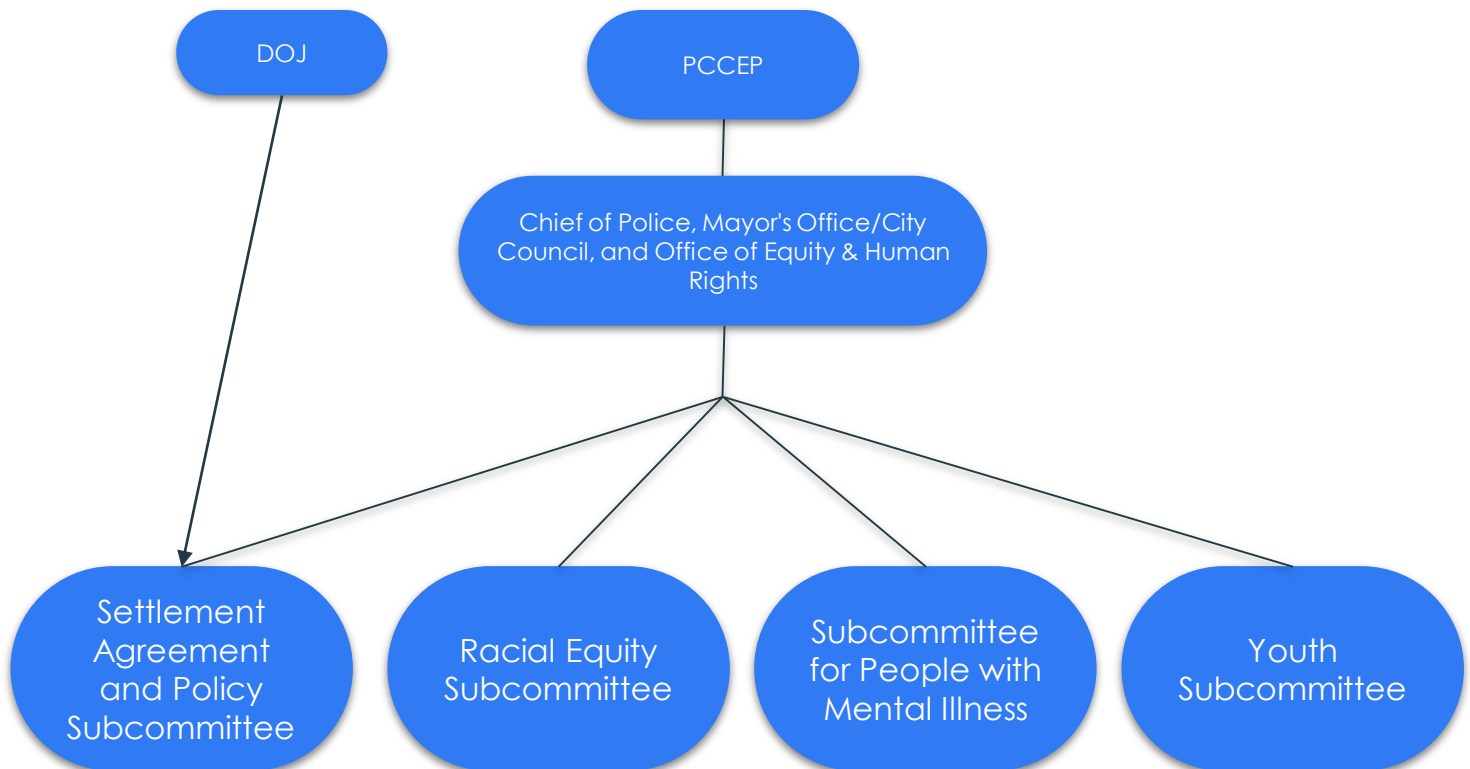


Portland Committee on Community-Engaged Policing



Mission

Mayor Wheeler convened the PCCEP to act as an independent advisory committee to the Mayor and Chief of Police with a specific focus on police services and relationships with people living with mental illness and people of color. The PCCEP is also charged with independently overseeing the implementation of the DOJ settlement agreement. The DOJ found the City of Portland to be in substantial compliance with the agreement as of January 10, 2020. The City must maintain substantial compliance for one year, after which the City and the DOJ are expected to ask the Court to dismiss the case. The PCCEP's mission is continue building trusting relationship to improve police-community relations.

Goal

- Increase collaboration with communities and law enforcement
- Implement policies and practices that decrease incidents of use of force
- Increase transparency and accountability within the Portland Police Bureau

Strategies

- The PCCEP independently assesses the City of Portland's Settlement Agreement with the U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ).
- Works collaboratively with Portland Police Bureau (PPB) to develop policies and training.
- Provide information and solicit feedback from Portland's diverse communities through roundtables and town halls that are open to the public.

Expected Outcomes

- Increased trust between Portland Police and the community.
- Meaningful training implementation partnered with positive outcomes.
- Effective community engagement.
- Decreased incidents of excessive use of force.

Timeline

- Compliance Officer and Community Liaison (COCL) will conduct ongoing assessment of compliance.
- Next PCCEP court hearing for United States v. City of Portland, Case. No. 3:12-cv-02216-SI to be held on February 2021.
- PCCEP will continue its commitment to the community by maintaining engagement efforts beyond the Courts involvement.
