- T00624 82<sup>nd</sup> Ave Pedestrian Crossing FOS Budget: \$1,453,735 (\$1,398,294 remaining)

- T00646 122nd Ave Pedestrian Crossings FOS Budget: \$2,206,897 (\$1,776,517 remaining)

- T00585 4<sup>th</sup> Ave Lincoln to Burnside SW FOS Budget: \$7,162,010 (\$6,872,488 remaining)
- T00593 Alberta St: 15<sup>th</sup> to 30<sup>th</sup> FOS Budget: \$3,720,000 (\$3,145,260 remaining)

If the two pedestrian crossing projects go forward the \$4 Million cut needs to come from either 4<sup>th</sup> or Alberta.

There are three recommended options:

- 1. Cut Alberta and reduce 4<sup>th</sup> Ave by \$900,000.
  - o Defers maintenance on Alberta increase cost later
  - Reduces paving on 4<sup>th</sup> Ave, removal of parking lanes and likely removal of some additional paving.
- 2. Cut \$4,000,000 from 4<sup>th</sup> Avenue
  - o Reduces the paving from Burnside to likely SW Madison
  - Does not impact multimodal improvements which are funded by other sources.
- 3. Reduce both projects by \$2 million
  - Reduces the paving limits for both projects
