7:35 AM Hot Topics, Points of Interest

- PBOT is looking at engineering solutions to address safety conflicts between vehicle and pedestrian movement at the Basin & Ensign St in the Swan Island neighborhood.

- The Portland Bureau of Transportation (PBOT) offers the opportunity to join the Fixing Our Street Oversight Committee. This Committee monitors revenues, expenditures, and implementation for the Fixing Our Streets program that funds road repair and transportation safety projects through a 10-cent-per-gallon gas tax. Information about the opportunity will be shared with the committee members.
- The I-5 Rose Quarter SEA PFC comment letter was finalized and shared with PBOT's Director Chris Warner. The letter will be posted online and shared by email with all PFC members.
- Portland Clean Energy Community Benefits Fund (PCEF) staff will be convening roundtables for each funding priority (or topic) in the Climate Investment Plan to create robust first drafts for public review and comment. PCEF opened applications for members of the public to participate in the topic roundtables. Information about the applications has been shared the committee members.

Regional Freight Delay and Commodities Movement Study

Metro staff provided a briefing on the findings and progress of the Commodity movement study, which includes a policy framework for commodity movement in the region; and a deeper understanding of how COVID-19 economic impacts have affected freight truck travel, e-commerce, and delivery service.

- Metro staff gave a briefing on the project, including:



- There is a lack robust data on e-commerce demand at the local level. However, local
 e-commerce demand is influenced by national/global economic and logistics trends.
 State and regional data on consumer spending, industrial real estate, and employment
 in key sectors suggest this region has had rapid growth in e-commerce like the nation
 has observed.
- E-commerce requires more space than traditional brick-and-mortar retail. This is due to the distributed network of distribution and fulfillment centers used to position product and fulfill orders as close to the customer's location as possible, and a high proportion (30%) of e-commerce orders are returned, and thus, retailers need space to receive and process those returns.
- The study is looking at 19 of 23 Regional Mobility Corridors are being used for studying commodity types and commodity movements.
- Results for three mobility corridors located in the Portland area were shared including:
 - o Rivergate to I-5
 - o I-5 freight corridor from Portland Central City to Vancouver
 - Columbia Corridor I-5 to I-205 north of I-84
- Tim Collins used the Metro study's website for to present some of the results.

Additionally, Metro has provided additional notes of their presentation.

- Rep. Susan McLain provided an update on the 2017 transportation package and her perspective on transportation-related improvement, including:
 - The transportation network is a system and thus, all pieces of this system should be supported
