Updated Ground Rules

Ground Rules will detail the *code of conduct* for the task force meetings, explaining the expected behavior of all task force members. For Ground Rules to be truly effective, Task Force members must understand each of them and agree to follow them as best they can. Please review these proposed ground rules and be prepared to discuss and vote on them in December.

PBOT's updated recommendations of Ground Rules including Task Force recommendations

- Remain respectful of all people and groups
- Listen to each speaker and ensure that only one person speaks at a time
- Conflict and tension can lead to solutions
- Respect the process and commit to reaching consensus
- Be candid and respect candor of the group
- Have fun: laughter is good
- Minimize assumptions: if unclear, ask
- Stay on topic: parking lot for later
- The process is imperfect: it may not achieve all things for all people

Other operating expectations

- In meetings try to minimize use of chat, but if used moderators and staff will monitor the chat and share anything on there & leave your camera on if you can.
- Staff will email meeting materials as attachments to the Task Force versus Gov. Delivery links.
- PBOT expects you to participate in the Task Force Meetings in good faith, ready to listen and learn, as well as share your personal experiences and local knowledge.
- We expect that you will attend the meetings regularly and prepare for them by reading the meeting materials ahead of time. If you can't make a meeting, let PBOT staff know and pass along any comments or concerns about the meeting material if possible so they can share in the meeting.
- PBOT staff may remove a Task Force member if they have more than three unexcused absences.
- *Task Force members are not authorized to speak to the media on behalf of the Portland Bureau of Transportation or on behalf of the Task Force. If a Task Force member is contacted by the media, please reach out to the PBOT Project Manager so they can connect you with PBOT's Public Information Officer. 

Elements of Parking Permit Program

Area- size

Need to be big enough to be effective, but best to start small and annex in. APPP minimum is 10 blocks or 40 consecutive individual block faces. We are not constrained by this rule, yet we need to determine an appropriate size/arrangement to be effective. For example, we would not put a permit program right next to a school or park (not without their request). So how we handle skipping blocks and still develop a contiguous parking zone that meets the goals?

Time limits

 Standard is 2 hours—shorter or longer can have positive or negative impacts depending on the priority users.

Hours of Enforcement

Depends on when the parking is tightest and balance of priority user's needs. Could be 12-9 p.m. 2-10 p.m. 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. it all depends on the problem we are solving for.










