Ground Rules

- Ground Rules will detail the code of conduct for the task force meetings, explaining the expected behavior of all task force members. The ground rules will be created and agreed to by the task force because members will more readily accept and stand by the rules you've set.
- Good group decisions result not only from the steps we take as a group but also from the attitudes we bring to the table.
 Further, to improve things, we need to do things and act—not just talk and listen.

Updated Ground Rules

- Remain respectful of all people and groups
- Listen to each speaker and ensure that only one person speaks at a time
- Conflict and tension can lead to solutions
- Respect the process and commit to reaching consensus
- Be candid and respect candor of the group
- Have fun: laughter is good
- Minimize assumptions: if unclear, ask
- Stay on topic: parking lot for later
- The process is imperfect: it may not achieve all things for all people

Operating norms

- In meetings try to minimize use of chat, but if used moderators and staff will monitor the chat and share anything on there
- Leave your camera on if you can (we know sometimes you can't)




*UPDATED Data: ACS 2020 5-Year Estimates for entirety of Eliot neighborhood boundary








Household Income

2020 % Household Race/Ethnicity*




- 2.3% Limited English Proficiency

 - for a parking ratio of 0.4




Black or African American Percent of Total Population 1970 North/Northeast Portland Area AfricanTotal


Black or African American Percent of Total Population 1980 North/Northeast Portland Area AfricanTotal




Black or African American Percent of Total Population 1990 North/Northeast Portland Area African- Total




Black or African American Percent of Total Population 2000 North/Northeast Portland Area African Total




Black or African American Percent of Total Population 2010

Context & History Matters


This group needs to be aware of and considerate of the history as we make decisions for future.

Elements of a permit program

- Size
- Time limits
- Hours of enforcement
- Permit eligibility and limits per address/business
- Guest permits

Size

- Zone K= 90 blockfaces
- Zone M= 600+ blockfaces



Time limits

- 2 hour is standard
- 4 hours can be used too
- Need to balance problem with area's needs (guests)



Hours of enforcement

- 8am-6pm standard for most APPP zones
- Zone S is 7am -midnight7 days/week

Depends on area needs/context



Guest permits



- Guest permits can be offered to residents and businesses.
- Need to determine appropriate limit that works for parking management plan & for community members
