

Snow Falls in Portland, Branches and Trees Fall Too

In the days between December 9, 2016 to January 18, 2017, Portland Parks & Recreation Urban Forestry responded to over 900 tree emergencies. To put that in perspective: there were 1,192 tree emergencies in the *entire* calendar year of 2015.

Our colleagues from the Seattle Department of Transportation (SDOT) responded to over 65 tree emergencies to help keep Portland moving. Thank you, SDOT!

When the January snow storm first hit, Urban Forestry crews worked to clear trees that were blocking TriMet tracks in four locations. This allowed trains to continue their vital service at a time when car travel was severely impacted by the road conditions. By mid-day on January 13, there were more than 200 calls to the City's emergency tree line, (503) **823-TREE** (8733).

As the snow continued to stick around, 823-TREE kept ringing. Calls included everything from trees in the rights-of-way, on buildings and vehicles, and even a landslide! Urban Forestry crews are still hard at work cleaning up sites across the city. **We thank you for your patience.** Have a look at some of the photos below to see a sampling of emergency tree situations!

Tips for Caring for Storm Damaged Trees

With the snow gone for now, you may be wondering what you can do about some of those storm damaged trees out there. (For a helpful article from the Oregon State University Extension Service, click here.)

Whether you are inexperienced with tree care, or a proud graduate of the **Neighborhood Tree Steward** Program, a great first step in dealing with non-emergency situations is to gather information.

- What's wrong with it!? Check the Arbor Day
 Foundation Storm Recovery Kit if you need help
 identifying the problems.
- 2. What kind of tree is it? If you're not sure, check out the Stay or should it go? Street Tree Inventory Map. If your tree isn't in there, maybe a tree like yours is nearby and has already been identified. The type of tree you have can strongly influence what you end up doing to correct storm damage.
- 3. Is it a street tree? If so, do you have a Pruning Permit? Remember, some street tree pruning

permits can be self-issued online for free. Other situations may call for an inspection first. Either way, don't be afraid of the process! Urban Forestry staff are here to make it as painless as possible!

4. Decide on a course of action! Does your tree require corrective pruning, staking, or even removal and replanting? Write out the steps that you will need to take to care for your tree in a timely manner, and then put your plan in place. Neglecting your tree now may turn an easy fix into a permanent defect.

We encourage you to talk to your neighbors, especially if you think you may have spotted a tree problem that they haven't seen. For larger trees or any risky situations, always contact a professional arborist. See the article below for information on arborists in the Portland area.







Some trees are more prone to storm damage than others! Choosing trees for reasons other than their spring flowering habit or autumn color makes a big difference when the weather turns.

Updated Local Tree Care Provider List

This winter has been a busy one for the Portland arborist community. However, not all private tree care companies are the same. Some are new to the area and bring with them innovative techniques, and others have been here for decades and know what has worked in the past.

To make the process of **selecting an arborist** a little easier, Urban Forestry maintains a list of **Local Tree Care Providers**. While we do not make any representation or warranty for any of the companies on the list, we have checked the following criteria:

- A company representative has attended a Local Tree Care Provider Workshop within the past year, which is an opportunity to learn about Portland's tree regulations
- There is an International Society of Arboriculture (ISA) Certified Arborist on staff
- The company has an active Portland business license
- The company does not have any violations of the Tree Code within the last year, and turns in acceptable permit applications

In 2016, Urban Forestry held three Local Tree Care Provider workshops. 60 professionals representing over 40 arborist companies were in attendance. Though not all of the companies were eligible to be included on the list, we appreciate everyone's participation. Workshops covered topics such as the tree

code, permits, replanting requirements, and trees in development situations. Be sure to check the Urban Forestry **Event Calendar** for future workshops!







needs, these arborist professionals also guide their clients through Portland's tree code, **Title 11 Trees**.



One of the ways our local arborists stay informed is to attend a Local Tree Care Provider Workshop on an annual basis. Participating arborists review information such as when a permit is required, how to properly submit an application and provide supporting documentation, and can ask questions directly to Urban Forestry staff.

After attending a workshop and meeting all other criteria, a company is eligible to be added to the City's Local Tree Care Provider List, a resource for members of the public who may be seeking tree care services. The list currently averages over 500 unique page visits per month.

For a company to be eligible for the Local Tree Care Provider List, they must:

- Have an active Portland business license
- Have no documented violations of the Tree Code within the last 12 months
- Submit accurate and legible Tree Removal & Replanting Permit Applications
- Send a Certified Arborist to a Local Tree Care Provider Workshop within the last 12 months

The Local Tree Care Provider list is updated at the beginning of each calendar

How do we best expand tree canopy so that all Portlanders have access to trees and their benefits? Portland State University and Urban Forestry have partnered to evaluate ways to equitably increase our city's tree canopy.



The Citywide Tree Planting Strategy Advisory Committee will provide input on tree planting strategy recommendations made by Portland State University. The committee will meet five times from June through October 2017 and will assist with identifying barriers and opportunities for tree planting for low income communities, reviewing City bureau and public agency priorities around tree planting, and reviewing a tree planting map tool.





Did you know that the Horticulture Department at Clackamas Community College (CCC) now offers an Arboriculture Associate of Applied Science degree? According to CCC staff, this is the first arboriculture training program on the West Coast. The Arboriculture AAS degree will prepare students for entry-level positions like tree climbing, pruning and plant health care management. By the end of the two-year AAS degree, students will be able to: Safely operate standard arboriculture equipment Identify common trees and shrubs Evaluate tree health and implement plant health management strategies Pass the International Society of Arboriculture's Certified Arborist exam Pass the Oregon Department of Agriculture's pesticide licensing exams The program, which trains commercial arborists who specialize in the care and maintenance of trees in urban

- The company must have an active Portland Business License and be in



compliance with business license law.

- The company cannot have a documented
 Tree Code violation within the past year.
- The company must submit complete, accurate, and legible applications.








Figure 3. Brown streaking develops in sapwood of branches infected by Dutch elm disease fungus. Streaking is visible here (from left to right) in: (1) the newly formed sapwood, (2) spring sapwood overlaid by uninfected summer wood, and (3) is absent (Photo courtesy of the America Phytopathological Society.) "Streaking" is another indicator of the presence of DED. This is characterized by dark discolorations inside the wood of an infected branch, below the bark.







Remind them- don't move firewood. Instead, buy it where you'll burn it, buy certified heat treated firewood, or gather firewood on site if permitted. Elms are most susceptible to Dutch elm disease (DED) infection from





Lightning Strikes Tree in Washington Park. See Photos!



On September 20th, a lightning strike was reported in Washington Park. The strike damaged a Douglas fir that was approximately 150 - 160 feet tall, with the top of the tree completely blown off. At about 2:20 pm that day the trunk of the tree caught on fire.

The 48 inch DBH (diameter at breast height) tree has been removed by Urban Forestry for safety reasons, and will be replaced with a Douglas fir or other large-form, native evergreen.



Two PP&R Urban Forestry Tree Inspectors, Dylan Saito and Casey Clapp, recently presented topics to an audience of their industry peers at the PNW-ISA Annual Training Conference.

Dylan's topic was: **Portland Emergency Tree Response: Storm Damage in Trees**. Attendance at his presentation was much higher than expected with 85-90 people crowding into the room.

During the presentation, Dylan reviewed precipitation records from 1941, noting that Portland has recently set new weather records for rainfall since record keeping began. In

addition, the **2016-17 winter season** brought ice storms to Portland that made national attention. Snowfall in the metro area accumulated up to two feet in some areas.

Dylan noted that Urban Forestry staff responded to the equivalent of a year's worth of storm event emergencies in less than 5 months time.

On the horizon, Dylan is involved as a co-creator of the PNW Tree Failure Database. Check the **PNW-ISA website** in the near future for the launch of the database.

History of Your Tree: What Can You Uncover? Tips From a Historian

Are you curious who may have planted a particular tree in the past?

Perhaps you would like to know what it may have witnessed?

Or maybe you want to find an old image to see what it looked like years ago?

The answers to each of these questions require historical research, often located in archival collections.

Often, people ask about what it is like in archives and how they work. Don't worry, it is not as hard as you may think.

Dave Hedberg (pictured) produced a **Historical Tree Research Guide** to demystify the process and point you to helpful resources.

It is specifically oriented to the Portland area, although, many of the tools and methods will work in other cities too.

Historical evidence helps tell a factual and accurate story of a tree

It offers personal, rather than arboricultural, support for preservation and advocacy.

Your research can lead to a Heritage Tree nomination or it could identify a cultural landscape or land-use pattern from the past.



Rocky Butte View Clearing Project Wraps Up Phase I

Urban Forestry's Operations Crew recently wrapped up tree work in support of the Rocky Butte View Clearing Project. Their efforts on Rocky Butte's challenging, wooded slopes recreate the idyllic view corridors that have drawn visitors to the park for years.

The Rocky Butte panorama allows views in nearly all directions with particularly spectacular views of Mt. Hood and Mt. St. Helens. City of Portland Scenic Views, Sites and Drives Inventory

This work defines the first phase of the view clearing project. Most of the woodv debris generated from Urban Forestry's work has been left on-site

as habitat improvement, including tall Douglas fir snags.

Portland Parks & Recreation will take this opportunity to improve the health of the forest on Rocky Butte by removing invasive species, planting 400 trees (the majority are low growing) and 5,200 shrubs. It takes hard work to look this good!

Yard Tree Giveaway: Trees Are for Everyone!

Urban Forestry completed the first year of their new Yard Tree Giveaway program in November, with over 450 trees distributed throughout the city!

One especially popular presentation was about new "Story maps" for some of the parks inventoried this past summer. These maps are virtual tours of the parks and their trees, and include historic photos in addition to information on each tree in the following parks:

- Trees of Berkeley Park
- Trees of Cathedral Park
- Trees of Irving Park
- Trees of Midland Park
- Trees of Rose City Park

- A connection to East Portland to help expand the range of the program (there are currently only five Heritage Trees east of I-205


